If Neglected, Contested Issue Over ST Demand for Meitei May Become a Flashpoint For Violent Ethnic Conflict

While the Scheduled Tribe Demand Committee, Manipur (STDCM) has intensified its agitation by visiting the residences of the elected leaders and submitting memorandum for their demand to include Meitei in the list of Scheduled Tribes under the Constitution of India, the All Tribal Students' Union (ATSUM) vehemently op-poses and urges the tribal leaders and Union Ministers not to concede the demand of the STDCM

ATSUM's opposition to the demand of STDCM for inclusion of Meitei in the ST list under the Constitution of India has been brought to the notice of the Union Minister of Tribal Affairs. Union Law and Justice Minister, and Chairperson of the National

Commission for Scheduled Tribe, Government of India; besides the elected tribal leaders of Manipur to State Legislative Assembly and Indian

Parliament. A team of ATSUM on November 19, 2022 met Union Tribal Affairs Minister Arjun Munda in New Delhi and apprised him of why the Meitei community should not be given ST status.

The ATSUM team, led by the Ariston team, ice by its President Paotinthang Lupheng and General Secre-tary SR Andria, called on the Union Minister for Tribal Af-Union Minister for Iribal Af-fairs, Arjun Munda at his of-ficial quarter at Tughlak Road, New Delhi, and ap-prised him of the threat and insecurity felt by the tribal people of Manipur due to the alleged illogical and illegitimate demand of the STDCM for inclusion of Meitei com-munity into Scheduled Tribes

categories of India. Moreover, after meeting and submitting a memoran-

dum to the Union Minister for Tribal Affairs, the team of ATSUM met Union Minister for Law and Justice Kiren Rijiju on November 20, 2022 in New Delhi on the issue of STDCM demand for inclusion of Meitei community in the Scheduled Tribe list of India and submitted a similar memorandum pointing out the reasons why the Meitei community should not be

given ST status. The ATSUM said that they were compelled to sub-mit a representation as the demand for inclusion of Meitei community in the ST category has been gaining momentum with most of the legislators from the valley including Manipur's lone Rajya Sabha MP Leishemba Sanajaoba openly declaring his support without taking into account the "irrational-ity" of the demand and sentiments of the tribal community of the State.

Besides meeting the Union Minister for Tribal Af-fairs and the Union Minister for Law and Justice, the team of ATSUM team reached the office of the National Commission for Scheduled Tribe (NCST), Government of India on November 22, 2022 and called on the Chairperson of the NCST. Government of India, Harsh Chouhan, at his office in New Delhi, and with the submission of a memorandum discussed the persistent demand of the STDCM to recognise Meitei community as Scheduled Tribe.

The ATSUM leaders also explained that the STDCM demand for ST status is nothing but a policy of the Meitei community to circumvent the

existing laws in Manipur to enable them to buy and own lands in the hill areas. The ATSUM leaders also had a serious deliberation on the plausibility of the demand to jeopardize the constitutional protection of tribal people of Manipur with the Chairper-

son, the ATSUM said. Earlier, before reaching out to the Union Ministers and NCST, a team of ATSUM led by President Paotinthang Lupheng and General Secretary Sinruwung Andria on November 15, 2022 knocked on the doors of Tribal leaders in the present Manipur As-sembly, including Outer Manipur Parliamentary Constituency MP, Lorho S Pfoze, where they submitted a memorandum in regards to the ST demand made by the STDCM, which is not acceptable to them.

No caste - No bar - save lives - donate organs

27th November is celebrated as Indian Organ Donation Day to commemorate the contributions made to society by deceased donors and their families. The main objective is to raise awareness about the importance of or-gan donation and encourage people to take a pledge for the same. This day strives to encourage people to donate their healthy organs after death in order to save more lives. The first-ever organ donation was done in 1954 when Ronald Lee Herrick donated a kidney

to his identical twin brother. Doctor Joseph Murray conducted the procedure for which he has also won the Nobel

Prize in Physiology or Medicine in 1990 for advances in organ transplantation. Donating organs like the kidneys, heart, pancreas, eyes, lungs, etc can help save the lives of those who are suffering from chronic illnesses. Numerous people lose their lives due to the unavailability of healthy organs that could save them. This day aims to help people realise that volunteering to donate their organs after death can be life-changing for many. The term organ donation means donating one's organs that are in healthy condition after a person dies. Organs including kidneys, heart, pancreas, eyes, lungs, and liver can be donated to save people who are suffering from any chronic illnesses. By observing World Organ Donation Day, people around the world will realise that volunteering to donate their organs after death can be life-changing for many who are patiently waiting. The day also focuses on sensitising and motivating people towards assuring them to donate organs and save more lives. Organ transplantation is nothing less than a miracle of the twentieth century, which has improved lives of hundreds of thousands of patients worldwide. An organ donor could save up to 8 lives and enhance the lives of more than 100 people through tissue donation. Organ dona-tion is a social act and it's considered to be an honor. Organ donation can happen from a brain-dead owner or a living donor.

One person can save up to eight lives from chronic illness by pledging to donate their heart, kidney, pancreas, lungs, liver, intestines, hands, face, tissues, bone marrow, and stem cells. Donating one's organs is giving someone a new life, anyone can volunteer to be an organ donor irrespective of their age, caste, and religion. Nearly 5 lakh people die in India every year for want of organs, while 2 lakh people die offiver disease, 50,000 of heart diseases. Of the 1.5 lakh people awaiting kidney transplant, only 5,000 get one. The emergence and spread of Covid-19 has brought great challenges to the healthcare system. While the country has lost hundreds of thousands to the illness, the effect on those suffering from non-Covid illnesses has been equally profound. The gift of an organ is like a gift of life. But, organ donation is not widely known or understood yet. Thus, people may feel that only the heart or liver, or kidneys can be donated. But, organ donation is much more than that. There is no age limit for this act of gifting life to the one in need. Organ donation has no age criteria. There are two systems for organ donation practiced worldwide, the *family consent system and the presumed consent system*. Organ donation

from deceased donors is slowly gaining momentum in India. Organ donation is a helpful act by the donor that can help in saving a life of a person and also could help in improving the quality of life for many individuals. Organ transplantation is one of the greatest achievements that modern science has been able to accomplish.

This was the reason that it was argued that the government must constitute a commission for appoint-ment which would not only look into the tenure of the CEC but would also take stock of his competence. But it is a fact that a competent person, a is a fact that a competent person, a bureaucrat, is disliked most by the present dispensation. He is pariah. No doubt every government prefers to have his favourite as the CEC. But it cannot be denied that the earlier Congress government did not strictly follow this dictum. T N Sheshan created history for his strong administrative actions. He reformed the election procedure and was in fact a terror for wrong doers. In appointing Goel, the Modi

government brazenly violated the rules and norms. It finalised the name of Goel just within twenty four hours of preparing the panel of names. The procedure lacked transparency. It was the reason that the bench, which also comprised Jus-tices Aniruddha Bose, Hrishikesh Roy and CT Ravikumar, had ob-served that none of the four names in the panel were "carefully hand-picked" by the Law Minister so that they could complete a six-year tenure. Goel was selected just within 24 hours of his opting for voluntary retirement.

It obviously implied that he was made to resign by the authorities only for being appointed as the CEC. Selection through creating panel was merely a hoax. In this perspec-tive remark of the Attorney General R Venkataramani ought to be taken seriously that there is a mechanism and criteria for selection and there cannot be a scenario where the government has to look back at every officers' track record and ensure that he completes the six-year tenure. He also said for appointment it is the profile that is important and not the

voluntary retirement which is being made an issue. Obviously for the convenience of the government there is no need to follow the 1991 Act that says EC's tenure is of six years and the government has to ensure that the person who holds the post completes the stipulated period.

This hurry of Modi government in appointing Goel smells of some design. Goel is being brought into office just a fortnight ahead of Gujarat assembly election. For Modi the Gujarat election has major implication. An insight into campaign would make it crystal clear that it is not the BJP but Modi who is in the fray. He has so far addressed not less than 30 meetings and taken out a number of roadshows. A defeat will completely erase his image and charisma

The manner in which the law ministry chose Goel, made the fivejudge Constitution bench headed by Justice K M Joseph which had perused the Centre's original file perrused the Centre's original interper-taining to Goel's appointment as EC, to observe; "What kind of evalua-tion is this? Although, we are not questioning the merits of ArunGoel's credentials but the process." The 1985-batch IAS officer got voluntary retirement from sergot volutiaty returnent from Ser-vice in a single day, his file was cleared by the Law Ministry in a single day, a panel of four names were put up before the prime minis-ter and Goel's name got the nod from the President within 24 hours.

It was the fear of being exposed that the Centre had objected to apex court's order for producing the original file as it desired to know whether everything was "hunky dory" in the appointment process as claimed by the government. Justice Joseph sough to know from the Attorney General R. Venkataramani; "This (file) was moved on 18 November. then the names were examined. Then the Prime Minister comes in..is it (usually) done in such haste? With

such tearing urgency?" On his part, Venkataramani re-

sisted judicial scrutiny of the appointment and said there was no "trigger point", inviting the top court's intervention in the current system to select an election commissioner. The AG was simply perform-ing his duty to defend the actions of the government. It is not that Goeal was that only suitable candidate. There were many from later civil service batches who could have been appointed. This would have also meant compliance with the law that warrants an election commis-sioner to have a tenure of six years in office, he argued. But more than that they would not have served the interest of the government in best manner. The list which featured the name of Goel incidentally had the names of other 44 officers. But they believed to be unfit for the task in the eyes of the law ministry.

Though Venkatramani told the bench: "These questions (on appointments) will crop up. How many appointments in public offices hap-pen in 12 or 24 hours? Can we get into all such instances?" The court remained firm. "Tell us how he was chosen ahead of three others," Justice Joseph asked. The Constitution has vested enormous powers on the "fragile shoulder" of the Chief Election Commissioner (CEC) and it is important that "someone of strong character" is appointed to the post, the Supreme Court has said.

Justice Roy wondered whether was normal for civil servants to take voluntary retirement. "Does it happen like this normally?" he asked. Justice Joseph also said that while the law contemplated a direct appointment to the position of Chief Election Commissioner (CEC), the overnment had made it a " tion-based" one. He added that direct appointments were being made until 1989. The frustration of the bench at the happenings clearly manifest in the observation; there is need to appoint a Chief Election Commissioner with 'character' like the late T.N. Seshan,

Strengthening EU-Bangladesh relations through EU-Bangladesh First Political Dialogue

Since the earliest interactions between European institutions and the newly independent nation in 1973, relations between the EU and Bangladesh have been improving for close to 50 years. However, the Political Dialogue in Dhaka on November 24th signaled an expansion of collabo-ration and prepared the path to establishing an even stronger foundation for the relationship. A high-level Political Dialogue that

will now be held annually, alternating between Brussels and Bangladesh's capital of Dhaka, was convened for the first time in Dhaka. It will offer strategic direction and boost cooperation in foreign and security policy. Its sig-inficance to the European Union was demonstrated by the EU's request to start negotiations on a Partnership Cooperation Agreement with Bangladesh at the inaugural meeting. It was an acknowledgement of

Bangladesh's socioeconomic transi-tion by the EU. The nation received praise for continuing to be the big-gest winner of the EU's Everything but Arms preferential trade program. Bangladesh asked the EU for help in extending trade benefits through 2029 as it leaves the category of least developed nations. The EU responded by highlight-

ing the necessity of Bangladesh's National Action Plan for Labor's full implementation, which in turn acknowledged its commitment to up-

holding workers' rights and workplace safety. Given the investment in safer and more environmentally friendly factories, this would need equitable pricing and shared respon-sibility for compliance-related fea-

Shahriar Alam, the state minister for foreign affairs of Bangladesh, headed the delegation, and Enrique Mora, the deputy director of the European External Action Service, led the team from the EU. Their extensive conversation focused on common ideals such as democracy, fundamental lib-erties, the rule of law, inclusivity, and respect for human rights.

Beyond the present focus areas of trade, migration, governance, humanitarian assistance, and development cooperation, the Political Dialogue sought to deepen EU-Bangladesh collaboration. On climate action, digital transformation, connectivity, and security, both parties de-cided to cooperate more closely.

The two sides discussed curbing violent extremism and combating ter-rorism. Bangladesh reiterated its stance of having zero tolerance for any form of terrorism. Both parties reaffirmed their shared conviction that humanitarian and human rights stan-dards must be upheld in order for counterterrorism measures to be effective.

In order to tackle transnational organized crime, including migrant

smuggling, human trafficking, and

money laundering, there is a need for more cooperation. A thorough discussion on migration is already under way and the EU plans to partner with Bangladesh in a Talent Partnership to promote beneficial global labor mobil-

The kindness of the people and administration of Bangladesh toward more than a million Rohingya refugees from Mvanmar was once again praised by the EU. Bangladesh expressed gratitude to the EU for its political and humanitarian assistance but emphasized the potential risk that the pro tracted refugee crisis poses to regional security and stability. The interna-tional community needed to take more action to set the stage for the Rohingyas' voluntary, secure, honorable, and sustainable repatriation.

On the necessity of using every effort to put an end to the violence in Ukraine while upholding international law and respecting the UN Charter, Bangladesh and the European Union concurred. Both sides were extremely anxious about the toll that war would take on the world economy. One of the six distinguished world

Right to privacy not absolute, Centre tells SC on plea on seizure of electronic devices

Agency New Delhi, Nov 27:

Right to privacy is not absolute and can be subjected to restrictions, the Centre told the Supreme Court on a petition seeking guidelines to law en-forcement agencies on seizure, examination and preservation of digital and electronic devices and their contents, Live Law reported on Sunday.

The court was hearing a writ petition filed by five academics, who have sought di-rections to the investigating agencies and the police, in-cluding seeking permission from a judicial magistrate before accessing or seizing elec-tronic devices and specifying how the material is relevant or linked to the alleged offence. In a counter affidavit filed

50 students in Assam rushed to hospital after taking iron folic acid pills

Agency Charaideo, Nov 27:

Altogether 50 students of two schools in Assam's Charaideo district were taken ill on Saturday purportedly af-ter consuming iron-folic acid (IFA) tablets provided by Health department workers, official sources said.

The students were taken to the Sonari Civil Hospital, where they were treated and discharged later. The officials said a health

workers' team from Batau subcentre under Patsaku Block primary health centre distributed IFA tablets to 75 students of Kheranipathar Lower Primary School and 26 students of Nimalia Lower Primary



School. The tablets were distrib-

uted in presence of teachers and the children were advised not to consume them on an empty stomach. After a while, the health

team received information from the school authorities that two children from each school were vomiting and complaining of abdominal pain.

"They were immediately taken to Sonari Civil Hospital and further health intervention. Later, 48 more children were taken to the hospital for examination." a source said. A health department release said the situation is be-

ing closely monitored. IFA tablets are given to children by the government as iron-folic acid supplements.

of STDCM Laishram Romesh said that objecting their 'legitimate demand' on inclusion of Meitei by ATSUM is unfortunate. From early part of their agitation, ATSUM has been opposing the demand while STDCM has been approach-ing the union to clear their misconception of ineligibilities of Meitei in ST list. "ATSUM objecting to

STDCM demand on the ground that Meitei are in higher class is not acceptable at all. The Imphal valley, having a size of just around 1,843 square kilometers, doesn't have any constitutional rights to protect the land. On the other hand, there is a consis-tent influx of migrants. What would be the condition of the valley once Asian Highway and railway projects are fully functional," he questioned while stating that allowing or disallowing Meitei in ST list should be decided by the Registrar General of India and Tribal Affairs Ministry. Also stating the stand of

Protection and Preservation Committee, Manipur (PPCM), Romesh recalled that PPCM, in the year 2017, had submitted memorandum to Manipur Government seeking not to send recommendation for inclusion of Meitei in ST list and calls on them to withdraw their stand considering the essence of bringing unity and integrity in the state.

Meanwhile, the Kangleipak Kanba Lup (KKL) has strongly come out on November 24, 2022 against the

ATSUM and questioned their agenda for road-blocking the demand of ST status for Meitei community. Speaking to media persons

on November 24 at its office at Paona Keithel, the KKL Secretary Ngamkheingakpa Luwang said the demand for ST status is to safeguard the Meitei and ensure their survival as an eth-

nic community of Manipur. ATSUM submitting written representations to the Union Minister of Tribal Affairs and Tribal Commission is most unfortunate. Whether to grant ST status or not is the sole right of the competent Minis-try of the Centre. ATSUM has no say in this regard and it should not interfere, said the KKL Secretary.

"Are all the constituent indigenous tribal student bodies on the same page with ATSUM? They should provide an answer and make their stand clear within 15 days," the KKL Secretary said.

If an answer is not given. KKL would be launching protests against ATSUM. Good or bad, all activities of ATSUM will be boycotted. Further, ATSUM's office in Imphal will also be closed if it doesn't respond and gives a clear an-swer, he said.

There are lots who are not indigenous people but pro-tected by the Constitution as Scheduled Tribe. If they act against the interest of the indigenous people (Meitei) when the community is facing threat of being extinct in the near future, then we will also act against their interest and contest their Constitutional status, the KKL Secretary said. Moreover, the World Meitei Council has submitted a memorandum to the Prime

Minister of India to delete the Chin-Kuki groups settling in Manipur from the list of the Scheduled Tribes of India.

According to a press re-lease issued on November 25, 2022 by the Chairman of the World Meitei Council, Nabashyam Heikrujam said the ATSUM leaders who are camping in Delhi and meeting Union Ministers are giving wrong in-formation. The ATSUM cannot represent the indigenous people of Manipur, the memorandum added.

While the Meiteis demand their right to include in the ST list, the Chin Kuki groups in the ATSUM objects and tries not to include Meitei in the ST list. The Chin Kuki groups are from Myanmar and they are migrants. The Constitution does not provide to include them in the ST list and they have been included illegally Therefore, the Chin Kuki groups should be deleted from the ST list, the Meitei should be included in the ST list, the release said.

Now, the latest developments over the issue of STDCM demand for inclusion of Meitei in the ST list turn out to be coloured with communal tones piting one against an-other while Manipur Chief Minister Nongthombam Biren has been working hard at his level best since his frist term to bring oneness of all the ethnic groups of Manipur and live in coexistence peacefully.

If both the Government of India and Government of Manipur does not tackle the vulnerable and contested issue over Scheduled Tribe demand timely, and allow the present situation to continue; it may become a flashpoint for violent ethnic conflict.

Assam-Meghalaya border violence: Protestors burn effigies of Amit Shah, Conrad Sangma

Agency Shillong, Nov 27:

Members of several social organisations in Shillong on Saturday burnt effigies of Union Home Minister Amit Shah, Meghalaya Chief Minister Conrad K Sangma, state Home Minister Lahkmen Rymbui and others in protest against the fir-ing by Assam Police earlier this week that resulted in six deaths. PTI reported.

The groups initially planned to burn the effigies at the entrance of the chief minister's bungalow in Shillong, but were shifted to a nearby area by the police.

The protest was organised by the Save Hynniewtrep Mission. which comprises Hynniewtrep Youth Council, East Jaintia National Council, Jaintia Students Movement Hynniewtrep Achik National Movement and Confederation of Ri Bhoi People, according to India Today.

Five of those killed in the police shooting in Mukroh village on Tuesday were residents of Meghalaya, while one was an official of the Assam Forest Guard, Sangma had claimed, adding the village was part of his state. The Assam government, however, had claimed that

only four persons were killed and that the village fell under its jurisdiction. Territorial disputes between the two states had begun when
