Four Indians enter medal round; Mary leads the way in World Boxing

Five-time world champion M.C. Mary Kom became the first Indian on Tuesday to enter the medal round of the 10th AIBA Women's Boxing World Championships at the packed JD Jhadav Hall

here this afternoon. The experienced Indian icon gave a perfect start and the platform to India's medal campaign at home, outsmarting Yu Wu from China 5:0 in the Light Fly (48 kg) category which was later cashed in on by Lovlina Borgohan, who accounted for Aussie Kaye Frances Scott in Welter class (69 kg), with another unanimous decision of the day. Later in the evening session, Sonia beat Colombia's

Yeni Castenada. But Manisha Moun, Bhagyabati and Pinki Rani Jangra were not so lucky on the day. The aggressive 20-year-old could not get past top-seeded Stoyka Zhelyazkova Petrova and ended up on the losing side, the split verdict (4:1) going in favour of the Bulgarian, while Bhagyabati Kachari lost to Colombian Jessica Sinisterra, in a split verdict (2:3). Pinki lost to a superior North Korean Mi Choi Pang, the latter winning 5:0. What separated Mary Kom and Manisha was the patience that the 35-
