# Of the Rs 1,000 crore worth cash, drugs, liquor seized from 5 poll-bound states; Rs. 167.83 crores is from Manipur: ECI report

IT News Imphal, Feb 26:

Since the enforcement of the Model Code of Conduct the law enforcing agencies under the strict supervision of the ECI has so far seized items worth Rs. 167.83 crores including Rs. 4.17 Crore in cash from the state of Manipur as on February 25. Items seized included 60881 liters of liquors, Drugs worth Rs. 143.47 crore, precious metal and other free-bies items that are suspected to use to influence voters during the election. In 2017 elec-tion total seizure of cash, liquor, drugs and other freebies was Rs. 6.42 crore.

A report of the ECI said that over Rs 1,000 crore worth of cash, drugs, liquor and freebies have been seized so far in the assembly polls in the states of Uttar Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Punjab, Manipur and Goa, the Election Commission said in a statement on Friday. The amount of seizures have increased more than four times when compared to the 2017 assembly elections in these states.

The amount of liquor seized from Punjab is the highest — a whopping 59 lakh litres — giving an impression that liquor was overflowing in the state. Punjab was followed by Uttar Pradesh with the sei-



zure of 19 lakh litres of liquor. Punjab was also on top

when it came to drugs as narcotics worth Rs 376 crores was seized from the state, followed by Manipur with Rs 143 crores.

Uttar Pradesh was at the top of the list in cash seizures with Rs 91 crores.

"Apart from above mentioned seizure figures, the Commission's visit galvanised enforcement authorities as the agencies seized drugs worth Rs 109 crore in Punjab and more than eight lakh litres of liquor in Uttar Pradesh in the in-up to the elections," the EC said in a statement.

The EC held multiple meetings with heads of Enforce-ment Agencies like - CBDT, CBIC, NCB, Excise and senior officials of bordering states to poll-going states — for a thorough framework to ensure 'inducement- free' elections.

The EC also took extensive reviews of enforcement agencies and police nodal officers during the meetings held in the states, to emphasise close and effective monitoring of items meant for influencing voters.

The EC has deployed 228 expenditure observers. The EC has also appointed special expenditure observers, offic-ers who hold an impeccable and brilliant track record of

domain expertise.

The special observers have been travelling exten-sively in their assigned states

#### Russian attack on Ukraine set to increase inflation

increase with more buoyancy in coming weeks. Even under normal circumstances, the price rise was certain, but after the Russian armed forces' invasion in Ukraine, consumers' pockets are going to be hit hard in our country. The reason is that the war between the two prominent members of the former USSR has suddenly increased the price of crude oil globally. This is bound to influence the prices of petroleum products everywhere. This could pose further risks to India's rising inflation. We import more than 80 percent of our crude oil requirement from other countries every year. Crude oil imports account for about 25 percent of India's total imports. Crude oil prices hit \$ 96.7 a barrel on Tuesday, the highest since September 2014, after Russian President Vladimir Putin deployed his troops to Donetsk and Luhansk in Ukraine.

Rising global tensions and the Russian attack on Ukraine have fueled a surge in oil prices. The rise in oil and gas prices is directly related to food prices. Since it will become costly to transport goods from one to lood prices. Since it will become costiy to transport goods from one place to another, everything else is sure to be expensive too. India imports crude oil worth \$ 150 billion every year. Due to this the trade balance of the country may deteriorate. In addition to petroleum products, Russia and Ukraine export sunflower oil in a big way and the two countries also account for 25 percent of wheat exports. This is sure to make a difference to Asia and especially India. Inflation resulting from the war will have an impact not only on Russia and Ukraine, but on the the war will have an impact not only on Russia and Ukraine, but on the whole world, including US and European nations. It has to have an impact on India's inflation for sure.

Corona virus had already troubled the world in the past two years, now the trouble of war has come. By the way, despite the third wave of Covid in India, the first month of this year was good in terms of employment and recruitment. According to a job platform, Jobseek index, there was a 41 per cent year on year growth in recruitments in January 2022. In January last year, this index was at 1925, which reached 2,716 this year. The sectors which proved to be effective for increasing recruitment are IT, Software, Retail and Telecom. Along with this, the growth was 29 percent in the pharma industry, 10 percent in medicine and healthcare, 8 percent in oil and gas, 8 percent in insurance, 7 percent in fast consumer goods (FMCG) and 2 percent in manufacturing. FMCG sales in the month of January 2022 decreased by 10 percent as compared to December 2021. This happened because of the third wave caused by the Omicron variant. According to Bijom, a retail intelligence tracking platform, sales per active general store declined by 5 per cent in January. However, the third wave of Covid is now on the downside. so it is believed that the February report will reach the level of prior to the third wave.

## No NATO Membership of Ukraine may be the basis of Ceasefire by Russia

#### President Putin's Military Adventure gives Ominous Signal for Europe

Despite the slanted propaganda that passes for "news" in the mainstream Western media right now, the truth of the matter is that there are no good guys when it comes to the con-flict in Ukraine. But depending on the day, some of the bad guys outdo the

In Moscow, President Vladimir Putin has said for months that he wanted only to stop NATO expansion into Ukraine and deter attacks against ethnic Russians in the Donbass dismissing claims that Russia was planning an attack on its neighbor. The precision air strikes and border incur-sions now underway as part of his "special military operation" put the lie to that. Clearly, the Russian leader was preparing for what the old expert George W. Bush might have called "preemptive self-defense."

Putin sits at the head of a parasitical capitalist and gangster class that rules over the stolen wealth and resources that generations of Soviet workers and farmers built up during 70 years of socialism. He trashes the idea that peoples and nations have the right to determine their own future, questions the legitimacy Ukraine's existence, and longs for the days of the old Russian Empire. As a political figure, this modern-day would-be czar certainly deserves no sympathy from progressives and left-ists in the West.

But to simply portray Putin as the latest incarnation of Hitler, a territoryhungry madman, as House Speaker Nancy Pelosi does, is to intentionally ignore the legitimate security complaints that Russia has been making for years. (It's also a case of finding By: C.J. Atkins
Nazis on the wrong side of the Russia-Ukraine border, but more on that in a moment )

The current crisis is underpinned by issues stretching back over 30 years—from the end of the Cold War to the present. Wayback in 1991, President Bush the First made a pledge to Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev that when the USSR withdrew from Eastern Europe, NATO would not seek to add countries there to its ranks.

If the West had truly been interested in creating the conditions for lasting peace for Europe, it would have dissolved NATO completely in that moment. Instead, barely a minute was wasted in proving Bush's prom-ise was empty; the alliance not only expanded into former Warsaw Pact countries like Poland, the Czech Re-public, Slovakia, and Romania, but actually gobbled up nations that were formerly part of the USSR itself, like Latvia and Lithuania.

With the excuse of being a "de-fensive" alliance against the Soviet Union gone, NATO was openly re-fashioned into a direct instrument of U.S. militarypolicy. NATO helped tear the country of Yugoslavia to pieces, bombarded Afghanistan after Sept. 11th, and pushed Libya into a civil

Given this history, Russia's fear of NATO pulling Ukraine into its sphere and creeping directly up to the Russian border is far from absurd. It is little wonder that Putin has been demanding the U.S. and NATO remove all weapons from Ukraine, that a guar-antee be issued Ukraine will not join the alliance, and that all former Soviet nuclear weapons on Ukrainian terri-

ory be secured. Any Russian leader left, right, or center-would ask the

On this side of the Atlantic, President Joe Biden has endlessly talked for months of "defending Ukrainian democracy" and of peaceful intentions, all the while deploying increas-ing numbers of U.S. missiles and troops closer to the Russian borderto not only Ukraine, but Poland, the Czech Republic, and other countries. Fully aware of Russia's security worries, Biden and NATO pushed the envelope anyway, acting as intentional provocateurs. A peacemaker the U.S. president is not.

Although too few have paid at-tention, Biden has also pulled back the curtain on the U.S. economic interests pushing for a Russia-Ukraine war—the ones who stand to profit here at home from fighting in eastern Europe. There are the usual suspects, of course, the missile makers and plane roducers, but the other big winners in this war are the big oil and gas com

Repeatedly at points throughout the current crisis, Biden has threatened Germany and Russia's Nord Stream 2 natural gas pipeline and pushed Berlin to squash the project. All the pipeline talk didn't come out

Companies like Chevron, ExxonMobil, and Shell, along with the hundreds of drilling and shipping con-tractors that work with them, want to massively step up exports to a Europe starving for gas, but standing in the way has been Russia and its stateowned Gazprom company.

# No Trangender Electors in Mayang Imphal: RO Sukumar

IT News Imphal, Feb 26:

23-Mayang Imphal had recorded the highest voter turnout of 94.37 percent in the 2017 Assembly election among the 13 Assembly Constituencies in Imphal West District, but there is no transgender elector enrolled in the constituency for the 2022 elections, said Returning Officer H Sukumar Singh, adding that every third gender should have enrolled themselves in the electoral list as they have equal right in the democratic process.
The Returning Officer fur-

ther stated that 23-Mayang Imphal AC has 31,813 electors out of which 15,313 are male and 16,500 are female electors. The constituency, which has no identified transgender elec-tors, has 219 PwD electors and 406 electors above 80 years. 175 electors have been found eligible for Postal Ballot (12D) for Absentee Voters.

Sukumar continued that out of the 41 polling stations in the constituency, 24 have been identified as vulnerable polling stations for the ensu-



ing Assembly election. 23/1-Samushang Shantipur and 23/ 9-Mayang Imphal Thana AwangLeikaiSorokManing have been identified as Model cum Women Polling Stations. Md Abdul Latif, an Inde-

pendent candidate, became the first MLA to represent 23-Mayang Imphal-AC in the Manipur Legislative Assembly by defeating Manipur People's Party candidate KhaidemGulamjat Singh in the State Assembly Elections, 1972. Abdul Latif, contesting on MPP ticket, retained the seat for the second time defeating Khaidem Mangol of the Communist Party of India in the 1974 Assembly Elections.

Khumujam Amutombi

Singh and Meinam Nilachandra Singh alternatively represented of the con-stituency from 1980 to 2002. In the 1980 State Assembly Elections, Khumujam Amutombi Singh of the Indian National Congress (Indira) defeated Md. Abdul Latif of the Janata Party.

Amutombi, who fought as Indian National Congress candidate, lost to Janata Party's MeinamNilachandra Singh in the 1984 election; however, in the 1990 Assembly elections. Amutombi contested as Janata Dal candidate and defeated Nilachandra, who contested the election as the INC candi-

INC's Nilachandra defeated JD's Amutombi in the 6th Manipur Legislative Assembly Elections, 1995. Amutombi once again returned as the INC candidate in the 2000 election and defeated Nilachandra, who contested the election as the Manipur State Congress Party candidate.

Nilachandra contested the 2002 election as the Federal Party of Manipur candidate and defeated Abdul Salam of the Manipur National Conference to return to the Manipur Legislative Assembly.

INC's Dr.Khumujam Ratankumar Singh, son of former MLA umujamAmutombi Singh defeated Maulana Abdul Salam of the Nationalist Congress Party in the 2007 election. In the 10th Manipur Assembly Elections, 2012, Khumujam Ratankumar defended the seat defeating Kongkham Manglem Singh of the All India Trinamool Congress. However, in the 2017 Assembly Elections, Kongkham Manglem's son KongkhamRobindro Singh, who contested BharatiyaJanata Party ticket, defeated INC's Dr. Khumujam

Ratankumar Singh. 23-Mayang Imphal has three candidates in fray for the 12th Manipur Legislative Assembly Elections, 2022. They are Deputy Speaker and sitting MLA Kongkham Robindro Singh of the Bharatiya Janata Party, Indian National Conoress candidate Dr. Khumujam Ratankumar Singh and Na-tional People's Party candidate Urikhimbam Ramesh Singh.

# No NATO Membership of Ukraine may be the basis.....

Currently Russian natural all imports into the European Union. Leading EU powers Germany and France get 40% of their gas from Russia, while some other countries, like the Czech Republic and Romania. use only Russian gas.
In order to dislodge the

competition and grab market share, the Western multinationals need to slow the flow of gas from the east. Completed late last year and due to become operational in 2022, Nord Stream 2 would permanently cap U.S. sales, which arrive via expensive shipping terminals.

The government of Ukraine,

which benefits from transit fees for existing overland pipelines, lobbied Washington all summer last year to impose sanctions on Nord Stream 2 and the German and Russian companies behind it. With Putin's invasion, Ukraine's rulers and the Western gas companies got what they asked for. Nord Stream 2 is postponed, indefinitely; Ger-many has revived plans for more terminals to ship in U.S. gas; and world energy prices have soared as a result of the war.

Now, as for the talk of Na-zis—well, the real fascists in this situation are the ones who command over the Ukrainian Armed Forces. Though he's playing a starring role at the moment, President VolodymyrZelensky—a Russian-speaking comedian turned nationalist politician—is just the latest in a string of rotating faces at the top of the right-wing Ukrainian state.

The current government came to power in the wake of the 2014 "Euromaidan" protests that overthrew the corrupt albeit democratically-elected administration of President Viktor Yanukovych. Trying to play Russia and the EU off one another to get the best eco-nomic deal for Ukraine when he was in charge, Yanukovych became the target of Westernbacked business interests in Ukraine and ultra-nationalist neo-Nazi groups. The latter

joined together, with U.S. support, to carry out a coup and send Yanukovych running for

In the wake of that coup, labor unions and left-wing par-ties were severely repressed in Ukraine. In Odessa, dozens of union members were burned alive in one case of mass murder while activists of the Ukrainian Communist Party and other groups have been forced underground

From the beginning of the current crisis, the Zelensky government has waffled. At one moment, it presses for confrontation because it thinks it might be able to extract more military and economic aid from NATO while protecting its own pipeline profits as the handler of Russian gas. Then, at another moment, it cautions against war panic when it starts to look like the situation might actually engulf them in a real war.

Zelensky openly an-nounced his desire last week to execute a war "with foreign mili-tary support" against Russia

and the breakaway regions its east. Then, when Russian missiles start to rain down and troops cross the border, he suddenly casts his country as a poor victim in a "war of aggression." Having perhaps convinced himself Russia would never actually ever respond with a full-scale military assault, Zelensky may now be waking up to the realization he made a bad gamble.

Does all of the foregoing justify the "special military operation" now being carried out in Ukraine by Putin's forces though? His claim that Ukraine needs to be "demilitarized" and "de-Nazified" is certainly a laudable goal, given the clique that holds power in Kiev and the developments in that country since 2014. But the actions taken by the Russian military which so far involve strikes on Ukrainian military infrastructure, air defense sites, airfields and military aircraft-constitute a major escalation of the conflict and must be con-

demned. Putin said he wanted

no invasion but launched one

But there's more than enough blame to go around. The U.S., NATO, and Ukraine said they wanted peace but provoked a war anyway. The U.S.-led imperialist encirclement of Russia after the Cold War and the brutal actions of the fascistbacked government in Kiew conspired together to bring us to this moment.

In this war, the Ukrainian people will lose. The Russian people will lose. The people of Europe will lose. And the American people will lose. In all these places, money will be redirected toward wasteful military spending or the energy monopolies and away from people's needs. In Ukraine and Russia, hundreds or perhaps thousands more lives will be lost.

To avert further catastro phe and upset the plans of the war profiteers, all the governments and forces involved must be pressured to pull back and return to the negotiating table. (IPA Service)

Campaigning for the first phase of the 12th Manipur Leg-islative Assembly Elections, stative Assembly Elections, 2022 ends as silent period be-gins from 4 pm today in Kangpokpi district. Two days are left for the 10,0351 (49,631 male and 50,720 female) voters of the district to decide the political fate of 17 (seventeen) candidates contesting in the three assembly constituencies.

The silent period is a ban

on political campaigning prior to voting, to give voters a peaceful time to consider and make a final decision on their vote. The period starts from 48 hours prior to close of the poll. The presence of political functionaries from outside the constituency will be restricted.

Also, election matters shall not to be telecasted/broadcasted in radio, TV or similar apparatus, while pre-certification by State/District Media Certification and Monitoring Committee (MCMC) is manda tory for publication of political advertisement in newspaper during the silent period. Public Meeting, procession among others will also be pro-

On poll day, candidates shall not canvass within 100 metres of polling station and shall also not enter polling booth with security. No one will be allowed to carry mobile phones inside the polling



booth except for the Presiding Officer and Polling Officer-I

As per Section - 126 of the Representation of People Act 1951, holding public meeting is prohibited during period of 48-hours ending with hour fixed for conclusion of poll. No person shall convene, hold or attend, join or address any public meeting or procession in connection with an election.

No person shall propagate any election matter to the public by holding, or by arranging the holding of any musical concert or any theatrical per-formance or any other entertainment or amusement with a view to attracting the members of the public thereto, in any polling area. Further, any person who contravenes above provisions shall be punishable with imprisonment for a term which may extend to two years, or with fine, or with

Meanwhile dispersal of

ers (MO) and Sector Officers (SO) in respect of the three assembly constituencies of the Kangpokpi District is scheduled on February 27, 2022. The Dispersal cum Reception Centre (DCRC) for the ACs will be at the Kangpokpi

DC Office.

Voter Assistance Booth will be set up in all polling stations. Provisions for pick up/drop fa-cilities for persons with disabil-ity (PwD) and aged voters are made available with wheelchair facility being provided. Dedicated five vehicles for each constituency are deployed in Kangpokpi district for PwD and aged voters. For 80+ and PwD, who have not yet applied for postal ballot will be considered as normal voters.

The death toll saw a rise of 255 fatalities, the ministry data also showed. It now stands at 5,13,481. The number of active cases further declined to 1,21,881. It currently comprises 0.28 per cent of the total infections, the ministry also said. A reduction of 12,354 cases has been recorded in the active Covid-19 caseload in a span of 24 hours.

Covid is subsiding in the coun-

try, the positivity rate has fallen to 1.01 per cent. While the national Covid-19 recovery rate has improved to 98.52 per cent, the health ministry said.

As many as 23,598 people recovered in the last 24 hours. taking the overall figure to 4,22,70,482.

The weekly positivity rate stands at 1.36 per cent, the ministry added.

So far, the country has administered 177.13 crore doses of the Covid-19 vaccines. Meanwhile, 11,36,133 samples have been tested for the viral

"Let me make one thing clear," US Ambassador to the UN Linda Thomas-Greenfield said after the vote, "Russia, vou can veto this resolution, but you cannot veto our voices, vou cannot veto the truth, you cannot veto our principles, you can-not veto the Ukrainian people."

support. The word "condemns was replaced by "deplores" and a reference to Chapter 7 of the UN Charter, which allows members to take military action to restore peace, was deleted.

The resolution reaffirmed the sovereignty of Ukraine and called for Russia to "immediately cease its use of force against Ukraine." Ultimately, more than 70 countries co-sponsored the resolution.

"Make no mistake, Russia is isolated. It has no support for the invasion of Ukraine," said Britain's ambassador to the UN, Barbara Woodward. Before the vote, Thomas-Greenfield described Russia's attack as "so bold, so brazen, that it threatens our international system as we

"We have a solemn obligation to not look away... At the very minimum, we have an obligation to object," she said. "Vote yes if you believe Russia should be held to account for its actions. Vote no or abstain if you do not uphold the charter and align yourselves with the aggressive and unprovoked actions of Russia.'

Moscow's UN envoy, Vassily Nebenzia, denounced the resolution as "anti-Russian and anti-Ukrainian." "It is difficult for us to compete with the US in terms of the number of invasions carried out. You are in no position to moralize," he said.
