Who Said Boys Can't *Wear Make-Up* (2018) - An educational film, written and directed by the very resilient Privakanta Laishram was nothing short of a revolution. The film had broken glass ceilings and raised many eye-brows since it was the *first*ever film from the entire North East India to highlight the topic of gender-neutral fashion, make-up, and clothing and Laishram won the Best Multimedia Influencer Award 2018 for it in Mumbai. The film also featured many other boys and men who wear gender-neutral clothes and make-up in day-to-day life alongside popu-lar names like **Priyakanta** Laishram himself, Inder Baiwa (Former India's Top

Model), Nimrit Kaur Ahluwalia (Indian Television Actress). Thounaoiam Strela Luwang (Femina Miss India Manipur 2023), Peden Ongmu Namgyal (Miss Diva Suprana-tional 2017), Bala Hijam (Manipuri Actress). John Oinam (Singer) and others.

No one bats an eye when a girl/woman walks out of the house with makeup. On the other hand, if a boy/man does the same, everyone stares, as if makeup on a man is a sin. People have denied the fact that makeup has its origins thousands of years ago and has historically been used for both men and women. In today's society, makeup on men is taken as taboo, and men are discouraged from doing it. The fact that this behavior is viewed as socially unacceptable lies equally in homopho-



bia, toxic masculinity, and misogyny. Men with make-up are painted as effeminate and assumed to be homosexual, their masculinity is either ques-tioned or attacked, and their sexuality/gender identity is falsely branded.

Through the film Who Said Boys Can't Wear Makeup,

Priyakanta Laishram raised numerous valid points against the existing stereotypical thoughts, practices, and beliefs of society. "Various civilizations

across different eras in human history have documented men using different forms of makeup or their equivalent at the time

So, how did men's makeup become so stigmatized in the first place? The lack of representation eventually led the majority of men to think that makeup makes you look more feminine – a view that has been ingrained in modern society,

ingrained in modern society, albeit diminishing, until to-day." Priyakanta addressed. When asked about how he decided on making a film on men's make-up and gender-neutral fashion, Priyakanta said it all started from his personal experiences as a boy who wears makeup and genderneutral clothes in real life.

"Everyone around me got offended when I first started wearing make-up, including my friends, family, relatives, and neighbors. Wherever I go, I used to get a lot of deroga-tory remarks from people. People called me all sorts of names. During high school, one of my teachers even dragged me out of the classroom and forced me to wash the makeup off my face with contaminated water from the toilet. It traumatized me for a long time. I didn't even tell my family because I was afraid of getting judged again for my choices. I cried and spent many sleepless nights. But eventually, all those criticisms and hardships that I had faced made me braver and more confident. I started caring less about others' opinions and started following my own choice of fashion and style. That was when I decided to make an educational film on gender-neutral fashion and make-up titled 'Who Said Boys Can't Wear Makeup' in 2018, to raise my voice against stereotypical societal norms

and expectations. Priyakanta added.

Today, the world has reached a new level of acceptance where in many circles (at least in Westernized societies) anyone is welcome to use makeup. Men use makeup in both natural and stand-out ways to day-to-day looks and enhance their natural features. and skin care in particular has seen a huge rise in popularity Like most things in our soci ety, makeup has been assigned a gender, when in reality, it doesn't have one. If a man chooses to, we need to stop thinking that it's a commentary on his masculinity or sexuality.

Restricting a brand in a state is suicidal

In the midst of poll preparations Karnataka, the contro-versy of Amul and Nandini milk brands created a stir raising the tem-perature of the campaign-

ing. As soon as Amul announced the online delivery of its milk in Bangalore, opposition parties including the Congress and Janata Dal (S) accused the ruling BJP in the state that the Gujarat-based Amul was challenging Karnataka's very own Nandini brand. Opposition parties also feared that the Rs 21,000-crore Nandini brand could be merged with Amul. An announcement made on social media heated up the politics of Karnataka. Actually, Union Home Minister Amit Shah in December observed that co-operation between the umbrella brands of Gujarat Cooperative Milk Mar-keting Federation and Karnataka Milk Federation could do wonders.

The truth is that Gujarat Cooperative Milk Marketing Federation's Amul brand has been supplying pouch milk and fresh products in two districts of Karnataka – Hubballi and Belgaum since 2015. Even the Amul ice cream is prepared with Nandini milk. Its intention was to make Amul milk and curd available only through e-commerce in Bangalore. Moreover, Amul milk is costlier than Karnataka's homegrown Nandini brand, so the question of competition between the two does not arise. The Government of Karnataka provides subsidies to dairy farmers for Nandini milk, hence the rate of Nandini milk is Rs 39 per liter in the state, while Amul milk is sold at Rs 54 per liter. The milk controversy forced Amul managing director Jayen Mehta to clarify that 'there is no question of competition' between Amul and Nandini. However, this kind of controversy can be detrimental to many other desi brands that have pan-India aspirations. Every brand and company should be free to market and distribute its

Every brand and company should be free to market and distribute its products anywhere in the country. India is the largest milk producer in the world with a production of 220.78 million tonnes in 2021-22. The country is contributing a quarter of global milk production. It is a 51% growth when compared to 2014-15. The source of the data is the Ministry of Fisheries, Animal Husbandry and Dairying, Government of India. But recently there has been a slight de-crease in milk production. The share of milk cooperatives and private play-ers in the milk market is expected to reach 54% by 2026. Dairying is often the primary source of income for many landless families and marginal farmers. Therefore, it is in their interest that successful brands like Amul and Nandini buy and sell in the markets. Dragging milk into politics will only harm the farmers.

The Indian dairy industry is facing several challenges. The average milk production per animal in India is relatively low as compared to other countries. The lumpy disease in cows also impacted milk production to a great extent in the northern states of India during the second half of the previous year.

Attacks against Churches anger Christians in **North Eastern States**

Congress and Regional Parties blame BJP led State Governments By: Ashis Biswas

In northeast Indian states, upset Christians feel they must protest more vigorously against the recent demolition of a few churches in Manipur and Assam, for which they hold the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) accountable. Intriguingly, Nagaland-based Christians have reacted more sharply than their follow religionists in the region. The Nagaland Pradesh Con-

gress Committee (NPCC) according to local regional media reports a few days ago, went beyond merely criticising the ruling parties of the region for what it felt was an attack against the Church. In a statement it simultaneously deplored the apparent indifference on part of Christian legislators in the region over such sensitive matters affecting the community. It appealed to Christian politicians not to be overwhelmed by political power or money.

Reports from some areas suggested that local government authorities had launched strict action against illegal constructions/encroachments built without permission, violating existing rules. Churches were not spared. Accord-

ing to one Dimapur-based account, the churches destroyed were the Evangelical Baptist Convention Church, the Evangelical Lutheran church in Manipur and the Catholic Holy Spirit Church, in addition to another in Assam. The demolitions were carried out a few days ago by local authorities accompanied by

security forces. The NPCC statement flayed Christian lawmakers in the NE states as well as those elected to the In-dian Parliament for their failure to raise the issue at any level. The ruling BJP, it was alleged had correctly assessed the numerical and other weaknesses that Christians suffered from, exploiting them to its own advantage. Not too many churches in the tribal areas had proper construction permits, it was explained. Clearly this was a time for Chris-

tians to come together to protect their faith and identity. In India, the North and West regions generally voted for 'Hindu nationalism' while in other areas people voted for their identity and pride. The community, according to the NPCC must not ignore the present threat to their identity, it was stressed. Expressing its surprise over the lack of reaction among Chief Ministers of Christian dominated states of Mizoram, Nagaland and Meghalaya, the NPCC felt the leaders were more interested in getting closer to the ruling BJP than any-thing else. Even in Manipur, Chrisaccounted for some 40% of the population.

Going by experience, observers said, it was a question of time be-fore US/EU-based NGOs and Christian organizations would register their protest over what had happened in the Northeast, given their close ties with various Christian bodies and organisations in the region. Over the years, there have been

regular complaints about the in-creasing harassment, assaults, etc against Christians and Muslims in India especially after 2014 when the BJP was first elected to power. Churches and missionaries have often come under grievous attacks by enraged mobs in the past, but those guilty have usually been punished.

Also, by the standards of a largely populated country like India, such incidents have been few and far between. Among conservative Hindus and Muslims in the sub continent, there has remained an undercurrent of hostility against religious Conversion and other activities on part of certain Christian organisations, which have led to tension/violence in India and Pakistan

In India, over 50% of Christians live in South India. Among Christians in India 37% are Catholics, fol-lowed by Baptists and communities led by the Churches of North and South India. Christians account for only 2.4% of the population com-posed mostly of former Hindus. Among younger people embracing the faith, 37% are from scheduled castes, followed by about 34% from the scheduled tribes.

Interestingly, many Indian Chris-tians have been known to share some of the beliefs and value systems of their fellow citizens in different areas, without compromising their religious identity in any way. (IPA Service)

High Courts cannot conduct 'Mini Trial' at the stage of discharge or while quashing criminal proceedings U/S 482 CrPC : SC

While setting aside a judgment passed by the High Court of Puniab and Harvana at Chandigarh which quashed the criminal proceedings in a case investigated by the CBI, the Supreme Court in a most learned, laudable, landmark and latest judgment titled Central Bureau of Investigation vs Aryan Singh Etc. in Criminal Appeal Nos. 1025-1026 of 2023 (@ SLP (CRL.) Nos. 12794-12795 of 2022) in the exercise of its criminal appellate jurisdiction that was pronounced as recently as on April 10, 2023 has reiterated that a High Court can-not conduct a "mini trial" at the stage of discharge or quashing of the criminal proceedings while exercising limited powers under Sec-tion 482 of the Criminal Procedure Code, 1973 (CrPC). The Apex Court also rightly reaffirmed that whether the proceedings were malicious or not was to be considered at the conclusion of trial and not at the stage of discharging or quashing the criminal proceed-ings. Of course, we must certainly note here that it was also made crystal clear by the Apex Court that what was required to be considered was whether there were sufficient materials collected during the course of the investigation. which warranted the accused to be tried

At the very outset, this remarkable, robust, rational and recent judgment authored by Hon'ble Mr Justice MR Shah for a Bench of the Apex Court comprising of him-self and Hon'ble Mr Justice CT Ravikumar sets the ball in motion by first and foremost putting forth in para 1 that, "Feeling aggrieved and dissatisfied with the impugned common judgment and order passed by the High Court of Punjab and Haryana at Chandigarh in Criminal Misc. Application Nos. 54107 of 2021 and 8233 of 2022 by which the High Court, in exercise of the powers under Section 482 Cr.P.C., has quashed the criminal proceedings of the FIR No. RC0512020S0001 dated 29.04.2020 registered at Police Station State

Grime Branch, Chandigarh under Sections 452, 323, 365, 342, 186, 225, 506 and 120-B IPC (earlier registered as FIR No.195 dated 30.08.2014 under Sections 452, 323, 365, 342, 225, 186, 506, 120-B IPC at Police Station Phase-1, Mohali) as well as all the subsequent pro-ceedings arising out of the same, the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) has preferred the present appeals

Simply put, the Bench men-tions in para 2 that, "Shri K.M. Nataraj, learned ASG appearing on behalf of the CBI has vehemently submitted that pursuant to the di-rections issued by the Hon'ble High Court, investigation of the aforesaid was handed over to the CBI, pursuant to which the FIR in question was registered on 29.04.2020 at Police Station, Crime Branch, Chandigarh for the aforesaid offences.

As it turned out, the Bench dis-closes in para 2.1 that, "It is submitted that initially, the accused Aryan Singh was not named in the fresh FIR. However, thereafter, after conclusion of the investigation, the chargesheet came to be filed against the said Aryan Singh also and he has been included as one of the accused."

of the accused." Further, the Bench points out in para 2.2 that, "It is submitted that thereafter both the accused Aryan Singh and Gautam Cheema filed discharge applications before the learned Trial Court, which came to be dismissed on merits. It is submitted that thereafter by the submitted that thereafter by the impugned judgment and order, in exercise of the powers under Sec-tion 482 Cr.P.C., the High Court has quashed the entire criminal proceedings, as if, the High Court was conducting a mini trial."

To put things in perspective, the Bench envisages in para 2.3 that, "It is vehemently submitted that in the facts and circumstances of the case, the High Court has exceeded in its jurisdiction while quashing the entire criminal proceedings against the accused Arvan Singh and Gautam Cheema.

It is vehemently submitted that while quashing the criminal proceedings, the High Court has ob-served that the allegations/ charges against the accused have not been proved and that the pros-ecution is malicious. It is submitted that at the stage of deciding the quashing petitions against the order passed by the learned Trial Court, refusing to discharge the accused, the High Court ought

not to have considered and/or observed that the charges are not proved. It is submitted that the charges are required to be proved during the trial and on the basis of the evidence led. It is further submitted that even the High Court has materially erred in observing that the prosecution is malicious. It is submitted that the investigation was handed over to the CBI, pursuant to the directions issued by the High Court and, thereafter, after conclusion of the investigation, the accused came to be chargesheeted and there-fore, the initiation of the criminal proceedings/proceedings cannot be said to be malicious. It is submitted that whether any criminal proceedings is malicious, is also required to be considered at the conclusion of the trial and not at this stage, namely, at the stage of exercise of powers under Section 482 Cr.P.C.'

For sake of clarity, the Bench observes in para 2.4 that, "Number of submissions have been made on merits also by Shri Natarai, learned ASG, however, for the reasons stated hereinabove, we are inclined to set aside the impugned common judgment and order passed by the High Court by relegating the accused to face the trial and thereafter the trial is to proceed against the accused, we are not considering the submis-sions made on behalf of the CBI as well as on behalf of the accused on merits."

Ouite frankly, the Bench then propounds in para 4 stating that, 'Having gone through the impugned common judgment and order passed by the High Court quashing the criminal proceedings and discharging the accused, we are of the opinion that the High Court has exceeded in its jurisdiction in quashing the entire crimi-nal proceedings in exercise of the limited powers under Section 482 Cr.P.C. and/or in exercise of the powers under Article 226 of the Constitution of India." Most significantly, the Bench

then minces absolutely no words to mandate in para 4.1 holding that, "From the impugned common judgment and order passed by the High Court, it appears that the High Court has dealt with the pro-ceedings before it, as if, the High Court was conducting a mini trial and/or the High Court was con-sidering the applications against the judgment and order passed by the learned Trial Court on conclusion of trial. As per the cardi-nal principle of law, at the stage of discharge and/or quashing of the criminal proceedings, while exercising the powers under Sec-tion 482 Cr.P.C., the Court is not required to conduct the mini trial. The High Court in the common impugned judgment and order has observed that the charges against the accused are not proved. This is not the stage where the pros-ecution/investigating agency is/ are required to prove the charges. The charges are required to be proved during the trial on the basis of the evidence led by the prosecution/investigating agency, Therefore, the High Court has materially erred in going in detail in the allegations and the material collected during the course of the investigation against the accused, at this stage. At the stage of discharge and/or while exercising the powers under Section 482 Cr.P.C., the Court has a very limited jurisdiction and is required to consider "whether any sufficient material is available to proceed further against the accused for which the accused is re-quired to be tried or not"." contd. on page 3

Former MP Atiq Ahmed, his brother shot | With 10,093 new Covid-19 cases, dead in Prayagraj in presence of police

Agency New Delhi, Apr 16:

Former MP Atiq Ahmed and his brother Ashraf were shot dead in presence of police officials as they were being taken to a hospital in Prayagraj on Saturday, reported The Indian Express.

The two brothers were shot as they were talking to the media surrounded by policemen and journalists.

Ahmed, his wife Sahista Parveen, their two sons, Ashraf and others have been booked by the Uttar Pradesh Police in the murder of lawyer Umesh Pal, who was a witness in the killing of Bahujan Samaj Party MLA Raju Pal in 2005. Umesh Pal was shot dead in Prayagraj on February 24.

On Saturday, the man who shot Ahmed and Ashraf and two of this associate surrendered to the police immediately after the firing. They have been identified as Lovlesh, Sunny and Arun Maurya, reported NDTV.

"They are being interrogated and we will know details later," said Prayagraj Police Commissioner Ramit Sharma

The police said that the shooters were disguised as reporters, adding that a journalist and a police constable have been injured, reported

Chief Minister Adityanath has ordered a high-level inves-tigation into the shooting and has formed a three-member judicial commission. Large gath-erings have been banned in all districts of Uttar Pradesh. Four others, including Atiq

Ahmed's son Asad Ahmed. have been killed by the Uttar Pradesh Police so far in "gunfights". Extrajudicial execu-tions, popularly known as "en-counters", have risen since the Bhartiya Janata Party government came to power in Uttar Pradesh in 2017.

Who was Atiq Ahmed? He had a long stint both in politics and with the criminal world. He was first accused in

a murder case in 1979. In the next 10 years, he emerged as a person who had strong influence in the western part of Allahabad city. He won his first election as

The country's total Covid tally currently stands at 4.48 crore (4,48,18,115).

As per the Ministry's lat-est data, the death toll has also climbed to 5,31,114 with 23 deaths recorded in the last 24 hours, taking the fatality

rate to 1.19 per cent. While five deaths were reported from Delhi, three each were from Chattisgarh and Rajasthan, two each from Karnataka and Maharashtra, one each from Haryana, Odisha, Tamil Nadu and Uttarakhand and four reconciled by Kerala, the data updated at 8 am stated.

India also recorded 6,248 recoveries in the last 24 hours, taking the overall discharges to 4.42.29.459.

The recovery rate of the country currently stands at 98.68 per cent. The number of people

who have recuperated from the disease surged to 4,42,29,459, while the case fatality rate was recorded at 1.19 per cent. According to the ministry's website, 220.66 crore doses of Covid vaccine have been administered in the country so far un-der the nationwide vaccination drive.

It thus definitely merits no reiteration of any kind that all the High Courts must definitely without fail pay heed to what the Apex Court has held so very clearly, cogently, composedly and convincingly in this leading case as pointed hereinabove. No doubt, there can certainly be just no denying or disputing it!

Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal appeared be-fore the CBI on Sunday for questioning in the excise policy scam case, officials said. The agency had sum-moned him on Friday last seeking his appearance as a witness before the investigation team to answer their que-ries on the inputs generated during the probe in which his former deputy Manish Sisodia was also arrested on February 26, they said.

Kejriwal arrived in his car at the heavily fortified CBI headquarters, where the Delhi Police has put in place four rings of barricading to pre-vent any possible protests by the Aam Admi Party leaders and supporters. The CBI has kept Sunday for questioning as the neighbourhood, which consists of complexes having government offices, remains closed, thus causing the least



inconvenience to the officials coming here

After his arrival at the ncy headquarters at 11:10 AM, Keiriwal was taken to the first floor office of the Anti-Corruption Branch of the CBI, which is probing the matter. Senior officials of the agency remained present in the office on Sunday to keep an eye on the development, a normal course whenever a VIP comes to the agency, they

said. During the day, which will also include a lunch break, the CBI may ask the chief minis-ter about the policy formula-

tion process, especially the "untraceable" file, which was earlier slated to be put before the Council of Ministers, they said. They said the file containing opinions of the expert committee and public and legal opinions on it was not kept before the council and remains untraceable.

The agency may also quiz Kejriwal on the statements of other accused, where they have indicated the manner in which policy was allegedly in-fluenced to favour some liquor businessmen and the South liquor lobby, they said. In addition, the officials said the agency might also seek his role in formulating the excise policy and his knowledge about the alleged influence being cast by the traders and South lobby members.

Kejriwal may also be asked if he was involved in the for-mulation of the policy before it was given approval, they said. Sisodia was later taken into custody by the Enforcement Directorate last month and remains in judicial custody with his bail plea rejected by the special court on March 31, they said.

While dismissing the bail plea, the court said he played the "most important and vital role in the criminal conspiracy" and had been "deeply involved" informulating and implementing the said policy to ensure the achievement of the objectives of the said conspiracy. The court termed Sisodia "prima facie" as "the architect" of the criminal conspiracy.
