Modi ensured connectivity, Northeast should now go all out to attract investments

New Delhi, Nov 29

Until recently, Arunachal Pradesh in the Northeast was arguably the most remotely connected state in In-

This was partly due to its geography and mostly due to the negligence of Delhi vis-à-vis the hectic infrastructure building on the other side of the border in Tibet.

The Narendra Modi government enforced a dramatic change in the scenario.

Arunachal got its first passenger airport at Pasighat in 2017. As of 2022, it had four such facilities, including the recently inaugurated Rs 640 crore greenfield Donyi Polo airport. More are coming.

The change is secular to the entire Northeast. In 2014, the region had nine airports, most operated in the daytime and looked like glorified cattle sheds. Intra-regional road travel was a back-breaking experience. Rail services were limited and painfully slow Today, there are 16 airports. The

number of weekly flights doubled. Fast-expanding network of modern highways and broad-gauge rail mak-ing the commute easier. Critical healthcare capacities have gone up manifold. Cities are donned with new bridges and flyovers.

Long pending hydropower projects started coming up. The infrastructure building in the Northeast is far from over. Along with road and rail, inland water transport is also witnessing an overhaul. The refining capacity is being doubled. Indradhanush Gas Grid is connecting every state in the region to the

national gas grid.

At one stroke, all disadvantages of the region are removed. No other part of the country has witnessed such a dramatic makeover. And, that takes us to an important awakening. Northeast is no longer infrastructure-

The goal has shifted to converting this opportunity into regional growth. Part of it has already started happening. Take the case of tic Product (GSDP) of the state has nearly doubled in the last six-seve vears riding on infrastructure-building activities.

Arunachal is preparing to boost future growth through value tourism

and, electricity exports.
As of October 2017, the state had a total installed power generation ca-pacity of 277.96 MW. However, most of these being renewables, marked by seasonality and low-capacity utilization, the state failed to meet the peak demand of roughly 120 MW. There was no surplus

As the 600 MW Kameng Hydro Power station of North Eastern Elec-tric Power Corporation (NEEPCO) became fully operational this year, Arunachal turned power surplus.

Things will take a more definitive turn with the phased competition of the 2,000 MW Lower Subansiri hydroelectric project, on the Assam-Arunachal border, beginning June

Naga leaders to meet Amit Shah, discuss the creation of 'Frontier Nagaland'

Leaders of the Eastern Nagaland People's Organization (ENPO) will meet Union Home Minister Amit Shah in New Delhi on December 3.

An 11-member delegation of ENPO will meet the Union Minister ENPO Will meet the Union Minister and discuss their demand for the creation of a separate 'Frontier Nagaland'. W Manwang Konyak, secretary of ENPO, said that ENPO has received an invitation letter from Union Home Minister Amit Shah for a meeting which is fixed on December 3 at 4 pm in the na-

tional capital.

"An 11-member delegation team
of ENPO led by R Tsapikiu Sangtam will meet the Union Home Minister. We are demanding separate statehood 'Frontier Nagaland and this issue will discuss during the meet-ing," W Manwang Konyak said. ENPO is an umbrella organization of seven tribal bodies of Nagaland -CBLT, KBCA, KBBB, PBCA, USBLA, TBBA and YBBA.

On the other hand, in a letter to seven tribal bodies, ENPO on Mon-day requested the anointed spiritual leaders to initiate a special prayer programme covering all churches under respective associations on December 3 at 4 pm and also re-quested all bona fide members of Eastern Nagaland to take out 5 minutes time at 4 pm to say a special

The ENPO has threatened to boycott the assembly polls in Nagaland next year if their demand for a separate 'Frontier Nagaland is not fulfilled. The ENPO has also decided not to participate in the annual Hornbill Festival in the state which will begin on December 1.

VikramGokhale a seasoned actor



A veteran of the industry and one of the most versatile actors Vikram Gokhale who has predominantly worked in the Hindi and Marathi film industries, breathed his last in a hospital in Pune on Novem-ber 26. Vikram Gokhale was a very seasoned actor and his demise is deeply saddening. Vikram Gokhale was a noted ac-

tor in Marathi theatre and cinema, as By: Vinod Chandrashekhar Dixit tor in Marathi theatre and cinema, as well as in Hindi films, where he acted in movies such as Agneepath (1990), Hum Dil De Chuke Sanam (1999), Bhool Bhulaiyaa (2007), Natsamrat (2015), Hichki (2018), and Mission

Mangal (2019). Born on November 14, 1945, Vikram Gokhale was an Indian actor best known for his work in Marathi theatre, Hindi movies, and television. Vikram Gokhale had started his acting journey on Marathi stage and was awarded the Sangeet Natak Akademi Award for acting in theatre in 2011. His big-screen journey began in 1971 with Parwana, which also featured Amitabh Bachchan. Apart from Bollywood films, the duo also worked in a Marathi film titled AB Ani CD. In his career of 59 years, Gokhale acted in every medium, from theatre to television to cinema in at least two major languages- Marathi and Hindi. He was without a doubt the most talented actor to have made a name for himself in the movie industry. As a result, he was regarded as the most well-known and adored actor in the movie business. His roles in the films Barrister, Gafla and Sau Jhooth Ek Sach are the ones he found the most challenging. The actor made his film debut in the 1971 Amitabh Bachchan-starrer Parwana. He is best known for his performances in films like Hum Dil De Chuke Sanam, Agneepath, and Khuda Gawah. He won the National Award for Best Actor in 2010 for his performance in the Marathi film Anumati. In 2010, he made his directorial debut with the Marathi film Aaghaat. He is fondly remembered for playing the patriarch in Sanjay Leela Bhansali's Hum Dil De Chuke Sanam. He also appeared in films like Salim Langde Pe Mat Ro, Bhool Bhulaiyaa, Mission Mangal, Aiyaary among many others. He was hounored with the National Award for best actor at 60th National Awards in 2013 for 'Anumati', a Marathi film. The actor, who was close to reaching his golden jubilee in movies, received praise for his outstanding acting abilities and won numerous awards. In recognition of his contribution to cinema, the actor was honoured with the Vishnudas Bhave Award in 2015 by the Akhil Maharashtra Natya Vidya Mandir.Over the decades, Gokhale gave stellar performances in a range of roles in prominent Hindi films such as Bhool Bhulaiyaa, Traffic, Hichki and Ab Tak Chhappan. He infused life into many memorable characters.

He used to say that "An actor should not hard-sell skills. Acting should

not be about peddling your abilities. To me to be seen acting is not acting. To act to believe is acting. Acting is the art of creating the illusion of the truth. You have to make people forget you are acting." No doubt, we shall miss his presence on the big screen but he has left an indelible mark on the hearts of all cinema lovers and his work will always be remembered. When compassion becomes a myth



The epic Mahabharata gave a detailed version of male atrocity on a woman who was dragged to the court of the Kauravas while all her five husbands stood mute and lifeless. Pandavas, the husbands of young Draupadi were compelled to remain silent when she was molested at the royal court and an emasculated audience watched the event with insensitive servitude. The parents of the Kauravas could not witness the brutality directly as one was blind by birth and the other chose to embrace blindness as an indication of respect for her blind hus-

The epic presents contrasts in conspicuous details. The unbelievable devotion that Gandhari the mother of Kauravas had for her husband and the molestation of Draupadi in the court of Kauravas is one of the examples. Blindfolding herself she chose to stay away from the incredible beauty of the world which her husband was deprived of. There could not be a better depiction possible than the blindfolding of Gandhari's eyes to live in tune with the blindness of her husband and the greatness that the epic at-tached to a male-female relationship. But the ruthless sarcasm that the courtiers had a reason to giggle on and the numbness that veterans like Bhishma stooped in when Draupadi's molestation took place, illustrate the skill with which the narrator describes the hypocrisy of a patriarchy.

Situation has not changed even

today. International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women came this year with same dullness and repudiation as it had been in the previous years. That anything with regard to the suppression and violence against women at home and society remained the same with not more than few media de-bates and columns making ruckus in restricted platforms. The contrast that the great epic decoratively portraved still remains a prophecy that the generations to come would seri-ously fail to learn lessons from the accuracy and approach with which the human double standards work. And the intelligence of literary magnets, the writers, profoundly re-vealed the truth that a society is supposed to function and the values they propounded were indicative of a disaster that the human minds would probably drag the entire humanity to.

To be precise, the silence with which we usually register our anger on the violence against women in a celebrated civilized society such as India is a result of the societal emasculation that we propose to push our life through. Except candle light marches nothing solid seems to be emerging zealously stormy, capable of putting efforts to stop the brutality. Deep and dark in our minds we break open the windows of violence and unleash the power of horror degrading everything that we con-sidered as humane. What motivated a young man to be too ruthless to slice a human body into thirty five pieces and refrigerate them for a con-venient disposal on a day-to-day basis? Aftab Poonawala had easily chopped off his live-in girlfriend's body without even the slightest of humanitarian sentiments

To imagine the level of atrocity a young man would dare to commit, needs an animalistic hardeartedness and medieval savagery. Marinated in unparalleled barbarity, there would be many young minds getting ready to give us a jolt of horror. As usual, dialogues and symposiums would make conclusions, mostly pinning blame on Netflix episodes of investigative horror sho that depict brutal human behaviour in decent fashion and well crafted intonation. That being one of the emotional intelligence of young minds, the contribution that distorted family atmosphere and the radicalised religious beliefs help young minds gravitate towards ferocity cannot be undermined.

Children becoming scapegraces at a young age cannot be justified without the whole society being brought to hold the responsibility. Undeniable invasions by social media into the young minds and un-justifiable ethos thrown into the mental framework of children by dif-ferent religious literatures effectively disseminate and harvest brutality aplenty. No murder or outrage on a woman, for that matter, should be toned down as a mere act of situ-ational violence. This could also be a well thought out plan or at least an accumulation of behavioural stimuli gathered from the existing ill-gotten sentiments of a family or society.
What if a child grows seeing violence being carried out on his mother or any other female member in his family? The sentiments he is nurtured with and progress through would definitely hold a tremendous impact on his mental build up. He can, without any legitimate reason be irrevocably indignant and unpardonably brutal on anybody he disagrees with.

Statistics revealing the quantum of aggression on women across societies is a decisive interpretation on the skyrocketing trend of vio-lence. This also shows and meticulously reveals the hypocritical el-ement of religions which had suc-cessfully established this notion of male hegemony substantiating the same with religious legitimacy. The outrage and ruckus in the Ira-nian streets should also be counted as a reaction to the impact of the hysteria that the male dominance has been hammering human sentiments with. A tendency to capture and rule the feminine in the society works harder and resentment of any kind against such a move would be overthrown as an attempt to denigrate the al-ready glorified male authority. Be it

in the family or in society, the dominant narrative is mainly focused on rewarding the male supremacy and for some societies it is an act of decency and a sign of distinctive so-

cial upbringing.

All such vitriolic strategies are based on an idea that religions could successfully preach and teach; that a woman being a creation sprung from the rib of a powerful man is supposed to be submissive to his muscularity. From her very young age, as a girl to her adulthood, she is frequently made to believe that she needs to take orders from the male population in the family. This gives an advantage to men who tap all the possibilities to unleash his unruly self on the girl who he chooses to live with. Shraddha's case and many other such incidents bring intuitions amounting to be a serious lapse from the side of both the families. While boys are blessed with autonomy to live their lives in freedom, girls normally are destined to remain in the family's confines. To make a choice is what the mis-take that Shraddha did but the price she had to pay was her life.

While analysing this gut-wrenching horror, the subconscious feel it gives is not less than an in-sight that the families in our coun-try are mostly entwined in a baseless and duplicitous familial bon-homie; that the effect of deceitful interactions and mannerisms make many families silent cauldrons. Ex-tremely privileged to have access to education and health, the present generation is more informed and intellectually settled than the past generations. Life-giv-ing values being dispelled by the arrogance of modern intelligentsia, the new generation is seen to be distanced and the estrangement inside the families forcefully pushes young minds towards the predatory intentions and monstrous mo-tivations of unknown individuals. But we should not allow compassion to become a myth.

Myanmar-Bangladesh medicine diplomacy

Medicines play a direct or indirect role in ensuring the well-being and well-being of people by getting rid of human diseases and alleviating anxiety and restlessness. Therefore, medicine is one of the largest and most profitable industries in the world today. The pharmaceutical industry of Bangladesh is known as an emerging industry with great potential. Which is playing a major role in the country's economy. Despite many crises, this industry has gained enough reputation for its healthy development and quality productivity, and has been able to achieve international standards. Bangladesh continues to thrive in expanding the life-saving industry. It is very important for this sector to play a significant role in strengthening the economic base of

Currently, Bangladesh has gained the glory of an exporting country in-stead of an importing country in the pharmaceutical industry, Bangladesh is the only country which is becoming known as an exporting country after meeting its domestic needs. Currently, 97 percent of the country's total demand for drugs is being pro-

duced in the country.

However, after independence, 96 percent of medicines had to be imported from abroad. Medicines are being exported to about 80 countries including Europe, America, Middle East, Central Asia. Currently, this industry is in the third position in terms of exports in Bangladesh. The day is not far when this industry will rpass the revenue of the garment

In this era of globalization, the pharmaceutical industry is in a strong position in the context of our country. Therefore, the highest quality control of products is a prerequisite for exporting to join the interna-tional market of drugs across the borders of the country. Therefore, in product quality and meaning, Bangladesh will be at the forefront of promotion and expansion. To increase the acceptance of this country's medicine abroad, its quality testing system must be made to international standards. Many developing countries including neighboring Myanmar, Nepal, Bhutan still import most of the drugs.

A significant development in Bangladesh's health sector is the National Drug Policy, a global indi-cator for measuring health human development. This policy, which came into effect in 1982 aims to remove harmful and unnecessary drugs from the market and ensure access to essential drugs at fair prices in all cases. As a result of this

prices in air cases. As a result of this policy, the pharmaceutical industry of Bangladesh has flourished.Bangladesh Exports of pharmaceutical products to Myanmar was US\$11.77 Million during 2015, according to the United Nations COMTRADE database on international trade.

Medicines worth 188.7 million

takas (Taka 105 per dollar) were ex-ported from Bangladesh in the last financial year. Although this medicine is exported to 140 countries of the world, the largest shipment has gone to the neighboring country of Myanmar. The country exported drugs worth 2.76 million dollars or 289 million rupees in the last finan-cial year, which is about 15 percent of the total drug exports. However, Bangladesh accounts for only 5 percent of Myanmar's total demand for pharmaceuticals, which is almost entirely dependent on imports.

Bangladesh sent medicines and medical equipment worth one crore takas as relief to Myanmar flood victims in 2015

We believe that there is a very good possibility of increasing Bangladesh's share in Myanmar's pharmaceutical sector if it gets gov-

ernment support.

Despite the Rohingya issue, crackdown on insurgents in the bor-der areas under the junta govern-ment, drug exports to Myanmar increased by more than 24 percent compared to the previous fiscal year (\$22.4 million). But Bangladesh's share is only 5 percent compared to Myanmar's demand for medicine every year. According to UN Comtrade data, Myanmar imported about \$550 million worth of medicines in 2021. Of this, India imported 298.5 million dollars, which is about

55 percent of the total imports.

Analysis of data from
Bangladesh Export Development
Bureau (EPB) shows that 34 items

of goods were exported from Bangladesh to the neighboring country Myanmar in the last financial year. The income from this prodctal year. The income from this prod-uct is three million 88 million dollars. Out of this, only medicine has been exported worth 27.6 million dollars, which is about 71 percent of the to-tal exports to Myanmar.

Again, in the fiscal year 2021-22, medicines worth 188.7 million dollars have been exported from Bangladesh to 140 countries of the world. Among them, most of the medicines were exported to Myanmar. It is followed by Sri Lanka, the Philippines and the United States in terms of drug exports. In the last financial year, medicines were exported to the countries worth two crore 32 lakh, two crore 26 lakh and one crore 34 lakh dollars respectively. Myanmar was the top country in the export of drugs from Bangladesh in the previous financial year as well. During this time, drugs worth 2.2 million dollars were

exported to the country.

However, Bangladesh is gradually increasing its share. Many ex-port-oriented pharmaceutical companies are now establishing themselves in Myanmar. Chittagong's Elbion Group is going to add a new name to the list of pharmaceutical exports to Myanmar. Chittagong's 's only drug exporting company is going to export a 20-foot container of omeprazole group drugs to Myanmar next month, worth about 30,000 US dollars. But this is the beginning.

Pakistani drone shot down by BSF women personnel in Amritsar

A women squad of the Border Security Force has foiled a cross-border drug-smuggling attempt in Punjab's Amritsar district by shooting down a drone, which was flying from Pakistan into India with 3.1 kg of narcotics, a BSF spokesperson said on Tuesday.

The personnel fired at the drone at 10.47pm on Monday after they noticed it entering Indian territory near Chaharpur village, 40km north of Amritsar city.

According to the information of Elbion group, applications have been made to the Myanmar Medicines Adminis-tration for the registration of 40 drugs of different groups. Next month, a shipment of trial basis medicine will go to Myanmar." The container will go directly to Yangon port in Myanmar via Chittagong sea port. Last June, 40 more drugs were applied for registration. It will take a year

to get approval. Elbion will export large scale in the future to the potential market of Bangladeshi drugs if approved. However, in this case, the restrictions imposed by Myanmar's junta government on foreign currency transac-tions last April are causing some obstacles.

Brazil overcame the absence of Neymar to beat Switzerland 1-0 and advance to the round of the 16 of the World

Cup on Monday. Casemiro scored in the 83rd minute with a shot from inside the area to put Brazil in the last 16 with a match to spare in Group G

Brazil striker Neymar stayed at the team's hotel treating a right ankle injury sustained in the opener in Qatar. Team doctors have not yet given a time-table on his return — or said if he will return at all.

The win gave Brazil six points from two matches, leaving Switzerland with three. Serbia and Cameroon, which drew 3-3 earlier Monday, have point each.

Switzerland needs a win in the last match against Serbia to guarantee its spot in the next stage. A draw may be enough depending on the match be-tween Brazil and Cameroon.

Ghana beat S Korea 3-2 in

Mohammed Kudus scored twice to help Ghana beat South Korea 3-2 in a World Cup Group H thriller at a rocking Education City Stadium on

Monday, keeping the Black Stars in contention for a place in the last 16.

Against the run of play, Ghana went ahead in the 24th minute when Mohammed Salisu struck from close range after South Korea failed to clear a free kick and Mohammed Kudus add a second with a glancing header to give the African side a 2-0 halftime lead.

South Korea came roaring back, however, with two dar-ing Cho Gue-sung headers three minutes apart to level the

Kudus grabbed the winner in the 68th minute when he was left unmarked in the penalty area and slotted home past a diving Kim Seung-gyu.

Ghana, the lowest-ranked team in the tournament at 61st, joined Portugal at the top of the group standings on three points with Uruguay and points with Urug South Korea on one.

Cameroon, Serbia draw each other 3-3

Cameroon kept their faint hopes of reaching the round of 16 alive after substitute Vincent Aboubakar inspired a breathless comeback in a draw with Serbia in Al-Wakrah

Aboubakar came off the bench to rescue his side by scoring one superb goal and creating another as they fought back to draw 3-3 with Serbia, a result that kept both sides' slim chances alive at the World Cup in Qatar. Jean-Charles Castelletto's

netted an opening goal for Cameroon at Al Janoub Stadium in the 29th minute. However Strahinja Pavlovic and Sergej Milinkovic-Savic of Serbia scored a goal each in first-half stoppage time to make it 2-1 against the West Africans. Serbia's Aleksandar Mitrovic netted after the break

to make it 3-1.

Aboubakar was summoned off the bench in the 55th minute and pulled a goal back for Cameroon with a stun ning scooped chip over the keeper in the 63rd, before teeing up Eric Maxim Choupo-Moting to draw them level three minutes later. The draw halted a run of eight consecutive World Cup defeats for the African side.

The result left both sides on one point and needing to win their final Group G game to stand a chance of going through to the knockout stages, with Cameroon facing Brazil on Friday when Serbia take on Switzerland.

Portugal 2-0 victory over Uruguay

Portugal beat Uruguay 2-0 on Monday with two goals from midfielder Bruno Fernandes to become the third team after France and Brazil to qualify for the World Cup quanty ... knockout stage.

Uruguay, who had knocked Portugal out of the 2018 World Cup, put together a string of chances on the break: midfielder Rodrigo Bentancur skipped past three players only to see his shot brilliantly saved, Maxi Gomez hit the post, and Luis Suarez shot into the side netting.

Portugal's second win in vo games put them at the top of Group H on six points and heading into the last 16. Uruguay, third on one point, must beat Ghana in their final group game to have a chance of progressing.
