Government says ATSUM leaders to release before 4; ecoblockade released

Imphal, August 08:

Government of Manipur had assured to release the five arrested student leaders of the All Tribal Students' Union Manipur (ATSUM) before 4 pm today. A minister of the N. Biren Singh Government said that the arrested students will be released before 4 pm today after an agreement was reached tween the Government of Manipur and represen-

tatives of the ATSUM. The agreement was brought after a marathon talk between a ministerial team of the state govern-ment led by TA Minister Letpao Haokip and members of the ATSUM late yesterday.

Talking to a news channel, TA Minister Letpao Haokip said that the government has reached an agreement with the ATSUM leaders and following which the ATSUM will lift the

economic blockade, and all the five members of ATSUM in Judicial Custody will be released before 4 pm today. However, till 4.00 pm there is no report of the five ATSUM leaders being released from judicial custody.

When this newspaper tried to contact the representative of ATSUM to ask whether they would lift the economic blockade or not, none could be contacted.

Schools reopen today after being shut due to rising COVID cases

Schools reopen today as per the recent orders by Manipur Government. All schools will be resuming offline classes from today since they were closed due to

rising COVID-19 cases.
Schools were earlier closed till July 24, 2022 as a precautionary measure after the state reported many new COVID-19 cases. Since the COVID positivity rate was shooting, the government de-cided to close schools for students upto class 7.

However, with situation

coming under control, schools - all government-run, government-aided and even private schools, have been asked to reopen from today for offline classes. These new orders also mention that everyone must follow COVID-19 safety protocols on the campus for

everyone's safety.

According to the orders all students and teachers will be required to wear face masks at all times, especially when on campus. They are also advised to maintain social distancing and avoid overcrowding in common areas. In case, someone falls sick or reports of having any symptoms, they must avoid coming to schools

Schools have also been instructed to let parents know about these guidelines. Needless to say, even parents have been asked to keep a check on their wards and not send them to schools, in case they report

of any COVID-19 symptoms.
Further, all heads of schools have been asked to take steps to ensure that stu-dents and staff are vaccinated and they get their booster shots, if eligible. All these decisions were taken by Manipur Government after a COVID-review was carried

CorCom boycotts Independence Day celebration

Appeal all not to hoist India's Tri-Color Flag as a part of the India Independence Day Celebration

CorCom, the proscribed umbrella organization, has announced that it will impose a total shutdown on August 15 from 1 a.m. to 6.30 p.m., as it has done every year. The general strike will not apply to medical and essential ser-vices, electricity, water supply, fire services, the media, or religious matters.

In the press statement, M. Sak-hen, Media Coordinator of CorCom, stated that after forcibly integrating WESEA and Manipur, all the democratic institutions were abolished and the indigenous people were made dependent on India. All the indigenous customary laws for self-governance were torn into shreds and the Indian central will was enforced on the sons of the soil, the outfit claimed.

For the past 72 years, Manipur has been existing as a colony of India after it was forcefully annexed as a part of India's expansionism on Oc-tober 15, 1949, the release stated. Therefore, it added that there are no grounds for the people of Manipur to cel-ebrate the Independence Day of India.

Attempts are still under-way to transform the indigenous cultures of WESEA through the imposition of Hindu ways of life, the popularisation of the Hindi language, and the population invasion of Hindi-speaking

"India is waging a major war of racial discrimination over the indigenous populations of WESEA. The RSS-BJP's ideology of "one nation, one religion, and one language" should be fought tooth and nail by the rising indigenous peoples, "opined the outfit. It stated that the imple-

World Champion Boxer Nikhat Zareen of BOI family Shines

Kudos to Bank of India Officer Nuoos to Bank of India Officer and Indian boxer Nikhat Zareen for clinching the gold medal in the on-going 2022 Commonwealth Games after an emphatic win over Northern Ireland's Carly Mc Naul in the women's Light Flyweight fi-nal bout. Hailing from Telangana's Nizamabad, Zareen first came to limelight in 2011 after she became World Junior boxing champion in 50 kg. She also came into the news when she challenged the World Champion Mary Kom and the Box-

ing Federation of India for Mary Kom's selection for the 2019 World Championship without trials. However, when the trial was finally held,

she was defeated by Mary Kom by 9-1.

Before Nikhat, the legendary MC Mary Kom (2002, 2005, 2006, 2008, 2010 and 2018), Sarita Devi (2006), Jenny RL (2006) and Lekha KC (2006) bagged a gold medal at the Women's World Boxing Championships for India. Nikhat Zareen won a gold medal at the 2022 IBS Women's World Boxing Championships. At the international boxing association (amateur) Women's Youth and The Junior World Championship in Antalya, she won the gold medal. She also won a bronze medal at the second India Open International Boxing Tournament field in Guwahati. This time this 26-year-old Indian boxer has won a gold medal by 5-0 against Carly Mc Naul of Norther Island in the finals. Nikhat is reigning World Champions in the Women's Over 48kg-50kg (Light Fly) category and have once again brought glory to the with another medal. This was her major competition after the World Championships and people expected her to win Gold here. Now her job is to land punches inside ring and make India proud. Nikhat was fascinated by boxing art when her father introduced her to

the sport at a young age. He has always been in favour of her boxing. Initially, she trained herself by watching her uncle train her cousin's brothers. Later, seeing her interest, her father trained her for a year and then inducted her into the Sports Authority of India in Vishakhapatnam in 2009. There she was trained under I.V Rao, a Dronacharya awardee. Her father made lot of sacrifices in his life for Zareen's sake. He moved out of Saudi Arabia quitting his job since boxing required her to wear shorts and shirts which was not allowed there which was recalled by Zareen in one of her interview. A win or a loss doesn't matter to her. She just want to

gain as much experience as she can put her best in Paris Olympics.

Bank of India – Telangana Zone had celebrated her success at the Zonal office and wished her to win medals in upcoming boxing events such as Commonwealth, Asian Games, and Olympic Games. It was really an iconic moment for the Bank of India as its own officer has won a Gold Medal for the country in boxing for second first time in the history. Nikhat's win was among the top accomplishments for Indian sport in

Zareen has received huge praise from all over India for her remarkable achievement. Even Prime Minister Narendra Modi congratulated the boxer to raise the Indian flag high at the World Championships

Every Indian sportsperson dreams of standing on the Olympic podium and Nikhat Zareen is no different. Everyone has one dream - to win a gold medal at the Olympics and she is also living in that dream and she will carry out her dream. Super whistles to Nikhat Zareen on landing this great feat with a punch.

Marching ahead with the spirit of Swatantra Bharat

It was probably two decades back, when a group of journalists and Guwahati-based patriots marched on a street of Guwahati to celebrate the Independence Day. As a number of separatist armed mili-tant outfits imposed a general strike on the day (that was the way the ethnic insurgents made them visible in the public domain continuing their decades long armed struggle against New Delhi) the entire city wore a deserted look, Markets, business centers, private vehicles and even the roads were empty as the militants, through their media state-ments (which were published with special focus in the local morning ewspapers), threatened the people not to join the observation.

The group raising a single na-tional flag (Tri-colours were unavailable at that time in the market and even the people did not keep the flag in residences as it was then assumed as a volatile article to pro-cure from any sources) marched from Ambari to the bank of historic Dighalipukhuri. A photojournalist took a snap of the march and it was then sent to a Delhi-based editor for use. The editor, who might have had no idea of the then trouble-torn northeast India, asked a strange question, why there was so little number of participants in the march. In reality, the editor missed the valid point that the small group of people came to the street defying the diktat of armed militants, who were trying to run a parallel administration in the alienated region.

One may raise an intriguing question, were the editors of Assam sensitive and responsible enough. sensitive and responsible enough.
The newspapers (private news
channels were yet to fully bloom in
the region) in Guwahati
probably were sensitive but not responsible. Prior to I-Day or Republic Day, as if the editor (or concerned reporters) were eagerly waiting for the statement from separatist mili-tants boycotting the auspicious days. It always made newspaper headlines, but when the brave and patriotic citizens tried to raise voices against the militants' diktat, the same editors behaved as unwanted items. So when the small group of patriots started observing the sacred days by hoisting & unfurling the Tricolour, most of the editors either

avoided the news or gave it an insignificant space.

The situation did not improve. even when the Assamese satellite news channels entered into the scenario after some years. Rather they started often misrepresenting and disrespecting the spirit. As usual, the news channels repeated the militant's version 'why celebration of I-Day and R-Day was useless' prior to both the revered occasions. Many news channels later made it possible for some top militant leaders to address their audience 'live'. The reporters, equipped with high resolution cameras, callously asked the students what were their programs on I-Day and R-Day (as those were simple holidays because of the militant's imposed total shut down), but they did not simply remember that one Assamese young girl sacri-ficed her life for the same Tri-colour. The reporters (from both the print and electronic media) and their edi-tors hardly formulate a simple question to those young people, had they not heard of Birbala Kanaklata!

For some times, it was a large number of outlawed militant outfits including United Liberation Front of Assam, National Democratic Front of Bodoland, Kamtapur Liberation Organisation, Manipur People's Liberation Front, Kanglei Yaol Kanna Lup, Kangleipak Communist Party, People's Revolutionary Party of Kangleipak, People's Revolutionary Party of Kangleipak/Progressive. Revolutionary People's Front, United People's Party of Kangleipak, United National Liberation Front of Manipur, Tripura People's Democratic Front, National Liberation Front of Twipra, Hynniewtrep Na-tional Liberation Front of Meghalaya, Garo National Liberation Army, etc which declared the general strike across northeast India on both the national days on 15 August and 26 January and called upon the people to boycott as well as prevent the celebration as a mark of solidarity against New Delhi.

But braving the gun-toting mili-tants and their threats, Journalists' Forum Assam (JFA) appealed to the north-eastern people to celebrate both the days defying the militants' decree. JFA argued that a number of martyrs from Assam including Piyali Phukan, Maniram Dewan, Piyali Barua, etc stepped up movements against British domination. Extraordinarily brave Kanaklata Barua. Mukunda Kakoti, Kushal Konwar, Tilak Deka, Bhogeswari Phukanani, Nidhanu Rajbangshi, Kamala Miri, Lerela Boro, Madan Barman, Rauta Kachari, Hemoram Patar, Gunavi Bordoloi, Thagi Sut, Balaram Sut, etc laid down their lives for the honour of Tri-colour. JFA president Rupam Barua, who conceptualized the model to oppose the rebel's diktats, asserted that Tri-colour is the symbol of our common strength. If we ignore the sacrifice of martyrs it would only indicate our ungratefulness to them. Once started with a small group of journalists (includ-ing this writer), the celebration at the city-based press club premises slowly attracted more like-minded fellow Guwahatians, including many children, to join in the occasion (simultaneously with the government celebrations), where the Tri-colour continues to be hoisted with fan-

Veteran author-journalists Dhirendra Nath Bezboruah, DN Chakravarty, Naresh Rajkhowa, Kanaksen Deka, Nirupama Borgohain, Sabita Goswami, Preeti Barua, etc took the lead and senior scribes Hiten Mahanta, Ranen Kumar Goswami, Ajit Patowary, Geetartha Pathak, Champak Borbora, Mukul Kalita, MK Goswami, Bhupen Bargohain, Sabita Lahkar, Rubie Barua Das, Raman Bora, Bijay Bora, Anup Sarma, DN Singh, Pranabjit Doloi, Kamal Krishna Das, Girindra Kumar Karjee, Manish Goswami, Prasanta Majumder, Kumud Das, Anjanil Kashyap, Dipankar Devsarma, Anirban Choudhury, Biswajit Nath, Samir Sandilya, Nayan Bhuyan, Sanjay Paul, Hiren Chandra Kalita, Prabhat Sarma, Maniit Sarma. What return should India's Mamata Banerjee provide to Bangladesh against the PM' Sheikh Hasina's 'Mango Diplomacy?

Most Bangladeshi and India media report read that the West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee has received 600 kg of mangoes from Bangladesh Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina as part of her "mango-hilsa diplomacy."

Hasina delivered mangoes to President Ram Nath Kovind and Prime Minister Narendra Modi last week, according to the Bangladesh Deputy High Commission in this country.

According to a Bangladesh's deputy high commission official in Kolkata, a few more chief ministers in the eastern region will likely receive similar gifts.President Kovind, Prime Minister Modi, and the chief minis-ters of West Bengal, Tripura, and Assam received mangoes from Prime Minister Hasina last year as well. Hasina delivered mangoes from Rajshahi, including kinds like Golapkhas and Amrapali, as it is the peak season for the delectable fruit in Bangladesh.

India is a longtime friend of Bangladesh. Keeping that friendship intact, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina

sent mangoes for her friend Indian President Ramnath Kobind and Prime Minister Narendra Modi, just like last year. On Friday afternoon, 1,200 kg of Amrapali mangoes were delivered to the residences of the President and

Prime Minister of India.

The mango was delivered as a gift to the respective diplomatic chan-nels by the Bangladesh High Commission in New Delhi, India, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's gift of mango and hilsa is further strengthening the diplomatic relations and friendship between the two countries.

Last year too, during the mango season, Sheikh Hasina sent 'Amrapali' and Haribhanga mangoes as gifts to the President of India, Prime Minister, Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee, Tripura Chief Minister Manik Sarkar and Assam Chief Minister HimantaBishwa

The Joint Consultative Commission meeting between Indian External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar and Bangladeshi Foreign Minister AK Abdul Momen on June 19 included discussion of the Prime Minister-level meeting's itinerary.

According to a representative of the foreign ministry, the two nations

will hold a Joint Rivers Commission (JRC) meeting before the PM-level summit in New Delhi. The JRC has not met at the ministerial level in the past ten years, despite the fact that the sharing of water from transboundary rivers is a major concern for the two nations. In October of this year, Prime Minister Hasina last traveled to India.

India and Bangladesh are attempting to improve regional collaboration, particularly in connecting South and Southeast Asia, in the wake of the Covid-19 outbreak and the Russia-Ukraine war, which severely interrupted the global supply

The Teesta water-sharing agree-ment is one of the many persistent disagreements between Bangladesh and India. Since a few years ago, there has been talk over the Teesta watersharing deal between Bangladesh and India. However, there is no longer a Teesta problem. The sharing of Teesta River water became the most crucial topic of dispute following the Ganges Treaty in 1996. At the two nations' ministerial-level conference in August 1983, the Teesta water-sharing issue between Bangladesh and India was first raised.

Manmohan Singh, who was India's prime minister at the time, traveled to Dhaka in September 2011. A

Teesta water-sharing deal was scheduled to be inked at that time. The tem-porary agreement had a 15-year term. The agreement establishes Bangladesh's entitlement to 37.5% of the Teesta's water and India's right to 42.5% of it. However, Mamata Banerjee, the chief minister of West Bengal, blocked the treaty from being

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina traveled to India later in 2014. The Teesta Treaty was anticipated to be signed following this trip to India. The PM met with Mamata Banerjee, the chief minister of West Bengal, during the trip. Even so, the West Bengal Chief Minister was not on board.

She claimed that the primary factor influencing her disapproval was her unwillingness to provide water to Bangladesh at the expense of North Bengal's residents. Even in 2015, Indian Prime Minister Narendra Moditrav-eled to Dhaka alongside West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Baneriee, Despite the Teesta Treaty receiving great press at the time, nothing came of it. As part of the Indo-US strategic partnership, US Navy Ship (USNS) Charles Drew arrived at L&T's Shipyard at Kattupalli, Chennai to undertake repairs and allied services

on August 07, Sunday. The ship will be at the Kattupalli shipyard for 11 days and undergo repairs in various areas. The arrival of US ship for repairs to India is considered a major boost to "Make in India" and "Self Reliance in Defence"

The US Navy has awarded contract to L&T's Shipyard at Kattupalli for undertaking maintenance of the ship. Indian shipyards offer wide-ranging and cost-effective ship repair and maintenance services, using advanced maritime technology platforms. The arrival of US ship for repairs signifies the capabilities of Indian shipyards in the global ship repairing market, an official release stated.

Defence Secretary Dr. Ajay Kumar, Vice Chief of Naval Staff Vice Admiral SN Ghormade, Flag Officer Commanding Tamil Nadu & Puducherry Naval Area Rear Admiral S Venkat Raman, and other senior officials of the Defence Ministry visited the shipyard to welcome the vessel. Consul General in Chennai Ms. Judith Ravin and Defence Attaché at the US Embassy in New Delhi Rear Admiral Michael Baker were also

present. On the occasion, Defence Secretary Dr. Ajay Kumar termed the event a red-letter day for the Indian shipbuildi industry and the Indo-US defence relationship. "We are pleased to welcome US Naval Ship USNS Charles Drew to India, for making her voyage ready. It marks the beginning of a new chapter for deeper engagements", he said.

He described the arrival of the US ship for repairs as a sign of maturing Indian shipbuilding industry and added that today, India has six major shipyards with a turnover of nearly \$2 billion. "We are making ships not only for our requirements. We have our own design house capable of making all kinds of state-of-the-art ships"

"The country's first Indigenous Aircraft Carrier Vikrant is a shining example of the growth of the Indian shipbuilding industry. Under the innovation ecosystem, vessels capable of undertaking autonomous missions have been built by Goa Shipyard Limited and some of our start-ups. The shipbuilding industry today is not just carrying out conventional things. but is also amalgamating the latest technologies with it," Dr.

Ajay Kumar said. 'Indian defence exports which were worth about Rs 1,500 crore in 2015-16, have

grown by 800% to around Rs 13,000 crore. A major destination for Indian exports is the US," Dr. Ajay Kumar said and thanked the US partners for their cooperation and support to the Indian defence industry.

US Consul General in Chennai Ms. Judith Ravin said: "In April, at the US-India 2+2 Ministerial Dialogue, US Secre tary of State Antony Blinken and Secretary of Defence Lloyd Austin affirmed their intention to explore utilizing Indian shipyards for repairs on US Navy vessels. This inaugural repair of USNS Charles Drewis is a landmark de-velopment to be celebrated as a symbol of our strengthened US-India partnership."

Defence Attaché at the US Embassy at New Delhi Rear Admiral Michael Baker said: "Our shipping industries positively contributes to a free and open Indo-Pacific by partnering to deliver effective, efficient and economical repair of mili-tary vessels."

Member of the Executive Council and Advisor to the CEO of L&T for Defence and Smart Technologies (L&TDST) JD Patil said, the Marine Sealift Command of the US Navy had undertaken a rigorous evaluation of select shipyards in India and cleared L&T for undertaking repairs on their vessels. It is a recognition of the modern infrastructure at the ship-yard built to global standards.

India logs 16,167 new Covid cases in 24 hours; positivity rate at 6.14%

Agency New Delhi, August 08:

India once again witnessed a marginal decline in daily Covid-19 cases on Monday, with the country recording 16,167 new infections in the past 24 hours, according to the Union Health Ministry data. With this, the active caseload of the country currently stands at 1,35,510.

The data shows that a total of 15,549 people recovered from the coronavirus infection in the last 24 hours, taking the country's cumulative recoveries to 4.34,99,659. The recovery rate remains consistent at 98.50%.

In India, the daily positivity

rate is 6.14%, while the weekly positivity rate is 4.64%. The country has conducted over 87.81 crore Covid tests till date whereas 2 63 419 tests were conducted in the last 24 hours.

Under the Covid-19 nationwide vaccination program, a total of 34,75,330 doses were administered in the last 24 hours while more than 206.56 crore vaccine jabs have been inoculated to the eligible beneficiaries in the country so far.

Meanwhile, the central government has provided more than 197.63 crore (1,97,63,11,575) vaccine doses to States or Union Territories. out of which, over 7.07 crore (7,07,24,170) balanced or unutilized jabs are still available with them, the health min-

istry added. Maharashtra on Sunday reported 1,812 fresh Covid-19 cases, taking the state's tally up to 80,59,732, according to the health department data, while the national capital logged 2,423 new infections yesterday. The positivity rate in Delhi also surged to 14.97%, marking the highest percent-age since 22 January this year.

In view of the rising Covid-19 cases, Rajesh Bhushan, union health secretary, wrote to the health secretaries of Delhi, Kerala, Karnataka, Maharashtra, Odisha, Tamil Nadu and Telangana, to step up vigil as mass gatherings are expected during various up-

Worried about the fresh rise in cases in the country, the central government had flagged concerns to states and union territories showing an surge infections and positivity rate and low levels of testing and vaccination.

The health experts have recommended various measures to mitigate the situation of rising Covid-19 cases in the country. An expert has said the Covid-19 cases are definitely rising but symptoms are mild, stating, "the Covid cases are definitely on the rise, Delhi also reported more than 2,000 cases yesterday. But most of the patients are having very mild symptoms."

Next name is Indira Priyadarshini Vrikshamitra Awardee Devaki Amm of India who have been protecting biodiversity by bringing and nurturing plants from different parts of India. He has raised public awareness about the

environment.
There are more than 3000 trees of different species in the forest planted by Devaki Amma. There are also some rare plants like Lakshmi Tharu. Chinese Orange etc. He has saved 200 types of trees and shrubs that supply fruits, veg-etables and flowers. In this episode, Chewang Norphel, who is called Ice Man, born in the year 1935, is an Indian civil engineer from Ladakh, who 15 artificial glaciers have been created Another such figure is Karnataka environmentalist Padmashree Salu Marada Thimmakka, who is noted for planting 385 banyan trees for four kilometers along the high-way between Hulikal and

Everyone knows that Sunderlal Bahuguna was an environmentalist and a hero of the Chipko movement. He fought for the conservation of forests in the Himalayas, first as a member of the Chipko movement in the 1970s and later leading the anti-Tehri Dam movement from the 1980s to early 2004. there uttarakhandIn D, Prabha Devi has planted more than 500 trees which stand as the guardian of Palasat village. There are also some other women working towards restoring the ecosystem, taking inspiration from whom students and teachers together make similar efforts, it will be good for the environ ment. One of them is Latika Nath who is known as Tiger Princess. Latika is the first wildlife scientist in the country to receive a doctorate de-gree on tigers. Such is the name of Prerna Singh Bindra who is a conservationist, journalist, author and are workers. Prerna works with forest officials, rangers and NGOs in protected areas for wildlife such as the Nandhaur Wildlife Sanctuary in Uttarakhand and the Naina Devi Himalayan Bird Conservation Reserve.

Similarly, Poornima Devi Burman, a renowned environ-mentalist from Assam, is working towards saving the Greater Adjutant Stork, or Hargila, from extinction, Another inspiring personality is Kriti Karanth. Congress must stand up to Modi **Government's ED terrorism**

Ideological clarity, robust organisation need of the hour

The enforcement directorate's relentless pursuit of the Congress and other opposition parties can prove to be counter-productive in the long

For a start, the impression can grow that the supposedly autonomous agency is being less than professional in its tar-geting of the non-BJP parties. The narcotic bureau's botched inquiries into the drug-related charges against Shah Rukh Khan's son, Aryan, can substantiate this belief.

Besides, the Congress's determined resistance to the probes against it can have two effects. One is to rev up the party's generally moribund organizational structure, and the other is to spread the message of the government's "misuse" of the so-called caged parrots against the BJP's political opponents. It is a charge which will not be disbelieved by size-

able sections of the population.

That the BJP is uneasy about the perception of playing hooky with the rule book is evident from its irate response to the Congress's comments on the arrests being courted by the party's senior leaders as well as the rank and file

Otherwise, the BJP would not have wheeled out a senior leader like Ravi Shankar Prasad to argue that the Congress's references to inflation and unemployment were nothing but "bahana" or excuses to take to the streets to protect the Nehru-Gandhi family from the

accusation of wrong-doing.

The BJP also has a ready answer to the charge against it of undermining democracy, as levelled by Rahul Gandhi. It is to recall the Emergency of 1975-77 which remains an albatross round the Congress's neck.

However, since two wrongs do not make a right, it is doubtful for how long the BJP can depend on the references to the Congress's misdeeds of nearly half a century ago to deflect attention from the allegations of questionable policies today.

The Congress may derive some satisfaction from its ca-pability to mobilize fairly large number of supporters in Delhi and other towns to protest against the enforcement directorate's action against the party's first family.

But what is bound to bother it nevertheless is how the BJP can manage to ride the choppy waters of inflation and unemployment despite the Congress's strenuous efforts.

None of the latter's diatribes on the Rafael aircraft deal and the Pegasus snooping device have succeeded in unsettling the "chowkidar" (guard) who is supposed to be "chor" (thief), Evidently, either the people pay no heed to such allegations against the BJP or the ruling party's cred-ibility is too solid for the charges to breach it. On both counts, the failure is the Congress's, for it has been unable to earn the people's trust or undermine the BJP's reputation.

The Congress's present tactics are, of course, defensive in nature. It is seen to be battling against heavy odds since the party has been un-able to rally anyother opposition party to come to its aid. A probable reason for the Congress's loneliness is the Nehru-Gandhi family's stranglehold on the party.

It is no secret that many of those who have drifted away from the Congress like Sharad Pawar or Mamata Banerjee or Amrinder Singh have done so

because of the family's unwillingness to accommodate them.

This is also true of Himanta Biswa Sarma and Jagan Mohan Reddy, both of whom are today chief ministers of their respective states. If the Congress had been openminded enough to give them enough political space, they might have remained in the party and made it much

As long as the family monopolises its grip on the Congress, making it impossible for anyone in the organization to rise to the top, the party will not be able to hold the BJP to account on its many faults, including the worldwide belief that its reign is eroding India's democratic standing. It is for this reason that it is said that the family is the BJP's greatest

However, there are curious similarities between the BJP and the Congress in this respect. Just as the Congress is sorely dependent on the NehruGandhis to stay afloat, the BJP cannot do without Narendra Modi. It is patent enough that the party will enter a rocky, uncertain phase in Modi's ab-

True, virtually all Indian parties revolve round one per-son – whether it is the Trinamool Congress or the DMK or the Rashtriya Janata Dal. Ravi Shankar Prasad has mocked the Congress for the lack of internal democracy. But this is true of all parties.

Unless the parties develop robust organizational struc tures based on anideological base – not the BJP's polarising communalism or the Trinamool's vacuous "ma, mati, manush" chant (the Congress's ideology remains unclear) – they will be afraid of falling apart in the absence of a dominant figure. This fear also makes some of them susceptible to the "misuse" of investigative agencies by a ruthless

World number 10 Lakshya Sen lost his way after a dominating start against 87-ranked Jia Heng Teh of Singapore. Sen however recovered to complete a 21-10, 18-21, 21-16 win in the men's singles semifinals.

In the first men's singles semifinal, Sen was stretched by his Singaporean opponent. He relied on relentless attack to put his Singaporean opponent on the backfoot and he was able to do that in the first game. A couple of forehand smashes on the Singaporean's right helped him take a 1-0 lead in

Making an impressive start in the high-voltage clash, Sindhu made early in-roads by getting the better of the Cana-



dian in the first game. The World No. 7 secured the first game (21-15) in the gold medal match. After wrapping up the first game in her favour, Sindhu thrashed her opponent in the second game (21-13) to enter her name in the history books. By virtue of her flawless win over Li in the women's singles final on Sunday, ace shuttler Sindhu has secured her firstever gold medal at the Commonwealth Games.

Completing a hat-trick of wins over Canada's Michelle, Sindhu outclassed the World No.13 to open India's medal account on Day 11 of the CWG 2022 in Birmingham, Sindhu

also improved her head-to-head record (9-2) over the Canadian superstar. Earlier this year, Sindhu had played two matches against Canada's World No 13. Prior to her monumental win in the women's singles final at CWG 2022, Sindhu had emerged victorious in both of her previous two encounters this year

Sindhu has joined Kidambi Srikanth and the duo of Treesa Jolly- Gayatri Gopichand by becoming the fourth Indian medallist in badminton at CWG 2022. Earlier, World championships silver medal-list Kidambi Srikanth signed off from the CWG 2022 with a

bronze medal in the men's singles event. After the women's singles gold medal match in Birmingham, India's Lakshya squared off against Malaysian shuttler Tze Yong NG in the men's final

The momentum shifted towards Jia in the second game as he slowed the pace of the game. A drop shot followed by a backwand winner made it 8-8 before Jia went into the interval with a 9-11 advantage. A slew of un-forced errors from Sen saw Jia take the next five points to make it 9-16. Sen tried to hang in the game, but after the Singaporean took a shoe change break at 15-18, he was able to level the match when Sen hit a forehand long. Sen built an 11-7 lead in the

decider though Jia made the Indian work hard for every point. The Singaporean was also given a last warning for delay in between points. Sen got four points and converted the first one with a deft drop shot that set up a backhand

"I didn't get in the rhythm in the second but I managed to pull it off in the end. The

crowd support also helped a lot in the first game," said Sen. "It was a tough game today. I have played him before, so I was expecting a good, fastpaced match.

"I wanted to control the net much better, but overall and from the back, the defence was very good. That was a really good match before the final," said Sen. Earlier, former world champion Sindhu, who has a silver and a bronze from the 2018 and 2014 editions, was clearly the better player on display as she kept a firm grip on the match.

The Prime Minister, Shri Narendra Modi has congratulated P V Sindhu on winning the Gold medal in Badminton at the Commonwealth Games 2022 in Birmingham.
