Google Translate adds support for 24 new languages including 8 Indian languages

Google Translate is adding support for 24 new languages including eight new Indian lan-guages, the internet giant announced at its annual developer conference Google I/O 2022 on May 11. This brings the total languages supported by the translation service to 133 languages.

Among the new Indian languages being introduced include Assamese, Bhojpuri, San-skrit, Dogri, Konkani, Maithili,

Meiteilon (Manipuri), and Mizo. Google said it is also adding indigenous languages of the Americas such as Quechua (Peru, Bolivia, Ecuador), Guarani (Paraguay and Bolivia, Argen-

tina and Brazil) and Avmara (Bolivia, Chile and Peru) and an English-based dialect Krio (Sierra Leone) for the first time on the service as part of this update.

Supreme Court sees through Govt's game on Seditions Law

Flip-flops fail as all proceedings ordered held in abeyance By: K Raveendran

The Narendra Modi government has received a real snub from the Supreme Court, which has overruled the Centres' objections and stayed all proceedings in sedition cases. A bench headed by Chief Justice N V Ramana also directed on Wednesday that all pending cases, appeals and proceedings with respect to charges framed for sedition be kept in abeyance. Those who have been booked under the law or are in jail can now seek bail from the appropriate courts.

The landmark Supreme Court decision comes after a lot of flip-flop on the issue by the government, which all along defended the draco-nian law as an essential tool to protect the nation. The court has thrown out all its objections and decided to stay all proceedings until the validity of the colonial era law is decided

for good. The government's diabolism on the issue was obvious throughout. And even when it offered to review and reconsider the law in line with the mood in the court, the affidavit it filed in this regard smacked of vulgarity. The affidavit said the government has decided to re-examine and reconsider the provisions of Section 124 A of the sedition law "in the spirit of Azadi ka Amrit Mahotsav (75 years of Indepen-dence) and the vision of PM Narendra Modi".

It is a common practice, particularly in the Gulf monarchies, to ance remission of punishment on auspicious occasions, like religious events such as Ramadan. Such ges-tures have been shown even in India, where state governments have followed the practice in cutting short jail terms, though mostly for political prisoners belonging to the rul-



ing parties. But it is perhaps for the first time that one is hearing about a whole law being dropped to mark an occasion

While it does raise doubts about the government's real intent, it also amounted to indirectly acknowledging that the seditions law is against the spirit of 'Azadi', but it nevertheless showed no inclination to let go of it. The British clamped down the seditions law as a repressive tool against the subjects of their colony, and it continued application would mean that the successor govern-ment considers itself to be as alien as the colonisers

The second consideration cited by the affidavit to reconsider the law, which is PM Narendra Modi's vision is equally bewildering. The existence of a law or its repeal cannot be based on the whims and fancy, the socalled vision, of a ruler, but warranted by the soundness of the underlying legal principle. Anything other than this is frivolous, as far as a law is concerned. So, when the Supreme Court decides that all cases must be held in abeyance, it is obvious that it has more reasons than the PM's so-called vision or the occasion of celebration to throw out the government arguments as it considers it a bad law

No doubt, Modi has of late been singing paeans of individual liberty and freedom. As is wont, Modi says one thing, but his government does quite another. Whether it is commitment to the poor or the inclusiveness of 'sab ke saath', the consistency is not in adherence, but in variance. The policies of his government have seen the rich grow richer and the poor become poorer, just as the inclusiveness of 'sab' has been more and more selective.

There was further evidence of the government's diabolism when it informed the court that it was not ready to drop the cases already booked under the law, as suggested by the apex court. In fact, the government has staged somersault on the issue after it promised the court that it would defer hearing of the pe-titions till it reviews the law and arrives at a final decision.

In fact, it has advanced another

specious argument for persisting with its stand. Solicitor General Tushar Mehta has told the court that a cognizable offence cannot be prevented from being registered and that once a cognizable offence was committed, it may not be proper to stay the effect of the pro-vision either by the Centre or the court. Therefore, the draft that the Centre is preparing suggests se-lecting a responsible officer for scrutiny, and his satisfaction is subject to judicial review. The government is deliberately ignoring the fact that an act becomes a cognizable offence only when it is made so and that it is within the powers of the government to make an act an offence in the first place; cognizable or not is a subsequent consideration.

Again, the mischief in making an officer of the government responsible for the decision is not too clever to be missed either. There is judicial review, but the review is about the satisfaction of the officer concerned. As long as the officer is satisfied, the court has nothing to with the decision. The government's new-found

love for liberty has also not been above board. After stoutly defending the seditions law in the court, it suddenly struck a conciliatory note, sensing the mood in the court and promising to do a review, pending a final decision on the issue. It had also agreed that until that is done. the existing cases need to be held in abeyance, as the court had itself suggested. But it was an about-turn when the government replied to the court's queries. But obviously, the court has not fallen for the makebelief exercise. (IPA Service)

India reports 2,827 fresh **COVID-19 cases; active** infections tally dips to 19,067

Agency New Delhi, May 12:

With 2.827 new coronavirus infections being reported in a day, India's tally of COVID-19 cases rose to 4,31,13,413, while the active cases dipped to 19,067, according to the Union Health Ministry data updated on Thursday. The death toll climbed to

5,24,181 with 24 fatalities, the data updated at 8 am stated.

The active cases comprise 0.04 per cent of the total infections, while the national COVID-19 recovery rate was 98.74 per cent, the ministry said. A decrease of 427 cases has

en recorded in the active COVID-19 caseload in a span of 24 hours

The daily positivity rate

was recorded at 0.60 per cent and the weekly positivity rate at 0.72 per cent, according to the ministry. The number of people who

have recuperated from the dis-ease surged to 4,25,70,165, while the case fatality rate was 1.22 per cent. The cumulative doses ad-

ministered in the country so far under the nationwide COVID-19 vaccination drive has exceeded 190.83 crore. India's COVID-19 tally had

crossed the 20-lakh mark on August 7, 2020, 30 lakh on August 23, 40 lakh on September 5 and 50 lakh on September 16. It went past 60 lakh on Sep-tember 28, 70 lakh on October 11, crossed 80 lakh on October 29, 90 lakh on November 20 and surpassed the one-

crore mark on December 19. The country crossed the grim milestone of two crore on May 4 and three crore on June 23 last year The 24 new fatalities in-

clude 17 from Kerala, two from Uttar Pradesh and one each from Delhi, Haryana, Himachal Pradesh, Jharkhand and Maharashtra. A total of 5,24,181 deaths

Thapa told reporters that he went to the camp in 2021. He further revealed that Gogoi was killed as he might have wanted

to run from the camp. Thapa said, "I went there in 2021. There are 25 people in the camp now. A mix of new and old cadres. The student leader Biju Gogoi was killed. Maybe he wanted to run and that's why he was killed. I saw his dead body in the morning. I went to work for coal fields but was taken to ULFA base instead earlier. I was taken to a camp at Myanmar." The police were tracking

Thapa's movement since Sunday. Superintendent of Tinsukia Police, Debojit Deuri, told the media, "We got some revela-tions, he told us that 35 people trained there including 3 vomen. Lama has informed that he saw the dead body of Biju Gogoi, former AASU leader who went missing during CAA protests and later it was confirmed that he joined the banned outfit, the cadre told us he say Biju Gogoi lying in a pool of blood with bullet injuries at the camp.'

Recently, a couple has been missing from the Tinsukia district of the state. As per a report published in East Mojo, the husband and wife were missing from May 5. The police traced the movement of the couple to Nagaland's Mon dis-trict. Reportedly, they had left behind their four-year-old daughter.

The CBI arrests 14 persons for violation of FCRA

By Raju Vernekar Mumbai, May 12:

In a massive crackdown against officials and NGOs involved in an alleged briberv scandal involving the Foreign Contribution (Regulation) Act (FCRA), the CBI registered the First Information Report (FIR) against 36 people and arrested 14 people, including Union Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA) officials and a National Informatics Centre (NIC) official on Wednesday.

Those arrested included the Chartered Accountants, and representatives of the The CBI also recovered NGOs Rs 3.21 crore in cash along with several incriminating docu-ments during the raids. The accused have been sent to police

custody till May 14 by the Spe-cial Judge (new Delhi) Naresh Kumar Laka. The Central Bureau of In-

vestigation (CBI) has filed the FIR (No RC0032022A00267, 7A, and 8) under sections 120B, 419,420,468,471 of the Indian Penal Code and Sections 7, 7A. and 8 of the Prevention of Cor-ruption Act, 1988 against 36 persons, including seven Gov-ernment officers attached to the FCRA division of MHA, for felicitating the inflow of foreign funds to the NGOs illegally.

Schools have now opened normally like two years ago. These two years were very confusing for the children living in the city. His movement to any other city, village was restricted His activities were confined around the house. Since the last few months, when the markets started open ing, due to the demand of children in many homes, parents started keeping domestic and foreign breed dogs, cats, rab-bits, parrots, colorful fishes, birds. Children these days have increased sensitivity to animals.

Our children also had constant demands to have a small puppy or a cat, but due to many practical challenges this has not happened yet. One reason for our hesitation could also be the rural background, where in those days our priority was cows, bulls, buffaloes. In our childhood, dogs and cats used to live outside the houses and it was not customary to make them sit on cots, posts, chairs.

Childhood in the Countryside It is said that all roads are never closed in life. There is always a way out by trying. So, that's how our daughter made friends with a nomadic kitten. She started taking biscuits and sometimes milk for him. She started visiting him every evening. He named her Bela. Bela used to move between the two apartments, but in the evening she too started waiting for Kuhu at a designated place. On seeing our daughter, wagging her tail against the wall, she would jump and cling

to her feet. When she would caress Bela, take her back, then the cat would go and eat the food brought by her. Sometimes in such a situation some dogs would start coming towards Bela. On seeing them, Bela jumped up and jumped to the other side of the wall. Once Bella came to me and started trying to wrap her feet, so I jerked back. Our daughter didn't like this behavior!

My own experience with cats has been 'defensive'. In the village, for the protection of food, milk and curd from the cat, people used to sneeze uta', in which the goods 'Sikh were hung in such a way that the cat could not reach there. In the kitchen of our ancestral house, there was a small mesh cupboard in which milk, curd etc. were kept. The cat could not open the cupboard and

went away sad. In the village, children sometimes entertained themselves by throwing water over the cats. However, in those days it was said about the cat that if she died due to persecution or beating, then the guilty person would have to donate a gold cat equal to its

weight! Animals like cow bull buffalo have been more influential in the memories of many people who spent their childhood in rural areas. Large bullocks were kept in the village, as the use of tractors in agriculture was very limited. Bulls also had names like Bhuara, Dilhwa, Safedu etc. They were taken care of like family members Bullocks recognized their farm-barn and family members. The children used to 'hanga' and enjoy sit-ting on the bullock cart with the loudness of his strength. Bullocks understood the language

of the plowman. In a week or ten days, the bullocks were bathed, oil was applied on their horns and they were garlanded. The cows and oxen in the village were regu-larly given roti at night, which was called 'Kaura'. Perhaps it has also been a kind of grati-tude that their hard work has contributed significantly to the food we are eating! It was customary to give the last bread to the dog. After coming to the city, now we do not get cows and bulls, but during the lockdown we started keeping water and bread for the birds. The daughter was happy to have Bella. But one day in the evening Bella did not appear. Gave her a voice, searched around, but she could not be found. I would also go there in the morning and evening to see that maybe. Found a cat, I took a photo of it, but the daughter said, no it is not Bella. She started feeling a little sad. The apprehension of evil about Bela started haunting the house. I was a
