### Hope the Judicial System will improve in 2022

India may be celebrating the Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav but even after 75 years, our ju-dicial system has not been able to come out of its ancient pat-tern. The cases go on for a long time and the verdicts are pro-

nounced in English or there is excessive use of Urdu. More than 50% India understands Hindi, but even today the decisions of the courts come rarely in this language. Many laws are still going on from the British era, such as in cruelty on animals, even today only Rs 50 is the fine. That is why the cases of animal cruelty pile up and criminals roam fearlessly. The courts do not have adequate staff, the posts of judges are lying vacant and the courts do not have proper facilities also. Supreme Court judge Justice S Abdul Nazeer recently said that the people of North India and North Karnataka are ignorant about their rights and they suffer due to lack of knowledge of the legal process. Because of this, most of the people continue to suffer for the rest of their life as the cases

The judicial infrastructure in the country is still being maintained in an unplanned manner. An effective judiciary can help in the effective development of the economy. According to an international research published in 2018 failure to deliver justice on time costs the country up to 9% of the annual GDP. According to the Tata Trusts report, only 0.08% of GDP is spent on courts. The general public has to suffer a lot due to the poor condition of the courts and the constitutional rights of the citizens are also violated. It is estimated that due to litigation, the common man has to bear the economic burden of up to two percent of GDP. If the courts settle the cases on time and at an accelerated pace, then the GDP will increase and the citizens will get relief. Improving buildings and infrastructure alone will not do miracles, so technical improvements, improvements in the court process, and appointments of judges and other personnel are also necessary.

Sometime ago the Chief Justice of India NV Raman had said that about 20% of the judges do not even have a proper courtroom to sit. The total sanctioned strength of judicial officers in the country is 24,280, while the available courtrooms are only 20,143. Of these, 620 are located in rental premises. 26% of the court complexes in the country do not have separate toilets for women. Similarly, 16% of court complexes do not even have toilets for men. Only 54% of the courts in the country have access to drinking water. In this computer age, only 27% of courtrooms have a computer on the judge's desk with a video conferencing facility. Similarly, only 51% of the courts have libraries. Only 32% courts have separate record rooms and only 5% have basic medical facilities. The 75th Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav will be truly meaningful only when the citizens of the country can get speedy justice and the judicial system will be fine-tuned. Let us hope the new year brings some improvement in the functioning of the judicial system in the country.

The concept of charity goes back to ancient times, and the practice of providing for the poor has roots in many major ancient civilizations and world religions. Today with the rapid modernization and advancement, social problems have become more complex and social work needs in some professional people with skills and desire to bring about a change. Whereas social work started on a more scientific footing aimed at controlling and reforming individuals, it has in more recent times adopted a more critical and holistic approach to under-standing and intervening in social

Social work has its roots in the social and economic upheaval brought by the Industrial Revolution way back years ago, which particularly started with the struggle of society to deal with poverty and its resultant prob-lems. Since the only focus of social work at that time was aimed at dealing with poverty, it was intricately linked with the idea of charity work during earlier those times. But today it is well classified in much broader terms. Today there is a clear classification beeen social work and charity work. Whereas charity is only aimed at providing some basic facilities to the poor or needy people, the social work is aimed at bringing a change in the so-ciety, a change for human betterment. Modern social workers can be found helping to deal with the consequences of these and many other social maladies in all areas of the human services professions and in many other fields

These social workers work as a group for solving

problems of the people who fail to seek any help from the government means. These associations can be international, continental or semi-continental, national, and regional. The main international associations are the International Federation of Social Workers (IFSW) and the International Association of Schools of Social Work (IASSW). These organizations work in different areas like medical help in the times of war or epidemic, children welfare, labour welfare or some other important issues related to common man. Social service can be termed as service working for the developmental process of a particular area where the government authorities failed to perform. The main areas where

social workers are involved include: Community Development: Social workers with specialization work in administrative as well as management fields volunteer in to bring about a community development, human development, and resource development. These mainly concentrate on the community development both the ru-ral as well as the urban community. Professional social workers work in a variety of settings, including non-profit or public social service agencies, grassroots advocacy organiza-tions, hospitals, hospices, community health agencies, schools, faith-based organizations, and even the military These work for promoting awareness of the rights of the citizens and also the various government projects aimed at benefitting the general class. Professionals from any field passion-ate about improving the lives of others can enter into this sector and work

begins with a Bachelor's degree (BA. BSc, BSSW, BSW, etc.) or a diploma in Social Work. There are various requirements that a candidate needs to fill in before entering into social sec tor these days. These requirements may vary from region to region and type of social sector one choose to enter in. Some countries offer Postgraduate degrees in Social Work, like master's (such as MSW, MSS, MA, MSc, MRes, MPhil etc.) or doctoral studies (such as PhD and DSW (Doctor of Social Work)). More and more graduates of social work continue to post-doctoral studies. Some argue that social work education is a lifelong process and one continues to learn as he works in the related field.

### PM inaugurates and lays the foundation stone of various developmental projects

# The North East, which Netaji called the gateway to India's independence, is becoming the gateway to fulfilling the dreams of a new India - PM Modi

IT News Imphal, Jan 4:

Prime Minister Narendra Modi inaugurated 13 Projects worth around Rs. 1850 crores and laid the foundation stone of 9 projects worth around Rs 2950 crore in Imphal, Manipur today. These projects relate to diverse sectors such as Road Infrastructure, Drinking Water Supply, Health, Urban Development, Housing, Information Technology, Skill Development, Art and Culture, among others.

The Prime Minister laid the foundation stone of construction of five National Highway Projects to be built at a cost of more than Rs 1700 crore. He inaugurated the Steel Bridge built over the Barak River on NH-37, at a cost of over Rs 75 crore, which would decongest traffic between Silchar and Imphal. He also dedicated to the people of Manipur 2387 mobile towers built at a cost of around Rs 1100 crores.

Prime Minister inaugurated Rs 280 crore worth 'Water Transmission system of Thoubal Multi-purpose project', which will provide drinking water supply to the Imphal city; the Water Supply Scheme project built at the cost of Rs 65 crore, to provide safe drinking water to residents of ten habitations of Tamenglong district and the

'Augmentation of Senapati District Headquarter Water Supply Scheme' built at a cost of Rs. 51 crore to provide a regular water supply to the residents of the area.

The Prime Minister also laid the foundation stone of a 'State of the Art Cancer Hospital' in Imphal worth around Rs. 160 crore on a PPP basic He inaugurated the '200 Bedded Covid Hospital at Kyamgei' which has been set up at a cost of about Rs. 37 crore in collaboration with DRDO. He inaugurated three projects under 'Imphal Smart City Mission', developed at a cost of more than Rs. 170 crore, including the Integrated Command and Control Centre (ICCC)', 'Development of Western Riverfront on Imphal River (Phase I)' and 'Development of Mall Road at Thangal Bazar (Phase I)'.

The Prime Minister also

The Prime Minister also laid the foundation stone of 'Centre for Invention, Innovation, Incubation and Training (CIIIT)' to be built in the state at a cost of about Rs 200 crore. He also laid the foundation stone for the construction of the Manipur Institute of Performing Arts at Gurgaon, Haryana, to be built at a cost of more than Rs 240 crore.

Addressing the gathering, the Prime Minister said a few days from now, on January 21, would be the 50th an-



niversary of Manipur getting statehood. This fact, along with the occasion of Amrit Mahotsav on 75 years of its independence is a major inspiration in itself.

Paying homage to the bravery of the people of Manipur, the Prime Minister said the belief in freedom among the people of the country, started here from the land of Moirang, where Netaji Subhash's army hoisted the national flag for the first time. The North East, which Netaji called the gateway to India's independence, is becoming the gateway to fulfilling the dreams of a new India. He reiterated his belief that the eastern and north eastern parts of India will be the source of

India's progress and this is visible in the growth of the region today.

The Prime Minister congratulated the people of Manipur for the schemes for which the foundation stone has been laid and were inaugurated today. He thanked the people of Manipur for the formation of a stable government that is governing with full majority and with full impact. He stressed that due this stability and choice of the people of Manipur achievements like 6 lakh farmer families getting hundreds of crore rupees under Kisan Samman Nidhi; 6 lakh poor families getting benefits under PM Garib Kalyan Scheme; 80 thousand houses under PMAY; free medical

treatment to 4.25 lakh patients under Ayushman Yojna; 1.5 lakh free gas connections; 1.3 lakh free electricity connections; 30 thousands toilets; more than 30 lakh free vaccine doses and oxygen plants in every district of the state could become reality

The Prime Minister recalled that even before he became the Prime Minister, he
visited Manipur many times.
He said he understands their

The Prime Minister said that his Government has resolved to 'Act East' for the Northeast. He said God has given so many natural resources, so much potential on this region. There are so many possibilities for development and tourism here. He added that work is now being done to realise these possibilities in the North East. ## State Congress President Hits hard on BJP, says will not win more than 15 seats in the upcoming assembly election

IT News Imphal, Jan 4:

President of the Manipur Pradesh Congress Committee, N. Loken today hits hard on BJP saying that they will not able to win even 15 seats in the upcoming state assembly election.

"I challenge if the BJP can tell any seat that they will win in 10 assembly constituencies of Thoubal and Kakching dis-tricts", Loken said to media persons at Congress Bhavan in Imphal today. He said that the BJP had speculated the number of seats to cross 40 during the poll campaign but there is no chance for the BJP to win at even 15 seats in the upcoming election. The MPCC President is confident that the BJP has no chance of winning at any of the seats at Ukhrul district, Senapati, and Tamenglong district. He said that Churachandpur district too, of the 6 constituencies the BJP may hardly come back at one or two assembly constituencies, the MPCC president said. Regarding the 40 assembly seats in valley districts, Loken said that the BJP may win at not more than 9

At a time when the Prime Minister of India, Narendra Modi was inaugurating 13 projects that is worth Rs. 1850 crore and laying the foundation stone for 9 new projects



worth Rs. 2950 crore at Hatta Kangjeibung here in Imphal, the MPCC president questions the developmental works taken up by the BJP government during the 4 and half years tenure.

"Those projects inaugurated by the Prime Minister of India today are all taken up during the Congress government and were almost completed before the last Assembly election. However, due to blockade called by some people or organizations over the creation of 7 more districts in the state, the than Congress government could not inaugurate it on time", Loken said. He further said the BJP led government took 4 and half years

to inaugurate projects that were nearly completed during congress's government.

Loken further took at the central government under the BJP saying that no people-oriented programmes were taken up by the BJP during their 7 and half years tenure. ## At 37,379 cases, India's Covid tally rises for 7th day; Omicron count at 1,892

Agency New Delhi, Jan 4:

Maharashtra and Delhi remain the leading contributors in India's Omicron tally with 568 and 382 infections, respec-

Body: India on Tuesday logged as many as 37,379 new Covid-19 cases, which was a spike of 10.75% from the preceding day, according to the morning bulletin shared by the Union ministry of health and family welfare. The spike was the biggest single-day jump in coronavirus cases in the co try since early September. Reuters reported.

This is the seventh con-

secutive day that India saw a rise in the daily Covid-19 case count with 33,750 fresh infections reported on Monday. Following Tuesday's figures, the cumulative tally of India

ministry's bulletin revealed. The active caseload has also been pushed to 1,71,830, accounting for 0.49% of the total

Meanwhile, the number of cases of the highly transmis-sible Omicron variant of Covid-19 has touched 1 892 in India Maharashtra and Delhi remain the leading contributors with 568 and 382 infections, respec-tively. Kerala, Rajasthan, Guiarat and Tamil Nadu all feature in the top 10 most-hit states due to the variant and have over 100 infections re-corded so far. Telangana, Karnataka, Haryana and Odisha are other states in the top 10 list in India, according to the health ministry's bulle

As many as 124 new fatalities due to Covid-19 were re-ported in the last 24 hours, one less than the preceding day, taking the death toll in India to 482,017. However, the only positive signal that remains in the latest undates is the new recoveries that saw a jump to 11.007 from Monday's 10.846.

now stands at 3,43,06.414. A total of 68,24,28,595 samples have been tested for Covid-19 in the country so far, of which, 11,54,302 were done in the last 24 hours.

Further, India's Covid-19 vaccination coverage has surpassed the 146 crore-mark with more than 57 lakh adult eligible beneficiaries getting inoculated in the past 24 hours. From Monday onwards, vaccination for individuals aged 15-18 also began and on the launch day, as many as 42,06,433 people were administered the first dose of the coronavirus vaccine. Thus, in the last 24 hours, 99.27.797 vaccine shots were jabbed to all eligible beneficia-

Meanwhile the consistent spike is occurring at a time when India is grappling with the Omicron outbreak owing to which several states and Union territories, including Maharashtra, Delhi and West Bengal, among others, have imposed restrictions. The Centre also advised states and UTs on Saturday to commence setting up makeshift hospitals to increase availability of beds and create special teams to evaluate home isolation cases.

The government has also been asked to consider using hotel rooms and other similar accommodations in line with Covid-dedicated hospitals to cater to patients showing mild to moderate symptoms.

Addressing the gathering, the DRDO chairman extended warm wishes to DRDO employees and their families. He said, DRDO has accomplished many successes through relentless zeal, perseverance and dedication of project teams, able leadership of project DGs, directors and lab directors. He acknowledged the support of all stake-holders like financial advisors, corporate teams, industry partners & government stakeholders in achieving the goals.

Secretary DDR&D brought out that 175 transfer of technol-ogy (ToT) licences were signed during 2021 and the production value of DRDO developed systems till today is over Rs 3 Lakh crore. He said that DRDO is ensuring the participation of industry as Development cum Pro-duction Partners (DcPP) and Production Agencies (PA) in the projects. DRDO test facilities have been opened up for industries and guidelines for GOCO (Government Owned and Company Operated) have been pro-

## Delhi, Punjab impose curfews; Delhi CM, other leaders test positive

Amid a single-day spike of 37,379 fresh Covid-19 cases, states such Punjab and Union Territory of Delhi have imposed stricter measures to curb the spread of the virus. Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal and other leaders have tested positive for the virus.

The Delhi Disaster Management Authority on Tues-day decided to impose a week-end curfew in the national capital. Only essential movement will be allowed during the curfew. It also decided to implement work from home in all government offices, while private offices will be permitted to function at 50 per cent ca-

pacity.
The Punjab government, meanwhile, has **imposed a night** curfew in the state from 10 pm to 5 am, excluding essential services. All educational institutes shall remain closed, while online classes will continue. Moreover, bars, cinemas halls, malls, restaurants and spas will be allowed to operate at 50 per cent capacity, subject to staff being fully vaccinated.

Among other restrictions, the notification urges people to follow the 'no mask, no service' principle — no service shall be provided in government and private offices to the person

not wearing proper mask

In Telangana, Sankranthi holidays were declared for all educational institutions across the state between January 8 and 16. The decision was taken Monday during Chief Minister K Chandrasekhar Rao's review of the Covid-19 situation prevailing in the state. However, officials informed the CM there was no need to impose a lockdown in the state at

Maharashtra is planning to procure an approximate 1 lakh S-gene test kits to ensure that infections from the Omicron variant are detected faster. This comes as the state continued to top the Omicron count in the

country, with 568 total cases as of Tuesday. In light of the surge in cases, Brihanmumbai Mu-nicipal corporation (BMC)-run schools in Mumbai will remain closed for Classes 1 to 9 and Class 11 till January 31.

Meanwhile, Delhi CM Kejriwal, who had attended an election rally in Dehradun a day before, on Tuesday announced that he was Covid positive. However, Health Minister Satyendra Jain stated that the infection was mild. BJP MP Manoj Tiwari, Union Minister Mahendra Nath Pandey and Maharashtra Minister Eknath Shinde, too, announced over Twitter that they have tested positive for coronavirus.
