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Manipur's own women's day

(Ningol Chakkouba is a unique festival in Manipur which celebrates the coming of married women to their paternal homes for a meal.)

Every November comes an important occasion of festivity for the Manipuri society. This year too, the annual festival of Ningol Chakkouba has just passed.

It is a unique festival, one that celebrates daughters in a country which has otherwise an overall discriminatory attitude towards girls. On a November day, married

sisters and daughters are invited to their paternal home for a sumptuous meal. History records that this practice began in 33 AD when Nongda Lairen Pakhangba was the king of Manipur. His sister Laishna, had once gone to the house of her brother, Poireiton. Apart from a multi-course delicious meal, she was given various home-grown fruits and handloom spun clothes as gifts. Since then, this practice has been an inextricable part of the Manipuri society.

Initially, this practice was found only among the Meiteis and the Kabuis. Though now, it has become a catalyst for communal harmony in the State. It began when some decades ago, civil society organisations started hosting feasts here and there where women of all communities were invited for a meal. Each of them was also given a handloom spun sarong or shawl as a gift. The idea behind these mass feasts was communities lived as members of the same family before the advent of Vaishnavism in the State in the 18th century after which untouchability began to be practised in Manipuri society leading to a social divide with a lingering effect.

Former Chief Minister Rishang Keishing had also a plan to take forward the idea officially and host a lunch for couples belonging to both tribal and non-tribal communities. But then, he was ousted from power before his

dream was realised.

However, the practice of organising feasts where women of all communities are invited is spreading into most parts of the four valley districts dominated by the Meiteis. Such occasions underline the common belief that the tribals and the non-tribals are brothers of the same parents; that while the elder brother staved in the hills, the younger brother decided to remain in the valley. However, with an ugly twist of history, an artificial social chasm was created which is deplored by one and all.

Yet another change in the last few decades can also be seen taking over the festival. In the early times, families preserved the pristine beauty of the social practice by gifting ordinary clothes and arranging simple but delicious

daughters. However, with more and more illgotten money trickling in to the State, many began to use the festival as an occasion to show off their riches. There began a competition among many newly rich families about who can afford more expensive gifts for their daughters and sisters. However, there has been appeals

time and again from various sections of society not to corrupt the unique practice.

On the day of Ningol Chakkauba. it is a must for married women and their children to don new clothes. They also have the custom of bringing fruits and sweets to their parental homes while coming for the meal. This is the harvest season for the traders who deal in imported fruits, sweets and other heavy demand items.

However, the family of Irom
Sharmila who has been on fast

unto death since November 4, 2000 demanding the repeal of the Armed Forces Special Powers Act, 1958 has not hosted Ningol Chakkouba since then. Sharmila is the youngest and most loved sibling in the family. When she has been on fast unto death, languishing in a prison there is no charm or meaning in hosting such lunches which are meant for festivity and jubilation, said some family members

of most commodities skyrocket on the eve of Ningol Chakkauba Prices of many commodities in Manipur are anyway one of the highest in the county due to lack of the Government initiatives to check untrammelled extortion of illegal taxes by militants of many hues.On top of that, most prefer to gift apples and coconuts brought from outside the State over locally grown fruits like the guavas and the berries and end up paying inevitably a huge sum Yet another offshoot of the festival is hosting games by some youths, such as dice, housie, etc., for the public, at times from October onwards. One such housie ticket this year was as high as Rs 10,000 which came with the

Though such events tarnish the pristine image of the festival, the good outcome of it has been that some have succeeded in making the festival a unifying force for the Manipuri society at large.

2 Naxals gunned down in Sukma encounter with police

Naxals were on Thursday killed by security forces following a major gun-battle in Chhattisgarh's insurgency-hit Sukma district.

"The operation was launched collectively by CRPF's elite Commando Battalor of Resolute Action's (CoBRA) 208 battalion and two teams of state's District Reserve Group (DRG) under Bhejji Police Station limits," Inspector

General of Police, Bastar Range, S

The operation was based on the information about the location of Maoist commander Hidma, who is the head of 1st military battalion of Naxals, in the region. "We received inputs that Hidma had arrived to take part in a marriage ceremony of a close cadre in Dubbakonta village following which we mobilised our composite forces last evening towards the region to nab him," he said. When security forces reached near Dubbakonta - a Maoist hotbed early this morning, a group of armed insurgents opened indiscriminate fire on them,

triggering a gun-battle between the two sides, the IG said. "So far, two bodies of Maoists in 'uniform', besides a muzzle loading gun, Insas rifle magazines and Maoist articles have been recovered," he

allegedly involved in the 2013 Jiram valley Naxal attack in Bastar's Darbha region in which 31 people, including some senior state Congress leaders, were killed and the 2010 Chintalnar ambush in Dantewada in which 76 troopers were killed.

Bomb threat: European flight makes emergency landing in Bulgaria over "hoax call"

Paris, November 19: A European Boeing 747 on Thursday morning made an emergency landing at the Bulgarian airport after 'bomb threat'. Sincea week after the Paris attack, these kind of threat even if it is a "hoax call" is taken seriously by the aviation safety department across the globe.

After Paris attacks which claimed the life of 129 people and leaving behind injured more than 850 many airports and flights were closed due to "hoax flights were closed due to "hoax call" or suspicious baggage found at the airport premises. According to reports, the plane which landed at Bulgarian airport was flying from Warsaw to Hurghada in Egypt. The passengers were taken to a safe place and the Bulgarian airport was evacuated after the threat. It is still not sure how many people were on board, however some reports suggest there were 161 people on board but the airport authorities are about to give its statement.

"Tensions and struggles don't bring change. It is about how many people to integrate," Modi said during his interaction with 169 IAS officers of 2013 batch.

Noting that they are the people going to manage several districts across India, he said, "The positive change you bring will be beneficial for the nation." He said 10 years are very crucial

for them and they should make the most of these years and ensure their foundations are strong.

"Our actions must be in tune with our vision. What we learn on the ground is very important," the

Prime Minister said encouraging them to initiate people-friendly initiatives to further ease

governance. These IAS officers for the first time started their career as Assistant Secretaries from the national capital, rather than their respective states allocated to them as cadres. They have been assigned important desks related with policy and flagship programmes of the concerned ministries and departments.

They are being groomed by principal mentors at the level of Secretary and divided into four clusters, namely infrastructure, social sector, regulatory, enabling or support sector and economic or commerce related, as assigned by the Cabinet Secretary. Apart from the desk work, the young officers have been visiting

the attached offices besides undertaking field visits.

5.3 magnitude quake jolts Kathmandu

Kathmandu, Nov. 19: A5.3 magnitude earthquake jolted the Kathmandu valley and neighbouring districts on Thursday morning.

According to National Seismological Center, the jolt was the aftershock of the 7.9 magnitude Great Quake of April 25. Its epicenter was at Nimlung in Sindhupalchowk district

The number of aftershocks of the Gorkha earthquake, with local magnitude of 4.0 or above has reached 408, the Himalayan Times reported.

Panic-stricken people ran out of their houses when the aftershock struck at 9:30 am.
