Wow, it's good to be old! 1st October is celebrated as the International Day for Older Persons every year. It is specially celebrated for the senior citizens all across the world to focus on the responsibilities towards their lives. This day is an opportunity to highlight the

It is a time not only to highlight their valuable contribution to the globe but also to stress their basic human rights. Many older persons are unaware of their rights and how to enforce them, due to a variety of reasons.

This is why celebrating the International Day of Older Persons is impor-tant in raising global awareness as a huge advocacy effort to call for more enhanced international thinking and actions on elderly rights. The age prob-lem certainly confronts us and the matter is taking a turn for the worse with the passage of time. Today the life expectancy has risen sharply due to medical advancement, improvements in nutrition, sanitation, medical science, health care, education and economic well-being. Ageism is widespread and an insidious practice which has harmful effects on the health of older adults The problem of loneliness and isolation is the gift of modern society. The society forces an old person to live like an island. The ageing process is a biological reality and affects every human being on earth. Physical strength leaves us resulting in general weakness and physical and mental infirmity'. Ageism rests on the assumption that discrimination against older persons is the norm and acceptable. Article 1 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights states that "All human beings are born free and equal in dignity and rights". We must do everything possible to ensure that our elders can lead a life of dignity, enjoy the best of medical attention, economic security as well as emotional stability. Every phase of life has its own problems which require prudence, wisdom, courage and strength to attend to. In childhood and youth one has parents and other close elderly kith and kin to help, cooperate and guide. Besides, one himself is full of energy, strength, stamina and cour-age. But the situation takes a reverse turn in the old age.

The Older persons make wide-ranging contributions to economic and social development. They should be encouraged to get out of their retirement mentality and think about old age as second innings and opportunity to complete so many unfinished tasks and expand horizons to look beyond the family and work for the community. When one grows old, this natural love and affection of other members of the family for him vanishes and the elderly person becomes like a planet which has lost its gravitational force and has

consequently been lost in the boundless and endless empty space. As per WHO, there are around 600 million persons world-wide aged 60 years and over and this total will double by 2025 and it is estimated to reach virtually two billion by 2050 - the vast majority of them in the developing world

At the same time we must also remember that we too will be like them one day and if our children treat us in the same fashion, are we going to happy then? Bird diversity is lower in urban forests



Lund University in Sweden, cities have a detrimental impact on bird diversity. Even if the forest areas are of the same quality, urban woods have much fewer bird species than rural forests. The researchers examined 459 natural

According to a recent study done by

woodlands located in or near 32 cities in southern Sweden. They counted the occurrence of different bird species, and the result is clear: in natural forests located in a city center, there are on average a quarter fewer species of forest birds compared to forests

outside the city. In terms of endangered spe-

cies, about half as many species were found in urban forests compared to rural forests.

The results deepen our knowledge of the impact of cities on biodiversity, says William Sidemo Holm, one of the researchers behind the study. It is already well known that urbanization is one of the main driving forces behind the loss of biodiversity, as cities spread out across the globe. What is not as well known, however, is how cities affect protected natural areas in a city. "Our study demonstrates that you cannot surround nature with urban development and believe that it will remain as it is, there is going to be a negative effect", says William Sidemo Holm, who worked on the study during his time as a doctoral student at Lund University. The researchers wanted to specifically examine similar forests, or habitats. It is therefore not city parks that have been compared to countryside forests, emphasizes William Sidemo Holm.

India among 42 countries where people are being silenced Suffered reprisals and intimidation by State and Non-State actors

India is among the 42 countries where victims of rights violations, human rights defenders and journal-ists have suffered reprisals and intimidation by States and non-State including being detained, actors targeted by restrictive legislation and surveilled both online and offline.

It has been revealed in the report submitted to the UN Human Rights Council on September 29, 2022. The report titled "Cooperation with the United Nations, its representatives and mechanisms in the field of human rights" said that for a third of these countries named in the report, individuals and groups either refrained from cooperation with the UN, or only agreed to report on an anonymous basis for fear of reprisals, which is a disturbing trend.

"People are pursued and persecuted for raising human rights concerns," said Assistant Secretary-General for Human rights Ilze Brands Kehris, adding, "Shocking though this number is, many cases of reprisals are not even reported.

The report highlighted cases happened between May 1, 2021 and April 30, 2022. People who sought redressal for human rights violations and abuses and who tried to cooperate with the UN or were perceived as doing so, were affected by reprisal and intimidation.

The report said that the surveil-lance of individuals and groups who cooperate with the UN to defend human rights continued to be reported in all regions, with growing evidence of expanded online surveil-lance and cyber attacks. Moreover, the massive digital shift accelerated by the COVID-19 pandemic further increased challenges relating to cyber-security, privacy, and access to online spaces. At the same time, the use and impact of restrictive

By: Dr. Gyan Pathak government legislation that pre- killing of vents and punishes cooperation with the UN, resulted during the year, in some long-term prison sentences or house arrest.

All these have a "chilling effect" on the people. Self-censorship, choosing not to cooperate with the UN or doing so anonymously amid concerns for their safety, is becom-ing another global tendency. In-creased surveillance and monitoring, as well as the fear of criminal liabil-ity, have created the "chilling effect" of silence when it comes to reporting violations, stopping people from cooperating further with the UN and deterring others form doing so.

The report shows, as in the previous years, that intimidation and reprisals disproportionately affect certain populations and groups, including representatives of indigenous peoples, minorities, or those who work on environment and cli-mate change issues, as well as people who may suffer discrimination based on age, sexual orientation and gender.

"The risks affecting women victims, as well as women human rights defenders and peace builders, who share testimony and cooperate with the UN, remain daunting," stressed Ms Brands Kehris vowing to work 'ensure that all can safely engage with the UN"

In India, the report said that staff and the secretary of the Centre for Social Development (CSD) in Manipur, Nobokishore Urikhimbam, and his relatives have continued to suffer intimidation, harassment, and physical violence during the present reporting period, despite the fact that their case have been included in every annual report since 2018 which mentioned allegation of surveillance, the freeing of bank ac-counts under FCRA and attempted

killing of close relatives for his human rights work and his engagement with the UN in relation to uranium mining and cement factories in Meghalaya. During the previous re-porting period, CSD refrained from sharing information on environmental damage and health risks to com-munities from mining in Manipur for

fear of further reprisal. On February 26, 2022, Mr Urikhimbam's son, secretary of United NGOs Mission Manipur, was brutally assaulted at gut point by unknown individuals who took him in car, assaulted him and threatened to kill him, and droped him at a po-lice station seriously injured. On February 20, two unknowns indi-viduals verbally attacked Mr Urikhimbam's wife, who is the sec-retary of the NGO Women Action for Development. CSD's registration have not be renewed as on April 30. 2022 which was to expire on June 30, 2022 though renewal application was submitted in July 2021

The case of the Central Jammu and Kashmir Coalition of Civil Society (JKCCS) was reported in the re-port of 2020 and 2021 also on allegation of appraisals. The situation of JKCCS and its chair Khurram Parvez, and other members of the coalition were included in every annual report since 2017. Government of India has responded in the case. However, Mr Parvez was still under travel ban in May 2021. Government of India responded in August 2021 and justi-fied his detention, and that he had been provided legal and medical as-sistance and access to his family, subject to security requirements. He was again arrested on November 22, 2021 under UAPA, and his case was addressed by special procedures on December 1, 2021 and expressed their concern that Mr Parvez has been victim of a number of incidents

of reprisals for sharing information with UN.

On January 5, 2022, Government of India responded, the details of which were not made public due to their confidential nature. According to the latest information received by OHCHR, as a result of increased surveillance, online and offline, and police questioning and intimidation of JKCCS staff and associated personnel, their human rights work has been impacted and they could not come out with public report on the human rights situation in Jammu and Kashmir (both Indian and Pakistani side) since 2020.

The situation of Mr Henri Tiphagne from the Centre for Promotion of Social Concers (CPSC, also known as People's Watch) was included in 2018, 2019, and 2021 reports. Their foreign funding has been restricted on allegation of financing terrorism, but the UN body has said it a clear case of reprisal. In January and February 2022, CBI raided, and the case is pending in the High Court of Delhi, due to which petition requesting interven-tion filed with National Human Rights Commission of India have been rejected.

The case of International Dalit Solidarity Network (IDSN), a Denmark-based NGO working against caste-based discrimination and for the rights of Dalits was included in the report of 2020 and 2021. IDSN application for consultative status with ECOSOC has repeatedly been deferred since 2008 limiting its engagement with the UN. Government of India responded in August 2021 only to say that it is not aware of any incident of reprisal and intimidation against the organisation, and that 'legitimate scrutiny' of an application cannot be termed as reprisal. Centre extends AFSPA in several Districts of Nagaland & Arunachal for 6 more months

Agency New Delhi, Oct 1:

The central government has announced that it would extend the Armed Forces (Spe-cial Powers) Act or AFSPA for six months in in 12 districts of Nagaland and Arunachal Pradesh, and some areas of five other districts of the two northeastern states to facilitate the armed forces to continue the anti-insurgency operations

The AFSPA extension would be implemented in districts including - Tirap, Changlang and Longding and also in areas falling within the jurisdiction of Namsai & Mahadevpur police station in Namsai district of Arunachal Pradesh

In Nagaland the AFSPA extension would be in nine districts that include - Dimapur. Niuland, Chumoukedima, Mon, Kiphire, Noklak, Phek, Peren and Zunheboto - as well as 16 police stations in four other districts including - Kohima, Mokokchung, Longleng and Wokha. Nagaland has 16 districts while Arunachal Pradesh has 26 districts.

The extension of AFSPA powers would mean that these territories would be termed a 'disturbed area' and the sixmonth extension would take effect from today unless withdrawn earlier.

The announcement comes after the Union Home Minister Amit Shah had on March 31 said that the centre would try and reduce AFSPA opera-

tions from April 1 in parts of Assam, Nagaland and Manipur. The announcement was made amid an outcry by most political parties and NGOs who have been demanding the complete repealing of AFSPA

Almost all Chief Ministers of the northeastern states and most political parties had welcomed the Home Ministry's announcement to reduce the disturbed areas under the AFSPA in the Northeast. AFSPA allows the Army

and other central para-military forces to conduct raids, operations, arrest anyone anywhere without prior notice or arrest warrant. It has been in force in Nagaland, Assam, Manipur barring the Imphal municipal council area and

certain districts of Arunachal

Pradesh. The reduction of jurisdiction of AFSPA in certain northeastern states came in April 1 following the recommendation of a high-level committee constituted to examine the possi-bility of lifting of the AFSPA after the killing of 14 civilians in Nagaland. AFSPA was en-tirely lifted in Tripura in 2015, in Meghalaya in 2018, and in Mizoram in 1980s.

Under the AFSPA, the Army and other central paramilitary forces can conduct raids, operations, and arrest anyone without prior notice. It was in force in Assam, Nagaland, Manipur (except for the Imphal municipal council area) and some districts of Arunachal Pradesh

The death toll climbed to 5,28,655 with 26 fatalities, which include 13 deaths rec onciled by Kerala, the data updated at 8 am stated.

Of the 13 fresh fatalities, five were reported from Maharashtra and two from Kerala

Ashok Gehlot likely to continue as Rajasthan CM; Sachin Pilot expected to be brought back as his deputy

as his deputy, sources said. Gehlot, a longtime loyalist of the Gandhi family, on Thurs-day met Congress president Sonia Gandhi in Delhi to discuss the political crisis in his state over a recent public revolt by his loyalist MLAs.

Following the meeting, the senior leader announced that he will not run for Congress president, taking moral responsibility for the recent public rebellion of his loyalist MLAs

The Congress in Rajasthan plunged into political crisis on Sunday after MLAs loyal to CM threatened mass resignation over a possible move to appoint Sachin Pilot as Gehlot's successor if the latter contest Congress chief polls. Speaking to reporters,

Gehlot, a three-time state chief minister, said he apologised to Gandhi for the developments and said the decision on whether he would remain CM would be taken by Gandhi. He described himself as a

disciplined soldier of the party and expressed his disappoint-ment over the turn of events More than 80 MLAs sup-

skipped the official legislature party meeting convened for passing a resolution authorising the Congress chief to appoint a successor to Gehlot, who was to contest the Congress presidential election. The legislators, instead,

held a parallel meeting to pitch for Gehlot's continuation or the guarantee that his arch-ri-val Pilot, who had rebelled against the CM in 2020, does not replace him. On Thursday, Congress

general secretary KC Venugopal said that the party president will decide on the Rajasthan CM post within a day or two.



an officer appointed by Central Government to adjudicate an ED seizure order. Such an officer should not be below the rank of a joint secretary. The competent authority in this case was the Chief Commissioner of Customs, Chennai, who heard the matter from both the sides.

The Xiaomi had challenged the seizure of amount in its bank accounts by ED, in the Karnataka high court. However Justice S G Pandit of the Karnataka High Court rejected the petition on July 05 this year.

Xiaomi India, is a wholly-owned subsidy of Chinabased Xiaomi groups. It started its operations in India in 2014 and started remitting the money from 2015. It remitted foreign currency equiva-lent to Rs. 5,551.27 crore to three foreign based entities in the guise of royalty. They included one Xiaomi group com-pany and two US-based companies not related to Xiaomi. According to ED, the remit-tances to the US-based companies were also done for the ultimate benefit of Xiaomi group companies.

Xiaomi India had contended in the court that it had lawfully paid royalty to "Qualcomm" and "Beijing Xiaomi Mobile Service Software Company Limited" for using proprietary licensed intellectual property (IP), particu-larly Standard Essential Patents. The company had also claimed that it had disclosed to the Income Tax authorities the payment of royalty from

2016 onwards. However the ED maintained that Xiaomi India does not use any technology or intellectual property of Qualcomm or Beijing Xiaomi Ltd and hence the question of

paying royalty does not arise ED stated that Xiaomi India did not avail any service from the three foreign based entities to whom such amounts were transferred Under the cover of various unrelated documentary facade created amongst the group entities, the company remitted this amount in guise of royalty abroad. The Company also provided misleading informa-tion to the banks while remitting the money abroad. The ED also stated that

Xiaomi India only buys from the manufacturers within India the completely manufactured mobile phones that are boxpacked and ready to sell to the distributors without adding any technology or any other value to the purchased phones. As such the amounts transferred outside India in the guise of royalty is contrary to section 4 of the FEMA.

Congress President Poll: Mallikarjun Kharge submits resignation from post of LoP in RS following Congress' 'one person, one post' norm

Senior Congress leader Mallikarjun Kharge has sent his resignation from the post of Leader of the Opposition in the Rajya Sabha to Congress Interim President Sonia Gandhi after filing his nomination for the post of party chief on Fri-

day. The 80-year-old Kharge, a grassroots politician and a hardcore loyalist of the Gandhi family, has sent his resignation following his party's 'one per-son, one post' norm an-nounced in May. The grand old party an-nounced wide-ranging nounced wide-ranging organisational reforms, including 'one family, one ticket' and 'one person, one post' norms and a cap of five years on hold-ing a party post in Rajasthan's Udaipur on May 15. It, how-ever, added a caveat to the 'one family, one ticket' formula stating that if another member in one's family is politically active, then only after five years of organisational experience that person should be

in the state

considered eligible for a Con-gress ticket. gress ticket. Kharge, who has filed his nomination for the Congress

chief post, has been backed by leaders like Manish Tewari, Anand Sharma and others of the Group of 23 (those who are fighting for reforms in the Igniting for reforms in the party). His candidature was proposed by senior leaders including AK Antony, Ashok Gehlot, Digvijaya singh, Mukul Wasnik and Pramod Tiwari

among others. Besides Kharge, Congress MP and G-23 member Shashi Tharoor and Jharkhand leader KN Tripathi have also filed their nomination for the party president post.

Former Madhya Pradesh CM Digvijaya Singh dropped

out of the Congress presidential race on the last day of filing nomination papers and ex-tended his support to Kharge, saying he "cannot think of contesting an election" against a senior leader like Kharge

A leader with more than 50 years of experience in politics, Kharge was elected MLA for nine times in a row. He has seen a steady rise in his career graph from humble beginnings as a union leader in his homedistrict of Gulbarga, now Kalaburagi. He has been pitched as a Dalit leader by his party colleagues.

Bird diversity is lower in urban...

The study is one of the first to compare the diversity of similar habitats along a so-called urban gradient. "This way we know that the results are not driven by differences in the actual habitats, which in this scenario was natural forest.

Instead, it was the surrounding environment that was different", he says. The fact that an urban environment has such a clear negative im-pact on forest bird diversity may have to do with access to food, the researchers believe. Many birds depend on food resources not only in their immediate vicinity but also in their surroundings, and in cit-ies there are fewer insects, for example. In addition, some species are sensitive to artifi-

cial disturbances such as noise and light, which occur more in cities

"Our results highlight the importance of taking surrounding nature into account in urban planning. Above all, it is important to avoid the ex-pansion of cities adjacent to protected environmental areas where there may be en-dangered species we found that these are particularly sen-sitive to urban surround-ings", says William Sidemo Holm. The study also showed that urban forests can be important for bird diversity. Al-though a majority of the bird species were more common outside the cities, there were species that were more often found in cities, such as the hawfinch. The reason may be

that cities have more fruit trees that can provide them with food.

"Our conclusion is that it is important to preserve natu-ral forests both in the cities and outside them in order to maintain local diversity", says William Sidemo Holm. In order to better preserve the biodiversity of cities, more knowledge is needed on how to reduce the negative impact on natural areas from the surrounding urban environment, say the researchers. "In the future, it would be particularly interesting to investigate whether coherent green infrastructure in cities, or between city and countryside, can in-crease the opportunities for bird species in the city to find the necessary resources",
