### KNF-N cadre with Rs. 5 Lakhs reward nabbed

Combined troops Assam Rifles and Manipur Police apprehended a wanted cadre of KNF-N with rewards of Rs. 5 Lakhs, from Kholope Village in Kangpokpi District while conducting an operation yesterday.

The apprehended cadre has been identified as

Sakithang Kipgen alias Thangboi alias Ranjit, (37 years). He is reported to have been involved in the infamous firing incident at B Gammon village which resulted in killing of 3 innocent civilians on October 12, 2021. Following the incident Chief Minister of Manipur, N Biren Singh announced a sum of 5 lakhs for providing info regarding the culprits on Oct 15, 21. The

individual has been handed over to the police for further joint interrogation.

A statement by the Assam Rifles said that KNF-N is a non-Soo rebel group and the said cadre arrested is a wanted cadre.

The operation was carried out by COB Motbung of Jwalamukhi Battalion and the police.

Rajivkumar Narengbam Principal IRE Group of Institutions, Ramesh Sharma National Co-ordinator EKTA Parishad, Haobijam Sujit, Revenue Branch Office Thoubal SDC M. Malemnganba and Director Human Right and Law Network (HRLN) Manipur Advocate Rakesh Meihoubam graced the occasion as the Chief Guest, Functional President, Guest of honours and Resource Persons respectively.

Keynote Address by Mamta Lukram State Co- Ordinator EKTA Parishad Manipur said that The physical composition of land structure as 90:10 hill-valley is an indication that forest cover is high in the state. The valley as divided into 5 districts

ranking in NE India, while Mizoram is highest and second is Meghalaya.

Surveys of the households in isolated pockets of the districts found that land which was former revenue village or unclassified khas land where people have inhabited for years are claimed by the villagers being included under forest cover. The fallen into forest cover of inhabited villages pose as threat to existence. Physical surveys before expanding forest cover and timely information to the people for compatibility is a

must. Simultaneously the revenue department also have urgency of initiative to assist the people towards legalised allotment.

Appropriate alignment of Land laws and Revenue Department would lead towards legal entitlement of land to many who are devoid of this basic right, She said. It is undeniable fact that conservation of forest and environment is important. Nevertheless people's existence without legal entitlement is a crucial issue. Forest expansion should be in So, there is need for co-

ordination and understanding between the network of forest department, Revenue department and the people. EKTA Parishad Manipur activist are able to find out the physical reality of non-synchronised relationship between the three departments from the case story of villages like Thoubal Khunou, Lourembam Aripat in Thoubal District and Wakha Village of Imphal district. ## Who torched the guitar? Students or Goons in Disguise

In an Oxford Union speech, Congress MP Shashi Tharoor famously said: "The British took the Hindi word 'loot' into their dictionaries as well as their habits." In the case of Manipur, student organizations have taken the Hindi-origin word 'goondaim' into their duty list as well as their habits. The recent incident is a concrete example. So be it in America or European countries, destruction of others' possessions cannot be justified. It was a move uncalled-for from a group of students who yearn to act as an apostle of a promising education scheme of the state.

The incident also spoke volumes about the law and order situation in the state. It exhibited that the government was unconscious of any incident until it happened. Moreover, it accentuated the government's inability to contain such an act against the law. Prevention will always be better than saying the signature phrases "Matik Chaba Action Loukhkhan" or "Lemna Tharor" after the incident. Once, a court lambasted Delhi police: "If pizza can be delivered within 15 minutes, why can't police reach the crime scene on time?" - a question that people of Manipur can ask the Manipur police and government, not just about this particular incident, but numerous others that had occurred recently.

For a society to thrive, imparting good education employing effective pedagogy is paramount. The supreme purpose of education in any democracy is to construct well-formed minds who can partake in our system, whose future depends on citizens' capacity to scrutinize their elected officials. The outcome of education should not be to construct someone who would impair others' lives or properties. If that happens, then the sole purpose of education goes in vain. This notion is relevant across the world. Nobel Peace Laureate Malala Yousafzai was shot in the head by Taliban shooters, and Kailash Satyarthi was also brutally attacked many times. But the duo never used violent means to attain their objectives of imparting education, and they continue spearheading their campaigns for the students. Like them, people expect that student organizations and their members, who are supposed to be students and well-educated, act with decency and follow educational etiquette. But the recent episode of shattering the properties of an organization altered the narrative of Manipur's student bodies.

For decades, Manipur has witnessed the states' student bodies' valor and fearlessness in many significant events. They scripted a proud history, generations to come will treasure and cherish. The people always respect them for their invaluable contributions and never boldly speak against them. But the recent happening drove the people to vent ire on various media platforms, regardless of the consequences. Though the act was intended, or at least claimed, to have been done for the welfare of the students, it backfired because of using illegitimate means to attain the goal.

Though individuals, media outlets, and artist organizations condemned and criticized the act of torching the musical instruments, it is pretty evident that people don't despise them but expect them to interpret the meaning of student bodies correctly. And, clarification in any form won't justify their deed given that it is human nature to remember the bad better than the good. Since the pursuit of education and educational bodies is to expand students' minds in the service of democracy, people from all walks of life expect them to employ peaceful steps in solving issues and it is achievable. Mahatma Gandhi also famously said: "In a gentle way, you can shake the world."

## Less corruption, more jobs, that's the need of the hour

As the spread of Corona virus is subsiding, economic activities are gaining momentum across India, which fuels hope for a better tomorrow. Slowly but surely

physical events and programs are being held and job opportunities have started showing up. Most of the people are now working from their offices. There are very few people who are on work from home (WFH) mode right now. As a result of this, there has been a decline in the quarterly earnings of Zoom, a video conferencing company. Zoom's business grew only 21 percent between November 2021 and January 2022, compared to 191 percent growth in its business in the same period last year. It is estimated that in the next five years, the demand for technically skilled employees will be more in the job market. According to an HR firm called TeamLease Digital, 12 million new jobs will be created in the engineering, telecom and healthcare sectors during this period. Employment opportunities in these sectors are expected to grow at the rate of 27 percent per annum as these sectors are undergoing transformation. At present, 42 million people have got employment in these sectors.

Meanwhile, the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP), which came to power in Punjab by promising to eradicate corruption from the government offices, has started taking baby steps in this direction, which is a welcome step. The old records of IAS, IPS, PCS and PPS level officers of the state government are being checked. In the next two weeks, a list of such tainted officers will be prepared, who have been involved in any kind of corruption. The tainted officers will not be given public dealing posts. This step of CM Bhagwant Mann is being appreciated. Seeing this policy change, preparations are on to check corruption in the neighboring Haryana state as well. A high power committee was constituted at the administrative level which would investigate cases of corruption up to 10 millions rupees. Under this arrangement, arrangements are being made for investigation up to the division level. There is a need to take swift action in cases of corruption, as it harms the economy and society like termites.

Despite the third wave of Covid, the first month of this year was good in terms of employment and recruitment. According to the Jobseek index, there was a 41 percent year-on-year growth in recruitments in January. In January last year, this index was at 1925, which reached 2,716 this year. The sectors which proved to be effective for increasing recruitment are IT, Software, Retail and Telecom. Along with this, the growth was 29 percent in the pharmaceutical industry, 10 percent in medicine and healthcare, 8 percent in oil and gas, 8 percent in insurance, 7 percent in fast consumer goods and 2 percent in manufacturing. The graph of new recruitment in IT Jobs is continuously increasing. In the first week of January, major companies like Accenture, Dell, Oracle, IBM, Genpact, Salesforce offered more than 70 thousand new recruitments. It is estimated that in the current financial year, the number of new recruits in India's top 10 IT companies like Infosys, Wipro, TCS, HCL, Tech Mahindra and Mind Tree will reach 5 lakh.

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## Reality of Congress and its fading trinity

India's modern political history is largely a portrayal of the activities of the Congress party. It had remained a platform of mobilization for the country's quest for freedom. It was nurtured by great personalities and it sustained as an idea of togetherness for long, encapsulating indomitable power to shake the East India Company's colonial dominance. The Indian National Congress (INC) epitomized the soft face of the ideals that India represented. The party that Mahatma Gandhi wanted to be wrapped up when the long-struggled freedom was achieved, did continue to grow as a political power stretching its hands across India. The political upscaling of the Congress was consistent for decades until it began to shudder in the saffron storm that the country came across in 2014. That was the strongest ever shake the party bumped into and the one from which it failed to come out. For Gandhi, the purpose of Congress's existence was fulfilled on the day when India became free. He questioned the need of the party in a free India. Probably he could forecast the inevitable fall of the Congress passing through generations. "Congress Mukti Bharat" was the political slogan with which Narendra Modi's saffron hurricane hit the shore of India's election campaign. He seems to have discovered the USP in propagating this idea of an India without Congress or the corruptive mindset that he later intelligently tried to correct it as and declared that the country wanted to get rid of it. Whatever, the Congress in India, though it has a credible vote share, has almost disappeared from the power politics that it enjoyed for generations. Gandhi indeed wanted the idea of Congress that he and his cohorts of those days fostered to exist as an organization focused on the social, moral and economic freedom of the people, especially for the underprivileged and the rural poor.

The Congress party's drubbing in the state elections in Uttar Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Punjab, Manipur and Nagaland, Sanghar Parivar, with its ideological intricacies essentially confusing and complicated to the dynasts, stretched its wings everywhere. Still unable to fathom the depth and veracity of the narratives that the Parivar scripted against the party, the trinity frequently convulsed in confusion. The second innings of Modi could shatter the influence of the Sonia, Rahul and her husband Rajiv Gandhi. Her stint as the party president from April 1998 was full of political experiments and expectations. No doubt, the lady with limited idea about the impulses that India was, managed to pull her party a long way through ups and downs. More than two decades of her presidency was accepted and appreciated at times and critically put for evaluation. She could metaphorically make the historic sacrifice that she is reported to have made denouncing the chair of the country's prime minister. For an enthralled Congress leadership, she was the incarnation of divinity in its femininity capable of transforming the party's destiny unchallenged, unparalleled and unbrokeable. The dynasty's pursuit of finding an heir apparent to hold the heaviness of the grand old party naturally directed its fingers on Rahul Gandhi. A natural choice for the party, the young and dynamic Rahul Gandhi, with his visibly scanty maturity to run a complexity such as Congress had trembled, stumbled and mumbled while experiencing the storm that the people of the country described- the saffron tide.

Don't get misguided by the use of the word trinity here multiple times. It is the mother and children representing the Nehru-Gandhi dynasty that the Congress is destined to lean on. The party's headquarters at the 24 Akbar Road in New Delhi these days is gloomy and remorseful for various reasons. Every election brings the party a reason to re-collect, recompose and regret. The main reason is its failure but its inability to find the reality behind its rigidity must be driving its leadership crazy. The party establishment is trying to knock on the doors of political stra-

egists like Prashant Kishor to find a calculable and viable solution in the direction of its revival. Spending most of her life between the walls of her residence, Sonia Gandhi began to assume a role in political life after the regional parties have also been hitting its prospects hard. The party began to shrink into its delicate self, unable to withstand the consistent electoral debacles. It is important for the Congress leadership to take in last shot from the quiver to cure the party before it takes its last breath. You may call this situation the party's existential crisis. It must be unthinkable for the party which ruled India for decades, falling into the level of complete insignificance and oblivion. Everything started in 2014 and the Congress had the harshest of the falls that it ever had. The Modi juggernaut was the blow that left it with broken bones and bleeding skin giving it nightmares on a daily basis. The Congress is still unable to scale the unfathomable depth into which it has fallen. Its complete dependence on the trinity from the dynasty for years remains a bitter reality. It probably sees nothing but darkness without the dynasty. The trinity understands the party's compulsions and the leadership circling the orbit of servitude around the trinity also understands it well.

It was not only Modi that Rahul Gandhi and the trinity had to take on. The gigantic Sanghar Parivar, with its ideological intricacies essentially confusing and complicated to the dynasts, stretched its wings everywhere. ## India-Bangladesh Must Always Stand With Each Other

Thanking the Indian government for cooperating in rescuing Bangladeshi nationals from Ukraine during the war, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina said the two countries would always stand by each other. It is absolutely true. As a friendly neighbouring country, India was, is and will be standing with Bangladesh. India and Bangladesh are eternal friends. India should stand in support of Bangladesh which embodies values that emerge from the Liberation Movement of the country. On the other hand, Bangladesh should be with Bangladesh as India always stands with Bangladesh.

Bangladesh and India are common members of SAARC, BIMSTEC, IORA, and the Commonwealth. The two countries share many cultural ties. In particular, Bangladesh and the East Indian state of West Bengal are Bengali-speaking. In 1971, the Bangladesh Liberation War broke out between East Pakistan and West Pakistan; India intervened in December 1971 in support of East Pakistan and helped secure its independence from Pakistan as the country of Bangladesh. Since the visit of Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi to Bangladesh in 2015 and round back visit of Bangladeshi Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina to India in 2017, the notable developments that have taken place include resolution of long-pending land and maritime boundaries asserting the issue of enclaves, the conclusion of over ninety instruments comprising in the hi-tech areas, i.e., electronics, cybersecurity, space, information tech-

nology, and civil nuclear energy and observed increase in bilateral trade from US\$9 billion to US\$10.46 billion in the fiscal year (FY) 2018–19, preceded by US\$7 billion to US\$9 billion in FY 2017–18, an increase of 28.5 percent.

On 6 December, Bangladesh and India celebrate Friendship commemorating India's recognition of Bangladesh and the continued friendship between the two countries.

However, The Prime Minister expressed this hope in a letter to Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Wednesday. Sheikh Hasina wrote, "Over the last few years, our bilateral relations have been further strengthened through effective dialogue at all levels." "I firmly believe that Bangladesh and India will always stand by each other and reflect the shared aspirations of the people of both countries." India is conducting a rescue operation called 'Operation Ganga' to evacuate civilians from Ukraine during the war.

Under the initiative, India has promised to rescue 23,000 people from the Eastern European country by March 15. Besides, 147 foreign nationals from 18 countries including Bangladesh have also been rescued. According to a March 10 report in the Times of India, 13 Bangladeshis were rescued from the northeastern Sami city of Ukraine and taken to another city during the fierce fighting.

Expressing gratitude for rescuing Bangladeshi citizens from the battlefield, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina wrote in the letter, "I am writing this to express my sincere gratitude to you and your government for their assistance and cooperation in rescuing and evacuating Bangladeshi along with Indian nationals from Sami Oblast, Ukraine."

port was halted.

In April 2021, Bangladesh sent medicines and medical equipment to India following the deteriorating COVID-19 situation in India. The relief package consisted of approximately 10,000 vials of Remdesivir, (produced in Bangladesh by Beximco) anti-viral infections, oral anti-viral, 30,000 PPE kits, and several thousand zinc, calcium, vitamin C and other necessary tablets. In May 2021, the government of Bangladesh sent a second consignment of COVID-19 relief consisting of antibiotics, paracetamol, protective equipment and hand sanitiser.

Operation Ganga was conducted to rescue Indian nationals stranded in war-torn Ukraine. So far, thousands of Indian nationals were repatriated under the scheme. Significantly, the Indian government has rescued citizens of several other countries besides Pakistan, Bangladesh, and Nepal through this operation.

It is India that stood by Bangladesh always. Even during the Ukraine crisis, India helped Bangladesh to evacuate Bangladeshi people. India's helping hand to Bangladesh is time-tested. A friend in need is a friend indeed. According to the media reports, 9 Bangladeshi nationals have been rescued from Ukraine recently under Operation Ganga. Prime Minister of Bangladesh Sheikh Hasina has already thanked Prime Minister Narendra Modi for rescuing the citizens of Bangladesh. India and Bangladesh should stand with each other.

The irony is, the road in the region connects three constituency-Kangpokpi, Tamei and Tadubi; yet no much efforts have been taken up so far on road infrastructure by concern govt which is unfortunate to public at large. How long should the people of I.T. Road suffer will be determined in the hands of present Govt and concern MLAs of the region. There can be no alternatives for the region than awarding smooth and reliable permanent roads which the general public demands.

### What People Expect From Govt:

Notwithstanding of who form Govt and their Party affiliations, there is always a common perception amongst general public that Govt will bring Change-associated with development and peaceful co-existence; prosperity and accountability. ing to difficulty in communicating with the staffs. As not every patient attendants can speak manipuri and well verse with the hospital surrounding, their query and doubts should be properly address. In fact, the all time clean and tidy RIMS, within and outside the hospital premise, is really appalled and reflect the commitment of the staffs.

As health care sector is lacking particular in Hilly areas, govt should focus more on the existing PHCs and CHCs. For instance, the T.Waichong PHC is common to more than 25 villages located at various distances. For some villages, it is a huge burden to receive first aid even in the case of emergency. Meanwhile, the CHC in Chalwa still remains to open its door despite the building construction completed years back. Such is the condition of I.T. Road Health Care sector.

Not the least, due to crooked, dusty and unmetalled, the current road is filled with potholes adding double burden to the people of the region.

### Public Trust in Govt :

Diversity in the region and its peaceful co-existence amongst the communities, the people of I.T. Road have never had heavy protest or any kind of agitations in recent pasts to express their displeasure over the govt in public domain even after prolong negligence by the govt. Such is the faith and trust the general public holds to Govt until today. This of public humanity can't sustain for long as

To end this suffering, govt should kindly took up the matter seriously otherwise, disruption of business and communication will continue to exist every rainy season. Not the least, the I.T. Road needs a permanent solution.

## Government Approves New Sainik Schools

Mumbai, March 27

The Ministry of Defence (MoD) has approved the setting up of 21 new Sainik Schools, in partnership with NGOs, private schools and State Governments across the country, from the academic year 2022-2023.

These schools will be set up in the first phase, as part of the Government's initiative of setting up 100 new Sainik schools in partnership mode. They will be distinct from the existing Sainik Schools.

The objectives behind PM Narendra Modi's vision to set up 100 new Sainik Schools is to provide quality education to the students in tune with National Education Policy and give them better career opportunities, including joining the Armed Forces. It also allows the private sector to work hand-in-hand with the Government towards nation building by refining the youth to become responsible citizens. The new Sainik schools will encourage girls to realize their dream of serving the country.

The Union Cabinet in October last year had approved a proposal of setting up 100 affiliated Sainik Schools. A total of 194 schools have applied to get affiliated to the Sainik School Society (SSS), the Ministry of Defence said in a statement.

17 of these Schools are Brownfield running schools and 4 are Greenfield schools. While NGOs, Trusts, Societies have a share of 12 approved new schools, 6 private schools, and 3 State Government-owned schools find a place in the list. Unlike existing Sainik Schools which are purely residential, 7 new Sainik Schools will be Day Schools and 14 schools will have residential arrangements.

The Sainik Schools Society (SSS), is an autonomous organization under the Ministry of

**Defence** which runs English medium residential Sainik Schools affiliated to the Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE). These schools prepare cadets to join the National Defence Academy (NDA), Khadakwasla (Pune), Indian Naval Academy, Ezhimala, Kerala and other Training Academies for officers. At present, there are a total of 33 Sainik Schools across the country, which offer admission at the level of **Class VI and Class IX**, based, on the performance of candidates in the All-India Sainik School Entrance Examination (AISSEE).

Now these new Sainik schools, besides their affiliation to respective education boards, will function under the aegis of the SSS and will follow the rules and regulations in partnership mode prescribed by the Society. In addition to their regular affiliated board curriculum, they will also impart education based on the Sainik school pattern.

Admission process:

(A) Entry to these schools will be at only class VI level based on the following lines: a) at least 40 percent of intake in class VI will be from candidates who have qualified for the AISSEE conducted by National Testing Agency through E-Counselling. B) up to 60 percent intake will be from

students enrolled in the same school and desirous of taking admission under this vertical of new Sainik Schools through a qualifying test, notification for which will be issued separately.

(B) Candidates qualified in AISSEE-2022 willing to take admission in a newly approved school of their choice will have to register themselves for e-counselling. (C) For the students already enrolled in the new Sainik School, admission will be provided based on a qualifying test. The academic session for approved new Sainik Schools for consideration in the next round is likely to be re-opened in the first week of April 2022.

As per decision taken, the domestic coal supply to all Gencos will be in proportion to the coal received from CIL and SCCL for all the Gencos and it will not be possible to give more coal other than on proportionate basis to make up any shortfall.

In its circular, the Ministry said that the production in captive coal mines allotted to power plants may be maximized to the limit permitted. It has been reported that a number of power plants are taking much

longer time than the prescribed norms in unloading coal from railway rakes which is affecting the turn-around time, the Ministry has asked to monitor the unloading time at power plants and it has been decided that lesser number of rakes would be made available to such power plants where there is slackness in prompt unloading of coal from rakes.

This step has been taken with the objective of maximizing the utilization of available railway rakes.
