

48 hours Chandel bandh called

A statement of the Naga Chief Association Chandel said that the decision was taken during a meeting held on September 22 at Zion Village Authority Office Chandel by members of Naga Chief Association Chandel, Kuki Chiefs Association Chandel and Job Card holders of Chandel over the misappropriation of MG-NREGS wages 2016-17 1st Phase by the Government of Manipur and not taking any concrete decision on the matter of the memorandum, submitted to the Chief Minister of Manipur through the Deputy Commissioner Chandel on September 14. The association had also staged a sit-in protest on the same day. The statement said that electricity, PHED, Medical, religious Service, Military force and Schools will be exempted from the purview of this bandh.

Manipur Maoist lambasts Labour Minister

8 Journalists killed in India in 2017

JFA demands high level probe into Punjab journo-murder

Guwahati, Sept 24: Worried at repeated incidents of journalist's murders across India, the Journalists' Forum Assam (JFA) urges the Union government in New Delhi to formulate a national action plan for delivering earliest justices to the victim families. The northeast India based media forum, while expressing shock over the killing of another journalist in the country, also appealed to the media fraternity as a whole to get united on demanding safety & security measures for working journalists as early as possible. The third case of journo-murder in September itself was reported from Punjab, as senior journalist KJ Singh, 66, along with his old-age mother Gurcharan Kaur found murdered in his residence at Mohali on Saturday (23 September 2017). Singh, who used to work for The Tribune, The Indian Express and The Times of India in Chandigarh, was found with his throat slit. Punjab chief minister and

veteran Congress leader Captain Amarinder Singh had already ordered to form a special investigate team (SIT) to probe into the dual-murder. He also reiterated his commitment to maintain the law & order situation in Punjab accordingly. KJ Singh becomes the eighth journalist murdered in India this year immediately after Shantanu Bhowmik, 29 (killed at Mandai of Tripura on 20 September) and Gauri Lankesh, 55 (shot dead at Bangalore of Karnataka on 5 September). Prior to them, a Haryana based television journalist (Sunder Singh Rana) was shot dead on July 29. The other victims include Kamlesh Jain of Madhya Pradesh (killed on May 31), Shyam Sharma (also of MP (15 May), Brajesh Kumar Singh of Bihar (January 3) and Hari Prakash of Jharkhand (January 2). India lost six journalists to assassinations in 2016, which was preceded by five cases in 2015. The populous country witnessed murders of only

two scribes in 2014, but the year 2013 reported as many as 11 journalists' murders, where three northeastern media employees also fall victims to the perpetrators. The killings of Sujit Bhattacharya (proof reader), Ranjit Chowdhury (manager) and Balaram Ghosh (driver) inside the office premises of DainikGanadoot in Agartala broke as sensational news as Tripura had no recent record of journalist murders. So Tripura repeated its shameful record on journo-murder after three years with Shantanu's killing on duty hours. "We appeal to the Punjab authority to probe into the murders of Singh & his mother with all sincerity so that the culprits cannot escape the punishments. We also extend moral supports to the agitating media-persons in Punjab, Haryana & Chandigarh demanding justice to the senior editor-journalist," said a statement issued by JFA president Rupam Barua and secretary Nava Thakuria.

Uprooting Manipur's sovereign status in 1949 by India has been the cause for the armed liberation struggle: Irengbam Chaoren

Imphal, Sept 24: Proscribed group People's Revolutionary Army (PLA) the army wing of the Revolutionary People's Front (RPF) is observing its 39th Raising Day on September 25. President of RPF, Irengbam Chaoren, in his message in connection with the observance recounted the history of the erstwhile state and its present status. The president of the outfit blamed the annexation of Manipur by India in 1949 as the root of the armed struggle in this region. "The uprooting Manipur's sovereign status in 1949 by India has been the fundamental moot point and cause for the armed liberation struggle", the statement said.

It further said that the retreat of British imperialism in 1947 automatically led to Manipur's reversion to its age old independent status. "On 15 October 1949 India again forcefully merged Manipur within its fold while India unilaterally abrogating the then Manipur's constitutional and republican government. The annexation of Manipur in 1949 marked the beginning of India's reworked colonization of Manipur. India's annexation of Manipur is a blatant violation of international norms on respecting the sovereignty of States", the statement added. Recounting the historical facts, the statement said that Manipur's existence as an

independent Kingdom State for ages is neither a heresy nor a folklore but a facticity of history. The facticity of possessing indigenous language, script, belief system, culture and arts, sense of a maturing boundary with a history of established military power with administrative institutions are neither alien nor unknown to the Manipuri worldview. The neighboring powers such as Ava, today's Myanmar, had historically accepted Manipur's presence in the Western South East Asian political theatre. The Manipuri soldiers marked their power and might by penetrating upto Kaungmudaw Pagoda, the then Capital of Ava with 7 edges of sword inscribed on Pagoda's door. The outreach of

Manipuri soldiers clearly implicates the courage and a national sense with which our forefathers stood firmly. The statement added, the memories of the battle of Khongjom fought during the Anglo-Manipur war of 1891 exemplifies the fact of our national being that is rooted in the love for freedom and independence. The aspiration of the people for independence is not a mere historical heresy but an established ethos that defines Manipur. Under the garb of India's pretentious democracy, time tested morale and national sensibility of the Manipuri people have been severely eroded. The civilizational symbiosis

between the hill dwellers and valley dwellers in the State for more than two thousand years has practical foundations on which it is built upon. The symbiosis has always stood firm against the powerful exogenous onslaught on its independence. In spite of a short occupation of Manipur by the Burmese, the 'Treaty of Yandaboo' of 1826 restored the independence of Manipur. The British's association with Manipur as a friendly ally did not last long due to treacherous colonial conspiracies of the British. The people of Manipur did not find it difficult to sense the colonial ambitions of the British. There was no dearth of national aspiration among the

Manipuris whose valour to protect and preserve Manipur's political freedom led to the Anglo-Manipur war of 1891. The defeat in the 1891 war resulted in the colonization of Manipur. There is no denying the fact that each one of us have been incessantly contributing towards the collective cause from multiple fronts. The peasants, the workers and the daily wage earners have never shied away from their basic struggle for survival and support for the downtrodden masses. The endeavours of the artists and sports persons to show the world their worth have reaffirmed the inspirational Manipuri national pride.

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
