In a press conference held today at the official residence at Sanakeithel here in Imphal, Health Minister Dr. Sapam Ranjan said that as of now, a total of 358 dengue cases have been detected. tors that transmit the disease are 'Aedes aegypti mosquitoes and, to a lesser extent, Ae. albopictus. The virus responfor causing dengue is called dengue virus (DENV). The Health Minister said that clean but stagnant water piling up at either flower pots

or water storage tanks is the breeding ground of the mos-quitoes that spread dengue. "People should be let aware that clean water at flower pots or at water tanks without cover is the breading ground for the mosquitoes,"

Dr. Sapam Ranjan said. The Health Minister also said that this is not the first time that the Health department is creating awareness to the people, already various awareness programme to prevent dengue has already been taken up. However,

Health Minister's direct involvement to ensure that the awareness to prevent the spread of Den-gue is of the first kind. Experts from the Health

Department who was present during the press conference said that people need not worry much about the vulner-ability of the dengue as the carrier mosquitoes of the dengue virus only bite during daylight. They appealed to people to use mosquito nets as much as possible.

A tsunami is a kind of natural disaster which is caused due to volcanic eruptions in the ocean beds. Tsunamis are natural occurrences in which a series of powerful waves cause a surge in water that can reach heights of several metres.

Tsunamis occur primarily in areas where two continents meet. Tsunamis also happen due to volcanic eruptions under the ocean beds. The Pacific Ocean is well-known for the frequent occurrence of tsunamis. Tsunamis cause a lot of damage to the environment. It destroys the buildings, forests, livelihood, etc. Since it is a sudden event, no one can anticipate occurrence. Tsunamis are rare events but can be extremely deadly. In the past 100 years, 58 of them have claimed more than 260,000 lives, or an average of 4,600 per disaster, surpassing any other natural hazard. Tsunami waves often look like walls of water and can attack the shoreline and be dangerous for hours, with waves coming every 5 to 60 minutes. Tsunami is defined as a sequence of ocean waves with a very long wavelength. Due to the tsunami, strong waves of water are created and move landwards. As a result, there is a large inland water movement that lasts for a long time. As a result, these waves have a significant destructive power. Like any other natural disaster, tsunamis bring massive destruction to the environment. The leading cause of a tsunami is attributable to an earthquake. However, even volcanic eruptions, landslides and comets or other heavenly bodies hitting the sea can be a source. Japan is the country which has recorded the most significant number of tsunamis. The tsunami generated in the Indian Ocean in the year 2004 is still considered as the most upsetting tsunami taking more than two hundred thousand lives. Tsunamis are quite rare in occurrence as compared to other natural disasters, but they are equally damaging.

During the eruption of a volcano on land, debris falls with a great thrust into the water body, causing the same ripple effect. Volcances can be underwater as well. All earthquakes to not cause tsunamis. There are four conditions necessary for an earthquake to cause a tsunami: The earthquake must occur beneath the occan or cause material to slide into the ocean. The earthquake must be strong, at least magnitude 6.5 on the Richter Scale. The earthquake must rupture the Earth's surface and it must occur at shallow depth – less than 70km below the surface of the Earth. The earthquake must cause vertical movement of the sea floor. The saddest effect of a tsunami is the loss of lives in huge numbers.

The saddest effect of a tsunami is the loss of lives in huge numbers. Tsunamis hit suddenly, with almost no warning and hence people get no time to escape it or run away. They drown, collapse, are electrocuted, etc. Tsunamis not only cause massive destruction of life but also degrade the environment in a gigantic way. In order to prevent Tsunamis, the government can invest in building strong and high protective infrastructure which can withstand the force of a tsunami. The length should be so tall, that the most upper wave of the tsunami cannot over top it. We need to educate people and make them aware of the effects and impact of a tsunami is exceptionally crucial.

### Journalism is a public good and we must protect it



Media and journalism are important for any vibrant democracy. With the progress in technology now things have moved beyond the traditional media or way of journalism. Digital media and web media and even social media have become more popular but at the same time there is importance of journalism which can bring many positive changes. The trust on journalism has been down

in recent times due to few individuals or organisations that brought bad names in the name of journalism. We should not for-

get that from 2016 to the end of 2020, 400 journalists were killed for their work or while on the job and globally 274 journalists were imprisoned in 2020, the highest yearly total in three decades. Only 13 percent of cases recorded by the United Nations Educational Scientific and Cultural Organisation (UNESCO) since 2006 are currently considered judicially resolved and 73 percent of women journalists surveyed had experienced online violence in the course of their work.

Ending impunity for crimes against journalists is one of the most pressing issues to guarantee freedom of expression and access to information for all citizens. Between 2006 and 2020, over 1,200 journalists have been killed for reporting the news and bringing information to the public. In nine out of ten cases the killers go unpunished, according to the UNESCO observatory of killed journalists. Impunity leads to more killings and is often a symptom of worsening conflict and the breakdown of law and judicial systems.

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## Prosecution Sanction in Extra-Judicial Executions in Manipur

IW stating that there are sufficient materials to prosecute four accused personnel under different sections of the Indian Penal Code including for murder. As two of the accused had already expired, no action is suggested against them. As no sufficient evidences are found against three named accused and other unnamed personnel of 19 Rajput Rifles, they are dropped from prosecution. It was reported that vide order dated 02.12.2019, the Central Government denied to accord prosecution sanction u/s 197 CrPC and u/s 6 AFSPA against four accused persons. In the circumstances, Final Report has been submitted by the CBI to the Court of CJM/IW for passing such orders as deemed fit in the interest of justice. The CJM/ IW issued notice to the Under Secretary (AG/DV/HRC), Ministry of Defence to appear in person or by a pleader before it to show cause why prosecution sanction shall not be granted when the CBI found enough evidence against the ac-cused army personnel. It was observed that denial of prosecution sanction in such situation involved a question of law. The CJM/IW observed that denial of prosecution sanction has become a routine matter by the Central Government in most of the fake encounter cases investigated in pursuance of the di-rections of the Supreme Court by taking refuse of Section 6 of AFSPA. He also framed 10 substan-tial questions for reference to the High Court of Manipur mainly on as to whether Government of India can deny the grant of prosecution sanction against the accused army personnel when the CBI has found sufficient materials against them for prosecution. It may be pertinent to point out here that during the pendency of the reference case before the High Court, Union of India approached the Sessions Court against the order of the CJM/IW. The High Court of Manipur also directed the Sessions Court, Imphal West to dispose of the pending criminal revision cases filed by Union of India challenging the or-der passed by the CJM/IW expedi-

It is apposite to reiterate that the Final Report submitted by CBI has arisen out of the FIR registered by CBI in pursuance to the directions issued by Supreme Court in WP(Crl.) No. 129 of 2012 filed by EEVFAM and HRA praying for investigation and prosecution of security personnel involved in fake encounters. The Sessions Judge, Imphal West delivered his judgment on July 4, 2022. The Judge observed that since the writ petition has been filed by EEVFAM to the Supreme Court informing the factum of 1528 fake encounter cases in Manipur, EEVFAM can be considered as the first informant of the case and as such, EEVFAM is entitled to receive notice from Id. CJM/ IW for considering the Final Report/Closure Report submitted by CBI. The Sessions Court also opined that the CJM/IW has not committed any patent error while issuing notice to EEVFAM as EEVFAM is an association of victims' families whose father, husband, son or brother have been killed in allegedly fake encounters at the hand of State as well as Central security forces, in the present case, EEVFAM is an informant and also an association of victims, it is held that EEVFAM as an association of victims will fall within the ambit of 'victim' as defined under Section 2(wa) CrPC. It was also held that Magistrate has jurisdiction and competence to make reference under Section 395(1) CrPC, when the CJM/IW made reference, the FR case was pending before it. The court, thus, has rightly rejected the application field by UOI challenging the jurisdiction and procedure odorted by the CIM/IW

#### adopted by the CJM/IW. Immunity Under the AFSPA

The constitutional validity of the Armed Forces (Special Powers) Act, 1958enacted by Indian Parliament has been upheld by the Su-preme Court of India in Naga People's Movement of Human Right v. Union of India, (1998) 2 SCC 109. The Apex Court of the country held that Parliament was competent to enact the Central Act in exercise of the legislative power conferred on it under Entry 2 of List I and Ar-ticle 248 read with Entry 97 of List I. It reasoned that after the insertion of Entry 2A in List I by the Forty-Second Amendment to the Constitution, the legislative power of Par-liament to enact the Central Act flows from Entry 2A of List I. It was not a law in respect of maintenance of public order falling under Entry I of list II, the Court opined. The mo contentious provision of the Act is section 4 which vested special pow-ers to the armed forces. It reads as follows: "Any commissioned officer, warrant officer, non-commissioned officer or any other person of equivalent rank in the armed forces may, in a disturbed area,- (a) If he is of opinion that it is necessary so to do for the maintenance of public order, after giving such due warning as he may consider necessary fire upon or otherwise use force, even to the causing of death, against any person who acting in contravention of any law or order for the time being in force in the disturbed area prohibiting the assembly of five or more persons or the carrying of weapons or of things capable of being used as weapons or of fire-arms, ammuni-tion or explosive substances;..." While the armed forces personnel are protected from prosecution, for their actions in aid to civil power, by Section 132 of the CrPC the AFSPA under section 6 further provides **immunity** to persons operat-ing under the AFSPA from prosecution, without prior sanction of the central government. Under Section 6 protection has been given to the persons acting under the Central Act and it has been prescribed that no prosecution, suit or other legal proceeding shall be instituted against any person in respect of anything dine or purported to be done in exercise of the powers con-ferred by the said Act except with the previous sanction of the Cen-tral Government. It virtually provides immunity to persons exercis-ing the powers conferred under Sec-

tion 4 inasmuch as it extends the protection also to anything purported to be done in exercise of the powers conferred by this Act.

#### Landmark Precedents

There are many landmark cases wherein the Supreme Court has un-mistakably held that wrongdoer personnel of the armed forces can be prosecuted for violation of right to life as guaranteed under Article 21 of the Constitution of India. The Apex Court in the case of Naga People's Movement of Human Right v. Union of India (supra) ruled that the protection given under Section 6 cannot be regarded as con-ferment of immunity on the persons exercising the powers under the AFSPA. It ruled that Section 6 only gives protection in the form of previous sanction of the Central Government before a criminal prosecution of a suit or other civil proceed-ing is instituted against such person.It was held that Section 6 only extends the protection in the matter of institution of a suit or other legal proceeding. The Apex Court also ruled that "In order that the people may feel assured that there is an effective check against misuse or abuse of powers by the members of the armed forces it is necessary that a complaint containing an allegation about misuse or abuse of the powers conferred under the Central Act should be thoroughly inquired into and, if it is found that there is substance in the allegation, the victim should be suitably compensated by the state and the requisite sanction under Section 6 of the Central Act should be granted for institution of prosecution and/or a civil suit or other proceeding against the person/per-sons responsible for such violation". It is worthwhile to refer to a decision of the Supreme Court in General Officer Commanding, Rashtriya Rifles v. Central Bureau of Investigation, (2012) 6 SCC 228. This was a case of alleged encoun-ter killing in the State of Jammu and Kashmir declared as a disturbed area where the provisions of the Armed Forces (Jammu & Kashmir) Special Powers Act, 1990 read with the Armed Forces (Special Powers) Act, 1958 were in operation en-abling the deployment of army. In this case Supreme Court had made a comprehensive analysis of the law relating to grant of prosecution sanction to prosecute army person-nel charged with committing crimi-nal offence. It was held that the competent army authority has to exercise his discretion to opt as to whether the trial would be by a Court-Martial or criminal court after filing of the charge sheet and not after the cognizance of the of-fence is taken by the court. The Court held that facts of this case require sanction of the Central Government to proceed with the criminal prosecution/ trial and in case option is made to try the accused by a Court-Martial, sanction of the entral Government is not required. It can be concluded that the

While killings are the most extreme form of media censorship, journalists are also subjected to countless threats ranging from kidnapping, tor-ture and other physical attacks to harassment, particularly in the digital sphere. Threats of violence and attacks against iournalists, in particular, create a climate of fear for media professionals, impeding the free circulation of information, opin-ions and ideas for all citizens.

The United Nations Plan of Action on the Safety of Jour-nalists and the Issue of Impunity is the first concerted effort within the UN to address attacks and impunity of crimes against journalists, with a multi-stakeholder and holistic approach. It brings together UN bodies, national authorities, media, and civil society organizations. Since the plan was

adopted, the issue of safety of journalists has gained a higher visibility in the UN, as evidenced by the increasing number of declarations, resolutions and other normative texts, and the UN Secretary General's Call to Action for Human Rights, Protecting journalists is also part of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. The Plan has also contributed to building international coalitions of governments and civil society and served to bring about changes on the ground, such as the creation of national safety mechanisms in at least 50 countries.

The UN General Assembly proclaimed 2 November as the International Day to End Impunity for Crimes against Journalists' in General Assembly Resolution A/RES/68/163. The Resolution urged Member States to implement definite measures countering the present culture of impunity. The date was chosen in commemoration of the assassination of two French journalists in Mali on 2 November 2013. This landmark resolution condemns all attacks and violence

against journalists and media workers. The UN's Secretary-Gen-

eral António Guterres in his message said that "I urge Member States and the inter-national community to stand in solidarity with journalists around the world today and every day, and to demonstrate the political will needed to investigate and prosecute crimes against journalists and media workers with the full force of the law."

Let us promote healthy jour-nalism based on facts and findings. This is possible when citi-zens support the media or journalists who are working for the truth and justice. False news or hate news must be boycotted so that journalism can be trusted by people like before. At the same time the government must give support to the journalists and also protect them. Together we can end crimes against jour-nalists. Let us not forget that journalism is a public good and we must protect it.

Qatar relaxed limits Thursday on international visitors arriving during the World Cup and will allow entry for fans without tickets from Dec. 2 when the group stage ends.

Fans will still need to ap-ply for and get a Hayya Card tournament identification document before traveling but a match ticket will no longer be mandatory to enter, Qatari World Cup organizers said.

About 1.2 million international visitors are expected to come to the tiny emirate during the month-long tournament with ticket sales ap-proaching 3 million for the 64 games.

The maximum demand on Qatar's limited stock of accommodation — including hotels, apartments, hired cruise ships and campsites - is when all 32 teams are competing in the group stage that starts Nov. 20 Fans are being encouraged

to stay in neighboring states and take flights to Doha for games. The pressure should ease

when just 16 nations will ad-vance to the knockout rounds that start Dec. 3. The final is on Dec. 18, which is Qatar's national day.

Qatar is the smallest World Cup host nation by size since Switzerland in 1954. All eight stadiums built in and around the city of Doha can be reached by metro trains and

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
