### **Chief Minister calls for judicious** consumption of Electricity

#### IT News Imphal, July 30:

Chief Minister N. Biren Singh appealed to the public to consume electricity and water judiciously and added that keeping such a habit of using only the required amount of electricity and water would help in preserving our valuable energy resource. The Chief Minister was

addressing the gathering at the State Level Grand Finale Event of Ujjwal Bharat, Ujjwal Bhavishya, Power @ 2047 (Bijli Mahotsav & Ujala Diwas) held today at City Con-vention Centre, Imphal as a part of the celebration of 75 years of Indian Independence. The programme was The programme was organised by the Power Department, Government of Manipur.

N. Biren Singh informed that the State Government purchased electricity from Power companies at Rs. 10 per unit for supply of electricity to the State. However, the State Government has been providing electricity to the public at the subsidised rate ranging from Rs. 5.50 to 6.50 per unit and as such an amount of around Rs. 350 crore is spent every year in subsidy, he added. The Chief Minister, therefore, appealed to the public not to waste electricity as a large amount of State's revenue, an important factor for taking up development works, is drained out in

purchasing electricity. He maintained that the State Government had been putting in every effort to cover far flung areas of the State in all its infrastructure development programmes. He informed that those areas with-



out electricity connection are provided power supply through off-grid power system adding that 68 Health Care Centres in Churachandpur, Chandel and Tamenglong had been facilitated with 24/7 power supply through solar power system.

Expressing satisfaction on learning that 4.10 out of 5.06 lakh power consumers had been brought under the prepaid meter system, N. Biren congratulated the Power Minister and the employees of the Power Department for such an achievement. He further informed that procure-ment of another 2 lakh prepaid meters is in process and the installation would be done by the year end.

Power Minister Thongam Biswajit Singh, while delivering his presidential speech, stated the Grand Finale Event was organised in four places of the State at Bishnupur, Churachandpur, Thoubal and the one at City Convention Centre, Imphal

He continued that the achievement of the Power Department was the result of tireless and dedicated efforts of its employees. Informing that the Central Government had come up with Revamped Distribution Sector Scheme with the objective to improve the quality, reliability and affordability of power supply to consumers, he ex-pressed hopefulness that the Power Department would be able to maintain 24/7 quality power supply by improving

the power system in the State under the Scheme. Stating that interrupted power supply is very much necessary for the State to become socio-economically viable, the Minister informed that the stringing line for Imphal-Mariani had been completed and added the State can now bring in power supply from different states. As such, there would be no shortage of power supply in the State, he maintained

Maharashtra's Sanket Sargar scripted history on Sat-urday, July 30 by becoming the first athlete from India to win a medal at Commonwealth Games 2022. The 21-year-old won the silver medal in the men's 55kg weightlifting event in Birmingham.

Sanket Sargar won a silver medal in the men's 55kg event with a total of 248kg (113kg in snatch, 135 in clean and jerk) to finish behind Malaysia's Aniq Mohamad, who took gold with a total of 249 kg (107kg in snatch, 142kg in clean and jerk).

It was a thrilling finish to the final as Aniq Mohamad needed a Commonwealth record of 142kg in clean and jerk to win the gold.

Sanket Sargar picked up an elbow injury when he tried to lift 139kg in his second clean and jerk attempt. He pushed on for a final attempt, braving the injury he suffered. However, Sargar was not able to lift 139 and finished with the silver medal. Sri Lanka's Dilanka Yodage won the bronze medal with a total of 225kg.

## Is the Govt. leaving **RIMS** into trouble water again?

From 2014 till the month of August 2018, news re-ports about corruption and mismanagement plagued almost all front page newspapers published not only in the state of Manipur but also in some national newspapers. A news report about a Director of RIMS refusing to leave the post after the expiry of his tenure in 2015 was head-lines in almost all newspapers in the state. From 2015 until 2018, the Union Ministry of Health and Family Wel-fare could not appoint a regular director to look after the one and only premier Medical Institute in North East India. Leaving no choice, the Government of Manipur in consultation with the Central Ministry, even appointed an IAS officer as Director in charge of RIMS on deputa-tion.

In between these 4 years, RIMS shows at least 3 incharge directors. Reports about medical achievement were almost nil as the political fight over the post of director overshadowed

In September 2017, a postgraduate student from RIMS had written to the Prime Minister of India stating that the institute was the most corrupt hospital in the country. The Post-Graduate Student even mentioned that some

times he, along with other medical practitioners, treated patients without proper investigation as the Institute does not have any facilities for investigation and because the patient party can't afford to do tests outside the insti-tute.

He wrote to the Prime Minister that the MRI machine installed did not work since he came to the Institute, CT scan was down for nearly a month, and there is no ICU which is just a ward named SICU, with no ventilators, no monitor, but a bed and a cupboard, Neonatal ICU was just for namesake by putting a fake sign in some forsaken rooms, for the whole hospital only one USG machine is working, there is no USG machine in the labour room which by the provide the provided the

tioned for the improvement of the institution are pock-eted by the authority for their own good.

A visit by this reporter on July 29, 2022 show many changes at RIMS. The OPD, the x-ray machines, the MRI etc. all were workable and treated patients in need. The OPD room was no lesser than the one at AIMS Hospital New Delhi.

May be because of the various unwanted happenings, the post of Director of RIMS remained vacant for years. The Ministry of Family Welfare keeps appointing in-charge directors untill April 2018. A new chapter at RIMS opened on that day. But then issues that are non-re-lated to the treatment of patients and providing better teaching facilities for students at RIMS, started plaguing RIMS again.

Those people playing parts in the construction of the hospital infrastructures started a senseless war for the replacement of the newly appointed director Dr. A Shanta, as he was always a taught administrator besides being as he was always a taught administrator besides being a doctor, in the maintenance of quality control. Those people living with the sanctioned amount of money for RIMS started spreading rumours as the Dr. A Shanta never compromised in procuring medical equipment and while appointing qualified doctors or nurses. Scores of letters and memorandums against Dr. Shanta were sent to the Union Health and Family Wel-care Minister for his real-scores.

fare Ministry for his replacement. Source with the Imphal Times revealed even the top post in the Government of Manipur complained about Dr. A Shanta.

Now as per an official order dated 18/07/2022, by the Union Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (NEC), Dr. Shanta is repatriated prematurely and is sent back to NEIGRHMS, Shilong with effect from October 12, 2022. And unlike other Director appointed Dr. A Shanta seems no problem with the decision of the Union Health Ministry. He was more worried about completing the left out task for improvement of the hospital facilities in-stead of making an effort to continue as Director RIMS.

Imphal Times has no problem with the transfer and posting of government officials. Maybe someone better than Dr. Shanta replaces him. But if one recounted the series of incidents that indirectly affect the people in need of medical treatment, one question left is - why the gov-ernment of Manipur is not urging the center to let Dr. A Shanta completes his term as Director RIMS.

# Tigers, their Survival is in Our Hands

Global Tiger Day is celebrated on 29th July every year since 2010 to protect the natural habitats of tigers, raise public awareness and support for tiger conservation issues and to show our collective support to save for this magnificent but endangered animal. This day is observed with much fervor and en-thusiasm to build and develop a stronger bond between human and wildlife. "Doubling tigers is about tigers, about the whole of nature and it's also about us" - Marco Lambertini, the Director General WWF said.

The WWF commit to TX2- 'Tigers times two' the global goal to double the number of wild tigers, say 6000 in 13 tiger range countries by 2022 but could reach 4500 tigers only as of now. It seems that the whole world has ignored the fact and they even forgot to set the theme for 2022 also.

We must protect tigers from ex-nction because our planet's future depends on it. Tiger is a symbol of beauty, bravery, strength, and na-tionality. So to save the tiger means save the national pride. The beautiful, awe-inspiring tiger is one of

the planet's most iconic animals Tiger, the royal animal revered in various cultures is also called the 'Umbrella Species' and by conserving this majestic species, we also conserve the pristine Eco-system and thousands of other species in the same habitat. Manipur is at present not in-

cluded in the global tiger map but not so long back, there were many instances where tigers were found in the state. We have heard of the word 'Keichanba,' which itself prove we had abundant tigers. Tigers are incredibly adaptable animals and can survive in extreme temperatures ----40°C to +50°C. A tiger's roar can be heard upto 3 km. Tigers are the largest of all big cats weighing upto 300 kg.

Tigers live in some of the most important but also most highly threatened habitats on the planet, where many of the most exceptional spe-cies thrive. Left with just 5% of the range where they used to roam, ti-gers are losing their homes to deforestation, infrastructure and other anthropogenic factors, forcing them into rapidly diminishing pockets of nature. According to WWF, globally 95% of the tiger population got extinct since the beginning of the 20th century.

As per the latest census reports of 2018-19, India's tiger population is 2967 tigers. This is about 70%, the highest number of tigers so far a country has globally. Because of the planned efforts under Project Tiger, India could attain the achievement after the country launched the initiative on 1st April 1973. It has been one of the most

uccessful ventures in recent tir to protect the striped predator. The tiger population declined from 3642 in 1990 to just over 1411 in 2006. Since then, the government has un-dertaken several steps to reduce the destruction of the Bengal tiger's natural habitat in the country. This project had the excellent recovery to increase the tiger population, al-most in 53 tiger reserves across 20 Indian states. The Government also launched an anti-poaching force comprising of police, forest officials

and other agencies. The challenges for decline in tiger population are habitat loss – humans have cut down the forest areas for purposes like agricultural land, timber and create enough liv-ing spaces leading to a loss of 93% tiger's natural habitat. Poaching & illegal trade of tigers happen as there is a huge demand for each body parts of tiger from whiskers to its tail. Man animals' conflict, the climate change-rising sea levels of Sunder bans etc. are also wiping out the tiger population. None of the tiger conservation landscapes in India within the Bengal's tiger range are large enough to support an effective population size of 25.

Manipur being in the boarder state with Myanmar is in a strate-gic route for wildlife crime. Wild life crime is the second largest crime after drugs and atop the arms in terms of volume and number in present world. The illicit demand for bones and other body parts of tiger for use in traditional Chinese medicine is another reason for the unrelenting poaching pressure in the country

The mandate for project tiger is the hope to conserve tigers in a ho-listic manner. At present the dynamics of forest management and wild-life conservation have been dis-torted due to need of income, lack of manpower, lack of awareness lack of land use policy and population pressure. A regional develop-ment approach in landscapes hav-ing Tiger Reserves is of utmost importance in the country. It should be viewed as a mosaic of different land use patterns, viz, tiger conservation, forestry, sustainable use and development, besides socio-

economic growth. Tiger habitats exist in environments of thousands of indigenous communities which depend on them and the traditional use systems of people in these landscapes are neither static nor benign. Therefore we cannot view these protected areas in isolation from the surrounding socio-economic realities and developmental priorities of the government. This call for a cross-sectorial and cross-disciplinary approach.

Tigers now need a 'preservationist' approach. Regional management planning is important all over the country to foster ecological connectivity between protected areas through a restorative input with inte-grated land use planning. Though, we have the Acts and Rules, unless the acceptance from all sections of the society that our national animal is in a tipping point, we will be too late for tomorrow to save the National Animal, the iconic, royal, majestic and the king of the forest

# India logs 20,408 fresh COVID cases, 44 deaths: Govt

#### Agency New Delhi, July 30:

India logged a single day rise of 20.408 new coronavirus infections, pushing India's to tal tally of COVID-19 cases to 4,40,00,138, as the active cases declined to 1,43,384, the Union Health Ministry said on Saturday. The death toll has climbed

to 5,26,312 with 44 new fatali-ties, the data updated by the government at 8 am said.

The active cases comprise 0.33 per cent of the total infections, while the national COVID-19 recovery rate was recorded at 98.48 per cent, the health ministry said. A decrease of 604 cases

has been recorded in the ac-tive COVID-19 caseload in a span of 24 hours.

The daily positivity rate was recorded at 5.05 per cent. The weekly positivity rate was recorded at 4.92 per cent, according to the health minis-

try. The number of people who recovered from the infection surged to 4,33,30,442, and the case fatality rate was recorded at 1.20 per cent.

203.94 crore doses of COVID vaccines have been administered in the country so far un-der the nationwide COVID-19 vaccination drive

India's COVID-19 tally had crossed the 20-lakh mark on August 7, 2020, and sur-passed the one-crore mark on December 19. India crossed the grim milestone of two crore on

May 4, 2021, three crore on June 23, and four crore on January 25 this year. The 44 new fatalities in-

clude six each from Maharashtra and West Bengal, four each from Haryana and Karnataka, three each from Gujarat, Punjab, and Uttar Pradesh, two each from Bihar, Chhattisgarh, Jammu and Kashmir, and Madhya Pradesh and one each from Chandigarh, Delhi, Goa, Himachal Pradesh, Kerala,

Odisha and Sikkim. A total of 5,26,312 deaths have been reported so far in the country including 1,48,097 from Maharashtra, 70,451 from Kerala, 40,143 from Karnataka, 38,032 from Tamil Nadu, 26,308 from Delhi, 23,565 from Uttar Pradesh and 21,352 from West Bengal.

The health ministry has stressed that more than 70 per cent of the deaths occurred due to comorbidities.

"Our figures are being reconciled with the Indian Council of Medical Research," the ministry said on its website, adding that the state-wise distribution of figures is subject to further verification and reconciliation.

India's vaccination coverage has reached 203.94 croremark - out of which 8.74 crore are precaution (booster) doses. In the last 24 hours, 33,87,173 people have been administered with the vaccine doses.

According to the health ministry data, the Centre has provided 195.08 crore vaccine doses to states and union territories. Over 7.09 crore balance and unutilized vaccine doses are still available with

"Besides, despite the State's wealth, there are disparities in children's development outcomes. The poorest 20 percent of children are twice as likely as the richest 20 percent to be stunted by poor nutrition and to die be fore their fifth birthday. The infant mortality rate of tribal areas in Maharashtra is 60-70 percent higher than the state average" the Kelkar Committee had surmised.

However, the statistic given by the Maharashtra State Family Welfare Department indicates that infant and child deaths encompass all segments, and child deaths are not restricted only to tribal areas.

Samarthan has suggested that a Taskforce be set up to take stock of child death viss-vis implementation of vari-ous welfare schemes. The urban and rural areas should be divided for this work so that proper solutions can be worked out

#### **Japanese Encephalitis in Assam: Three more deaths** reported, toll rises to 47 kept ready with ICU and

Agency Guwahati, July 30:

Three more people lost their lives due to Japanese Encephalitis in Assam on Friday, taking the death toll to 47. Meanwhile, seven new cases were reported in the northeastern state in the past 24 hours. As per the National Health Mission, till now, 294 cases of the viral infection have been detected in the state

Among the latest fatalities, one death each was reported in Barpeta, Chirang and Darrang, reported PTI. Two fresh cases of Japanese Encephalitis were reported from Jorhat district, while one each was detected in Bongaigaon, Charaideo, Darrang, Dibrugarh and

Kokraihar districts Out of 35 districts of Assam, only three districts -South Salmara, Dima Hasao and Karbi Anglong - are not affected by the disease. Most numbers of 44 cases have been detected in Nagaon, followed by Jorhat with 39 cases. A total of 34 cases have also been re-

ported from Golaghat so far. In the wake of rising cases of Japanese Encepha-litis, all the nine medical colleges, and 10 district hospitals across Assam have been

### **BJP sweeps District Panchayat Elections in Madhya Pradesh** Congress alleges misuse of Power and Rigging by Officials

By L S Herdenia Bhopal, July 30:

Congress has alleged use of Police and administration in the election of office bearers of dis-trict Panchayat. It was adoption of these tactics that the BJP could capture 41 district Panchayats out of 51 for which elections were held. Congress could capture only 9. The final results were out on July 29

evening. Election to Bhopal district Panchayat was very dramatic. The Congress candidate was forcibly made to defect by a group of ministers. This was opposed but top Congress leaders including Digvijaya Singh. BJP leaders alleged that Digvijava Singh lost his cool and raised hand on a police constable.

After the elections were over Chief Minister Shiv Raj Singh Chouhan hailed what he described BJP's one sided win in panchayat polls. The ruling BJP has swept the recent panchayat elections in Madhya Pradesh, Chief Minister said adding that "Congress has been wiped out at the ground level".

BJP said it has won the dis-trict panchayat president and vice-president election in 41 districts out of 51 where elections were held. Congress sources say they won in 9 districts and Gondwana Gantantra Party (GGP) in 1 district.

Chouhan and BJP state president VD Sharma said the party has won more than 80% posts in panchayat elections from gram panchayat to district panchayat level.

"This is a historic victory. In the district panchayat elections Congress was reduced to single digit and couldn't even reach the tens. The BJP organisation has been successful in taking the works of the government to the people". Chouhan tweeted, hailing the "one sided victory". In the elections for the post of president and vice-president of district panchayats, BJP- supported candidates won 41 of the 51 districts, Chouhan said, add-ing that of the 23,000 chayats, BJP-supported pan candidates won sarpanch post in 90% seats and 625 won unopposed. In 312 janpad panchayats, BJP-supported candidates won the post of president and vice-president in

227 while 20 others affiliated to party won, he said. Congress backed candidates won in 64. Congress, which says it per-formed fairly well at gram panchayat and janpad panchayat level, accused BJP of using administration, police, money and other unfair means to win the president and vicepresident election at the district level.

PCC president Kamal Nath said Congress-supported candi-dates have won at several places but were defeated at many places 'because of BJP's deceit and use of unfair means". He didn't specify the number of places where Congress won.

Among the districts where Congress supported candidates have won include Chhindwara and Rajgarh, the bastion of former CMs Kama lath and Digvijaya Singh. According to sources, at

Umaria and Dhar, Congress and BJP-backed candidates won the same number of votes for district president and the winner was elected through a draw. BJP-supported candidates won at both the places.

Elections to Bhopal district panchayat was marked by direct confrontation between Digvijaya Singh and a state minister Both were involved in a public face off with police struggling to keep supporters of the two parties

away from each other. Things got volatile during the election of the Bhopal district panchayat president and vicepresident when minister Bhupendra Singh brought poll winner Ramkunwar Gurjar and her husband Navarang Gurjar, a Congress leader, in his car. Digvijaya objected to this and it led to a run in with him, and later

with Sarang. In a viral video. Sarang the medical education minister, is seen in his car while Congress leaders shouted that the vehicle can't be allowed any further (the prohibited area' they called it). Sarang jumped out of his car and asked the policemen to "drive the Congress leaders away". "Hatao in sab ko, hatao, aisa thodi chalega" he is heard saving, while an agitated Digvijaya is kept at a distance by police. Digvijaya also made a point to Bhupendra, who was seen smil-

ing. A close aide of Digvijaya said he was asking how min ter Bhupendra Singh could bring voters in his car. Ramkunwar went on to be elected Bhopal district panchayat president and Mohan Singh Jat, the vice presi-

dent. When the election process began in the morning, Congress MLA Arif Masod alleged that BJP had lured away four Con-gress-supported members of the panchayat promising each that they would be made the president or vice-president. This delayed the nomination process by 45 minutes to allow BJP resolve the issue Both BJP and Congress

workers were present in full strength when elected district panchayat members, who were to vote for the president and vice president, started arriving at the district panchayat office. BJP leaders Bhupendra Singh,

Rameshwar Sharma, Shaitan Singh Pal, Vishnu Khatri and later Vishwas Sarang arrived to take them into the building skirting Congress leaders and workers who shouted slogans against the BJP and accused police and administration of working as "BJP agents". Congress alleged that the

collector allowed proxy/tender votes for four of the 10 district panchayat members - someone else voted on their behalf – de spite the fact that none of them is illiterate or ailing so as to be unable to cast their vote. Besides it was not their blood relatives who cast the vote on their behalf as is the norm, but BJP workers, they alleged. After the high-voltage elec-

After the high-voltage exce-tion, there was a barrage of tweets with pictures from both camps... While Congress ac-cused BJP of stealing the man-date, BJP accused Congress leaders of manhandling police.

Digvijaya Singh called it arm twisting by the administration and criticised the 'arrogance' of the government. PCC chief Kamal Nath said: "our candidates were defeated by abuse of power"

CM Shviraj Singh Chouhan tweeted "Such indecent behaviour doesn't suit an ex-CM. He holds a policeman by the collar, shouts and tries to breach the district panchayat office gate. It's disrespectful". Sarang tweeted that Digvijaya has a "habit of raising hand on uniformed personnel". "This is the true face of Congress" he alleged.

The state BJP has got a big The state BJP has got a big boost after the latest phase of elections. The Congress has also fought by mobilizing its or-ganization in full strength under Kamal Nath. Both the parties are now preparing for the next battle the assembly elections in 2023. (IPA Service)
