Ahead of the 12th Manipur Legislative Assembly Election scheduled to hold in two phases – February 28 and March 5, Prime Minister Narendra Modi today addressed a public meeting at Luwangsangbam Criket ground here in Imphal.

The Prime Minister was given a warm reception with traditional flavor by cultural performers of the state. Chief Minister N. Biren Singh, State BJP President A Sharda devi, Minister Th. Biswajit, Union Minister of State Dr. Ranian, Rajya Sabha MP Maharaj Sanajaoba and other leaders of the state and Union BJP leaders along with thousands of BJP supporters received the Prime Minister who is in a few hours visit in the state. The prime Minister was given a rausing welcom from Airport till he reached at Luwangsangbam ground by supporters of BJP on the way.

PM Modi started his address by highlighting that Manipur has completed 50 years of its establishment in the past month only. PM Modi said "In the decades of Congress rule, Manipur only got inequality and unbalanced development. But in the last five years, the Double Engine Sarkar of BJP has made cere efforts for the development of Manipur." PM Modi spoke on the

troubles, the people of Manipur had to face under previous governments and how the Double Engine Sarkar has transitioned the state into a People's Government. PM Modi further said that the BJP government has taken care of Manipur during the pandemic completely, be it providing free vaccines to every poor and tribal family equally or building a robust health system.

Hitting out at the opposi-tion, PM Modi remarked, "The Congress government had made 'bandh' and blockade the fate of Manipur. The Congress party could never understand the feelings of the people of the North East, the problems of the people here." PM Modi also iterated the problems of ration the people of Manipur faced before 2017. He said, "Even in this crisis of Corona, the BJP government is ensuring free ration to 22 lakh people of Manipur. Polling for Absentee Voters begins in Kangpokpi

As Kangpokpi goes to poll in just a week, polling for the Absentee Voters began today in 51-Saitu (ST) Assembly Constituency (AC). Altogether 106 Absentee Voters that is, citizens over 80 years of age and persons with dis-ability (PwD) are eligible for postal ballot to cast their votes at home in Kangpokpi district. 17 polling teams have been formed to visit the house of the Absentee Voters in the three assembly constituencies of the district and to enable them to exercise their voting rights

For the 51-Saitu (ST) AC, first round of briefing of electors on voting procedures and

collection of marked ballot pa-pers for Absentee Voters was held through house-to-house visit by the designated Poll-

ing Officials. Altogether 62 Absentee Voters – 53 numbers of Senior Citizens (above 80 years of

age) and 9 numbers of persons with disability (PWD) will exercise their voting rights. Sec-ond round of house-to-house visit by the designated Polling Officials will continue till February 24, 2022 if the need

District Election Officer Kangpokpi led by Kengoo Zuringla and the entire election team are tirelessly work-ing in full swing as the poll date draws closer for the first phase of the ensuing 12th Manipur Legislative Assembly Election, 2022.

DEO is ensuring that the election is carried out in a free, fair & transparent manner and there are no room left for corruption. She appealed to the voters to utilise their power to elect their choice of representatives with-out any fear and biasness.

Interacting with the DIPR officials of Kangpokpi district, she further said that there are numbers of mobile apps from which a common citizen/voter can avail information related to the ensuing election such as cVIGIL app, Voter Helpline app and Know your Candidate app. Stating that **cVIGIL** stands for Vigilant Citizen and is available as a free app for all An-droid users in India, she continued that people can lodge complaints of poll malpractices and any incident of violation of the Model Code of Conduct

(MCC) through cVIGIL app from any mobile number. She said that the app al-



plaint ID which will be aclows a person to report any violation of MCC by simply knowledged by ECI. She furtaking a photo or video and ther added that once loggedalso helps to log-in anony-mously and track the comin, a citizen can click a photo or record a video (of upto 2 minutes) and submit it as digital proof along with auto-mated location mapping by the Geographic Information System.

Regarding the Voter Helpline app, users can down-load their digital photo voter slip. They just have to link up their mobile phone with that of EPIC (Electoral Photo Identity Card) card. Voters can show the Digital Photo Voter slip at the polling station, in-stead of the physical photo voter slip, she added.

Further she said, anyone can call the toll free Voter Helpline number 1950 or dial mobile numbers 6033904313,

6033904314, 6033904292 for any queries related to Kangpokpi district. She said that callers can enquire on subjects such as EPIC, electoral roll, online registration and lodge a complaint by sim-ply dialling into the toll-free

numbers. About the Know Your Candidate, she said that ECI has developed Know your Candidate (KYC) mobile applications for both Android and iOS platforms for informing about "criminal antecedents status of candidates. This allows citizens to browse candidates with/without criminal antecedents and empowers

the citizens to know the criminal antecedents of the candi-dates, she added.

ECI has designed inhouse software for complete candidate and election management through software called ENCORE which stands for Enabling Communications on Real-time Environment. This provides seamless facility for Returning Officer to process candidate nomination, affidavit, Voter turnout, counting, results and data management. It was tweeted by Harsh Goenka, Chairman, RPG Enterprises, who enjoys a huge fan following on social media. Hundreds of twitter users reacted to the shocking futuristic statement made by one of the top businessmen of India. However, most of the users were against the idea of closing down brick and mortar stores, as the traditional stores provide jobs to millions of people. One user, Utsav Verma supported the statement by saying that you can get all the variety on Amazon, which you cannot get at a shop. It's a pain to go to the market, find parking, and browse through unmanaged shelves. "Still, there will be things which I would like to touch, feel and try

Sofin, there winds a being which a would fixe to touch, feel and dry before buying," he opined. Another user, Mohit Gupta did not agree and said, "Technologi-cal development is an ongoing process. Traditional stores will evolve as the years pass. Nothing goes dead as new technologies come in to help. Logistics and time for delivery will always ensure the pres-ence of physical stores." Still, experts opine that offline shops and online retail stores must be connected and should complement each other. That will ensure a perfect consumer experience. Having all sorts of payment options will also be a deci-sive factor in buying. Virtual stores, mobile or m-commerce, chatbots and artificial intelligence will also play a significant role in the fu-ture shopping trends. The desire for instant access and fast turn-around, 24/7 availability, will be the norm in coming years, driven in particular by millennials (born during 1980–95) and also by Gen Z consumers (born during 1996–2010). Lamentations on women rights will be aired to houseful audi-ences by channels, with no deliberations arguing on what, if some-one wants to unveil themselves from the suffocating and incarcerating attires imposed on them by the same patriarchy. So, the convenience of the mighty gender is running the show. Everything can be justified and suppressed to the level of its satisfaction. Young girls choosing hijab over education in the recent tussle in Karnataka reveals this superimposed hand of an invincible patriarchy. No wonder, it can't work otherwise. The discourse is about constitutional rights being forcefully trodden to dust by a constitutional establishment, the government. The constitution, being indiscriminate on religious rights, equally blessed ev-erybody with freedom to express and prosper. Therefore, someone's right to choose between what is professed in religion comes under religious freedom and apparently unquestionable. Attempts to question such practices should definitely be addressed inside the boundaries of the constitutional values. Going be-

Business is rarely risk free. So are bank loans. There is nothing unusual about non-performing loans or assets. They exist in every economy. when business promoters But. collude with bank management to manipulate loans in their personal favour, they become a matter of serious concern. And, this seems to have become a growing trend in India. The latest report on the promoters of a Gujarat-based ship construction firm, ABG Shipyard, defrauding a consor-tium of 28 banks and financial institutions to the tune of Rs.22,842 crore should be a cause of worry as the forensic audit by Ernst and Young (EY) consultancy revealed that be-tween 2012 and 2017, the promoters colluded together to illegally divert

criminal breach of trust. The loan account was declared as 'non-performing asset' (NPA) in July 2016 and 'fraud' in 2019. The Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) has registered an FIR against ABG Shipyard Ltd and its directors, including chairman and managing director Rishi Kamlesh Agarwal, in what could be the biggest bank fraud case in the country's history. Unfortunately, the authorities, including the banking regulator Reserve Bank (RBI), the government and banks, do not seem to be enough concerned.

Between 2014 and 2020, an RBI data analysis would show the total burden of non-performing loans on banks was nearly 365 percent more than the amount during the previous six years of the United Progressive Alliance (UPA) rule. A scrutiny of banking data since 2008 would show the massive amount of bad loans be ing written off in recent years. RBI put the new gross NPAs of public sec-tor banks (PSBs) from 2014-15 to 2019-20 at nearly Rs.18.28 lakh crore, up from around Rs.5 lakh crore from 2008-09 to 2013-14.

PSBs wrote off bad loans worth Rs.6,83,388 crore during 2014-20. It was a massive write-off if compared with the 2008-14 gross amount of Rs.32,109 crore. Usually, banks write off non-performing loans which are over four-yearold as part of their exercise to clean up balance-sheet, "As borrowers of written-off loans continue to be liable for repayment and the process of recovery of dues in written-off loan accounts continues, written-off does not benefit the borrower," NDA Minister Anurag

Thakur told Parliament in 2019.

India ranks quite high in the list of major economies such the US, China, Japan, France, Germany, the UK, Israel, Spain, the Netherlands, Canada, Sweden, Australia, Denmark, Indonesia and Malaysia, among others, in terms of bank NPAs. According to a Global Economy study based on World Bank data of non-performing loans as per-centage of bank loans in 102 countries in 2020, India's was recorded at eight percent. However, RBI has lately forecast that the rate of banks' bad loans will increase to 9.8 percent by March 2022 under the baseline scenario and to 11.22 percent under a severe stress scenario

The forecast is quite alarming compared with the Global Economy-listed figures of countries such as China (1.84 percent), Malaysia (1.57 percent), In-donesia (2.75 percent), Australia (1.11 percent), the UK (1.22 percent), Israel (1.48 percent), Canada (0.53 percent), Sweden (0.51 percent) and the USA (1.07 percent). In 2017, the NDA government promulgated an ordinance to amend the Banking Act, which was subsequently passed by Parliament, giving RBI more powers to tackle the problem of Indian banks clogged un-der the burden of Rs.9.64 trillion of NPAs. However, the problem persists as the latest RBI forecast suggests. Little is reported officially about the

role of India's large business houses in big bank frauds and continuously growing NPAs. This is despite the fact at an overwhelming percentage of bad loans are on account of big business borrowers. While genuine and small defaulters are punished regularly, bullied by bank-engaged private

musclemen or bouncers for loan recovery and their personal assets are seized, big business defaulters often go scot free. Many take shelter outside the country. Three years ago, this government asked banks to provide passport details of people associated with soured loans of more than Rs.50 crore.

According to CBI, most ABG Shipyard loans were given by banks be-tween 2005 and 2012. SBI said the company's account turned NPA on November 30, 2013. The account was restructured in 2014. But, its operations could not be revived. Obviously, the lenders failed to properly assess the chances of revival before agreeing to the loan restructure. Who were the assessors? Did they act under political or other external pressure? Why fresh look out notices against the fraud stars now? During the financial year 2019-20, the lender banks declared the ABG Shipvard account as 'fraud' Why did it take this long for CBI to file FIR against the directors of ABG Shipyard and ABG In-ternational Private Limited? What prevented the arrest of the offenders

Interestingly, many of the big bank defaulters are NRIs though they live mostly on India-based business opera-A good number of them have tions multiple passports and residences in tax havens. The law and the legal system seem to be soft on them in India compared to those in North America. Europe and Asia. Imagine big-time fraud star Diamantaire Mehul Choksi has been been happily hiding in Antigua and Barbuda since 2018 after leaving India! Nirav Modi, nephew of Mehul Choksi, continues to cool his heels in a UK jail as he is afraid of poor conditions of Indian jails.

Nirav Modi is accused of an alleged involvement in the Rs.14,000-crore bank fraud case. NRI businessman Vijay Mallya, a big bank fraud accused in India, has been living in the UK ever since he managed to leave the country on March 2, 2016. Banks are still anxiously awaiting Mallya's extradition with the hope that the money they lent to the former Kingfisher boss will be returned to them. Mallva was a former Congress-Janata Dal (Secular)-BJP supported independent Rajya Sabha MP for two terms. In advanced countries, bank fraud is regarded as a felony. In the US, conviction for bank fraud carries imprisonment of upto 30 years and/or a fine of upto \$1 million.

Many feel collusion among top nk officials, powerful political bosses ba and rampant nepotism has allowed big business to loot India's banking sys-tem. According to a list compiled by All India Bank Employees Association, the largest body of bank employees, 17 public sector banks had, as on September 30, 2019, a total of 2,426 wilful defaulter loan accounts worth Rs.1.5 lakh crore. Those wilful defaulters in cluded ABG Shipyard, Kingfisher Airlines, Rotomac, Nakshatra Brands, Amtek Auto, Diamond Power Infra-structure, Siddhi Vinayak Logistics, Deccan Chronicle Holdings, Ashapura Garments, Electrotherm India, Nakoda, VMC Systems, Varun Industries, Zoom Developers, among several others. These are accounts where borrowers are not willing to pay despite their having a repayment capacity to a substantial extent. Hence, an element of criminality undoubtedly exists. Af-ter all, banks are dealing with public money. (IPA Service)

Biological E's Covid-19 Vaccine Corbevax Gets Emergency Use Approval for Children Aged 12-18

Agency New Delhi, Feb 22:

Hvderabad-based pharmaceutical company Biologi-cal E Ltd on Monday said its coronavirus vaccine Corbevax, also India's third homegrown vaccine, has received an emergency use ap-proval in India for use in children aged 12 to 18 years. The approval is likely to

significantly ramp up the government's ongoing drive to vaccinate children between 15 and 18 years of age, and later for those between 12 and 14 years of age.

It comes at a time when schools across the country are opening up as Covid cases are witnessing a considerable decline.

"With this approval, we are closer to finishing our global fight against the COVID-19 pandemic. Once fully vaccinated children can

resume their activities and educational pursuits in schools and colleges without any apprehension," said Mahima Dada, Managing Di-rector, Biological E. Limited.

Biological E had sought the emergency use authorisation of Corbevax on February 13. The expert panel of India's central drug authority had later recommended granting restricted Emer-gency Use Authorisation (EUA) to Biological E's vaccine. The recommendation was sent to the Drugs Con-troller General of India (DCGI) for final approval.

Corbevax is India's first indigenously developed RBD protein sub-unit vac-cine against Covid-19. The Drugs Controller General of India had approved the vaccine for restricted use in adults on December 28, but it was incorporated in the country's vaccine drive.

In a statement, the pharmaceutical company said that it initiated the clinical study in October 2021 and evaluated the available safety and immunogenicity results of the ongoing phase 11/11 study, which indicated that the vaccine is safe and immunogenic. Corbevax is India's first

RBD protein sub-unit vac-cine against Covid-19. The Drugs Controller General of India had approved the vaccine for restricted use in adults on December 28, but it was incorporated in the country's vaccine drive.

Corbevax is administered through intramuscular route with two doses scheduled 28 days apart and is stored at 2 to 8 degrees Celsius tempera-ture and presented as 0.5 ml (single dose) and 5 ml (10 doses) vial and 10 ml (20 doses) vial pack.

President Ram Nath Kovind conducted the review of the Indian Navy's fleet (PFR-2022) off the Visakhapatnam coast in the the Bay of Bengal in which India's maritime defence might was on full display on Monday.

Sailing on the indigenously designed Naval Offshore Patrol Vessel INS Sumitra, designated as the Presidential Yacht, Kovind sailed past 44 ships anchored in four columns in the Bay of Bengal and received the ceremonial salute from each of them. The theme of the President's Fleet Review-2022 was Indian Navy 75 years in Service of the Nation', commemorating the Azaadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav(75 years of Indpendence), an Indian Navy release stated.

The crew of each ship presented a salute with the traditional 'Three Jais', a symbolic act called "Man and Cheer Ship," in a demonstration of the unconditional allegiance of

Navy personnel to the coun-try and the Supreme Commander.

The President was accompanied by First Lady Savita Kovind, Defence Minister Rajnath Singh, Minister of State for Defence Ajay Bhat, Andhra Pradesh Governor Biswabhusan Harichandan, Chief of Defence Staff General M M Naravane, Chief of Naval StaffAdmiral R Hari Kumar, Flag Officer Commanding-in-Chief of Eastern Naval Command(ENC) Vice-Admiral Biswajit Dasgupta and other officials on board the Presidential Yacht. Along with the ships, there

was a Parade of Sails, compris-ing two Laser Bahia, six Enterprise Class, and six Indian Na-val Sailing Vessels Mhadei, Tarini, Bulbul, Hariyal, Kadalpura, and Neelkanth. Rescue divers conducted 'combat jumps' from the Ad-vanced Light Helicopter(ALH) Mk-I, demonstrating a quick rescue using a Rescue Basket. The President also reviewed the mobile submarine column that included INS Vela, a re-

The effective deployment of the Indian Navy in times of crisis has under-scored India's vision of being the 'Preferred Security Partner' and 'First Responder' in the

IOR. The headquarters of the

ENC of the Indian Navy located at Vizag had made a glorious contribution during the 1971 Indo-Park war. The ENC was instrumental in the naval blockade of the then East Pakistan and the sinking of Pakistan's submarine 'Ghazi'. It was a decisive blow to Pakistan and the 1971 war remains one of the most emphatic vic-

tories in our history, he added. He noted that about 70 percent of the contents of several

warships and submarines under construction in various public and private shipyards across the country are indig-enous. Soon indigenously built aircraft carrier, 'Vikrant will join the service. This is an impressive contribution to the making of an 'Atmanirbhar Bharat'(self-reliant India).

Altogether 1765 wall writings, 16085 posters, 3215 banners have been removed for violation of Model Code of Conduct, said Nodal Of-ficer, MCC Imphal West Pangambam Shantikumar. He said till date a total of

31,015 cases have been recorded for defacement at public property including 1740 wall writing, 15045 post-ers, 3130 banners, and 11,100 others which have all been removed. Another 2012 cases have also been recorded for defacement on private prop-erty including 25 wall writings, 1040 posters, 85 banners, and 862 others, and all of these have also been re-

moved, he added. The Model Code of Conduct is a set of norms estab-lished in consensus by groups of political parties so that ruling parties, prominent parties or those having more resources do not take undue advantage through their po-sitions and to ensure that there is a level playing field for all candidates during the conduct of elections, said the Nodal Officer.

Appealing to all including candidates, their agents, workers and the public to abide by the set guideline of the Model Code of Conduct and ensure smooth conduct of free and fair elections, he said, citizens can play a responsible role in the conduct

of free and fair elections. The MCC Team is also responsible to receive complaints through the cVIGIL



app, a user-friendly applica-tion cVIGIL, introduced by the ECI to ease monitoring of any MCC violations, he continued. The cVIGIL app eases lodging complaints re-garding any MCC/expendi-ture violations by the citi-zens and disposal of such complaint by the MCC team,

he added. Citizens can submit photos, videos of any MCC vio-lation along with their location immediately on witnessing the violation through this app, he said, explaining furer that, location mapping of the complainant is very important while using this app. By using this app, the com-plainant will not have to visit etc. the office physically to lodge his or her complaint, he

added. The cVIGIL was activated in the district since the day election was notified for the State on January 8, 2022. Altogether 138 cases have been received as of February 20 by

the MCC Cell Imphal West, he said and added that, while 75 cases have been disposed, 63 cases have been dropped as these cases were found to be "Duplicate case, frivolous,

non-violation of MCC and not related to election." Some common reasons found in the cVIGIL complaints, he said are posters/ banners without permission, names and addresses of printer and publisher, installation of more than permitted number of banners/posters/ flags in public places, money and gift distributions, cam-paigns and use of loud speaker during silent period,

.. Further elaborating on the utility of the app, the Nodal Officer said that once the complaint is received on the application, his team, which also include 39 Flying Squad Teams (FST), will get into action and assigned the case to the concerned FST to move directly to the location

receive through the application. This ensures easy and fast disposal of MCC violation cases, however, if the complaint is found to be complex, a report will be submit-ted to the RO for necessary action, he said.

He continued that a report will also be sent to the con-cerned ROs even if the case has been disposed by the MCC team. Three FSTs, along with

one vehicle are assigned for one Assembly Constituency each, he said adding that each FST is a five member team including three police personnel, one magistrate and a videographer. Another five vehicles are on reserved so that they can be used to reinforce any FST teams in the constituencies

Other forms of complaints are also received by the MCC, he said, highlighting further that, the cell has received 25 cases of written/telephonic all of which has been disposed. The Cell has also received two Referred Complaints from Nodal Officer, MCMC and six from Nodal Officer Social Media all of which have also been disposed, he added.

The Nodal officer also said that his Cell with 10 members and the FSTsis putting their best efforts to address and dispose all com-plaints and any sort of MCC violation in the district till date.
