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SC directs review of vaccine mandates, say nobody can be forced to be vaccinated

New Delhi, April 2:

Nobody can be forced to be vaccinated, the Supreme Court said on Monday and directed public and private institutions to review their vaccine mandates restricting unvaccinated people. "No individual can be forced to be vaccinated. Bodily integrity is protected under Article 21 of the Constitution," said a bench of justices L Nageswara Rao and BR Gavai Jacob Pulayil, a former member of the National Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation, moved the court against the vaccine mandates restricting access of unvaccinated people to public places, services and essential commodities. He also sought disclosure of vaccine

The court said the vaccine mandates were "not proportional". "We suggest that all authorities, including private and educational authorities, should review the orders to restrict unvaccinated persons if not already recalled.

The court clarified its order is restricted to Pulayil's petition and does not cover mandates for Covid-appropriate behaviour. It added the direction will not stop governments from issuing directions for con-

trol of the pandemic.

The court said no data has been provided by the Centre to controvert the material placed by the petitioner, which



indicates the risk of transmission by the unvaccinated is at par with the vaccinated. It upheld the vaccination policy rolled out by the Centre for the public including children. The court said an individual has the right to refuse to undergo medical treatment, "...in the interest of protection of communitarian health, certain restrictions can

be imposed on individual rights. However, it has to meet the three-fold test as laid down by us in the K Puttuswamy case [2017] on right to privacy includes legality...legitimate state aim

and proportionality."

The bench cited the material placed before the court and said the vaccination policy can-

not be said to be unreasonable It referred to the vaccination for children and added: "We cannot second guess the opinion of experts as the vaccination follows the global practices

The court directed the Centre to maintain transpar-ency in sharing findings and reports on approved vaccines. It suggested a virtual platform for sharing information on adverse effects due to vaccina tion with due regard to the right

to privacy.

The bench said information on adverse effects is crucial to understanding the effi-cacy of vaccines. "...publish reports on adverse events of vaccines from public and doctors on a publicly accessible system without compromising with the privacy of citizens," said the bench.

plans. Speed has been curtailed, understanding of living in harmony with nature has been growing, and spirituality has been finding more hearts and minds, particularly among the younger generation. Similarly, there has been a change in the thinking about beauty and outward appearance. Globally, cosmetics sales plummeted during the pandemic. During this period, most women worked from home and kept wearing masks, due to which they did not need to do makeup. One of the effects of this change was that women realized their natural beauty better and cut down on make-up, which has affected the business of cosmetics brands around the world. Consumer affairs research firm Kentar surveyed three lakh women in its study. Sales of women's beauty products in the UK are down by 19 percent compared to 2019. Even sales of cosmetics in departmental stores dropped by 40 per-

Sales of beauty and fragrance cosmetics plummeted during the pandemic. Instead, women focused more on skin, hair and bath accessories. Due to wearing masks for two years, there has been a change in habits, which has caused huge losses to the cosmetics companies. In a way, work from home proved to be harmful for these companies. A shocking survey also came out about the fact that engineering students have negligible interest in sports. Sports and gym are not even mentioned in the top 10 hobbies of these students. Stanford University of USA conducted a survev of hobbies of students from 167 technical institutes in US. China. Russia and India, in which startling facts about engineering students came to the fore. A similar survey was also conducted by the All India Council for Technical Education (AICTE). About 90 thousand students took part in it. The first three hobbies included learning something new, reading and watch-

ing online documentary films.

Meanwhile, it was found that 69 crore people in the country are con nected to the Ayushman Bharat scheme. 26 crore people have taken some health insurance scheme on their own. That is, 70 percent of the citizens of the country are part of some health insurance scheme, the remaining 30 percent of the population, that is, about 40 crore people are not yet part of any health insurance. The central government also wants to connect these 40 crore Indians with the Avushman scheme. The National Health Authority and NITI Aayog have prepared its draft. To take advantage of the scheme, each of these individuals will have to pay an annual premium of Rs 250 to 300, in return for which each of them will be able to get free treatment up to Rs 5 lakh in a year. This will also include the facility of being treated in a private ward. This facility is not available in the current Ayushman scheme. The new scheme may be implemented in the next few months Under the Ayushman scheme, treatment can be done in any hospital associated with the government scheme. Even medical facilities can be used in other states also.

Mercury Rising

India has been in the grip of what seems like an eternity of heatwaves.
April temperatures over north-west and central India are the highest in 122 years. During April 1 to 28, the average monthly maximum temperature over northwest India was 35.9° Celsius and the same over central India was 37.78° C. These averages belie measurements at the district and sub-divi-



sional level where several parts of Rajasthan, Punjab, Haryana, Gujarat, and Maharashtra have seen temperatures inch towards the mid-40s and breach normals. There is little respite expected in May, which is anyway the hottest month, though the India Meteorological De-partment (IMD) says that while north and west India will continue to sizzle on expected lines, and must likely brace for more heatwaves, the rest of the country is unlikely to see the levels of March and April. A heatwave is declared when the maximum temperature is over 40° C

and at least 4.5 notches above normal. A severe heatwave is declared if the departure from normal temperature is more than 6.4° C, according to the IMD. The proximate causes for the searing heat are an absence of rainbearing Western Disturbances, or tropical storms that bring rain from the Mediterranean over north India. Cool temperatures in the central Pacific, or a La Niña, that normally aid rain in India, too have failed to bolster rainfall this year. This is an unusual occurrence.

Despite five Western Disturbances forming in April, none was strong enough to bring significant rain and depress temperatures. The IMD has forecast a 'normal' monsoon or 99% of the Long Period Average (LPA) of 87 cm and is expected to forecast the monsoon's arrival over Kerala later in May. On the surface, there is no direct bearing between the intensity of heatwaves and the arrival and performance of the monsoon. In fact, even as northern India baked for want of rain, April saw monthly rainfall break a four-year record with high rainfall in several parts of southern and northeastern India. May too is expected to see 9% more rain over India than is usual for the month, though it must be kept in mind that base rainfall is so low in this month that it is unlikely to make a mark. While individual weather events cannot be linked to greenhouse gas levels, a warming globe means increased instances of extreme rain events and extended rain-less spells. What is better known is it helps to have disaster management plans in place that help States better deal with heatwaves and their impact on health. The official toll due to heatwaves in the last 50 years is put at over 17,000 people, according to research from the IMD. The heat island effect means urbanisation adds degrees to the already searing conditions; and so, heatwave deaths must be treated as a disaster that merits compensation. Private and public workplaces too must be better equipped to factor heatwave risk

What Amounts to Regular Power Supply to the People of I.T Road

The entry of Electricity in Manipur can be dated back to 1930 with the commissioned of two hydel sets having a capacity of 100KV and 56KV at Leimakhong by the then Manipur State HE Board. Gradually, it was only during the Second Five Year Plan(1956-61) that the State of Manipur saw a significant changed in the demand of Power in the State. Ever since from its inception, the demand for Power has been increasing and with the pursuing of Electricity Act, 2013, the then State Electricity Department Manipur(EDM) was unbundled and corporatized into two state owned independent entities i.e Manipur State Power Company Limited(MSPCL) and Manipur State Power Distribution Company (MSPDCL) w.e.f the 1st

of February, 2014.

The former MSPCL (TRANSCOM) is responsible for the transmission line and power Sub-Station of Manipur power utility and are responsible for the management of 1) .440KV line 2) .132 KV (EHV) Extra High voltage line 3) 33 KV line Whereas the later MSPDCL (DISCOM)mainly look after the distribution of power

supply and are responsible for the operation and maintenance of 1) 11 KV line 2) 0.440KV line 3) 0.230 KV line 4) Service connection 5) Revenue Collection 6) Distribution of Transformers 7) Street light etc. However, despite with such a vast power and responsibility vested on the Company, the condition of Power Supply in the region of I.T Road is yet to meet its essential requirements and the frequent interruption of Power Supply only indicates the area not being prioritised; which is against the fundamental principle of the Company in the service of humanity.

Present Day I.T Road Power

Condition:

Yes, there exist two Sub Stations in the area. The one at Gelnal sub station consist of only 6 work ing Staffs and the other is situated Tamei. This two Sub station,11KV, supplies major areas of I.T Road and is maintained by

Given the present situation, it may be known that it is not reli-able to carry out day to day activities with repeated power cuts causing on daily basis. Thanks to govt for the initiative to ease the living

condition of the people, almost every households are now dependent of Power Supply to meet their working demands. However, this of re-peated power cuts not only indicates the area being a neglected region but also indicates the quantum of concern authority's apathy

With the opening of Schools and establishment, day to day business begins to exclusively depend on electricity. There are number of students who couldn't afford solar lamb for their night studies. Power Cuts become their burden of knowledge-gain and a new misery. Wood misty keep their work on hold for their livelihood. It is undeniable that, the region equally needs power supply as to

that of the valley.

Meantime, the total number of 11KV consumers I.e both from Gelnal and Tamei sub-station could be close 1,500 in term of households or may be even more. Thanks to postpaid and Power subsidy from the govt, if I may correctly mentioned, that each household paid Rs 200/- as part of monthly power Bill irrespective of the quantity they consumed. This may be a reasonable amount for

the people whose majority house-holds' economic and financial con-ditions are still below the poetry line. It may also be known that, this minimum sum of Rs 200/- is still a far dream to arrange for many penury households of the areas.

Being located in a hilly tract, the region of I.T Road is not of easy reach from District Head Quater, Kangpokpi. Crooked and fill with multiple potholes everywhere, the condition of road is the main driver of delayed technicians and working staffs to rush to the spot in time whenever disruption or technical failure of power occurred. It is for this reason that the untrain locals who are not even well verse with electrical engineering or have no electricity background often risk their lives in the interest of public to resolve the electrical problems. Not realizing the hazard of electricity, they are not even provided with electrical kits and wears during their search for line disruption or while their climb to the electrical post. This is the state at present where they locals are becoming unpaid lineman and untrain technician.

India's Covid positivity rate past 1 per cent again after two months

India's Covid case positivity rate went past one per cent again after over two months as the country witnessed a single-day rise of 3,157 infec-tions and 26 fatalities, according to the Union Health Ministry data updated on Monday.

The rise reported on Mon-day pushed the country's overall Covid tally to 4,30,82,345 cases and 5,23,869 deaths, the data said.

The number of active cases rose by 408 in a 24-hour span to reach 19,500, the data updated at 8 am showed.

At 1.07 per cent, the daily positivity went past one per cent again after a little over two months, the ministry said. It was at 1.11 per cent on February 27.
The weekly positivity rate

was 0.70 per cent, according to the health ministry.

Positivity rate refers to percentage of all coronavirus tests performed that return positive result. A higher positive rate means higher transmission rate for the virus.

The death toll has now climbed to 5,23,869 with the latest 26 fatalities being reported, 21 of them from Kerala

The active cases constitute 0.05 per cent of the total infections. The country's COVID-19 recovery rate was recorded at 98.74 per cent, the

health ministry said.
The number of people who

ease rose to 4.25,38,976, while the case fatality rate was recorded at 1.22 per cent.

The cumulative doses administered in the country so far under the nationwide Covid-19 vaccination drive has exceeded 189.23

India's Covid-19 tally had crossed the 20-lakh mark on August 7, 2020, 30 lakh on August 23, 40 lakh on September 5 and 50 lakh on Septem-

It surpassed the one-crore mark on December 19.

The 26 new fatalities in-clude 21 from Kerala, two from

A total of 5,23,869 deaths have been reported so far in the country including 1,47,843 from Maharashtra, 69,068 from Kerala, 40,102 from Karnataka, 38,025 from Tamil Nadu, 26,175 from Delhi 23 508 from Uttar Pradesh and 21,202 from West Bengal.

The health ministry stressed that more than 70 per cent of the deaths occurred due to comorbidities.

Heatwave: Centre asks states to review health preparedness, issues dos & don'ts

Agency New Delhi, May 2:

As a severe heatwave continues, the Centre has asked states and Union Territories to review their healthcare preparedness and issued a list of dos and don'ts to prevent heat-re-lated illnesses.

In a letter, Union health secretary Rajesh Bhushan has also urged for uninterrupted power supply for cooling appliances. Amidst a power shortage across the country, use of solar cells has been suggested "wherever possible"

The weather department has predicted above-normal temperatures for central, western, and northern India, where mercury has already hit 46° Celsius in many places, a recorded deviation of 6° Celsius from normal, the letter

says.

While asking healthcare facilities to remain prepared with essential medicines and consumables such as IV fluid, ORS, ice packs and cool drinking water, the Centre has issued a list of guidelines to prevent and manage heat-related problems.

While advising people to remain indoors during the hot parts of the day, the guidelines suggest people cover their head with umbrellas or caps while stepping out.

"Reschedule or plan outdoor activities during the cooler parts of the day," the guidelines state, adding people must remain well-hy-drated and drink water regu-

larly even if not thirsty. The guidelines, however, advise against consumption of alcohol, hot beverages or carbonated drinks.

People have been asked to contact the 108/102 helplines should they experience any heat-related symptoms such as high body temperature, unconsciousness or a state of confusion, or lack of sweat.

A core body temperature above 40° C or 104° F, muscle weakness and cramps, nausea and vomiting, besides a rapid heart beat and shallow breathing have been identified as a medical emergency.

In children, refusal to eat, excessive irritability, decreased urine output, leth-argy or absence of tears are danger signs, the guidelines

say.

The guidelines also has a section for employers, who have been asked to provide cool drinking water at workplaces and ensure people consume it every 20 minutes.

Besides allowing for more breaks, employers have also been asked to provide shaded areas for work and schedule outdoor work for cooler parts

The Conundrum and the way forward: Strictly speaking, it may

not be a cakewalk for the Govt and concern authority to expedite in resolving the present pathetic Power condition of I.T Road as there exist multiple problems that deems it necessary to look at. For instance, the all round existing of high terrain in the areas where the input wire 33KV and output 1 ÎKV passed over the jungles, letting trees and bamboos an easy hit at the wires. This caused disruption of power often particularly during rainy and windy season. This highly exacerbated our power condition and can be overcome to minimum extend by stretching the wires across the side of the main road. This will in turn ease the hectic linemen during their search for line disruption and also added to their work efficiency.

Not to surprise, the number of human labours or working staffs is in shortage. As cited above, there exist only 6 Staffs at Gelnal Sub Station. whereas the number may be less or same at Tamei sub Station. More surprisingly, absent of Technician at the station is very much common throughout the year who are to deal with the technical issues whenever emergency or technical threat occurs. Also, there should be enough staffs and linemen from both 33KV

and 11KV department to operate on every working days. This may served the public the rights to get their efficient elec-tricity without a day or more delayed of power cuts.

Over the past four or more years of operation of Electricity in the region, the installed post and wires have not been replaced until today. Some of the existing installed old posts are in the verge of fall. They need immediate atten-tion. There's also a handful length of present stretching wires that are found rush and needs an urgent replacement. Having to ignored the present problems of wires and posts may not only disrupt the power condition of the area

but also pose a grave concern to the people of I.T Road. In the meanwhile, lengthy of wires that are made to passed over the trees and bamboos are prone to hit wires during this season and thus, require vigilance efforts to keep the wire on checks

Power being part of our most essential needs, effort of providing efficient and uninterrupted power to public from concern department should be aided by regular payment of Bills. This will henceforth, ensure better and quality power supplies in the hills area of I.T

As COVID-19 cases rise yet again, NTAGI set to review data for vaccination of children above 5 years

Agency New Delhi, May 2:

As the COVID-19 pan-demic rages on, the National Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation (NTAGI) is set to review the data of COVID-19 vaccines for children between the ages of five and 12 on May 4. Last week, an NTAGI panel had recommended inclusion of the Serum Institute's Covid jab Covovax in the national anticoronavirus vaccination programme for children aged 12 to 17 years. The development also comes amid a recent

spike in cases over the past w weeks. Last week, Union Health

Minister Mansukh Mandaviya had said that a decision on vaccinating children aged between five and 12 years would be taken on the basis of the recommendation by an expert committee. While the issue had not been taken up during the re-cent NTAGI meeting, sources say that a decision is forthcoming.

Last week on Tuesday. the Drugs Controller Gen-eral of India had granted emergency

authorisation for Biological E's Corbevax for those aged five to 12 years and Bharat Biotech's Covaxin for children in the age group of six to 12 years. Corbevax is currently being used to inoculate children against COVID-19 in the age group

of 12 to 14 years.

The DCGI approval comes following recommendations by the Subject Expert Committee on COVID-19 of the Central Drugs Standard

Control Organisation. India had begun vaccinating children earlier this year in January, with adolescents in the age group of 15-18 years. The nationwide vaccination drive was expanded further on March 16 to include children aged 12-14 years. So far, more than 2.91 crore adolescents have been administered with the first dose of COVID-19 vac-

The cumulative COVID-19 vaccine doses administered in the country has exceeded 189.23 crore

Lucknow's Markazi Chand Committee said that the Shawwal crescent was not sighted on Sunday evening hence, May 2 will be observed as the last day of Ramzan and Eid ul-Fitr will be

celebrated on May 3.

Marzaki Chand Committee said in a statement, "Marzaki Chand Committee Farangi Mahal, Qazi-e-Shahar Maulana Khalid Rashid Farangi Mahli Imam Idgah Lucknow has announced that today is the date 29 Ramzan-ul-Mubarak 1443 H. There is no moon of Shawwal on May

1, 2022. So tomorrow is 30th roza and Eid-ul-Fitr will be on May 3, 2022. Eid-ul-Fitr namaz at Indgah Lucknow will be held on 03 May 2022 at 10 am,"

Additionally, the moon-sighting committee in Karnataka said in a statement on Sunday, the Markazi Ruyath-e-Hilal (MReH) said the moon was not sighted in the city of Bengaluru due to heavy rainfall, the moon was also not sighted in other dis-tricts of Karnataka or anywhere in the country.

"The first day of Shawal (1443) will be on Tuesday, May 3, 2022," the committee said in its statement. The decision was taken after the MReH committee held its meeting today, under the chairmanship of Maulana Sagheer Ahmed Khan Rashadi.

The Executive members of Ruyat-E-Hilaal Committee of Karnataka announced that the crescent was not sighted anywhere across the country and hence the Eid al-Fitr will be celebrated on May 3.

Eid-ul-Fitr is celebrated by Muslims around the globe to mark the end of the Islamic holy month of Ramzan.

Ramzan is observed by Muslims worldwide as a month of fasting to commemorate the first revelation of the Ouran to the Prophet Muhammad, according to Islamic belief.

Ramzan is the ninth month of the Islamic calendar, which involves rigorous fasting for about 30 days.

During this month, Muslims do not consume food or water from dawn to dusk. They eat Sehri (a pre-dawn meal) and break their day-long fast with 'Iftar' in the evening.

Eid ul-Fitr marks the end of the fasting month of Ramzan. The festival is celebrated on the first day of Shawwal, the 10th month of the Islamic lunar calendar.

It referred to the segregation of vaccine trial data and added subject to the privacy of individuals, the data of all trials conducted and being conducted must be made available to the

public without delay.

The court directed the Cen tre that all clinical trials, key findings and results of vaccines approved for children be made

public.

The petitioner asked the government and the Drug Controller General of India to pro-vide segregated data for each of the phases of clinical trials of the vaccines administered in India. The court also heard the vaccine manufacturers -Covaxin's Bharat Biotech and Covishield's Serum Institute of India (SII) - before reserving its order in March.

The petition quoted the World Medical Association's Helsinki Declaration of 2013 on Ethical Principles for Medical Research involving human subjects, which mandates researchers to publicly disclose all negative, inconclusive and positive

results of their research.

The Centre, Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu and Madhya Pradesh defended their vaccine

mandates saying they fulfil the test of proportionality and are meant to create more awareness about vaccination.

SII told the court that all necessary data was with the regulator. Bharat Biotech denied allegations of non-disclosure of information and said the data related to the phase III trial has been published.

The Centre told the court all documents related to Covid-19 vaccines and their compositions are available in the public domain, and the vaccines has proved to be very effective and
