#### Human activities are behind 75% of forest fires

In the similar hot day summer three years ago, I decided to spend a couple of days in the cool moi ntains of Himachal Pradesh. After crossing Kalka and Parwanoo, I

witnessed clouds of smoke emerging out from among the dense trees on the hills. Tree trunks were burning and sufficienting smoke was mixing in the air. The dreamy picture of green hills which I had in my mind vanished soon and I felt sorry for the state of affairs. It was sad to see that there was fire in the forests all over the way. As the mercury rises in the summer, there are regular reports of forest fires. This time again, forests are burning in many places on the Himachal hills. Forests of Kumaon and Garhwal divisions of Uttarakhand are also on fire. Fire incidents have been reported at 124 places in the state. Earlier, fires have broken out around Sariska Tiger Reserve in Rajasthan, Similipal Wildlife Sanctuary in Orissa, Ladkui Forest in Sehore district of Madhya Pradesh and Kodaikanal Hills area in Tamil Nadu. There have been a total of 1216 incidents of forest fires this year so far

causing an estimated loss of over Rs 30 lakh forest property and wildlife. About 22 per cent of India's forest cover is highly vulnerable to fire. Experts say that a forest fire needs only two things, one is fuel and the other ignition. If fuel is available, the fire continues for many days. The sharp leaves of pine act as fuel in the fire. Therefore, the pine forests are more dangerous. Dry leaves and twigs lying on the ground also act as fuel. If we talk about ignition, then human activities are said to be responsible for 75 percent of the fire incidents. More work should be done to prevent forest fires and measures should be taken to reduce them. Climate change has the greatest impact on the weather. This is affecting lives and economies around the world

The United Nations report on climate change says that the coming few years will prove to be troublesome for the world. Every year 560 natural disasters are expected in the world, compared to 400 annually till 2015. If we look at earlier figures, between 1970 and 2000, there were only about 100 disasters on an average every year. In the coming times, there will be more disasters like forest fires and floods. Apart from these there will also be pandemics and chemical accidents. Like the forest fire, thoughts flash in our mind. A report by Queens University of Canada states that 6,000 thoughts come to a person's mind every day, of which 80 percent are negative thoughts. These have an adverse effect on the daily routine of the person and cause mental stress. If meditation is done for four-five minutes every day, then the damage can be reduced. Cleaning and managing thoughts that come to mind is as important as we do with the household items. You can get rid of useless memories by writing them down on a diary or paper. This can calm your mind. After getting rid of negative thoughts, the activ-ity of the mind increases and creative thoughts get pouring.

#### **Scorching Heat**



Millions of Indians are experiencing a bru-tal heatwave that is throwing lives and livelihoods out of gear - and there is no relief in sight. Severe heat conditions have been consistently reported over large parts of India since

the beginning of the summer season in March this year. Maximum temperatures in west Rajasthan and Vidarbha in Maharashtra have remained between 40 degrees and 45 degrees Celsius throughout the last two months. Although March marks the seasonal transition

from winter to summer, this year the month saw two spells of heatwaves And technically, summer season has not even started. There have been at least 26 heatwave days since the beginning of March, and as many as four spells of heatwaves in a little over a month and a half. The last of these heatwaves remains ongoing. The India Meteorological Department (IMD) declares a heatwave for a

region when the maximum temperature reaches at least 40 degrees Celsius in the plains, at least 37 degrees Celsius along the coast, and at least 30 degrees Celsius in hilly regions. Alternatively, a heatwave is declared when the maximum compared to the temperature of mum temperature rises by between 4.5 degrees Celsius and 6.4 degrees Celsius above normal. A severe heatwave is declared when the maximu perature departs from normal is more than 6.4 degrees Celsius. A third condi-tion for a heatwave arises when an area records a maximum temperature of more than 45 degrees Celsius and up to 47 degrees Celsius on any given day.

Summers have always been gruelling in many parts of India - especially in the northern and central regions. Even before air-conditioners and water coolers started selling in the millions, people had devised their own ways of coping with the heat - from keeping water cool in earthen jugs to rubbing raw mangoes on their bodies to ward off heat strokes.

But many experts say India is now recording more intense, frequent heatwaves that are also longer in duration.

The effects are visible. Farmers say the unexpected temperature spikes have affected their wheat harvest, a development that could potentially have global consequences given supply disruptions due to the Ukraine war. The heat has also triggered an increase in power demand, leading to outages in many states and fears of a coal shortage. Prime Minister Modi also flagged the increased risk of fires due to rising temperatures. Apart from climate change, factors such as increasing population and the

resultant strain on resources are adding fuel to the fire. This, in turn, leads to factors that worsen the situation, such as deforestation and increasing use of transport. And the cost of such extreme weather events is disproportionstely borne by the poor. Since 2015, both the central and state governments have issued a num-

ber of measures to mitigate the effects of heatwaves, such as banning work-ing outside during the hottest hours and issuing timely advisories. But these can only be completely effective if accompanied by big-picture changes such as an overhaul of environmental protection laws and greening cities.

ably in the interest of the BJP too. For the saffron party, the emer-gence of local forces in different parts of the country may not always give goosebumps of delight and a silent giggle of satisfaction. The leaders in the BJP

and the RSS are undoubtedly aware of the fact that there is a danger in such small regional parties emerging with numerous self-interests and re-gional aspirations, indubitably threatening its dream of inching towards an Akhand Bharat. Emergence of small parties and their grouping to nge the national parties were challe tested and failed. This trend perhaps is viewed as a move capable of politi-cally destabilizing the country. The Congress party's efforts to pull it from the gorge of its political apathy should be viewed and valued with sympathy. The recent elections held in five states buried the last drop of hope remaining with the Congress certainly dragging it to an outsider a strategist who behaves like a hawker, selling his ideas to anybody in the street, with little or no political acumen as a party worker. Surpris-ingly, the generation gap that the party generated through its decades of hits and misses is so deep as it remained completely dependent on one family. No leader to the stature of a national eminence and ability to pull a crowd is visible in the party. Its complete dependence on the dynasty sidelined everybody throwing it to the stage of severe political irrever-ence in the present political context. The way out is of course a revamp and the party leadership's gesture in this regard is indicative of the ur-



perceptions indicating that it alway stood, at least vocally, with the majoritarian aspirations, which indeed should be disputed. On the ground, the reports on the welfare schemes executed so far evidently prove the fact that the government at the center could bring its projects to the last man on the queue without much mishmash. The Congress, when it was in power, mostly failed to implement welfare schemes impartially and its welfarism for the selected few was largely countered by the BJP's welfare plans for all. The schemes implemented in the last eight years were unquestionably impartial according to agencies. The Congress's extreme obsession for a redeemer, a rescuer is signaling to its utter desperation and an urge to come out of an illusory world that it imprisoned itself. The harshest reality that the Congress would stumble on is the sycophancy that it reared and trained its leaders through, and the redemption plan offered by Kishor is triggering to break this menace.

Presenting his meticulously crafted roadmap for the revival to its high command, Prashant Kishor waited for the Congress to respond but the party, though impressive on what the strategist viewed on its plight, offered him nothing special ut a position in the Empowered Committee which it set up for the party's preparations for 2024 general elections. Kishor's views were almost in line with what the dissent ing G 23 had viewed and the high command's decision to lean on and lend an ear to what the veterans agged long back is a positive sign. Meanwhile the Congress was irritated and skeptical of the intentions of Kishor and his team for striking a deal with the Telangana Rashtra Samithi (TRS) for the next year's assembly elections. The TRS and the Congress are face to face in the state of Telangana, Kishor, on the other hand, is with a definite plan to de-throne Modi in 2024 and all set to bring the regional bulls to one yoke with Congress taking an important role in the plough. The strategist, seemingly with humility, denied the offer the Congress made, possibly dissatisfied with the trifling weight that the party threw on him. What seems to be mounting on Sonia Gandhi is the magnitude of the threat of existence and the fear of being discarded by the cadre. ## SC seeks reply on de-reservation of in-service quota seats

#### New Delhi, April 30:

A two judges bench of the Supreme Court presided by Justices DY Chandrachud and Hima Kohli issued notices to the State of MP in a special leave petition preferred by a number of government doc-tors and medical officers from the state who have challenged the de-reservation of 30 per cent seats earmarked for them in PG medical courses in the state

The SLPs were filed against the judgment of the

division bench of Madhya Pradesh High Court, which had affirmed the dereservation of 30 per cent quota seats after the conclusion of the second round of counselling, holding the same to be in tune with existing rules 4 and 14 of the Medical Admission Rules 2018. The SC however declined to grant interim relief for the current year, but agreed to examine the constitutional question of law for the ensu-ing academic year 2022-23, in view of the gravity of the prob-lems pointed out by the appel-

nt doctors The appellant Dr Shaline Agrawal & Ors. were represented through advocates Siddharth R Gupta, Abhikalp P Singh, and Shivam Baghel, wherein the state has been directed to respond in 4 weeks. Petitioners are all inservice doctors who had served in the remote, rural, tribal, and interior villages of the state for the prescribed period of 3 years and above and were claiming the benefit of a 30 per cent reserved quota in the PG medi-cal courses provided by the

state for such doctors. The state in the counselling and admission process conducted for the academic year 2021-22 had de-reserved all these inservice quota seats and allotted them to open/direct category candidates, which was assailed by all of them before the High Court on the primary ground that there is no such provision in the parent rules for de-reservation/conversion of seats from in-service quota to non-service quota.

## **Healthcare Services Covered Under Consumer Protection Law: Supreme Court**

#### New Delhi, April 30:

The Supreme Court Friday said that doctors and healthcare services are not excluded from the ambit of the Consumer Protection Act of 2019 and termed the PIL concerning it as a "motivated PIL" A bench of Justices DY Chandrachud and Hima Kohli affirmed the Bombay High Court verdict which held that doctors and healthcare service providers are covered under the ambit of the Consumer Protection Act.

Appearing for the peti-tioner an NGO "Medicos Le-

gal Action Group", senior advocate Siddharth Luthra said that in the 1986 legislation was no mention of healthcare in the definition of services and despite there be-ing a proposal to include it under the new Act, it was actually not included. The bench said that the

statute says "services of any description" and added the definition of service is wide enough and had the Parliament wanted to exclude it, then it would have said expressly Justice Chandrachud said, "Actually your client committed a selfgoal. Some consumer

AAP winning a seatiIn Guwahati Municipal Poll ss a jolt to Trinamool Congress Congress is in a bad shape in Assam as the minorities get jittery

For the Delhi-based Aam Aadmi Party (AAP), winning a seat in the 2022 Guwahati Municipal elections was not exactly a major victory, but it certainly helped in consolidating its position as the undis-puted front runner among regional parties in India currently ahead of the Trinamool Congress (TMC).

The political significance of the AAP's victory, as the party contested these elections for the first time, went well beyond the number of seats won. Ms Masooma Begum, the party's candidate contesting the minority-domi-nated ward 42, won convincingly. Along with the local Assam Jatiya Parishad (AJP) party also winning one seat, the AAP could claim to have resisted the massive victory eep of the ruling NDA (BJP AGP) coalition which ended up bagging 58 out of the 60 wards. The BJP won in 52 wards as against the AGP's victory in 6.

Most state-based observers said the outcome was not surprising given current politi-cal trends in Assam. Prime Minister Narendra Modi, BJP President Mr, J.P. Nadda ad state Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma thanked the people of Guwahati for their upport. So did Mr Arvind Kejriwal, AAP leader and Chief Minister of Delhi, as he con-gratulated Ms Begum.

The Indian National Congress the biggest opposition party, ended up not for the first time, as the worst losers, failing to win a single ward. Most post poll analyses indicated

that pro-Congress voters especially Muslims, had voted r the AAP in many areas, ditching the grand old party. In part the sad story of the Assam Congress is not very different from that of its other state units wherever it is in the opposition - a major failure of the top leaders to help/in-spire local candidates and

workers, lack of any effective programme or rallying slogan, inadequate resources and the usual infighting at local levels. Nor was the Congress's defeat restricted to Guwahati only. Senior Congress leaders

made their usual pre-poll claims about doing well in these elections according to Guwahatibased media reports. Alto-gether civic elections were held in 80 urban/semi-urban areas. The NDA won in 73 but the Congress could not win a

single civic body. BJP leaders accused both the AAP and the AJP of resorting to communal propaganda in their pre-poll campaign. As stated before, Muslims and other sections not supporting the NDA seemed to voted en masse for the AAP. A sure sign that minority and other votes had shifted to the AAP in a major way was the fact that candidates of the newly contesting party came second in over 20 wards, in contrast to the poor performance on part of Congress candidates. They mostly claimed third or lower positions.

The outcome should provide much food for thought, mostly negative, for leaders of both the Congress as well as the All India United Democratic Front (AIUDF) led by Mr Badruddin Ajmal MP in the

days ahead. In West Bengal too the results were followed closely by analysts. The fact is ruling TMC circles in Bengal, deter-mined to make their mark prior to the 2024 Lok Sabha elecas the strongest and most determined political challengers of the ruling BJP, have every reasons to be as unhappy as Congressmen over the GMC poll results.

Ever since the recent Goa Assembly elections, where the TMC and the AAP had both contested, relations between the parties had been strained. Abandoning their earlier re-spect for each other AAP leader Mr Kejriwal had questioned the seriousness, even the objective, of the TMC's poll campaign in Goa con-ducted by the Bengal leaders. The fact that the AAP later

won two seats in the 40-strong house contesting for the first time, did not endear Mr Keiriwal or his party to the TMC, as the latter failed to win any seat. This despite its expensive, high-octane cam-paign led by MP Abhishek Banerjee, political heir appar-

ent to Mamata Banerjee. Now the TMC has been outflanked by the AAP's foray in the East, after its debacle at Goa, True, veteran Congress leaders in Assam such as Mr Ripun Bora and others have recently joined the TMC. This followed some hectic efforts made by Ms Sushmita Dev who herself crossed over from India's grand old party to the TMC some time ago, to revive her present party's fortunes in Assam

Earlier efforts made by TMC leaders to strike roots in

Assam especially among Barak vallev-based Bengalis did not succeed. But Ms Dev also faces

major problems. Even as she attends to problems in Assam the Tripura unit of the TMC, set up with much fanfare only months ago by Mr. Banerjee and other heavyweights has shot its bolt. The lone winning TMC candidate in the recently concluded Tripura civic polls recently resigned to join the BJP which has won 330 out of 335 seats.

Bottom line: With the AAP upstaging the TMC both in the East and the West and about to launch a fully functional unit in Bengal next, the TMC's ambitions to emerge as the lead-ing regional party to challenge the BJP all over India may not easy to achieve. (IPA Service)

## The uncertainty looms large in labour arena on International Workers' Day

By Raiu Vernekar Mumbai, April 30:

Even as we are celebrating the International Workers' Day on First May, with drastic changes in labour laws to en-sure the "Ease of Business", the uncertainty looms large in labour arena across the country.

While presenting the budget 2022, Union Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman had said that the next target of the government is to create 60 lakh jobs with "PM Gati Shakti" which will pull forward the economy and will lead to more jobs and opportunities for the youth.

The Mumbai-based Centre for Monitoring India Economy (CMIE) in its recent report has stated that the overall unemployment rate in the country has dropped to 7.5 per cent with urban unemployment rate at 8.5 per cent and rural at 7.1

per cent in April this year. But the situation varies in different parts of the country. As per the data, Haryana has the highest unemployment rate at 26.7 per cent, followed by Rajasthan and Jammu and Kashmir at 25 per cent each. Bihar is at 14.4 per cent, Tripura at 14.1 per cent and West Bengal at 5.6 per cent. The permanent jobs are

waning out and the contract system is the order of the day. Surprisingly over 100 casual employees continue to work on the contract basis, in the Union Government-controlled media-Mumbai Doordarshan, for the last over 5 years. Even some of the departments of the Maharashtra Government, have been employing people on contract basis with minimum salary.

As against this, those in organised sector continue to fight for more remuneration. It is common knowledge that the successive Pay Commissions are being set up to fulfil the demands of the Government employees by the Union Government. Also the dearness allowance based on inflation is revised time to time.

Several jobs were lost and the economy was thrown out of gear due to Covid pandemic in the last two years. The num-ber of gainfully employed people which was 44 crore in 2013, came down to 38 crore in 2021. This meant that 6 crore people went out of jobs. Al-though the Union Government claims to be generating jobs every year, no jobs are avail-able says CPM Polit Bureau member Dr Ashok Dhawale. In Maharashtra alone nearly 4 lakh people are unemployed. Over 90 percent people work
