Guwahati, Oct 7:

Union Home Minister Amit Shah is on a visit to the Northeast and he will preside over a regional meeting on 'Drug Trafficking and National Secu rity' in Guwahati, Assam on Saturday. The agenda of the meeting is to examine the drug scenario in the northeastern region and ways to mitigate it.

The high-level meeting will also see the participation of Chief Ministers and DGPs of all the northeastern states.

Groundwater depletes at an alarming rate

Some states areas facing groundwater scarcity due to the indiscriminate use of groundwater for agricultural purposes and most of the areas have come under danger zone. The condition is that the groundwater level is going down by one meter every year. Water is a precious resource to sustain life on this planet. Therefore, the situation demands attention.



Groundwater is depleting at an alarming rate in India, which is expected to overtake China as the world's most popu

set to increase due to depleting groundwater and increasing urbanization. According to a report by the World Resources Institute, India is one of the 17 countries in the world facing an extreme water crisis. India's water crisis has worsened over the past few decades as bore wells were dug to extract more and more groundwater for water-consuming crops such as paddy and sugarcane. Ideally, surface water should be collected in ponds and other water bodies during the monsoon season and this stored water should b used throughout the year for irrigation instead of groundwater. Over 60 percent of the wells in the country checked by the Central Groundwater Board have recorded a decline in the water level in the past decade.

Punjab is facing groundwater scarcity due to the indiscriminate use of groundwater for agricultural purposes and 80 percent of the state's area has come under the red zone. In a workshop organized by the Bureau of Energy Efficiency and Punjab Energy Development Agency, an expert in-formed that 16 lakh electric tube wells in Punjab continuously draw water from below ground, due to which the groundwater level has reached a worrying point. The condition is that the groundwater level is going down by one meter every year. The Punjab State Assembly Committee, set up to study the depletion of water tables, had said in its report that the state would turn into a desert in the next 25 years if the current trend of drawing groundwater continues. In simple words, we are drawing more water for ou use than we are filling back into the ground. As a result, the water level going down. This has created a threat of desertification in Punjab.

The rate of pumping up the groundwater in Punjab is 1.66 times higher than the rate of replenishment. It is worth mentioning that paddy cultivation got a boost in Punjab during the Green Revolution in 1966-67, which consumes a lot of water. The trend continues nowadays also. In such a situation, it becomes necessary that the farmers, urban bodies, and industrial units are made aware of the measures to save water and electricity and they should be warned about the dangers caused by the depleting level of groundwater. The United Nations has also issued a warning on the water crisis looming on the earth in its new report. The UN report says that due to climate change, droughts, floods, and drinking water-related crises are in-creasing. According to this report titled The State of Climate Service 2021, in the year 2018, about 3.5 billion people had access to water for 11 months in a year. It is feared that if precautionary measures are not taken, by 2050, the number of people facing a water crisis could be 5 billion. Experts recommend native plants for the garden. They look great and don't need much water or fertilizer. Also choosing grass varieties for lawns that are adapted to the local climate, reduces the need for extensive watering.

How can we tackle the problem of underage driving?



It seems over the years, our so-ciety has unfortunately become more complacent about underage driving than before, and more kids are growing up learning that it is *cool* to drive young, to drive fast, and to risk it with the law. Underage driving has not only added to the city's chaotic traffic but is resulting in a large number of accidents. Children, by nature, are more reckless. They are not mature enough to understand the consequences of their actions or mistakes. For them, driv-

ing is all about thrill and looking cool. Children are not to be blamed for reckless driving but it is the parents' job to teach children how to go by the rule book. Public awareness campaigns by traffic control authorities and others are vitally important to make such youth realise their errors and the possibilities of their rash driving. Children of this age are restless, impatient and have a shorter attention span. It is observed that a few school authorities who tried to discourage underage driving had to face parents' ire. Speeding around seems cool to teenagers but it can lead to havoc and that's where adults have to step in. Children are more likely than older drivers to speed, run red lights, make illegal turns, ride with an intoxicated driver, and drive after using alcohol or drugs. They have a sense that they can get away with transgressions – a feeling of bravado whereby "I can get away with anything" The fight against underage drinking in our country is a tough battle, and frighteningly, alcohol is involved in about 20-25% of fatal teenage car wrecks.

Underage driving seems to increase with each passing day as children become smarter and more informed and parents fail to understand the con-sequences. It is observed that minors can get a license with fake proof of age. In such cases, the police impose a nominal fine and these dangerous drivers are back on the road. Teenage drivers are a threat not only to themselves but also to others. They are not sensitive to traffic rules and don't even follow the basics of safe driving. Prime Minister Narendra Modi celebrated his 72nd Birthday on Sept 17, 2022 and since coming to power in 2014, he has launched a number of social welfare programs and initiatives aimed at benefiting the people living in the society. From 'Swachh Bharat Abhiyan' to the "Make In India' campaign, the PM Modi-led government has intro-duced a number of flagship schemes and initiatives to support the com-mon man. During the Covid-19 pandemic, the prime minister called for 'Aatmanirbhar Bharat' or a self-reliant India. On the occasion of his 72nd Birthday, here are some of the

most important initiatives and schemes that has benefited the com-

mon man since the past 8 years. * Pradhan Mantri Jan Dhan Yojana: The program was an-nounced by PM Modi in his first Independence Dayaddress in 2014. The objective of "Pradhan Mantri Jan-Dhan Yojana (PMJDY)" was to ensure access to various financial services like availability of basic savings bank accounts, access to need-based credit, remittances facility, insurance and pension to the unbanked weaker sections and lowincome groups through effective usage of technology.

* Swachh Bharat Abhiyan: The Swachh Bharat Abhiyan is the cleanliness campaign by the Government of India launched in 2014. With this project, open defecation will be eliminated, and the solid waste manage-

ment system will be improved. * PM-KISAN scheme: PM-KISAN scheme or Pradhan Mantri Kisan Samman Nidhi provides financial support to farmers. Under this scheme, the government sends 3 installments of Rs 2,000 rupees annually to the farmers' accounts to increase their income of the farm-

Yojna: Pradhan Mantri Mudra Yojna (PMMY) provides loan to small and micro-enterprises up to Rs 10 lakh. The programme was started in order to develop an important entrepreneurial environment in India. * Standup India scheme: In or-

der to encourage entrepreneurship at the grassroots level with an emphasis on economic empowerment and job creation, the Stand-up India scheme was introduced in April 2016

More recently, Prime Minister Narendra Modi announced **PM CARES** for Children scheme on May 29th, 2021 to support children who have lost both parents or sur-viving parent or legal guardian or adoptive parents due to COVID-19 pandemic. The scheme provides a monthly stipend of 3,000 from 18 years to 23 years and a lump sum of 10 lakh to children when they turn 23 years old. Free education and uniforms are also provided to children in government schools. Private schools are also allowed to provide fee reimbursement under the

Right to Education Act 2005.

Lastly, but not the least, another good schemes government invest-ment scheme to come out of the Modi-led Govt. is Sukanya Samriddhi Yojana (SSY) – 'Beti Bachao, Beti Padhao'. This is a saving plan crafted especially for girl child in India, the scheme target par-ents of girls and support them to fi-nancially secure the future of their daughter's by opening an account in either a commercial bank or a post office. The SSY scheme was initiated by the Indian Government under the campaign named; 'Beti Bachao Beti Padhao' and is available at 7.6% cur-

rent interest rate. Humanity grappling with the deadly blow of climate change

War between dreams



Realizing the deadly impact of climate change, 195 countries of the world signed the climate treaty on December 12, 2015 in Paris, the capital of France, to protect the entire humanity from its future wrath. By the end of this century, it was decided to reduce the increase in temperature up to 3.5 degrees Celsius due to climate change to 1.5 degrees Celsius (meaning less than 2 degrees Celsius in all cases). The emission of gases due to the use of petroleum products, industry, agri-culture and man-made pollution promised to reduce but during this irresponsible behavior was adopted by various nations.

During the time of President Donald Trump, the US withdrew from this treaty, which was a shame. The

current US President Joe Biden corrected this mistake after gaining power. People showed irresponsibility in pre-venting man-made pollution, the serious and deadly consequences of which have left people all over the world in awe during the summer sea-son. The entire West was seen to be booming. July this year with the beginning of 2010, many countries of America, Europe, China, Mexico, Latin America, Africa, Australia and Asia had to suffer from heat waves. Last year, Layton town of British Columbia province in Canada was seen completely scorching with 49.6 degrees Celsius heat, but India was seen sweltering with 45 degrees Celsius heat only in March. In this month, the heat wave of 49.5 degrees centigrade was seen in the town of Nawab Shah in

Pakistan In 28 states of America, there was a scorching heat, which is often in a hundred years once a year has been recorded. In the city of Toronto, Canada, the temperature was more than 30 degrees Celsius for more than 50 days. If climate change continues to increase at this rate, according to an estimate, in 2060, cities like Toronto will experience 38 to 40 degrees centi-

grade heat for more than 50 days. In London, the capital of Britain, which

is famous for dark days due to rain and clouds, the fire brigade was constantly ringing bells everywhere in these summers. Every time there was a fear that the look wall would melt on the streets. It is not known when and where there will be a fire in the heat. It may come as a surprise to know that the whole of Europe was badly affected by the warm winds this time. The runways of airports in Britain, Spain, France, Portugal, Italy, etc., were seen melting with the 54 degree Celsius heat and full of streaks of aircraft wheels. China's Shanghai city was seen to be scorching with 40.9 degree Celsius heat this time after 1873

The hot tropical air means that during this time the temperature rises by 90 percent in the surrounding areas, affects vegetation, fauna, water and the organisms that live in it. Since the 1980s, it has been observed that the sea level temperature is increas-ing rapidly due to temperature change. This has been revealed in the 2019 report of the National Inter-governmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC). According to the same IPCC report, in the middle of the cur-rent year 2022, warm winds were seen to cause environmental damage in northern India, Afghanistan, Pakistan,

southwestern Europe, North America, especially in its state, Texas.. Their tumultuous tumult was recorded as be-ing caused by human error. Professor Dr. Jason Smerdon, a researcher at Columbia University's Lamont Earth Observatory, says that warm tropical winds affecting different regions of the world mean that the climate is warming overall. This hot climate is affecting the entire regions of the world.

According to Dr. Jane Baldwin, extreme heat waves are warming our Earth's temperature. He says that the polar latitudes are faster than the equatorial ones are heated with The heat waves that have been seen flowing across the world in recent times are directly indicating that the fury of these heat waves may continue in the future. As they have broken previous ummer records, this is indeed a very alarming phenomenon. According to Dr. Baldwin, these increased tempera-tures and heat waves are due to human activities. Our programs are not climate friendly. Acknowledging this truth, if we do not make climatefriendly changes in them immediately, then surely we will end up on this earth. We will be digging the grave of our destruction.

Government asks Chief Justice of India UU Lalit to name his successor

Agency New Delhi, Oct 7:

With a month left before Chief Justice of India (CJI) U U Lalit retires, the government on Friday started the process of appointment of the next CJI with Union Law Minister Kiren Rijiju asking the incumbent to "As per the MoP on ap-

pointment of Chief Justice of India and Supreme Court Judges, today the Hon'ble Minister of Law and Justice sent a letter to the Hon'ble Chief Justice of India for sending his recommendations for appointment of his successor, the Union Ministry for Law and Justice said. As per the Memorandum

of Procedure (MoP) governing the appointment of members of the higher judiciary, "ap-pointment to the office of the Chief Justice of India should be of the senior-most judge of the Supreme Court considered fit to hold the office". Justice D Y Chandrachud

is the second senior-most

judge of the Supreme Court. If appointed, he will have a tenure of over two years as CJI till November 10, 2024.

The MoP stipulates that the law minister would, at an "appropriate time," seek the recommendation of the outgoing Chief Justice of India for the appointment of the next CJI. Under this process, after

receipt of the recommendation of the CJI, the law minister puts it before the Prime Min-ister who advises the President on the matter of appointment. This process is conven-tionally done a month before the retirement of the incumbent CJI. CJI Lalit retires on November 8. After the recommendation

process, once a new CJI is desbe put on hold.

India reports 1,997 new Covid infections, active cases drop to 30,362

200 kg Heroin Seized from an Iranian

Agency New Delhi, Oct 7:

India logged 1,997 new coronavirus infections taking the total tally of Covid-19 cases to 4,46,06,460, while the active cases declined to 30 362 according to the Union Health Ministry data updated on Fri-

day. The death toll climbed to 5,28,754 with nine fatalities which includes three deaths reconciled by Kerala, the data updated at 8 am stated. The

active cases comprise 0.07 per cent of the total infections, while the national COVID-19 recovery rate increased to 98.75 per cent, the ministry said.

A decline of 1,920 cases has been recorded in the ac-tive COVID-19 caseload in a span of 24 hours. The daily positivity rate was recorded at 0.94 per cent and the weekly positivity rate at 1.34 per cent, according to the ministry. The number of people who

■ ease surged to 4,40,47,344, while the case fatality rate was recorded at 1.19 per cent. Ac-cording to the ministry, 218.88 crore doses of Covid vaccine have been administered in the country so far under the na-tionwide COVID-19 vaccination drive. India's COVID-19 tally had

crossed the 20-lakh mark on August 7, 2020, 30 lakh on August 23, 40 lakh on Septem-ber 5 and 50 lakh on September 16. It went past 60 lakh on September 28, 70 lakh on Ochave recuperated from the dis-

tober 11, crossed 80 lakh on October 29, 90 lakh on November 20 and surpassed the one-crore mark on December 19. The country crossed the grim milestone of two crore on May 4 and three crore on June 23 last year. It crossed the four-crore mark on January 25 this year.

The six new fatalities reported in the last 24 hours include two from Chhattisgarh and one each from Kerala, Maharashtra, Rajasthan and West Bengal.
