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Withdraw Suspension of Operation (SoO) agreement with KNO/KNA and ZRO/ZRA - PAPPM

IT News Imphal, Dec 3:

Government of India and Government of Manipur should immediately withdraw Suspension of Operation Suspension of Operation (SoO) agreement with KNO/KNA and ZRO/ZRA, said People's Alliance for Peace and Progress, Manipur (PAPPM).

In a press release issued by People's Alliance for Peace and Progress, Manipur it is stated that the Suspension of Operation (SoO), a tripartite ceasefire agreement between Kuki National Organisation (KNO) and Central and State Governments was first signed on Aug 22, 2008 and it has been extending from time to time. Similarly Suspension of Operation agreement with Zomi Revolutionary Organisation (ZRO)/Zomi Revolutionary Army (ZRA) was also signed in 2008.

The statement further said that Poppy Cultivation in the Hills of Manipur has been taken up under the patronage of militant groups taking ad-vantage of the Suspension of

Operation (SoO). The quantum of drug smuggling through Manipur has also increased manifold since then. It is also known that these militant groups are bringing Mynamaree Nationals and settling them in the hills of Manipur taking advantage of SoO. The extortion in some hills districts which were otherwise not affected before has also increased dramatically since then, the statement

The statement added that P Soyang Haokip, President and Supreme Commander of the Kuki National Army (KNA) and the Chairman of KNO is of Myanmar origin and was born in Molnoi village in Saigang division, Myanmar. Dr. Seilen Haokip, the spokesperson of KNO is from Mizoram and was born of a Bengali father and a Kuki mother with strong Myanmarese connection. His mother later became the second wife of a person from Haokip clan of Saitu, Kangpokpi, and thus got his Haokip surname.
"Similarly, Thang Lian Pau,

the president of ZRA/ZRO is a Myanmarese national born Panmwarl village Tonzang Tsp., Chin State of Myanmar and he was a member of Myanmar Parliament. He has a Bachelor of Science degree from Mandalay University in 1984, and received a Masters of Science degree in 1988 from Rangoon University. He was the general secretary of the Zomi Na-tional Congress (ZNC) until December 1991. He became an independent MP after the SLORC banned the ZNC in 1992", it added.

According to Dr. Th.
Siamkhum, the Paites setteld
in Manipur came from Chin Hills in 1870s. Dr. H Kamkhenthang has also writ-ten in his book, "The Paites, a transborder tribe of Manipur" that the old Kukis came to Manipur in the 16th century and Thadou (New Kuki) in the later part of the 18th century and early part of the 19th Centuries. He has also mentioned that the Paites came to Manipur only in the later part of the 19th and early part of the 20th century.

Soyang Haokip, President of the Kuki National Army (KNA) and the Chairman of KNO is now talking of Zale'n-gam, meaning the Land of Freedom for Kukis. Similarly, The ZRA's proclaimed objective is to "protect the interests of the Zo ethnic groups" and to "unite the Zomi peoples under one state, Zogam' which overlaps the official state boundaries of India (Manipur and Mizoram), Myanmar (Chin State) and Bangladesh.

Then, the question of why the Centre and Manipur Government have undertaken the Suspension of Operation (SoO) agreement with these militant groups which are con-trolled by Myanmarese Nationals arises naturally. It appears that the Governments of India and Manipur are helping them to grow militarily under the pretext of peace process by handing over a large tract of land of Manipur under their control and thus sacrificing the national interest in the

The cantankerous behaviour of some students in colleges is often the offshoot of indiscipline in the schools in which they studied, and uncaring families. Instead of attempting to classify the acts of ragging as "soft" and "hard," we should employ the guidelines of the committee in letter and spirit. If faculty members communicate more informally with them, a healthy academic environment can be created.

Ragging and abetting the crime on the college campus will remove the lurking fear in the minds of freshmen, especially those who opt to stay in hostels. The authorities should not stop with just making rules but take effective steps to implement the same and highlight the ill-effects of ragging through the visual media. The move will implant fear and discipline in the minds of senior students who indulge in ragging. Even today, students from the rural areas have a lingering fear when they go to cities for higher studies. To dispel such fears, colleges should prominently display a banre saying their campus is free from ragging. Those who indulge in ragging look for temporary pleasure but end up destroying many lives. Students alone can put an end to it. Anti-ragging steps should be strictly enforced. Parents and teachers are equally responsible for eliminating the virus. Service organizations and NGOs should too launch awareness campaigns against the menace in educational institutions.

There was not much awareness in those days and ragging in the past was one way of familiarizing freshers with senior students. But now, the increased incidents of ragging have exposed the errors in our education system which may be successful in churning out academically brilliant

students, but has failed to inculcate proper values in them.

The cantankerous behaviour of some students in colleges is often the offshoot of indiscipline in the schools in which they studied, and uncaring families. Instead of attempting to classify the acts of ragging as "soft" and "hard," we should employ the guidelines of the committee in letter and spirit. If faculty members communicate more informally with them, a healthy academic environment can be created.

It is also noticed that those who indulge in ragging do not plan in advance. On most of the occasions, things go out of control. The guilty should not only be expelled but also barred from admission to any other

Looking to the increase in ragging incidents, active involvement of media and the civil society is essential in tackling the problem of ragging. The mindset of the student has changed and now we need to focus in on enforcing stringent measures like rustication of a student, withholding of scholarship, debarring a student from appearing in any test. If possible students who involve in ragging must be put in jail instead of just being suspended or expelled. An example needs to be set.


life as well.

The pupil has to contribute a lot from his side. The teacher can only sow the seed, but there must be the capacity in the person to whom the seed is sown to make it sprout, grow, blossom & fructify. Teacher is only a gardener; he sow the good seeds and evil habits by his own sloth, ignorance or had habits

man of wealth, but theywere highly respected. They were man of learn-ing & character, before whom the rich & the poor, the prince & the peasant, sat with folded hands and received knowledge of not only reading, writing and studying books, but also in building up good character and a disciplined life. This contact between the teacher &the student has now growing thinner & thinner every day resulting in lack of discipline amongst students. There is neither atmosphere nor opportunity for teacher &student for acting & reacting on each other for good, which ultimately has led to domination of evils. Such students, who have re-ceived indifferent training, when becomes teachers then the system collapses. Rajendra Babu lamented that the mushroom growth of institutions without necessary equipment does more harm than good. No institution can serve its purpose without sufficient preparations and equipment. The country is in a hurry to carry advantages of education to largest number of people and in fact our aim is to make everyone at least literate in the shortest possible time. There has not been corresponding depth and that quality has suffered on account of exclusive attention towards quantity resulting in lowering of standard at secondary & university level. In course of time this deterioration in the standard of education will affect the standard in all aspects of our life and ultimately the country will be a loser in long run. There should be certain diversification at the early stage so that those who are considered fit for higher qualifications,



whether in general or technical, are selected out and rest are allowed to take to the lines for which they are fitted instead of crowding the higher educational institutions from which they cannot derive the benefits that is intended, and thus only serve to lower the standards for all.

Rajendra Babu remarked that in colonial days, foreigners were interested only in turning out men & women for the work of running their administration, especially in the lower grades, and character building had no place there. In the absence of moral education in educa-tional institutions, there has been a decline in moral values in the society. All religionshave been gi equal statusin country. But that does not exclude the inclusion of those fundamental principles on which rest right & wrong and which are acceptable to all. Young men & women who have received degree from universities should conduct themselves as models, by spread ing good ideas & laying down bet-ter standards by their conduct, for those who have been less fortunate. Difficulties will come in life and the scholars should face them with determination and character to meet

them squarely & boldly. Succumbing to one temptation would invite a hundred more temptations to come in the way and the task would become more difficult. But if one refuses to succumb to temptations, the success will not elude all the time.

Rajendra Babu urged the stu-dent that they should remember that they have to fulfill the expectations of not only their here & dear, but also the society & country. Honesty & efficiently both equally are nec-essary to make the country progress. Students after completing their education close one chapter in their life and open a new one. Scholars should make the new chapter as ight as they can, and in spite of all difficulties, a determined will can cceed.

Rajendra Babu was a boon to the soil of India. Throughout his life, he follows the path of truth, non-vio-lence, patriotism and human values. He will remain a symbol of nation building not only for students and teachers, but for all sections of the society.His ideas and thinking will continue to illuminate the country for years.

Worried About Your Dry Lips In

Lip scrubs are the best way to treat chapped lips in winter and there are some amazing ones available on the market but are costly affairs.

We've come up with a few effec-

tive lip scrub formulas for super soft, kissable lips that can be made with

DIY Lip Scrubs during Winter basic kitchen ingredients and taste great, too.

1. Take one tablespoon of cocoa

butter, one tablespoon of coconut oil, one teaspoon of organic cocoa powder, and one tablespoon of brown sugar. Melt cocoa butter in a micro-wave-safe bowl. Transfer to a small iar and stir in the coconut oil. Refrigerate until the mixture has partially hardened. Stir in the brown sugar and cocoa. Apply to lips once a week. Let the mixture sit on your lips for 30 seconds, and then massage with your fingertip. Rinse and follow with lip balm.

. Take 10-20 petals of the rose with a little quantity of milk in a small bowl. Crush the rose petals in it to make a paste. Take a small amount of these homemade lip scrubs to apply to your dry lips. wash your lips with lukewarm water after 5 minutes and apply lip balm to keep your lips

3. Squeeze half a lemon into a bowl. Remove seeds if any. Add 1 ½ tablespoons of honey to it and mix well to make a smooth paste. Apply

the mixture all over your lips and leave for about 10 minutes. Wash off with water and finish with a moisturizing lip balm to nourish further

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4. Take 2/3 cup Brown Sugar 1/3 cup Olive Oil, 2 tablespoons of honey, 2 tablespoons of petroleum ielly. Combine ingredients in a bowl combined. Apply and mix until fully on lips and wash it 10 minutes

5. Take 2 spoons of pureed pa-paya into a bowl. Add 1 tablespoon of avocado oil and mix until smooth. Once done, apply the mixture on the lips and let it sit for a few minutes. Wash with plain water

6. Mix the coffee powder and honey in equal quantities together. Now, massage the mixture on your lips for a minute in a circular motion and leave it for some time to settle. Wash it off with slightly warm water. This scrub will slowly remove the dead skin cells and help to keep the lips mois-

7. You can mix honey with sesame seeds (til) and use as a scrub on the

lips, rubbing gently and then washing off with plain water.

8. Mix honey with walnut powder and rub gently on the lips. Wash off the same way.

Beyond The Universe

Science is always in search of an equation for confirming a proposition while Philosophy rises above the details and reaches an empirical deduction through imagination.

Theories of universe combine science and philosophy- the latter inevitably bringing in the idea of God to fill in the unexplained blanks in the man's understanding of uni-

Philosophy sensed that time and space had no beginning or end -which was an attribute of God. Science is struggling with this inter-pretation but it has already moved to explore space and its lifespan which is a function of time.

It has not put a seal on any asnects of universe beyond the stipulation of scientists that space was still expanding. They have furnished 'infinity' as a part of equation on the advance of both space and time. Infinity can also be envisaged as the answer to what sepa-

rates 'beginning' from the 'end'.
Seen from the presumed 'end',
the point of 'origin' would also be
away by infinity. Infinity is
science's way of conceptually mea-

suring 'infiniteness'.

Both space and time are on a course. The question is whether this course was irreversible. However, if something has no beginning nor an end then theoretically these two terminals have to merge to make

the process reversible. Infinity is a step towards examining universe from this angle.

Infinity has received acceptance and recognition as an equa-tion of science but has not yet offered an explanation of reversibility of an expanding universe or a retraction in the movement of time The 'uncertainty' principle is another invention of science which acknowledges that in a non-static universe no positioning of any element thereof could be defined with certainty.

Now, if space has to be expand-

ing in all possible directions and time also must free itself of a linear conceptualisation then science would have to explore how their beginning and end must merge. This merger would have the effect of accommodating both 'infinity' and :uncertainty' and making the cosmos a constant.

In a sense, the entirety of time and space was equated by philosophy with an omnipresent God.
What Science could look at is a theory that would embrace space and time in a 'constant' by using 'infinity' and ;uncertainty' as fac-tors in the equation for proof.

Meanwhile, theories like the 'evolution' of species, 'relativity' and 'action evoking equal but opposite reaction', are all dealing with parts of the 'whole' that universe was. A fundamental discovery is that matter was indestructible - it can only change into energy - and the fact that 'stability' was rooted in high velocity circulatory 'movement' as was the case with an atom on the inside.

'Relativity' does not demolish

the theory of the absolute as it can exist within the cosmological constant. Equality of 'action' and 'reaction' is a part of the interplay of stability' and 'motion'. Even the established interdependence of flora and fauna is a fact which is essentially a detail about how life as a product of 'evolution', was managed.

Science has found answers to many subsidiary queries that arise in a discussion on universe. Hindu Philosophy used the adjective 'Anant' or 'without an end', for the universe - which is also applied to God. Science has to establish that seamless transition was possible between a 'beginning' and the 'end' in relation to space and time to get the universe to measure up to this description.

The challenge for science is that if it worked on a 'part' of the undefined 'whole' then the experiment would find it intrinsically difficult to totally explain the latter and reach definitive terms for that

This limitation of science can be overcome through imagination - Einstein, perhaps the greatest scientist of all times, famously said that "imagination is more important than knowledge

In the case of universe, science has to prove that 'end was equal to beginning'. What is that journey that ends where it began from? It perhaps means that motion was illusion and that what was seen or felt as a moment of the journey was a point that never in fact

'Relativity' explained this at least partly. The thought that what you see is not the reality, is close to the Hindu spirituality's Maya -an illusion or a dream - believed to be a manifestation of God.

Could a dream be examined by a person who had woken up to sense what part of the dream en-visaged reality. The message was that examination of universe should help to focus on 'how it got created'.

manded to police custody. An FIR (No 1314/2022) has been registered and the accused- Mobeen Chand Mohammad Shaikh (19) and Mohammad Naqeeb Sadrealam Ansari (21) have been booked under sections 354,354-D and 34 of the Indian Penal Code a press release issued by police

on Thursday read.
The incident occurred when Hyojeong Park, a Korean YouTuber, was live streaming at Khar West in North West Mumbai at about 11.50 pm on November 30. The accused pulled her and one of them dragged her to his scooter. He was forcing her to sit on his scooter. She shouted and opposed their attempts.

The video of this incident was shot by passersby and one of them posted it on social media and also tweeted tagging the Mumbai Police. Next day, the police found out Park's address and called her to lodge a formal complaint. However she said that she

would do it later.
In the meanwhile, a Woman

police constable Sania Mulani lodged the complaint on behalf of the police. The police traced out the accused at Patel Nagar, Bandra West and arrested them. She admitted that she had experienced a similar scenario in a different country as well, but there the authorities did

not act quickly enough.

Delivery boy Nabbed

In another incident, the Khar Police arrested a delivery boy named Shahzade Sheikh (43) on charges of attempting to molest a woman while de-

livering her order.
The incident occurred when the complainant woman (25) ordered some vegetables at about 3 pm on November 30 through Zepto app. The ac-cused reached her place at about 3.30 pm. No sooner she opened the door, even before delivering the vegetables, he allegedly began video shoot-ing her. When she protested, the accused entered the house by pushing her and began abusing her. As she shouted for help, the security personnel of the building rushed to the spot and caught the ac-

The victim lodged the official complaint with Khar police next day. She told police that if she had not shouted for help. anything could have hap-pened. The offence (CR No. 1315/2022) was registered un-der sections 341 and of the Indian Police Code. The police traced out the accused within 12 hours from his residence at Mumbra in Thane district When produced in Bandra court, he was remanded to police custody till Saturday. Gujarat polls: Campaigning for phase II to wrap up with roadshows, rallies today

The second phase of the Gujarat Assembly elections is scheduled to take place tomorrow, Sunday, December 5. The high-voltage campaigning for the 93 seats out of a total of 182 constituencies in Gujarat will end on Saturday evening. All 833 candidates from around 60 political parties are making last-ditch efforts to

The 93 assembly segments are spread across 14 districts of north and central Gujarat, including Ahmedabad, Vadodara, and Gandhinagar, of which, the prominent constituencies include the Ghatlodia seat of Chief Minister Bhupendra Patel, Viramgam seat where Patidar leader

Hardik Patel is fighting on BJP ticket and Gandhinagar South from where Alpesh Thakor is fighting as BJP candidate.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi conducted a whirlwind campaign for some of the BJP candidates on December 1 and 2, including two back-to-back roadshows in Ahmedabad.

On Saturday, the incum-bent BJP will hold several roadshows and poll rallies of their star campaigners. Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath will hold poll rallies in Dholka, Mahudha, and Khambhat towns toda, while Union minister Smriti Irani will hold roadshows in Modasa and Siddhpur towns of north

In Gujarat polls phase I, the 39 political parties have fielded 788 candidates including 718 male candidates and 70 women candidates. The overall voter turnout was recorded at

The ruling BJP is confident of retaining the 27-year-long rule in the state, while the Congress is desperate to save its second position in the state and the Arvind Kejriwal-led AAP is making a gamble by trying to cash in on 'anti-incumbency'.

The counting of votes will be done on December 8 Results of the Himachal Pradesh Assembly elections will also

Assembly elections will also be declared on the same day. While Vijapur, Visnagar, Mehsana and Unjha seats in north Gujarat have a considerable number of Patidar voters. there are at least five such seats in Ahmedabad city -Ghatlodia Sabarmati Maninagar, Nikol and Naroda.

In south Gujarat, several seats in Surat city are considered as Patidar bastions, including Varachha, Kamrei and

Katargam.

Many believe that it was the Patidar quota agitation and resultant anger that led to the BIP's defeat on several Patidar-dominated seats in 2017, such as Unjha in Mehsana district as well as Morbi and Tankara seats in the Saurashtra region.

For the upcoming polls the BJP has given tickets to 41 Patidars, one more than the Congress's tally. The AAP has also given tickets to a significant number of Patidars

According to political analyst Ravindra Trivedi, chances are high that the community will bury the past and support the BJP this time.

Bengal: 2 killed, many injured in blast near venue of TMC's Abhishek Banerjee's rally

Implementation of Research Findings should be given more weightage than time spent conducting research - Professor R.K. Uppal

An effective, relevant, and quality research program is crucial to a nation's development. UGC, New Delhi re-cently reformed Ph.D. regulations, which is a very welcome step. An excellent step is to stop researchers from submitting research papers for Ph.D. Not requiring prior publication in the Ph.D. award process is a very appropriate step. When the Ph.D. research publication is the most signifi-cant research publication, why is it published at the mi-cro level? The decision to make publication not a re-quirement for the award of a Ph.D. is an excellent one. There are some people who have started research publication factories. Regardless of whether a research paper is relevant to your research findings or not, you pay the money and publish it. I be-lieve that there still needs to be some reform. The University Grants Commission in New Delhi ought to make it a rule that degree can only be granted when the results of your research are relevant and applicable; otherwise, they shouldn't. More important than the amount of time spent on research is how the findings are put into practice.

Dr. Rajinder Kumar Uppal, a prolific writer, a Man of Letters, an acclaimed academician, research stalwart, and the more ingenious guide has won accolades not only in the academic field but also in the genre of research. Presently, he is serving in the most exalted institution. Baba Farid College of Management and Technology (Punjab), as a Professor-cum-Principal. He is also visiting Professor in Indus International University, Himachal Pradesh.

The universities or fund-ing organizations for research should inform the researchers of the applications made of their findings and in which they have been incorporated them. I had two significant research projects completed that were funded and approved by UGC. New Delhi. but I have not yet heard any thing about how the results of my research have been applied. Teaching- research practice needs to go hand in hand. Quality and Excellence in Research is need of the hour. The research findings should have social impact as

body symbolising 'life' was a product of the five elements of nature - fire, water, earth, air and space - saw the assimilative link between cosmos and the manifestation of life.

In short, what the sage philosophers essentially realised was that universe was without a beginning or an end and that whatever was 'visible was part of the invisible

Science is to get this metaphysical equation right not-withstanding the limitations of a human mind, Philosophy could be helping science to draw closer to a solution by stipulating that cosmological constant symbolised the 'singularity' of God - the latter rep resenting the 'unseen' whole behind the 'visible' universe.

Universe will remain, in human thought, inseparable from God even after science confirms that universe was a continuum. Science and philosophy would be describing the same wholeness of uni verse by different names.

The World Cup's round of 16 is set after the final group stage games were played Fri-day. Group H was settled first. Portugal had already clinched a spot in the knockout round, but South Korea turned the group upside down with a late goal for a 2-1 win over the favored Portuguese that put it through as well. Uruguay in position to advance with a 2-0 win over Ghana, but the South Korea win eliminated the Uruguayans based on a tiebreaker. The Group G finales featured Brazil's 17-game World Cup group stage winning streak coming to an end after a 1-0 loss Cameroon, and Switzerland holding off Serbia to claim th group's second spot in the knockout round.

South Korea slide into World Cup final 16 after beating Portugal
Hwang Heechan's 90th-

minute winner has put South Korea through to the round of 16 at the World Cup with a 2-1

win over Portugal.

Hwang made his strike after captain Son Heungmin sprinted the length of the pitch in possession to set up the goal at Qatar's Education City Sta-

Portugal opened the scoring after five minutes, thanks to Ricardo Horta.

Group H was so competitive that it wasn't until eight minutes after the final whistle blew that South Korea knew their fate: Uruguay's 2-0 victory against Ghana was not enough to edge Son's men on goal dif-

The South Korean team huddled on the centre circle. crowding round a phone showing the final, frantic, moments of their rivals' game before exploding into joyous celebrations as they marked making it beyond the World Cup's group

stage for only the third time.
Portugal had already qualified for the knock-out stages before this final group game, and made six changes from the team that beat Uruguay 2-0; Dalot and Horta among those

bought in. The Koreans had to win to stand any chance of going through.

Uruguay out of World Cup

despite victory over Ghana Giorgian de Arrascaeta scored twice as Uruguay beat Ghana 2-0 on Friday, but it was not enough to keep them in the World Cup after South Korea beat Portugal in the group's other game.

Uruguay's Luis Suarez had infamously clawed the ball off the line in extra time at the 2010 World Cup to stop Ghana from scoring a last-gasp winner. Ghana missed the subsequent

spot kick and penalty shootout. This time, Andre Ayew missed from the spot with a tame 21st minute penalty that was easily saved by Uruguayan keeper Sergio Rochet. The penalty was awarded after Mohammed Kudus, Ghana's best player during the match,

was tripped by Rochet. Suarez, who had been booed by Ghana fans during the warm-up, claimed two assists shortly after. De Arrascaeta headed the ball over the line from close range after a shot from Suarez in the 26th minute and doubled Portugal's lead with a superb volley six

minutes later.
Uruguay later had a penalty claim turned down by VAR after Darwin Nunez tangled with Daniel Amartey in the box. La Celeste continued to dominate the game with Facundo Pellistri missing a good chance in the

65th minute.

In the final stages, news of South Korea's lead had reached Uruguay's bench, and Suarez, who had been taken off, was seen in tears.

Uruguay knew they needed goals to overturn the goal defi-cit, and Edinson Cavani had a strong penalty claim waved away after he clashed with Alidu

Cameroon out of World Cup despite stunning Brazil

Vincent Aboubakar scored late to give Cameroon a historic win over Brazil but it was not enough to secure their advance to the next stage of the World Cup in Qatar, after Switzerland defeated Serbia in the group's other game.

The 1-0 victory in the final Group G game on Friday left Cameroon packing their bags for the flight home, while already-qualified Brazil headed to the Round of 16 at the top of
