capital on Sunday.

MLAs from Manipur into the @BJP4India family. All of you possess qualities that will greatly benefit our party. I am certain you will all serve the nation diligently as members of the BJP & play your role in the development of the country," JP Nadda twitted.

According to a statement from Manipur Legislative Assembly Secretariat on Friday, Kh. Joykishan Singh, Ngursanglur Sanate, Md Achab Uddin, Thangjam Arunkumar and LM Khaute merged with the ruling party BJP.

"The Speaker of the Manipur Legislative Assembly is pleased to accept the merger of five JD(U) Members of Legislative Assembly (MLAs) with the BJP under



the tenth schedule of the Constitution," stated the Legislative Assembly Secretariat.

The merger of JD(U)
MLAs with BJP has delivered a big jolt to the Nitish Kumar-led Janata Dal (United) in the northeast.

The Bharatiya Janata Party secured a majority of 32 seats in the 60-member state Assembly in the recently held Ass bly elections, results of which

In less than two years time, Nitish Kumar flipped his choices and in a surprise move went on to stitch an alliance with RJD and Congress to form a 'Grand Alliance' government

Earlier this week, JP Nadda was on a two-day visit to Tripura, which is slated to go

to Assembly polls next year.

JP Nadda lauded the "allround development of Tripura"
under Prime Minister Narendra Modi and said the governmen has "brought an end to political violence" by creating an "atmosphere of peace".

He also slammed the previ-Communist Party of India (Marxist) government for "en couraging terrorism and infil-tration" in the northeastern

The JD(U) MLAs who joined the BJP are Khumukcham Joykishan, Ngursanglur Sanate, Md Achab Uddin, former DGP LM Khaute and Thangjam Arunkumar.

"When we parted ways from NDA, all our six Manipur MLAs came & met us & assured us they were with JDU. We need to think about what's going on. A one day workshop on 'Fighting Drug Menace- A Multi Faceted Approach" was held yesterday at DTC Hall, Tuibong, organized by District Tuibong, organized by District Legal Services Authority Churachandpur District Bar Association (CDBA), under the sponsorship of Manipur State Legal Services Author-ity (MASLSA). Justice MV Muralidaran,

Judge, High Court of Manipur and Executive Chairman, MASLSA and Gaiphulshillu Golmei, Registrar General, High Court of Manipur at-tended the program as Chief spectively. Lamkhanpau Tonsing, District and Sessions Judge, Churachandpur, Ojesh Mutum, Member Secretary, MASLSA, Athokpam Shanta, Registrar (Vigilance), High Court of Manipur and Bineshwori Maibam, Addl. Member Secretary, MASLSA.

Albert Thangthasiem, Se-nior member of Churachandpur District Bar Association (CDBA) wel-comed all to the one day workshop and the need for orga-nizing such type of program in the present times.

Lalrinchhana Bawitlung President, Churachandpur District Bar Association gave the keynote address. He highlighted various issues ofpublic importance like making district jail functional again, for establishment of rev-enue tribunal in the district as also consumer court, and pleaded for building a judicial complex for all courts by allotting land and building necessary infrastructure etc

Justice M.V Muralidaran stated that due to the problem of drug abuse, the society is not only susceptible to other forms of crimes such as sexual abuse, child and women trafficking, domestic violence etc. Convergence of the activities of the various stakeholders at appropriate stages, be it awareness, consultations, workshops, treatment measures, advocacy, study and research, capacity building etc., as a coordinated mechanism is the need of the hour, he added. He made a special mention of the NALSA Legal Services to the victims of drug abuse and eradication of drug menace which provides a plat-form for all stakeholders in the fight against drugs Gaiphushillu Golmei, Registra General, High Court of Manipur expressed similar thoughts and the importance of legal services institutions in achieving this end. Ojesh Mutum, Member Secretary, MASLSA earlier, had men-tioned the alarming threat posed by drug abuse and il-licit trafficking and the need

to check further degradation

The technical sessions began with Sorokhaibam Sadanada deliberating on enabling access to justice un-der the NDPS regime and the need to look inwards and fight with honesty of purpose and integrity. Hasby Haokip, Addl. SP gave a power point presentation on the need of technology in policing, espe-cially in reference to NDPS Act. Various good initiatives taken by police in other states can be implemented in Manipur as well. Khaikhopau Ngaihte, ADC, Churachandpur represented on behalf of Deputy Commis-sioner, Churachandpur and

gave a brief highlight of the steps taken by District Admin istration Churachandpur in fighting drug menace in schools. Lamkhanpau Tonsing rounded off the first session by giving a detailed analysis of the mandatory provisions to be followed under the NDPS Act by the investigating agencies. He made a point of the various amendments made, conferring powers to CMO, AR, DC etc., under the NDPS Act for authorizing search, seizure and arrests. He went into the finer details of the Act and the need for the investigating agencies to comply fully with the provisions, lest it be taken advantage of.

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### **NEP Challenges and Major Action Points**

In course of the implementation of National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, major challenges have been categorized under three broad themes- School, Teacher and Child. Subsequently, during the Chief Secretary conference, 35 priority areas have been identified for major actions to be taken care of by the states.

Parent awareness drives will be conducted so that they can contribute to the quality of their child's education. Twining of private and government schools should be done and private schools should adopt a remote schoolas part of their social obligation. Ac-

tivities such as teacher exposure visits between private and government schools, hosting of government school students by private school students and joint sports competitions between private & government schools should be explored to increase exposure for both sets of students. Optimal utilization of resources should be systematically planned by the States/UTs on the concept of "Providing Urban Amenities to Rural Areas" (PURA). There should be greater integration between Schools and Anganwadi centres and students from Anganwadis should be taken to nearby primary schools, where they should be given a platform to perform a song and creating confidence to prepare them for school. Also the school teachers should orient the Anganwadi workers on teaching and learning for pre-school children. Adoption of Anganwadis by nearby schools should be properly planned. Hackathons should be organized, where students should provide innovative solutions to a variety of real life problem statements created by different departments. Many of these solutions could be adopted to solve long standing problems. Micro-improvements should be Continuously un-dertaken. Also activation of Tithi Bhojan concept must be activated as "Sabka Prayaas" to ensure supplementary nutrition for the school going children.

Parents should confirm the teacher's performance on the large photograph of the concerned teachers displayed in the classroom. Campus based recruitment drive, as done in technical colleges, for Teacher Education Institutions should be explored. Regular e-training should be promoted for capacity building of teachers to excel. Retired outstanding teachers should be invited for mentoring a cluster of schools and motivating its teachers. Efforts willbe made to do away with single teacher schools and adequate amenities should also be provided in the school. To make teaching and learning more engaging for TV driven education, teachers should be en-couraged to provide high quality content in various forms like animation,

mono-acting, drama, dialogues etc.

To give a boost to access to high quality content for each grade in the country, setting up of 200 TV channels have been planned. The content of thesechannels will be sourced by the teachers of the States/UTs. There should be peer-to-peer learning in the classrooms. To improve the learning trajectory of the students, classroom interactions through academic quiz is

SCERTs have a pivotal role to play in the implementation of NEP 2020 SCERIs have a pivotal role to play in the implementation of NEP 2020 and hence all SCERTs in the country would need to be strengthened. All Teacher Education Institutions across the country have to adhere to certain norms and standards of the NCTE and gradually move towards a multidisciplinary environment. Under National Mentoring Mission (NMM), a unified learning interface in the form of a portal has been established where all the mentors will remain connected. National Professional Standards for Teachers (NPST) will focus on the preparation, practice and performance improvements of all teachers. Performance Gradius Ladey (PCI) for formance improvement of all teachers.Performance Grading Index (PGI) for the Districts, released by the Ministry of Education (MoE), assesses the performance of the school education system across 83 indicators and the report would be used by the States to accelerate the work in a particular district which is lagging behind. The progress with respect to these priority areas will be monitored by the NITI Aayog.

The North East region constitutes 7.9 per cent of India's total geographical land expanse(Rizal & Asokan, 2013). Each community in the region have their own ethnic aspirations for progress and self-determination. North East region provides unique indigenous habitats featuring di-verse biota existence (Chatterjee et al., 2006). NEI is a tourist destination adorned with natural land-scapes, rivers, waterfalls, cultural distinctiveness, biodiversity, flora and fauna. In this multicultural scenario, homogeneity and peace are costly values to achieve. The multi-facets of culture, geography, festi-vals, music, and food make NEI a social mosaic of beauty. While there is much diversity, there are also competing trends toward sectarianism. The role of teachers has become of utmost importance to impart holistic education in an era of exclusive ethnic consciousness and rampant

#### corruption. Cultivation of Value Based Education (VRF)

Along with academic excellence, we must instil ethics in the students' minds. We should realize that each individual can do something, but when we work together as a community, we can achieve much in

building a value-laden society. Constant tension in NEI Lack of values leads to egotistic and anti-social behavioural pat-terns. Value deficit society ends up in turmoil. Teachers know history, geography and the future of the world. As elders, it becomes their duty to educate, enlighten and in-fluence students to think bigger than their small communities. The constant tension between states and intrastate ethnic clashes are detrimental elements obstructing NEI's progressive trajectory. Most of these tensions are human-created and directed toward the selfish ends of a few or a group. Security of persons and property is a major con-cern in NEI, apart from an infrastructure deficit, communication blocks, and geographical isolation. The result of tension affects everyone in society. Unfortunately, violence and bandh culture adversely affect the image of NEI in the national and global forum. The constant tension between the Governments and Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) also threatens daily wage earners and the student community. The secession-ist inclinations of various groups picture NEI as a dangerous ground where the AFSPA thrives. There is hidden slavery in NEI where groups dictate, and ordinary people have no option but to oblige grudgingly. A fear psychosis exists in the minds of people. The existence of fear is an open secret which is rarely posed. In this existential reality, the celebration of national Indepen-dence Day may not make much meaning to those victims of slavery, coercion, and throttled political voice. In this juncture of life, teachers must inculcate a sense of belongingness to mother India and bring in the sense of love and equality before the law of the land. Each student must be oriented to see the bigger picture of community exist-ence rather than mere selfish individual survival.

#### Possibility for tourism in NEI

Given the natural extensions of the Himalayan hills and valleys, the NEI stands out as an attractive destination for tourism. Domestic tourism is a primary revenue source for most North East states. In 2008, the then Prime Minister, Manmohan Singh, released the Vision 2020 document that earmarked infrastructureled tourism expansion as one of the prime hopefuls for revenue generation (Duarah & Mili, 2013). The re-cently concluded North East Festival (NEF), Bangkok 2022, saw more than 50 tour operators and officials from North East India trying to establish bilateral ties with Thailand(The Print, 2022).Cultural festivals such as NEF aims to showcase North East to the world and attract tourists to NEI. To further enhance the interstate relationship, each state could organize tours to learn about other cultures cuisines and policies. This exercise would enlarge the mindset of those who travel and also establish interper-

sonal relationships between people of different states

#### Teachers' role

Teachers have the power to in-fluence. Power is the ability to direct or influence another person's behaviour or course of events There is a need for teachers who possess holistic education with a global mindset. Herbert Spencer's law of social evolution advocates a movement from simple to complex and homogeneity to heterogeneity that allows multiculturalism to thrive. Moderated by Imphal Free Press resident editor, the daylong programme was organised by Khelen Thokchom Trust (KTT), Manipur and supported by the Manipur State Aids Con-trol Society(MACS).

Trust member Sobhabati Sammon delivered a presentation and welcomed the members present at the event. The work-shop was attended by Ukhrulbased journalists, KTT and oth-

Arun, who is also editor-in-chief of Imphal Free Press and AIDS control officer, Ukhrul/Kamjong Dr Yuithingla Vashum attended as presidium members.

On the occasion, Irengbam Arun said that the best way to pay tributes to the late senior iournalist Khelen Thokchom. who remained ever ready to mould and shape young jour-nalists to be the cornerstones, was to organise the capacity building workshop for the me-dia fraternity of the state to bring more awareness on HIV-AIDS among others.

Functionaries of Manipur AIDS Control Society (MACS) State TI coordinator Ksh Deepak, IEC and Mainstreaming Omajit Leishangthem and assistant director IEC and mainstreaming Phanjoubam Lanngamba attended as resource persons.

Delivering the basic con-cepts on HIV/AIDS, Deepak said that following detection of the first AIDS case in the state from a drug user in 1990, the crusade against the AIDS pandemic has come a long way since the adoption of HIV policy. However, amid the interven-

tions to check the epidemic continuously for the past two de-cades, there has been little progress in the battle against the disease he said

Over the years, the mode of transmission of the AIDS has evolved from injecting route to sexual route, he pointed out, adding, sexual transmission has become a major concern.

Elaborating on the prevailing scenario of prevalence among adults aged 15-49 years, he said the overall prevalence of the country stands at 0.22 per cent, Mizoram at 2.3 per cent which is the highest in the coun-try, followed by 1.44 per cent in Nagaland and 1.5 per cent in

"The prevalence rate is alarming in both Ukhrul district and Kamjong districts with Ukhrul and Kamjong figures standing at 1.7 and 1.6 per cent respectively."

He also called on all the stakeholders, including village authorities, churches, civil society organisations, NGOs and others to give their unstinted support and cooperation and join hands in fighting the disease as MACS alone would not

He also shared a Toll Free number '1097' which could be used by the public for HIV re-lated queries, and also informed that the public can also use 'NACO AIDS App' on their smartphones to access information related to AIDS.

In his speech, Omajit Leishangthem briefed about the various legal provisions under the newly-adopted HIV/AIDS (Prevention and Control) Act 2017. He said that as in other parts

of the states, Manipur also has the service of an ombudsman for the protection of People Living with HIV (PLHIV) under the Act.
As per the Act, PLHIV are

protected and they should not be discriminated against on the basis of their HIV status. He said that there has been a case against disclosure of the identity of a HIV/AIDS patient which was brought to the notice of the ombudsman in the state.

In his presentation, Phanjoubam Lanngambam spoke on 'Media ethics on HIV/ AIDS related reporting'. While reporting on HIV/AIDS, the reports should be objective, fac-tual and sensitive and should not disclose the identity of HIV infected persons, he said.

"People are trying to defame us but their reach is limited to computers & tweets. That is the reason Congress is nowhere to be seen on the ground," he further added. "I won't dictate from Delhi The

flag of our party will be decided by the people of Jammu and Kashmir," he said. "I've not decided upon a

name for my party yet. The people of J&K will decide the name and the flag for the party. I'll give a Hindustani name to my party that everyone can understand," Azad said while addressing a rally. My party will focus on -the restoration of full statehood, right to land and employment to native domicile - he further added.

Azad also said that the agenda of his party would be restoration of full statehood, right to land, employment to native domicile and assembly with Governor, and not with a Lt Governor. "My," Azad said.

Azad, who resigned from
Congress last month ending
his 50-year-long association
with the party over the leadership crisis in the organization, said that he will launch a new party soon and the first unit will be formed in Jammu and Kashmir before the Assembly elections in the Union Terri tory. Azad's first public meet-ing comes at a time when Congress leaders are holding a Mehangai Par Halla B rally at Ramlila Maidan in Delhi

on Sunday.

After Azad's resignation, 64 leaders from J&K quit the party. Expressing their solidar-ity with Azad, 36 Congress leaders including leaders of the National Students' Union of India (NSUI), the youth wing of the Congress also submit ted their resignations to the

party leadership.
