All is set for first phase poll, 173 including 15 women candidates are in the fray

The list of contesting candidates for Phase-I has been finalized. A total of 173 (one hundred seventy three) candidates are in the fray, out of which 15 (fifteen) are woman candidates, 6 (six) in Imphal West, 2 (two) in Imphal East, 3 (three) in Bishnupur, 3 (three) in Kangpokpi and 1(one) in Churachandpur, Total number of Independent candidates for Phase-I is 18 (eighteen).

The last date for filing of nomination for the Phase-II is over and total number of candidates who filed nomination is 96 (ninety six), Scrutiny of nominations will be taken up on 14.2.22. List of contesting candidates will be finalised after last date of withdrawal on 16.2.22.

A detailed meeting of Chief Electoral Officer,



Manipur, with the Special Observers, all General Observers, Police Observers and Expenditure Observerswas held at CEO's Office yester-day to review the Poll Preparedness. The Observers revealed that they have vis-ited some of the Polling Stations, have visited commis-sioning halls, strong rooms and counting halls and held meetings with the District Election Officers and Return-ing Officers. They expressed satisfaction at the overall preparedness and minor bottle-necks if any are brought to the notice of the concerned for necessary amendment.

Regarding Postal Ballots, 13,274 (thirteen thousand two hundred seventy four) Electronically Transmitted Postal Ballots (ETPBs) have been transmitted today, to the re-spective Record Offices for the Service Electors, for Phase-I. For Phase-II. 8667 (eight thousand six hundred and sixty seven) ETPBs will be transmitted to respective Record Offices on 17.2.22.

For Postal Ballots for Persons with Disabilities (PwDs), 80+ electors and those from essential services, a total of 6024 (six thousand twenty four) have opted for it in the Phase-I. 2687 (two thousand six hundred eighty seven) electors have opted for Postal Ballots under this category in Phase-II, totalling 8771 (eight thousand seven hundred seventy one) for both Phase-I & Phase-II combined. 195 (one hundred ninety five) polling teams have been con-stituted for both Phases, for getting these Postal Ballots casted.

Meanwhile, in order to ensure that nothing is left to chances for the successful conduct of the State Assembly elections, 2022, the District Election Officer/DC Pawan Yadav has convened Nodal Officers' meeting daily wherein problems and progress were shared and discussed.

Second randomisation of EVMs and VVPATs in respect Tipaimukh, Thanlon, Henglep, Churachandpur, Saikot and Singhat ACs is slated to be held on February 14 at the Conference Hall of DC's office.
A total of 34 candidates are

in the fray for the six ACs. With 8 candidates, 59-Saikot AC has the highest number of candidates. The contesting candidates in this AC are George T. Home Remedies for Thick Eyebrows

The eyebrows play an important role in determining the look of both the eyes and the face. In fact, they frame the eyes, so keeping them well groomed is as important as eye make-up. Keep the shape as natural as possible. Sometimes, one has sparse or thin eyebrows due to hereditary factors, or it may be due to protein deficiency. So have adequate protein in your diet and include a small bowl of sprouts daily. They contain amino acid and help growth of brows. The current trend in eyebrows

is the natural looking, thicker eye-brows. The classic curved eyebrows are also popular. For a young teenager, the eyebrows should be natural, without too much shaping or very high arches. If the arches are rounded, it helps to bring balance to sharp features and an angular face shape. For a mature woman, the outer corner of the brows may be lifted, i.e. the end of the brows should curve slightly upwards. It gives a lift to the face too. While plucking eyebrows to shape them, one should be careful. Tidy the brows regularly by brushing them into shape. You will need one of those tiny eyebrow brushes. Pluck out stray hairs between the brows and along the bottom of the brows. Never pluck hair from above the eve-

If you have very thin or sparse eyebrows, it may become a prob-lem and you may wonder how to encourage the growth of eye-brows. It is said that if you daily apply a little castor oil with a cot-ton bud on the eyebrows, they may become thicker. But, it may take time. Applying coconut oil is also said to help. You can apply it on the brows and leave it on all night. Curry leaves are also said to help. Keep curry leaves in hot water and leave it to cool. Then make a paste of the curry leaves and apply on the eyebrows.

You can also apply aloe vera gel. You can take the gel from the aloe

vera growing in your house. The gel obtained from the plant itself is the leaf pulp and is found in the inner portion of the leaves. First wash the leaf well and observe to tal hygiene while extracting the

To determine the shape of the evebrows, sit in front of the mirror and hold a pencil against your nose, going straight up, just above

the inner corner of your eye. Where the pencil touches, is where your eyebrow should begin. Then hold the pencil diagonally from the base of the nose towards the outer corner of the eyes, going just past it. This is the point where it should end. The highest point of the brows should be just above the iris.

While your brows are growing, you can also redefine your brows using an eyebrow pencil. First brush the brows into shape and then make short feathery strokes with the eyebrow pencil. The point of the pencil should be sharp, so that you can make light strokes. Avoid harsh black lines. Follow the direction of hair growth while mak-ing the short feathery strokes. Brush the eyebrows again after-

Root of bureaucracy

The big change in the India of the twenty first century would be possible only through reforms in the bureau-cracy. It is very important to change it with time. Neither Indian Railways nor any other institution can run with the work culture of the fifties. From Europe to America, the bureaucracy of all the developed nations has reformed it-self by taking lessons from the private

There will hardly be any country in the world which lives in the contradiction of bureaucracy like India. On the one hand the bureaucracy has to go through reproach, oppression and hu-miliation from all sides, on the other hand every youth even dreams of joining it. It includes every government institution from government schools, universities to courts. A few days ago in Patna and Allahabad, youths took to the streets in anger for railway recruitment exams and caused huge damage to government property. By the way, his point is also true to some extent that why there is a delay in recruit-ment in railway jobs? At the same time, these youths also pointed fingers at the examination system of recruitment. The pain of these young people is

justified. The poor and unemployed have been hit the most by the Corona tragedy of the last two years. Even more so in the Hindi region, because people are not able to start even small works here and there is no hope of it in future. But some cracks are clearly visible in this protest as well. He has called the bureaucracy indolent, indifferent, corrupt not knowing what to do. When such an allegation is made, the bureaucracy is not the name of a single per-son sitting at the top, but an entire institution consisting of several levels of staff-officers.

If seen, this charge is applicable at

every level. The responsibility of the senior officers is definitely more. But

be recruited under the examination of Rail-Recruitment Board, are equally infamous for their work-lessness, negligence, indolence. Who does not know that in the railway administration, the maximum number of passengers without

ticket, incidents of poi-soning, theft, delay, loss of railways belongs to North India and especially in those areas where there have been disturbances. After all, what society is this which is making such citizens who when they are out of the system are ready to ruin and break it and if they reach inside, to save it at any cost, There is also delay in recruitment from the railway administration and some

lapses have also happened.

Due to this protest, the railway administration has lost its sleep and is ready in principle for further reforms. The committee has been formed and it is expected that such steps will be taken so that such a situation does not hap-pen in future also. But in the light of such incidents, there is also a need to look at the entire system. The entire countrywas affected by the Corona period. But the southern states are fast coming back on track due to their better education system, skills, work culture, whereas in the northern states like Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, the eyes of the youth are only

private hands? Are such steps not being taken continuously in the railways?

Not only in the last five years, but over the last twenty years, a lot of ac-tivities of the Railways are moving towards the private hands under the Pub-lic-Private Partnership (PPP) model and by many other names, whether it is the maintenance of rest houses or development of stations or production units. Lots of work. In the past, preparations have been made to hand over about a hundred railway routes to private trains. In spite of this, when will this knowledge come in the school, university or ociety of Hindi states like Uttar Pradesh Bihar that when will you stop giving up hope of a government job on the basis of fake general knowledge and memorizing the spelling of English? Why not learn to do farming, industry or other skill or labour-intensive work

The serious question is also of bureaucratic reforms. In any case, his crime is no less. Indian bureaucracy is considered to be the most corrupt and comfortable bureaucracy in the world.

And the state responsible for this is no less. Although the current government has addressed this problem and implemented some good transparency mea-sures for reforms, they are all more about the use of technology.

Remember there was a time when there were long queues for train tickets. From electricity office to telephone and passport office, work could not be done easily. But the digital technology world of the twenty-first century has done much better to reform or cut

down on bureaucracy than our power. The ruling authorities seldom raised their voice against red tape, corruption, nepotism, but there was a tendency to patronize them more and more.

Certainly a major change in the In-dia of the twenty-first century would be possible only through reforms in the bureaucracy. It is very important to change it with time. Neither Indian Railways nor any other institution can be run by the work culture of the fifties. From Europe to America, the bu-reaucracy of all the developed nations has reformed itself by taking lessons from the private sector. In the past, our bureaucracy has also been hit repeat-

edly by the Supreme Court very harshly. Recall that Chief Justice of India NV Raman said in November last year on air pollution that 'a kind of inertia has developed in the bureaucracy. They don't want to take decisions. how to stop the car How to seize the vehicle? Will the court do all this.' He made similar remarks in the case of non-payment of dues of an employee of Uttar Pradesh. He had told the Chief Secretary that 'You are depriving your own employee of his le-gitimate dues. You should be given strict punishment.' The Supreme Court has even said that 'even God cannot save this country now'.

In the light of such serious obser-

vations of the Supreme Court, we need to think why the bureaucracy is becoming so inert? Take the example of the recent incident of railway recruitment, then these candidates had gone to Patna to meet the senior officers, but they did not give any satisfactory answer. Why? Is there a lack of transparency? Why delay in taking the right decision at the right time? Do you lack courage? Is Tantra slowly making them so paralyzed and inactive? Contrary to lakhs of claims, all these have declined very sharply in the last few days and its effect will be disastrous for the entire country. Politicians also need to understand that if you make the bureaucracy indo-lent and sycophantic, then in the long run its consequences will be similar to those seen at Patna station recently.

India logs 50,407 new COVID-19 cases, 804 deaths

Agency New Delhi, Feb 12:

India saw a single day rise of 50,407 coronavirus infec-tions, which took the tally of cases to 4.25.86.544, while the active cases have declined to 6,10,443, according to Union health ministry data updated on Saturday.

The death toll has climbed to 5,07,981 with 804 daily fatalities, the data updated at 8

The daily COVID-19 cases are being recorded at less than one lakh for the last six con-

The active cases comprise 1.43 per cent of the total infections, while the national COVID-19 recovery rate has further improved to 97.37 per cent, the ministry said. It said a reduction of 87,359

cases has been recorded in the active COVID-19 caseload in a span of 24 hours.

The daily positivity rate has been recorded at 3.48 per cent, while the weekly positiv-ity rate has been recorded at 5.07 per cent, according to the

The number of people who

have recuperated from the disease has increased to 4,14,68,120, while the case fatality rate has been recorded at 1.19 per cent.
The cumulative doses ad-

ministered so far under the nationwide COVID-19 vaccination drive has exceeded 172.29 crore.

India had crossed two crore cases on May 4 and three crore cases on June 23. The 804 new fatalities in clude 492 from Kerala and 63

from Maharashtra.

A total of 5,07,981 deaths have been reported so far in the country, including 1,43,355

Union road transport & highways minister Nitin Gadkari has been advocating for ethanol mixed fuel (mostly with patrol/ gasoline) for the vehicles. Lately the minister asked the carmakers in the country to introduce flex-fuel engines on a large scale. He argued that the ethanol mixed patrol will be cheaper and it would reduce the air-pollution drastically.

India today spends around rupees eight lakh crore annually for importing crude oil, gas and other petroleum products and the PM Narendra Modiled central government de-cides to reduce the amount with the use of ethanol, methanol, bio-diesel, compressed natural gas, green hydrogen, electric arrangements

The optimum use of ethanol (also called ethyl alcohol or grain alcohol) in patrol-powered engines would financially benefit the farmers as the in-flammable organic and colourless compound is prepared from the agricultural produce like grain, sugarcane, hemp, molasses, potato, etc Presently India has a maximum of 9 percent ethanol blended petrol in use.

Ethanol (symbol C,H,OH) burns in a cleaner way than patrol which usually leaves a significant volume of toxic caron-monoxide (CO is generated due to incomplete combustion of fuel) in the air Moreover, the low-level blend like 10% ethanol and 90% patrol can be used in conventional patrol engines. How ever, the increasing percent-age of ethanol content (above 20) would need certain engine modifications.

Vaccinated patients less likely to need critical care due to Omicron: Study

Agency Los Angeles, Feb 12:

Vaccinated adults have a lower risk of severe illness due to Omicron variant of coronavirus, and are less likely to land in intensive care compared with unvaccinated patients, a US study sug-

The study, published in a weekly report by the US Cen-ters for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), also found that during the Omicron period fewer patients died while hospitalised, compared with those admitted when the Delta variant was dominant.

"Overall, the Omicron-period group had a lower likelihood of being admitted to the intensive care unit (ICU) and were also less likely to require invasive mechanical ventilation compared with the Delta-period group," said Matthew Modes, a pulmonologist at Cedars-Sinai Medical Centre in the US, and co-first author

of the study.

The researchers looked at the characteristics of 339 pa-tients hospitalised with COVID-19 at Cedars-Sinai Medical Center from July to September of 2021, when the Delta variant of SARS-CoV-2

was dominant. They compared that group with 737 patients admitted with COVID-19 during December 2021-January 2022, when the Omicron variant was most prevalent.

Clinical information was gathered from the electronic health records of the patients

The analysis shows that a greater portion of the patients hospitalised during Omicron were vaccinated as compared to patients hospitalised dur-ing the summer of 2021 when the Delta variant predomi-

nated.
"In addition to the protection that vaccination offered people admitted to the hospital when Omicron dominated, we saw that the addition of a booster dose appeared to be particularly important in re-ducing the severity of illness, especially among older adults," said senior author of the study Peter Chen, from Cedars-Sinai.

"Unvaccinated patients hospitalised with COVID-19 during the Omicron variant dominance still had a higher chance of being admitted with serious complications and ap-peared to be at higher risk for the development of respiratory failure, compared with vacci-nated patients," said Chen.

The researchers noted that vaccination, including a booster dose for those who are fully vaccinated, remains critical for mitigating the risk of severe illness associated with SARS-CoV-2 infection.

"A clear pattern emerges if you take just the Omicron-pe riod patients and compare their vaccination status against the percentage of them who ended up in the ICU," said Michael Melgar, a co-first author of the study and a medical officer with the CDC.

"The more vaccinated someone is - from unvaccinated, partially vaccinated, fully vaccinated without a booster dose to fully vaccinated with a booster dose the better the outcome for the patient," Melgar added.

Disability Pension to Lower Ranks Sepoy

As per extant orders, Armed Forces Personnel including Sepoy who is invalided out from service on account of a disability which is attributable to or aggravated by Military service is being granted disability pension consisting of service element and disability element. The rate of disability element for 100% disability shall be 30% of emoluments last drawn by the individual. For lower percentage of dis-ability, the disability element

reduces proportionately. Saabka Sainik Sangarsh Committee submitted various representations regarding cal-culation of disability element on slab based system as had been recommended

7thCentral Pay Commission (CPC).
The 7th CPC recommended

a return to the slab based system. The 7th CPC, however, in respect of Civilian Employees of Central Government had not made any recommendation. Civilian Employees of Central Government were getting disability pension under 6th CPC on percentage based system as such they will continue to get disability element on percentage based system. It cre-ated an anomalous situation. Therefore, the Service Headquarters requested to maintain Status quo i.e. to be continued the calculation method of disability element on percentage basis as per 6th CPC regime. The concerns of Services were examined in this Department Anomaly Committee on Pension through Department o Expenditure, Ministry of Fi nance.

Department of Expenditure Ministry of Finance conveyed the approval of the Cabinet re-garding recommendation of Anomaly Committee in the matter that parity with Civilian for grant of Disability Element which was granted to Defence Forces under 6th CPC regime, shall be maintained. Accordingly, orders were issued on 04.09.2017 for continuing Disability Element on

percentage basis. Saabka Sainik Sangarsh Committee was replied on the lines of existing position.


The delegation was ac-

between the two navies.

The visit of the US Navy (USN) delegation was part of follow-up activities linked to the Basic Exchange and Cooperation Agreement (BECA) discussions held in October 2020 wherein a consensus was reached to explore cooperation in the field of Underwater Domain Awareness (UDA) with a formal agreement between the two sides

The USN delegation presented various avenues to progress cooperation in the niche field of UDA and further strengthen Indo-US compre-

hensive global strategic partnership. On the Indian side, the discussion was led by Vice Admiral Krishna Swaminathan, Chief of Staff, HQWNC wherein various facets of cooperation in the field of UDA were deliberated, a Defence spokesman said.

Major agreements signed between India and USA since 2014 include the Defence Framework Agreement (DFA), BECA, General Security of Military Information Agree-ment (GSOMIA), Communication Compatibility and Security Arrangements (COMCASA), and the Logistics Exchange Memorandum of Agreement

India was accorded 'Major Defence Partner Status' by the USA during Prime Minister Narendra Modi's visit to the USA in June 2016 that institutionalized defence trade and technology sharing with India, at par with closest allies and partners of the USA.

Commensurate with the Major Defence Partner designation, in 2018, India was elevated to Strategic Trade Authorisation Tier 1 status, which allows India to receive license-free access to a wide range of military and dual-use technologies regulated by the Department of Commerce

In September 2021, in a meeting with US President Joe Biden and Modi, Biden reaf-firmed the US' "unwavering commitment" to India as a Major Defence Partner through close engagements, including information sharing and strengthening cooperation in advanced military technologies. The leaders also welcomed the deepening of advanced industrial coop eration and noted the project to co-develop air-launched unmanned aerial vehicles under the Defence Technology and Trade Initiative, and encouraged more such joint

disregard of written accords by China: Jaishankar

The current situation at the Line of Actual Control (LAC) has arisen due to the disregard of written agreements by China not to mass soldiers at the border, External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar said on Saturday.

Speaking at a joint press conference along with his Australian counterpart Marise Payne, Jaishankar further said when a large country disregards written commitments, it's an issue of legitimate concern for the entire international community.

The minister made the comments in response to a question on the eastern Ladakh border standoff between the Indian and Chinese militaries.

day, Jaishankar replied, Yes . "Yes, we (Quad) had a dis cussion on India-China relations because it was part of how we briefed each other about what was happening in our neighbourhood. And it's an issue in which a lot of countries legitimately take interest particularly if they are from the

Indo-Pacific region, he said.
The situation at the LAC has arisen due to the disregard by China in 2020 of written agreements with India not to mass forces at the border, he

"So, when a large country disregards written commit-ments, I think it's an issue of legitimate concern for the en-tire international community," he added.

The eastern Ladakh border standoff between the Indian and Chinese militaries erupted following a violent clash in the Pangong lake areas and both sides gradually enhanced their deployment by rushing in tens of thousands of soldiers as well as heavy weaponry.

The tension escalated fol-wing a deadly clash in Galwan

As a result of a series of military and diplomatic talks, the two sides completed the disengagement process in the north and south banks of the Pangong lake in February and in the Gogra area in August last

India and China held the 14th round of Corps Commander-level meeting on January 12 during which the two sides agreed to maintain dia-logue through military and diplomatic channels to work out a mutually acceptable resolu tion" of the remaining issues of the standoff at eastern Ladakh

New low-cost coating for fabrics can kill Covid virus: Study

Agency Toronto, Feb 12:

Scientists in the US have developed an inexpensive. non-toxic coating for almost any fabric that decreases the infectivity of SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19, by up to 90 per cent.

The coating, described in the journal ACS Applied Materials & Interfaces, may be used in future to develop an antiviral spray for fabrics

"When you are walking into a hospital, you want to know that pillow you are put-ting your head onto is clean," said study lead author Taylor Wright, a doctoral student at the University of British Columbia (UBC) in Canada.

"This coating could take a little bit of the worry off frontline workers to have personal protection equipment (PPE) with antimicrobial properties,"

Researchers soaked fabric in a solution of a bacteria-kill-

ing polymer which contains a molecule that releases sterilising forms of oxygen when light shines on it.

They then used an ultraviolet (UV) light to turn this solution to a solid, fixing the coating to the fabric

"This coating has both passive and active antimicrobial properties, killing microbes immediately upon contact, which is then amped up when sunlight hits the cloth," said senior study author Michael Wolf, a professor at UBC.

Both components are safe for human use, and the entire process takes about one hour at room temperature, the researchers said. It also makes the fabric hydrophobic, meaning microbes are less likely to stick to the cloth, and doesn't seem to affect the strength of the fabric, they said.

The coating can also be used on almost any fabric, in-cluding cotton, polyester, denim, and silk, with applications in hospital fabrics, masks,

and activewear, according to the researchers.

Whereas other such tech-nologies can involve chemical waste, high energy use, or ex-pensive equipment, the new method is relatively easy and

affordable, they said.
"All we need is a beaker and a light bulb. I am fairly certain I could do the whole pro-cess on a stove," Wright said.

To test the coating's bug-killing properties, the researchers bathed treated fabric in bacterial soups of Es-cherichia coli (E. coli and Methicillin-resistant Staphylo-coccus aureus (MRSA), both major sources of hospital-ac-

quired infections.
They found there were 85 per cent of viable E. coli bac-teria remaining after 30 min-utes, which fell to three per cent when the treated cloth was exposed to green light for

the same amount of time. Similarly, 95 per cent of viable MRSA bacteria remained. dropping to 35 per cent under green light. No bacteria remained after four hours.

The researchers also looked into whether the coating reduced the infectivity of SARS-CoV-2 by bathing treated fabric in a solution of the virus particles and then adding that solution to living cells to see if they could infect

They found the passive properties were not effective against the virus, but when treated fabric was exposed to green light for two hours, there was up to 90 per cent decrease in the infectivity ofSARS-CoV-2

"In other words, only one tenth of the amount of virus signal was detected on cells infected with the UV-fabric and light treated virus," said study co-author Francois Jean, a professor at UBC.

The team found they needed an 18 square centimeter piece of fabric to kill mi-crobes with material containing seven per cent weight of the active ingredient.
