### 19 CSOs of various communities of Manipur demand implementation of NRC; memorandum submitted

IT News Imphal, July 13:

At least 19 civil bodies of various ethnic communities of the state had submitted memorandum to the Prime Minister Narendra Modi urging for implementation of the National Register for Citizen (NRC) in the state of Manipur to trace the foreign migrant who have been illegally set-tling in the state.

Narendra Modi for implementation of the Inner Line Permit System in the state elaborated on the need for implementation of NRC in Manipur in view of the unnatural growth of population due to influx of foreigners from Bangladesh, Nepal

and Myanmar.
The CSOs expressed utmost gratitude to Prime Min-ister Narendra Modi for the extension of Bengal Eastern Frontier Regulation 1873 in Manipur that the people of Manipur had struggled for

long years from 1990.

The memorandum said, as
Manipur is a border state the intrusion of immigrants from Bangladesh, Myanmar and Nepal by far and autonomously had settled at large since the abolition of the Pass Permit / Permit System on 18 November 1950 by the then Chief Commissioner Himmat Singh. On this issue, no discerning step had taken up so far for the last 75 years under the Foreigners Act 1946. Because of this continuous overflow of influxes, which subsisted within us, has now taken possession of the socio economic and political rights of the indigenous people. Bangladeshi and Myanmar Muslims have occupied the constituency of Jiribam and numbered of them scattered on average in valley areas. Myanmar Kuki and nearby Lushai kuki have settled at an unsystematic population of some lakhs in number. They have now counteracted ownership against the occupant indigenous people in hill ar-eas. Likewise, Nepali population has raised tremendous

The memorandum signed by the 19 CSOs demanded the Inner Line Permit System being enforced to the state of Manipur, to give a complete definition of indigenous people of Manipur which is yet to be defined.

The memorandum also expressed its trust to the central government over its commitment to protect the Indian citizens under constitutional pro-

"Amit Shah ji delivered a remarkable speech in the Rajya Sabha of the Indian Parliament on 19 November 2019 that NRC would implemented throughout the country. In the

light of this perception, we call for the implementation of NRC in Manipur to safeguard the genuine citizens", the memorandum said.

The memorandum also recalled the movement of Foreigner issue, which demanded for Detection & Deportation of Foreigners from Manipur. In 1980 & 1994, the All Manipur Students Union (AMSU) & Al! Manipur Coordinating Committee (AMSCOC) had undergone an agreement twice with the Manipur Government & the then Governor of Manipur V. K. Nair regard-ing the Detection and Deportation of Foreign nationals from the soil of Manipur base on the year 1951. Nevertheless, the Manipur past as well present government has not taken up any steps towards the agreement. Therefore, the foreigners are a great threat to the indigenous people of Manipur and as whole in respect of India too from a long time. It is the request to our responsible Center Government to open Centers of operation for Detection & Deportation of foreigners with imme-

Agency New Delhi, July 13:

Precaution doses of COVID-19 vaccine are likely to be administered at government vaccination centres to individuals aged between 18 and 59 starting from July 15, Union minister Anurag Thakur said on Wednesday.

Aimed at accelerating the uptake of COVID precaution doses, the booster shots will be administered for free at government vac-cination centres.

The beneficiaries will be given the booster dose un-der a 75-day special drive, which will be held as part of the Centre's Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsay to celebrate the 75th anniversary of India's Independence.

"India is celebrating 75 rs of Independence. On years of Independence. On the occasion of Azadi ka Amrit Kaal, it has been de-cided that from July 15, 2022 till the next 75 days, citizens above 18 years of age will be given booster doses free of cost," the Union minister

# Guru had supreme position in the society

This Doha (verse) of Sadguru Kabir describes greatness of a Guru, who is necessary in the life of a human being and the important pillars of society. They are friends, philosophers and guides who teach, philosophise and enrich students. From academic knowledge to moral ethical or social, the Gurus are treasure trove. A Guru's contribution to the world is priceless and irreplaceable. Gurus are known to form the minds of the youth, they bestow good qualities on their students and make them responsible citizens. It is a profession and mission taught by saint.

The Vedic Mantra "Gurur Brahma Gurur Vishnu, Gurur Devo Maheshvarah; Guruah Sakshat Param Brahma, Tasmai Guruve Namah" explains that Guru himself is the Tridev i.e. Brahma-Vishnu-Mahesh and is verily the supreme Power or Absolute truth. It signifies the unchallenged position of Guru, who helps us in solving all troubles that we encounter in the path of learning & wisdom in our life.
Guru is composed of two Sanskrit words "Gu", meaning darkness and

Guru is composed of two Sanskrit words "Gu", meaning darkness and "Ru", meaning light. Thus Guru means the one who brings from darkness to light. The word Guru itself resembles the message "Asto Maa Sadgamay, Tamso Maa Jyotirgamay, Mrityor Maa Amritgamay" (i.e. lead us from ignorance to truth, from darkness to light and from death to deathlessness). A guru is one, who has immenence knowledge, wisdom and command over a subject and makes use of it to guide his disciples. Guru are the building block of society, who help to become a person better human being. Actually, the word "Guru" is untranslatable and 'Teacher', 'Master', 'tutor' or other equivalents give only a partial meaning. Parents as well as all those persons, who are responsible for the career building of the disciples, are their "Guru".

In Indian culture and civilization, the concept of Guru is found in the earliest Vedic texts. The Guru and Gurukul were the established tradition in ancient Bharatvarsha. Guru had highest position in King's Rajdarbar and society. Archeological and epigraphical evidence certify the existence of numerous Gurukuls, where Shishyas were equipped not only with bookish knowledge but also had an all-round development. Philosophy, grammer, farming, animal husbandry, farming, weapon training, music, painting and other essential life skills in human life were part of the study.

The Guru-Shishya Parampara were also part & parcel in other sects like Buddhism, Jainism and Sikhism, which originated from Sanatan Dharma. Sikh is the transformed form of Sanskrit word Shishya and Shikhism is completely based on Guru tradition. Thus Guru tradition based learning were the backbone of enriched Indian society and India was the hub of knowledge and culture. Nalanda Vishwavidyalaya, Vikramshila Vishwavidyalaya, Udantpuri Vishwavidyala, Takshshila Vishwavidyalaya, Kashi Vidyapith etc. are some such evidences, where learners from all over the world illuminated their mind and body.

Undoubtedly, Guru is the one who shapes the nation inside his/her classroom. After cessation of Guru-Shishya Parampara (system) and adoption of Macaulay education system, the goal and meaning of education has completely transformed. The teacher/tutor's duty has narrowed down to just teach the students certain subjects in classroom and now they have nothing to do with their all-round development. Gradually the teachers lost their dignity in the society.

After governmentisation of schools, the teacher no longer remain a

After governmentisation of schools, the teacher no longer remain a Guru, but became a salaried employee. The government used them in various jobs, other than teaching. They are the soft targets for engagement in various non-teaching works like elections, human census, animal census, pulse polio works, ration card verification & many more. The entry of politics and unionism among teachers has also badly hampered the education system. Several factions of teachers' organization have evolved only to establish leadership, which time & again organise strikes for their demands. The ultimate sufferers are the learners, for whom the schools have been established and teachers have been appointed.

schools have been established and teachers have been appointed. The two-fold system of education i.e. Government and Private, has bifurcated the education cenario in two distinct identity, Policy makers, themselves do not accept the government schools and send their wards to private schools. Even teachers, working in government school, have no faith on their own school and they prefer to admit their wards in private schools. Generally, government schools are now meant for poor and downtrodden classes, who have no better option. Even after 75 years of independence, the education system has not been transformed as job-oriented and the graduates find themselves empty handed after passing out. The mindset of teachers has totally been transformed. Due to downgrading from "Guru" to "teacher", the country's foundation is at stake.

It is heartbreaking that the major section of present-day teachers is apathetic towards the high-valued job of learner's career building through teaching. Education has become a profitable business, and teachers have become its marketing managers. Although the enriched growth of science and education has made us capable to reach on moon and mars, but unfortunately the human values have been lost.

The need of the hour is to relook prevailing education system in India.

We must shift our strategy from present education system, which are producing graduates having only bookish knowledge, to Gurukul system, where all-round development of the dispel was the main objective. By adopting the Guru Parampara, the country will once again become a Vishwa Guru.

YouTube creators are helping to meet viewers' increasing need for at-home grooming assistance by sharing their experiences and tips on everything from DIY haircuts to salon nails. And while cooking has always been popular on YouTube, people are watching this genre at a rate more than 45% higher than the same period last year, turning to creators for help on everything from fast and easy meals to gourmet cuisine and specialty baking. Finally, with daily commutes, social gatherings, and sporting events on hold, people are devoting their time at home to personal projects and skill development.

For many, these pursuits are brand new. We've seen global watch time of how-to videos containing "for beginners" or "step by step" the title increase more than 65% year over year. Which topics are people gravitating toward? They range from popular pastimes to niche endeavors. For example, watch time of tutorial videos about guitar have seen a 40% increase globally year over year. And worldwide, average daily views of content about making sourdough have spiked 260% since March 15, compared to average daily views for the rest of the year. In 2011, YouTube had more than 1 trillion views or around 140 views for every person on Earth. 72 hours of video are uploaded to YouTube every minute. should generate eureka squeals of joy from learning content develop-ers. Sure, a lot of those videos feature musical performances by rock-star wannabes and cats doing funny things, but there are a huge number of videos on content topics relevant to workplace learning. A YouTube search for "Safety Training" returns 56,000 results. A search for "Management Skills" wanagement Skins

returns 36,600 results. A search for
"Business Writing" returns
57,000 results. A search for "MS
Excel 2010 Tutorial" returns 40,200 results. The volume of content available on YouTube frees training departments from having to reinvent the wheel. Rather than focusing on creating content, they can instead focus their efforts on finding the best existing content to pro-vide to learners. Because there's so much content on YouTube, it isn't an effective learning strategy to say to learners "why don't you go to YouTube and watch a few videos about project management?" The learner shouldn't be required to sort through dozens of videos before finding relevant content. A more efficient approach is to find and inte-grate good YouTube content into your learning management system and ultimately into learning paths. Chances are, your learning management system will allow you to link to YouTube videos which will open in a new window. This approach will display the comments posted by people on YouTube and will allow your learners to comment as well if they wish. Even if you're hard at work creating proprietary learning con-tent, you can quickly create and make available effective and entertaining content that will help your learners acquire new skills.

### India logs 16,906 new Covid cases, 45 deaths in 24 hours

Agency New Delhi, July 13:

India recorded 16,906 new COVID-19 cases in the last 24 hours, taking the total number of coronavirus to 4,36,69,850. The death count climbed to 5,25,519 with 45 new fatalities in the last 24 hours.

#### Assam flood situation improves, IT News Imphal, July 13: over 2.92 lakh people still affected

Agency Guwahati, July 13:

The flood condition in Assam improved significantly on Tuesday although over 2.92 lakh people are still reeling due to the deluge in seven districts, an official bulletin said.

According to the daily flood report of the Assam State Management Authority (ASDMA) no river is flowing above their danger marks in Assam as of now and no incident of drowning was reported during the day.

The toll in this year's flood

and landslides stood at 192

across the state.

ASDMA said around 2,92,200 people are still affected by the flood in Cachar, Chirang, Hailakandi, Morigaon, Nagaon, Sivasagar and Tamulpur districts.

Cachar is the worst hit with

over 1.68 lakh people suffering, followed by Morigaon where more than 1.13 lakh persons are affected and Nagaon with around 7,450 people.

Till Monday over 3.79 lakh ople were affected in the deluge across 10 districts in the state.

At present, 642 villages are under water and 1,514,92 hectares of crop areas have been damaged across Assam. ASDMA said

It further said authorities are running 83 relief camps and distribution centers in five districts, where 19,237 people, including 5,004 children, are taking shelter.

The authorities have distributed 375.68 quintals of rice, dal and salt, 1,649.16 litres of mustard oil and other flood re-lief items during the last 24 hours

Massive erosions have been witnessed in Barpeta, Bongaigaon, Kamrup, Morigaon, Nalbari, Tamulpur, Tinsukia and Udalguri dis-

Embankments, roads, bridges and other infrastructure have been damaged by flood waters in Barpeta, Kamrup, Nagaon, Dibrugarh, Nalbari, Udalguri and a mute spectator despite noticing a spurt in killings and disworkers

North-East Forum for International Solidarity (NEFIS) expressed strong condemnation to the brutal killings of migrant workers in Manipur.

# Supreme Court to hear on July 15 pleas challenging Centre's Agnipath scheme

Agency New Delhi, July 13:

The Supreme Court on Friday will hear pleas challenging the Centre's Agnipath scheme for short-term recruitment into the armed forces. A bench of justices DY Chandrachud and AS Bopanna will consider the matter

ter.

The Agnipath scheme was announced by the Narendra Modi government in June for a short-term induction of soldiers in the armed forces. The scheme seeks to recruit soldiers, including

women for only four years with a provision to retain 25 per cent of them in the regular cadre for another 15 years after another round of screening

The announcement had led to protests across the country, with agitations turning violent in some states. Some petitions were filed in the Supreme Court challenging the scheme introduced by the Central Country of the Central Count

The Centre has been aggressively defending the scheme, stating that the reforms were long pending as the armed forces wanted to bring in youthfulness and experience. The defence ministry had also said that concessions like reservations for 'Agniveers' by different ministries were pre-planned and not in reaction to the arson which took place in lune.

"This reform was long pending. We want to bring youthfulness and experience with this reform. Today, a large number of jawans are in their 30s& officers are getting command much later than in the past," Lt Gen Anil Puri, Additional Secretary, Dept of Military Affairs, said at the briefing on June 19.

# Largest, brightest 'Supermoon' to light night sky tonight

Agency New Delhi, July 13:

The Earth is all set to witness a 'supermoon' today bringing the lunar body at the closest distance this year. The phenomenon happens on a full moon night at the Moon's closest approach to the Earth, lighting up the night skies bright

ing up the night skies bright.
Today, the Moon will be only 3,57,264 kilometres away from the Earth

from the Earth.

The last supermoon this year – also known as 'Strawberry Moon' – occurred on June 14, which marked the last full Moon of spring or the first full moon of summer.

Those who missed catching a glimpse of the 'strawberry

supermoon' last month will have another chance as this month's full moon will be back tonight.

Interestingly, this time it happens to occur around the same time when the Sun is farthest from the planet, due to Aphelion. The supermoon of 2022 is

The supermoon of 2022 is also known as 'buck moon' – named after antlers that form on a buck's forehead typically around this time of the year. The supermoon will be vis-

The supermoon will be visible at 2:38pm Eastern Time Zone (12:08 am Indian Standard Time, Thursday) on the night of July 13

The Moon is likely to appear full for about three days, from early Tuesday morning through early Friday morning.

The term 'supermoon' was

coined by an astrologer called Richard Nolle in 1979. According to his definition which has been adopted by American space agency NASA, the phenomenon is a full moon that takes place within 90 per cent fits tis closest approach to Earth.

A supermoon is a treat for skywatchers and photographers as the moon appears larger and brighter, providing them with a spectacular opportunity

to observe celestial events.

The phenomenon tends to have tidal effects on the planet, causing very high high and low low tides. Coastal storms at the sea around this time could even lead to aggravated flooding, astronomers say.

A full moon at perigee ap-

pears 14 percent larger and 30 percent brighter than that at apogee, but only 7 percent larger and 15 percent brighter than an average full moon. It's difficult to tell the differences with the naked eye.

But you can indeed see highlands and lowlands on the moon with the naked eye.

Binoculars or telescopes are recommended, through which the details in craters, mountains, ridges and other huge features on the moon can be observed.

The moon seems larger to the naked eye when it is near the horizon at moonrise and moonset. That's because it is in proximity to the buildings and trees on the ground and can be compared with them.

# New Space Policy soon, to act as launch pad for Pvt Companies to execute larger commercial missions

Agency New Delhi, July 13:

Pawan Goenka, chairman of the Indian National Space Promotion and Authorization Center (IN-SPACe), the official government space agency, said that private enterprises in India will finally be permitted to launch their own commercial space projects by the end of this year.

Space Project This year.

Goenka said that the Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO) will be the only user of the first batch of five Polar Satellite Launch Vehicles (PSLVs) produced by a partnership between Hindustan Aeronautics Ltd and Larsen & Toubro Ltd.

This would be the first time a whole rocket was constructed outside of the space agency.

However, according to Goenka, once the first phase of privately-built PSLV deployment is finished, future PSLVs will be supplied to the private sector as well, allowing them to execute larger commercial missions with these higher-capacity launch vehicles.

In June, the IN-SPACe headquarters, established to encourage private investment and innovation in the space industry, was officially opened by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, who also said that Indian firms would emerge as leaders in the alghal space seed.

in the global space sector.

While previously the space sector was closed to private firms, the government opened it up for all by bringing reforms, said Modi, adding that "we have removed all restrictions by bringing reforms in the space sector".

sector".

He also said that in order to create winners in the space sector, IN-SPACe will help private husinesses



"I am hopeful that like in the IT sector, our industry will also take the lead in the global space sector," Modi said, adding that the central government has been working on a new space policy which will provide ease of doing business in the space sector.

The Space Policy 2022 is currently in its final stages of development after significant consultation with industry stakeholders. Once released, it will outline how the private sector might contribute to technol-

ogy transfer, remote sensing, and satellite communication.

and sate the communication.
Recently, ISRO chairman
Dr S Somanath, imaging satellites, which were formerly only
owned by the Indian space
agency and the defence, will
henceforth be held by private
companies under the Space
Policy 2022.

There would be only investments made by Indiabased enterprises. If FDI exceeds 70%, it will be restricted and subject to government approval, said Somanath. Additionally, rockets can be owned, created, and launched by private entities as well and they can also construct a launch pad.

"There are many missions planned for this year. We will launch a recently developed small satellite launch vehicle (SSLV) by this month-end or at the beginning of August... Test and trials are on for the Gaganyaan program," he told the media during a press brief in Coimbatore.

However, the policy would be followed by the much-anticipated space law, which has been on hold for a while. Meanwhile, the business community has called for a review of the punitive sections of the law.

It should be noted that according to Economic Survey, there are presently 101 start-up businesses, of which 47 joined the marketin 2021 and 21 in 2020. It highlighted that the Indian space sector is predicted to grab a larger share of the global space economy, with private sector engagement. At the moment, India accounts for only around 2% of the space economy, behind the key players in this space race - the United States and China. It is understood that the in-

It is understood that the increased commercial participation in the Indian space sector followed a global trend in which space is transitioning from a government-driven sector to one in which the private sector performs end-to-end space activities.

The government believes that in two years, India will have its own SpaceX-like initiatives as the centre prepares to boost satellite production and enable a wider role for private actors in the space sector.

According to Ajay Kumar

Sood, the Principal Scientific Advisor to the government, the space industry's full potential is still unrealized, and the government will promote private satellite manufacturing for a variety of uses, including health care, agriculture, as well as urban development.

In June, he said that following consultations, the new space policy's final draft will soon be sent for additional review, to the Empowered Technology Group, which aims to proactively lay down, coordinate, and oversee national-level policies relating to "procurement and Induction of technologies", "R&D in technologies that require large outlays in resources, both financial and human" and "render sound and timely advice for determining direction and trajectory of Government's R&D and Technology Development Programmes".
