NEFIS submits memorandum to UGC on the issue of nondisbursal of non-net fellowships to research scholars at MU

North-East Forum International Solidarity (NEFIS) had submitted a memorandum to the Chairperson, University Grants Commission (UGC) regarding the very urgent issue of non-disbursal of Non-NET fellowships to the research scholars enrolled at Manipur University. These fellowships were instituted to be granted to all the research scholars i.e. those enrolled in scholars i.e. those enrolled in M.Phil and Ph.D courses at the Central Universities across the country. But, at Manipur University the scholars are being denied the fellowship, the amount for which has not been released since 2017. A statement of the Forum said

that many anomalies concerning the Non-NET fellowship abound at MU, especially since it has not published any regulations/ guidelines regarding it. There is a gross anomaly as far as Non-NET fellowships at MU are concerned. At all the central universities across the country, the fellowships are disbursed according to the date of registration of the candidate. However, at MU already registered scholars are considered eligible for the fellowship only after they have completed the coursework. The scholars who have just enrolled are made to undergo a pre-Ph.D course, without which they are considered as ineligible for the fellowship. This system, it should be known, is not followed in the other central universities, and it arbitrarily penalizes the research scholars of MU.

Another issue related to the matter is the exclusion of those students as recipients of Non-NET fellowship, who are being supervised by college teachers, it added. "In all the other universities all

the research scholars enrolled at respective departments of the central universities are entitled to receive Non-NET fellowships, but it is not so at MU. Clearly, in the absence of regulations/guidelines governing the grant of Non-NET fellowships, such arbitrariness is bound to creep in". NEFIS said.

It added that the research scholars are made to conduct their research in the absence of any fund, which negatively affects their work. More importantly, many research scholars, especially a large number coming from socioeconomically weaker sections, in the absence of any fellowship, are forced to get their admission cancelled. The unjustified and arbitrary rules, therefore, serve to victimize the research scholars at MU.

In the memorandum submitted to the UGC, NEFIS demanded that the pending Non-NET fellowships of Ph.D research scholars at Manipur University should be immediately released and the disbursal of fellowship should commence from the date of admission of research scholars at the respective departments, rather than the arbitrary and unjustified rule of staring it after coursework. Also, the arbitrary rule of not granting Non-NET fellowships to research scholars being supervised by college teachers should be immediately scrapped and there should be parity among all the research scholars enrolled at the university. NEFIS also demanded that Manipur University should be directed to publish regulations/guidelines governing the disbursal of Non-NET fellowships, similar to that published by the other central universities. NEFIS would be scaling up its campaign against campaign against victimization of research scholars in the coming days, if its demands are not met

Former cricketers predict result of much-awaited India-Pakistan clash

The Indian team enjoys a 100 per cent winning record against Pakistan at the World Cup and Harbhajan Singh believes the trend will continue even this year. The offie does not give Pakistan any chance in their match against India as according to him, the Sarfaraz Khan-led side lacks experience.
"Pakistan's form isn't that

great and they don't have much experience as well. Pakistani teams in the past were difficult to beat but their current team will lose 9 times out of 10 against India," Harbhajan told 'India Today' programme here.
"There is no chance. When

Pakistan had great teams in the past, even they couldn't beat India in the World Cups. How will this team beat India now?" added Harbhajan, who believes India-England match will be a bigger one than the clash between the sub-continental arch-rivals.



the CSK-star believes India will need to be at the top of their game as they will be the side under more pressure.

"The pressure will be more on India. When two fighters spar, the stronger one always has the fear of failure. Pressure of losing against Pakistan will be immense. Because I know what happens in India when we lose to Pakistan," he said. 'People don't remember what happened in other matches but when we play against Pakistan they remember everything. is. Pakistan didn't start well in World Cup 2019 but we have always been slow starters. But I hope they gradually go up in this tournament.'

R Ashwin said bowling will be the key for Pakistan during

this World Cup.
"Like Younis bhai said, the experience of not having played under pressure and the magnitude of it, they don't play in Pakistan any more. All these things are big factors," Ashwin said. "But see what happened in the

Champions Trophy final in 2017. They have the skill especially in their bowling

out any team if they have the runs on the board." Bilateral cricketing ties

between India and Pakistan were suspended after the 2008 Mumbai Terrorist attack with the two neighbours playing each other only in ICC events ever since.

Younis however called for resumption of cricketing ties between India and Pakistan. "India and Pakistan should resume cricketing ties. It is very important for the game. We anyways have so much problems with our law and order in both countries. Cricket should be played between the two nations," he said.
