Inquiry ordered into vandalization of Azad Higher Secondary School Kangleipak Students' Asso-

The State Government has ordered an inquiry into the vandalization of Acme Higher Secondary School, Yairipok yesterday by some irate students, inside the ongoing Higher Secondary Ex-amination hall. The vandalization led to the fainting of a female invigilator and 15 students losing conscious-

Basantakumar speaking to the media said, the report of the inquiry would be submitted by Monday and the examination will be postponed for a day or two for the said cen-

The Minister's prompt action came after student organisations of the state Democratic Students' Alli-ance of Manipur (DESAM),

(KSA), Manipuri ts' Federation Students (MSF), and Students' Union of Kangleipak (SUK) demanded action against the student responsible for the vandalization.

A formal police complaint was lodged by Private School Development Com-mittee, Thoubal to Thoubal Police Station for taking up action against the misbehaving students responsible for the vandalizing school properties. Council of Higher Secondary Education Manipur Secretary Ch Biren visited and inspected Azad Higher Secondary School after the unfortunate incident and resumed examina-tion with strict security measures

It may be mentioned that the examination for Class

XII started on February 23 and ends on April 1. A total of 36, 717 students at 120 different examination centers are appearing in this year's examination. For Arts stream, a total of 11391 stu-dents of which 5821 are male and 5570 female students are giving the examination. For Science stream, 24513 students are appearing in the examination, of which 12108 are male and 12405 are female students and for commerce stream, a total of 813 students are appearing in the examination, of which 452 are male and 361 are female candidates. 3205 Non-Government College, 13289 Government Higher Secondary School, 19991 Non- Government Higher Secondary School, and 232 Council Private students are appearing in this year's Class XII examination.

Farewell my departed friends from school to college days

It was shocking and heart-breaking news. Within four days, we have lost two college friends, both with ailments and gone too soon. Their untimely demise was mourned in the whatsapp group created for the 1985 - 90 batch of Assam Engineering College (AEC, Jalukbari, under Gauhati University). First it was Sandeep Goel, who breathed his last on 1 February 2023. I was his classmate in AEC with the same branch (Mechanical Engineering) and used to attend the classes where many acclaimed professors including our principal sir (Aparna K Padmapati) guided us to solve mechanical problems from the and intelligent. Unlike me (many of us), he spoke when only it was necessary. He was otherwise a serious student who later developed himself as a successful professional and eventually an adorable

The second depressing news hit us with the demise of Gunagovinda Buragohain on 4 February. Guna was a student of Chemical Engineering and a boarder of Hostel 7, where we faced the usual trouble days together in the initial college days. A jolly man, Guna was so simple, well behaved and friendly in nature. We experienced all the fond moments while rushing to the college in the morning hours, going to take an

evening tea in nearby Sundarbari market and occasionally visiting the growing city of Guwahati with different missions. Very often we failed in our adventures, but Guna was very optimistic. I tried to support him in many cases with all my energy, space and commitments.

Soon after leaving the college, I opted to work in a newspaper (all my gratitude to AEC professor Surendra Nath Medhi and Natun Dainik's editor Chandra Prasad Saikia). I was often called on by classmate Pradip Medhi, who was looking for a job at that time. He was critical to me for selecting a job with no financial security and he himself imagined a fine future as an engi-neer. But a heart attack cut

short his dream journey, which I came to know very late. Studious AECian friends like Prabal Choudhury (a hardliner debater), Uttam Kumar Roy (fantastic actor and a creative theatre director), Manju Borah (a simple lady), Swapan Kr Das (gentleman in real sense), Bipul Sarma (humble and friendly in nature), Kamal Krishna Gupta (stout and stable). Monilal Brahma (a sweet person), Parag J Baruah (sober personality with a po-etic mind), Ranjit Kr Saraha (smilling lad with a guiter on hands) lost their hard battles in life. Pranabjyoti Bordoloi, an energetic leader of our batch, died in a fatal road ac-cident in college days.

During my high school days at Makhibaha, we en-

countered the untimely demise of classmate Shiva Prasad Thakuria with visibly thick & black hairs, who was suffering from serious illness for some time. He was followed by a number of classmates from our locality in later part of life, who left for the heavenly abode too young. Srimati Barman (married an early age to a distant village), Gopal Seal (who worked for national armed forces), Bhupen Bhattacharya (an agri-engi-Bnattacharya (an agn-engi-neer), Phatik Thakuria (an-other engineer), Mahesh Sarma (a popular footballer), Ranjit Pathak (a strongman among us) and Dilip Deka (who was our first boy in class and went missing nearly two and went missing nearly two decades back during the troubled days in western

Assam) joined the list of departed souls. I remember the day, when

we received horrible news of losing a friend during my school days at Bhojkuchi, a typically isolated village of Nalbari district in central Assam. Some of our friends were playing at the school playground when a white am-bassador car arrived. We followed the vehicle without knowing that one our beloved childhood friends was lying inside it. Our classmate Prahlad Barman (whose handwriting was appreciated by everyone) suffered from some heart related ailments. Just before the seventh standard examination (at that time, it was the last exam in our school), he died in a Guwahati hospital.

For the last time we saw Prahlad, sleeping peacefully at the courtyard amidst heartbro-ken cries in sorrow by his aged mother and other relatives Next day we had a condolence meeting at our school. Everyone wept while remembering him as a bright student with an amiable nature. Until then no photograph of Prahlad was available with his family. Later a close-up snap was arranged from a group photograph, where we all were present on the school campus, and was taken by Tihu-based awardwinning photographer Mahendra Barua just before Prahlad went for treatment in the city. Even today, whenever I visit my village, I can hear his soft and crispy voice while feel-ing his warm presence.

Treating Heat Stress

weather service, 2023 is forecast to be a hotter year than 2022. Heat waves are among the most dangerous of natural hazards, the frequency and intensity of which will rise in the 21st century due to climate change. The Met Office annual global temperature forecast for 2023 suggests that next year will be one of the Earth's hottest years on record.

The mercury is at its peak during the summer. Heat is unbearable even during the early hours of the day. The

summertime in India can be brutal even for the most experienced of us. Besides making us feel tired and zapped, it can even be downright harmful by increasing the risk of heatstroke. Summer is especially warm because during this time that part of the earth is directly under the sun and its rays are focused on the area, drying up ponds and lakes and this can lead to a scarcity of water. Summer days can be extremely hot and people usually the elderly suffer from heat strokes, in the past this has resulted in some deaths, during this season children may also suffer from summer boils. According to the World Health Organisation, more than 1,70,000 people died due to heat waves from 1998-2019

In summer, the heart rate is elevated. When running with a heart rate monitor, remember that higher temperatures also boost our heart rate even if we run at our usual pace. Therefore, it might be a good idea to take it a bit slower. If the outside temperature is too high with unbearable humid, one

should consider doing an abbreviated exercise routine.

Drink lots of liquids to replace the fluids you lose from sweating. Do not wait until you feel like you need a drink. Thirst is not a reliable sign that your body needs fluids. When you exercise, you should take small sips of liquid rather than large drinks. Water is the best drink to replace lost fluids. Water

with salt added can be used if you sweat a lot.

Doctors have always advised small, frequent meals during the day and not to skip breakfast for overall good health of a person. This becomes all the more important during summers as it prevents low blood pressure and dizziness during very hot days.

Fruits like watermelon and grapes nourish and cool our body and give moisture to our skin. They also help to counter the influence of the summer heat.Mango, another popular fruit available during this season, is also very good for health. It clears the skin, eyes, reduces cholesterol, and alkalizes the whole body. But, it should be consumed in limited quantity as too much

consumption can raise the body heat and might cause stomach problems.

Don't forget to put on sunglasses when going out. Even wide-brimmed hats are effective to protect oneself from the sun. There are some who prefer to cover their heads with scarfs, stoles or dupattas. This is also a good option but make sure that the scarf or stole is of a light material like cotton. This will prevent the heat from directly reaching your head. It will also protect

It spreads by bacteria, viruses, toxins, and chemicals which, post entering the human body, cause the onset of stomach pain, nausea, diarrhea or vomiting. RSS has a major role in BJP Poll campaign in three North Eastern States

Sangh Parivar fighting with its back to the wall in Meghalaya, Nagaland

The central leadership of the BJP has been focusing its attention on the north eastern states of the country since then coming into power of the Party in 2014 and in its expansionist efforts, the main vehicle has been the RSS. In the present phase of the assembly polls to the three states Tripura, Meghalaya and Nagaland, all senior leaders of the BJP have campaigned including the Prime Minister Narendra Modi and the Home Minister Amit Shah. The polls in Tripura took place on February 16, the polling in the other two states is scheduled on February 27

North East is the most favourite destination for the RSS, and of course its political wing BJP. The party which till two decades ago was alien to the people of the re gion has emerged as the only ruling party all India party and has been virtually dictating the political discourse. Like any other state the expansion and growth of the BJP owes to the Congress factor. Former Assam Congress leader Himanta Biswa Sarma shifting his loyalty to the BJP helped the party open its account in the North East, after defeating the Congress in the

Assam assembly election.

The wrong handling of the Assam movement launched by the All Assam Student Union by the Congress provided the much needed opportunity to the RSS to enter into the mainstream politics through L K Advani in early eighties. In recent times, riding on crest of the election victory, taking inspiration from Assam win, the party managed to expand into Christian-dominated states like Meghalaya, Nagaland, Mizoram besides the Hindu-dominated state of Tripura.

Apparently BJP's slogan of Hindutva and communal politics preached by the Assam chief minister Himanta laid the foundation for ascendance. But it was the si-lent work and sustained campaign of converting tribals into Hindus by the RSS since India attained Independence that moulded its growth and provided the readymade forum to take on Con-

After Tripura, the two other states that will go to election are Nagaland and Meghalaya. Both these states will have elections on February 27, to elect its 60 representatives. Meghalaya has a population of 29.67 lakh with 74.59 percent Christians. Hindus constitute 11.53 percent while 4.4 percent are Muslims. The Congress had won 29 seats in the 2013 state poll, the BJP had won none. The political spectrum changed fast in the state.
RSS started operations in spectrum changed fast in the state. RSS started operations in Meghalaya with setting first shakha in 1946 under Vasantrao Oak in Shillong. The state was then a part of Assam. It attained full statehood on 21 January, 1972.

After that they started working among Garos, Jaintias and Khasis. They also started programmes for the Hajong and Koch communities which are tribes. It was their social work that made them acceptable in the re-gion. At present the RSS has 6000 swayamsevaks. This number is quite encouraging since the state is dominated by Christians. In 2016 they had held "Know RSS" programme which was attended by 300 teachers out of which 125 were Christians. At present, there are 46 shakha, 30 milan (weekly meet) and 35 mandali (monthly meet) in Meghalaya.

Winning the assembly elec-tion is issue of life and death more for RSS as BJP losing the election will hasten up the process of peoples' action against the RSS. In Tripura also the emergence of BJP as the ruling party owes to the astonishing devotion of the RSS. The feedback from the think tank of the RSS helped erode the base of the CPI(M). Former Tripura chief minister Manik Sarkar had successfully converted the state into a Left bas-tion initially but the CPM could not motivate the party cadres and leaders to listen to the peoples' groaning. The long CPI(M) rule under Sarkar led to stagnation and acute unemployment. RSS exploited the situation and BJP

came to power.

Although the Naga People's Front (NPF) is an alliance partner of the BJP at the Centre, Manipur and in Nagaland, the BJP is yet to make any significant progress in this northeastern state. With 88 percent of its population being Christians the RSS has been finding a tough proposition to penetrate the region. The fact remains that religious equation has made the job far tougher for the RSS in its effort to gain a strong foothold in the state. As of today it has only

two shakha running in Dimapur.

Though RSS has developed some amount of base in Meghalaya, it is unlikely that it is sufficient to ensure electoral victory to BJP in the state. RSS enabling the BJP to form North Eastern Democratic Alliance in 2016, a platform of non-Congress parties in the region with the avowed aim to keep the Congress out of power has not proved to be so effective.

Stakes are high for the BJP, but more than that of the RSS. BJP will lose the electoral battle, but the RSS will face erosion of its base. In early years the people of the region, especially the tribals and Christians had not perceived the RSS as a major threat. However the recent attack of the RSS and BJP on their social and cultural bases have scared them of losing their identity. Obviously for the RSS and BJP it is a do or die situation. They cannot lose the gains made during these years. The nature of the stakes gets reflected in party's meticulous and long term planning for the forthcoming Assembly elections in Tripura, Meghalaya and Nagaland.

Though the North eastern states have emerged as a strong base of the RSS and BJP, the fact remains that it is still tough for emerge as the major ruling party in the region. The BJP had put a strong fight in Tripura and it is go-ing to do the same in Nagaland and

Meghalava where the elections will be held on February 27. True enough the 2023 assembly polls in Northeast are a semifinal to 2024 general elections.

The alliance between the BJF and the National People's Party (NPP) in Meghalaya has been quite fragile. The BJP had supported the Conrad Sangma-led NPP to form a government. But both are fighting separately. Meghalaya has a legacy of political instability with constant changing of parties by the MLAs. In the state BJP is not a major player. The Garo and Khasi division in the state affects the voting patterns. With about 75% population being Christian and about 12% population Hindu, the Congress has enjoyed a hold over the Shillong region and the NPP has had a hold over the Tura re-

In Nagaland, meanwhile, the key issue is peace and security. The maverick stand of the BJP has turned the regional outfits not to rely on it. The ruling Nationalist Democratic Progressive Party (NDPP) has been trying to negoti-ate a peace agreement with various militant groups, and the outcome of these negotiations will be a key factor in the elections. They nursed the impression that Union Home Minister Amit Shah would announce complete abrogation of the AFSPA (the Armed Forces (Special Powers) Act). But it has not happened.

The state has also been facing

demands from seven tribes for the creation of a separate "Frontier Nagaland" by carving out 16 districts. Recently, the central government held meetings with the East-People's Nagaland Organisation (ENPO) to find a way out of this problem.

As in Meghalaya, in Nagaland too, BJP is a secondary player. The National Democratic Progressive Party (NDPP) of Chief Minister Neiphiu Rio depends upon help from the BJP to frustrate the ef orts of Naga People's Front (NPF) (IPA Service)

G20 meeting in India ends without consensus on Russia-Ukraine war

Agency New Delhi, Feb 26:

A meeting of finance chiefs of the Group of 20 economies ended on Saturday without a joint statement after China and Russia opposed the inclusion of text criticising the war in Ukraine.

India, which hosted the meeting in Bengaluru, issued a "chair's summary" stating that there were "different as-sessments of the situation" in Ukraine and on sanctions imposed on Russia.

Russia refers to its actions in Ukraine as a "special mili-tary operation" that is necessary to prevent Kyiv from be-ing used as a platform for Western aggression. It avoids describing the conflict as an invasion or war.

India had also urged delegates at Saturday's meeting to avoid using the word "war" in any official statement, uniden-tified G20 officials told Reuters. The development came a day after India abstained from voting on a resolution in the United Nations General Assembly that called for the unconditional withdrawal of Russian troops

from Ukraine.

New Delhi has maintained a neutral stance in the conflict and not explicitly condemned Russia's invasion of Ukraine



India has also sharply increased its imports of Russian oil since the war started, with the country's foreign minister S Jaishankar repeatedly defending the move

Delegates told Reuters that China and Russia did not want the G20 meeting in Bengaluru to be used for political issues.

A footnote in India's summary on Saturday said that two paragraphs were adapted from the G20 Bali declaration in November. Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman told reporters that China and Russia had reservations about this.

The declaration said that "most members strongly condemned the war in Ukraine and mense human suffering and exacerbating existing fragilities in the global economy - constraining growth, increasing inflation, disrupting supply chains, heightening energy and food insecurity, and el-evating financial stability

It added, "There were other views and different assessments of the situation and sanc-tions. G-20 is not the forum to resolve security issues, we ac-knowledge that security issues can have significant con-sequences for the global economy."

The second paragraph of the declaration, opposed by both the countries, stated: "It is essential to uphold interna-

tional law and the multilateral system that safeguards peace and stability...The use or threat of use of nuclear weap-ons is inadmissible. The peaceful resolution of conflicts, efforts to address crises, as well as diplomacy and dialogue, are vital. Today's era must not be

German Finance Minister Christian Lindner said the failure to reach an agreement on the joint communique was re-

"This is a war," she had said on Friday. "And this war has a cause, has one cause, and that is Russia and Vladimir Putin. That must be expressed clearly at this G20 finance meet-

Nagpur man held for making Hoax **Bomb Call to Mumbai Police**

The Mumbai Police arrested one Ashwin Mhaiskar (29) a Nagpur resi-dent, from Palghar, on charges of making hoax bomb call and passing on false information that huge quantity of explo-sives have landed in the city, on Saturday.

The accused called up the south region control room of the Mumbai Police at about 1.35 pm on Friday. Soon the police swung into action. They carried out searches at multiple locations, including the landing points, sensitive and crowded areas and beefed up the security. After through searches the call was turned out to be a hoax. This was the

eighth hoax terror call received

The accused without identifying himself, told the police that there would be a blast in parts of south Mumbai including a government hospital and crowded places in the city. He informed the police that, 90 kg explosives have already landed on February 23 at a coastal area and it would be used to carry out bomb blasts in different parts of south Mumbai. He told the police that the blasts would take place at Bhendi Bazar, JJ hospital area, Null Bazar, etc.

After working on the tech-nical clues, the officials of the JJ Marg Police located the caller to Dahanu in Palohar area. He was traced and ar-rested in the matter within 9 hours of the crime, the police

After the call was termed as a hoax, the JJ Marg Police registered a case (No 74/2023) against the caller and booked him under sections 506 (2) (criminal intimidation), 504 (1) (intentional insult with intent to provoke breach of the peace), 179 (refuse to answer the public servant), 182 (false Information) of the Indian Penal Code and began to look for the caller. Subsequently they

Delhi Excise policy case: Sisodia appears before CBI for questioning

Agency New Delhi, Feb 26:

Amidst fresh apprehensions that he might get arrested, Delhi Deputy Chief Minister Manish Sisodia reached the headquarters of the Central Bureau of Investigation in New Delhi around 11.15 am, to answer

which is probing the Delhi Excise Policy 2021-22 scam in which an allegedly erroneous policy was enforced by the AAP Government that caused losses to the Delhi Government and benefitted liquor traders through a planned conspiracy.

Sisodia who is accused number 1 along with 14 others in the FIR registered pertaining to the scam last year, told reporters on Sunday before heading to CBI headquarters that he doesn't care if he has to stay in jail for a few months. In his tweet, the Delhi Deputy CM said "Going to the CBI today again. Will cooperate fully in the entire investigation. The love of lakhs of children and the blessings of crores of countrymen are with us. I don't care if I have to stay in

jail for a few months,". On February 19, he skipped CBI summon for question apprehending arrest and had sought more time from the agency, citing that he was in the midst of finalising the budget for Delhi and the draft is at a very crucial stage. The CBI has sum-moned Sisodia for the second time in connection with the ongoing investigations of corruption in the Delhi Excise Policy. which was allegedly 'tweaked' to benefit liquor traders that resulted in losses to the tune of Rs. 2873 crores to the Delhi Govern

Sisodia seeking time on February 19 told reporters that if he gets arrested, the public of Delhi and the government employees will suffer as he is the finance minister of Delhi and needs to finalise the Budget. Sisodia tweeted last Sunday before taking a decision to skip questioning wake of the Delhi Budget plan-ning. He said "They have deployed the full forces of the CBI and the ED (Enforcement Directorate) against me; raided my house, searched my bank locker, yet they found nothing. I have made arrangements to ensure good education for the children of Delhi. They want to stop it. I have always coop-erated with the investigation

and will continue to do so."

This is the second occasion that the CBI has asked Sisodia to make himself available at the agency's headquarters in New Delhi to anwer queries related to the Delhi excise scam. He was summoned last year (2022) on October 17. During this, he was questioned for almost 9 hours. The CBI sleuth also paid a recent visit to Sisodia's office at Delhi Secretariat on January 14, "to gather certain information"
