Expert Committee report on Liquor Legalisation by March end: Chief Minister

IT News Imphal, Mar 3:

On the last day of the ensuing 3rd session of the 12th Manipur Legislative Assembly, Leader of the House N. Biren Singh, replying to a question raised by MLA K. Ranjit Singh, said that an expert committee has been constituted to look into liquor legalization. He also said that the expert committee will submit a report by the end of this month. Responding to another question raised by the MLA, Chief Minister N. Biren informed the House that there are 2,28,520 hectares of land under paddy cultivation in the State. From 2017 to January 2023, 3,017 cases have

been registered for violation of the Paddy land and Wet-land Act, 2014, the CM added.

Replying to a question raised by MLA Paolienlal Haokip, Chief Minister N. Biren said that 18.500.6 acres of poppy plantations had been destroyed since the in-ception of "War on Drugs" till date. The Chief Minister further said thatthe government will extend all possible assistance to poppy planters on humanitarian ground even if there is no definite plan to provide livelihood means for

Replying to a question raised by MLA Th. Lokeshwar Singh, Fisheries Minister H. Dingo Singh said that fish pond scheme is available under the Pradhan Mantri Matsya Sampada Yojana (PMMSY) and that fish farmers belonging to SC/ST/ Women will receive 60% sub-sidy whereas the subsidy will be 40% for general category.

Replying to a question raised by MLA Surjakumar Okram, Rural Development & Panchayati Raj Y. KhemchandSingh informed that the expected amount receivable under MGNREGS for ceivable under MGNREGS for 100 days for the year 2020-21, 2021-22 and 2022-23 are 1301.86 Crores, 1398.07 Crores and 1498.47 crores re-

spectively.

Later, the Leader of the House laid three papers on the table of the House: (i) Medium Term Fiscal Policy

Statement, Fiscal Policy Strategy Statement & Macro Eco-nomic Framework Statement and Disclosures (ii) Report of the Fourth Manipur State Fi-nance Commission 2021-2026, Volume I & II and (iii) Explanatory Memorandum as to the Action Taken on the Recommendations made by the 4th Manipur State Finance Commission in its Report submit-ted on 31.07.2021.The Leader of the House also moved the Manipur Appropriation (No. 2) Bill, 2023 (Bill No. 3 of 2023) for consideration and pass

Leader of Opposition Okram Ibobi Singhand MLA K. Raniit Singh also expressed their observations on the Appropriation Bill.

Union Minister of State for External Affairs RK Ranjan Singh on Thursday said that the ambitious Kaladan Multi-Modal Transit Transport Project (KMMTTP) was delayed due to political un-certainty in Myanmar. He said that the Centre

prioritises the bilateral crossborder project and also the waterways project with Bangladesh under the Act

East policy.
"Because of the unpredictable atmosphere occurring in Myanmar, our progress in view of the Kaladan project is a bit derailing," Singh told a news conference here.

He said that the Kaladan



project was strategically planned by the Centre to connect the northeastern part of the country with Indo-Pa-cific countries.

"The Kaladan project is

intentionally and strategi-cally planned by the Centre with the full cooperation of the Mizoram government. The project, if it comes true, will help us to be exposed to the Indian ocean and also link us with all Indo-pacific countries," Singh, who is also from the Northeast

(Manipur), said. Even though the Kaladan project was derailing, the Centre has an alternative and is looking for waterways towards Bangladesh, accord-ing to the Union Minister.

Rail connectivity in North-East: Construction of new Jiribam -Imphal line nears completion

To boost rail connectivity in the North-Eastern states, Indian Railways is executing several projects in full swing in the region. Of these, the Jiribam – Imphal new line rail-way project is of immense importance. On completion of the track work, the capital city of Manipur will get connected to the rest of the country. Pres-ently, the construction of a new track between Jiribam and Imphal is at the final stage.

The 110 km long Jiribam to Imphal new line railway project has 52 tunnels and bridges in tough terrains. Among the tun-nels, tunnel number 12 is the

longest tunnel of this project. It passes through the most complex geological condition having fragile soil type conditions. The 10.275 km long tunnel includes a 529 metre RCC Ramp with a parallel safety tun-nel of length 8.30 km.

The construction work of the tunnel has been one of the

most challenging jobs for the railway authorities. Considering the complex geological condition of Imphal valley, the North East Frontier Railway has adopted vertical shaft technology to build tunnels. Normally, this sort of technology was used in Metro projects but for the first time in the history of the zonal railway, the vertical shaft technology was fol-

The Vertical Shaft technology helps to reduce the construction time of balance tunnelling stretch and thereby expedites the progress of the tunnel work. All the tunnelling activities will be done through a vertical shaft with the help of a Gantry Crane and other modern machinery. In FY 2023-24, the Ministry

of Railways is also focusing to boost connectivity to the remotest part of the country. For this, the laying of the track is most important. The ministry has set a target to lay tracks for a distance of 7,000 km in the next fiscal. This includes new lines, doubling, tripling, gauge

North East trusted in **BJP Ruling**

Voters in three northeastern states who recently voted have placed their trust in the ruling parties and alliances. The results of the assembly elections in the three northeastern states are encouraging for the BJP but concerning for the Congress. This is possibly the first time that the assembly elections in the northeastern states have piqued the interest of the entire country. The good news for the country is that the previously isolated Northeast is becoming more connected to the rest of the country. Without a doubt, the BJP's victory in Tripura, a former Leftist stronghold, is surprising, while its coalition government has re-

trined to Nagaland.

The BJP has crossed the double-digit threshold in this state for the first time. Where the BJP is strong, it forms governments on its own, while where it is weak, it accepts the role of a minor party. The BJP attributes its success to an increase in vote percentage in Meghalaya. It could be argued that keeping the Northeast on the agenda is advantageous for the BJP. The impact of the Prime Minister's constant visits to the Northeast is also visible in the election results.

To bring the Northeast into the country's mainstream, the Prime Minister has stated that it is neither far from Delhi nor far from the heart. However, the BJP's formation of governments in Tripura and Nagaland, as well as its efforts to form a government in Meghalaya, lays the groundwork for assembly elections in several key states this year. However, a Tripura government led by the BJP and the Indigenous People's Front is forming. It is attempting to form a new government in Meghalaya with the

NPP, which was a partner in the previous alliance. This is what the preliminary results of the talks indicate. In Nagaland, the BJP is forming a government with the NDPP. The BJP demonstrated its growing mass base by winning 12 seats for the first time. In Nagaland and Meghalaya, the BJP has no qualms about becoming a minor power partner. Indeed, the BJP's strategies have become increasingly focused on the 2024 Lok Sabha elections. There was speculation that Rahul 2024 Lok Sabha elections. There was speculation that Rahul Gandhi's Bharat Jodo Yatra would affect the elections there and that Congress would reap its benefits. That didn't happen, though. The results of the NE poll represent another setback for Congress, which suffered embarrassing losses in Punjab and Gujarat last year. The party drew a blank in Nagaland, queered the pitch for the Left in Tripura, and failed to prevent the defection of Mukul Sangma to the TMC in Meghalaya. That is bad news for the big old party, which now faces more pressure in other elections this year.

Startups & North-East India connect: Untapped potential

The term "startup" became popular in the late 1990s as a result of the "dot-com" bubble. Although the term does not have a universally accepted definition, it is commonly understood to refer to new businesses. According to DPIIT, an entity will be considered a "start-up" for a period of 10 years from the date of incorporation/registration and if its revenue for any of the financial years since incorporation/registra-tion has not exceeded Rs 100 crore. The startups are expected to focus on the innovation & improvement of products, services, processes, and are crucial economic develop-ment agents, and sustainable growth. They generate employment, promote social inclusion and reduce income disparities. They have technological advancement and eco-nomic growth in both developed and emerging markets today. The global startup economy is propelled by the growth and innovation of startups.

There is no denying that Startups are key drivers of global economic growth due to their capacity to rapidly develop innovative solutions. With the assistance of funding entities, incubators, technology provid-ers, and policymakers, their focus on cutting-edge technology and disrup-tive innovation has aided their global expansion. During COVID-19 pandemic, startups played a crucial role in driving innovation and adapting to rapidly changing market de-mands by launching a variety of digital health services, "contactless" food delivery, and remote working and learning tools.

India's startup ecosystem has developed tremendously from 400 registered startups in 2014 to ap-proximately 85,000 registered

startups with more than 100 unicorns and a combined valuation of \$350 billion. India has the third-highest number of unicorns in the world thus it is only a matter of time until it tops this list. According to research Nasscom, India added more than 1,300 active technology firms in the past year, bringing the overall num-ber of active technology startups to between 25,000 and 27,000. In addition, the nation added over 23 unicorns in CY2022, ranking it second in the world.

The expansion of India's startup ecosystem can be attributed to a number of government initiatives designed to encourage entrepreneurship in the nation. Launched in 2016, the Startup India programme provides startup companies with tax breaks, self-certification, and expe-dited patent applications. Other initiatives, such as the Atal Innovation Mission and Digital India, are centred on fostering innovation and creating a digital infrastructure and startup-friendly ecosystem. A national network of incubation centres and accelerators, offering co-work ing spaces, investor access, and networking opportunities, has been established to provide access to resources and mentorship. Because of all these initiatives India has become one of the most vibrant startup ecosystems and has attracted global attention and investment.

India's 41-place rise on the Glo-bal Innovation Index over the last seven years can be attributed to the government's unwavering efforts, and this demonstrates the importance of innovation & innovation is main ingredient for a startup. The Indian startup ecosystem has benefited from a growing network of angel investors and incubators, as well as partnerships among startups, corporations, and universities.

Historically India's startup ecosystem has been linked to tier 1 cit-ies like Mumbai, Bengaluru, Hyderabad, and Delhi. However, a startup ecosystem is gradually gaining traction in India's north-eastern region. As a result of government policies and initiatives, the number of startups in North-east is increas-ing exponentially.

The startup ecosystem in the Northeast is comprised of over 900 DPIIT-recognized startups that have created over 8,800 jobs, with around 42% of these startups having at least one female director.

The Northeast Entrepreneurship Fellowship was established to advance the startup ecosystem. It is a unique programme that connects, networks, and trains entrepreneurs from the entire Northeast. Since the launch of Startup India as a national platform, the number of startups in the Northeast has grown, and in November 2022, Startup India hosted ASCEND (Accelerating Startup Calibre & Entrepreneurial Drive) workshops in the states of the Northeast. The North-eastern Council, with the B-School Incubator IIM Calcutta Innovation Park has launched the first-ever North-East Entrepreneurship Development Programme (NEEDP) at the NEC Secretariat in Nongrim Hills, Shillong The initiative, which is considered a ground-breaking initiative, which will benefit beneficiaries from all eight states in the region as it aims to identify and empower 270 promising entrepreneurs from North-East India via well-planned incubation and pre-incubation programmes.

The Northeast Venture Fund (NEVF), which was founded in collaboration with the North-eastern Development Finance Corporation Ltd (NEDFi), intends to equip com panies in the region with the funding they need to grow and attract outside investment.

The establishment of some of the finest educational institutions, such as IIM and NIFT, will go a long way towards establishing the Northeast as a resource and training destina-tion of choice. The Meghalaya Institute of Entrepreneurship is an additional government organisation dedicated to enterprise development and capacity building for state residents.

The Northeast region of India has tremendous potential for investment, trade, and startups . To establish a robust startup ecosystem, it is essential to provide aspiring innovators and founders with the infrastructure, guidance, and support they require from ecosystem enablers such as incubators, men-tors, and academia, Government of India had taken a number of initiatives to make this happen. It has become an attractive location for entrepreneurs as a result of signifi-cant improvements in transportation and connectivity over the past few years and concerted administrative efforts. Young people & entrepre-neurs are increasingly drawn to the region to explore its untapped potential by utilising the government's various supportive policies and measures. As India continues to attract global attention, it is time to unlock the potential of the North-

east and open it to the world.

Speaking from the experience of working as the head of the government for more than 20 years, the Prime Min-ister emphasized that the desired results are achieved within the stipulated time when all stakeholders align themselves with any strategic deci-sions taken by the government. He expressed happiness at the suggestions received through the post-budget webinars that have been conducted so far.

The Prime Minister underlined the need to think out of the box and plan ahead to take tourism in India to new heights. Throwing light on the parameters before a tourist destination is developed, the Prime Minister listed out the potential of the place, ease of travelling to the destination, and new ways to promote the that emphasizing these parameters helps in preparing a

roadmap for the future. The Prime Minister highlighted the huge scope of tourism in the country and listed out coastal tourism, beach tourism, mangrove tourism. Himalayan tourm, adventure tourism, wildlife tourism, eco-tourism, heritage tourism, spiritual tourism, wedding destinations, tourism via conferences and sports tourism. He also gave the example of Ramayan Circuit, Buddha Circuit, Krishna Cir-cuit, Northeast Circuit, Gandhi Circuit, and pilgrimages of all saints, and stressed the need to work together collectively on this The Prime Minister informed that several places in India have been identified through the route of competi-tive spirit and challenge in this year's Budget while also focus-sing on the holistic development of the destinations. Modi asked for a detailed discussion on how different stakeholders can be engaged.
The Prime Minister busted

the myth that tourism is a fancy word associated only with the high-income groups of the country. He noted that yatras have been a part of India's cultural and social life for centuries and people used to go on pilgrimages even when there were no resources available to them. He gave the example of Char Dham Yatra, Dwadash Jyotirling Yatra, 51 Shaktipeeth Yatra and said that it is used to connect the places of our faith while also strengthening the unity of the country. Observing that the entire economy of many big cities of the country was dependent on these yatras, the Prime Minister lamented the lack of development to enhance facilities suited to the times despite the age-old tradition of yatras. He pointed out that hundreds of years of slavery and the politi-cal neglect of these places in the decades after independence were the root cause that inflicted damage to the country. "The India of today is changing this situation" Prime Minister interjected as he noted that the increase in the facilities leads to an increase in the attraction among the tourists. He gave the example of

Kashi Vishwanath Dham in

Varanasi and informed that

around 80 lakh people used to visit the temple in a year before it was rebuilt, but the tourist footfall crossed 7 crores last year after the renovation. He also informed that 15 lakh devotees have gone to see Baba Kedar compared to only 4-5 lakhs before the completion of reconstruction work in Kedarghati, Similarly in Pavagadh of Gujarat, the Prime Minister informed that 80 thousand pilgrims go for the darshan of Maa Kalika compared to only 4 to 5 thousand people before the renovation. The Prime Minister noted that the increase in facilities has a direct impact on the number of tourists and the increasing numbers mean more opportunities for employment and self-employment. The Prime Minister also touched upon the Statue of Unity, the tallest statue in the world and informed that 27 lakh tourists visited the place within a year of its completion. He underlined that India's tourism sector can increase manifold with growing civic amenities, good digital connectivity, good hotels and

hospitals, no trace of filth, and excellent infrastructure. The Prime Minister also mentioned the Kankaria lake project in Ahmedabad, Gujarat and informed that skill development for those working in the food stalls was carried out apart from the redevelopment of the lake. He emphasized on cleanliness along with modern infrastructure and informed that about 10,000 people visit the place every day despite the applicable entry fees. "Every tourist destination can also develop its own revenue model", the Prime Minister said

"Our villages are becoming centers of tourism", the Prime Minister remarked as he underlined that remote villages are now coming up on the tour-ism map due to their improving infrastructure. He informed that the Central Government has started the Vibrant Village Scheme for the villages situated along the border and emphasized the need to support businesses such homestays, small hotels and restaurants.

Throwing the spotlight on the increasing number of foreign tourists in India, the Prime Minister noted the growing attraction towards India and inrmed that 8 lakh foreign tour-

ists have come to India in January this year compared to only 2 lakhs in January last year. The Prime Minister also underlined the need to profile such tourists and create a special strat-egy to attract them to the coun-try who have the maximum spending capacity. He informed that foreign tourists who come to India spend an average of \$1700, while international trav-elers spend an average of \$2500 in America and around \$5000 in Australia. "India has a lot to offer to high-spending tour-ists", he pointed out. The Prime Minister stressed that every state needs to change its tourism policy to align with this thought. He gave the example of bird watchers who camp in the country for months and underlined that policies should be made to target such potential tourists.

Highlighting the basic challenge of the tourism sector, the Prime Minister pointed out the lack of professional tourist guides here and stressed the need for certificate courses in local colleges for guides. He suggested that guides working in a particular tourist destina tion should also have a specific dress or uniform so that tourists will come to know at first glance. The Prime Minister noted that a tourist's mind is full of questions and guides can help them find answers to all those questions.

The Prime Minister also stressed promoting school and college trips to the northeast so that more people become aware and start developing infrastruc-ture and facilities for tourists. He also emphasized promoting wedding destinations as well as sports destinations. The Prime Minister insisted on developing 50 such tourist destinations that every tourist from around the globe is bound to visit on his trip to India. He also men tioned developing apps for tour-ist destinations in all lan-guages listed in the United Na-

Concluding the address the Prime Minister expressed confidence that this webinar will seriously consider every aspect related to tourism and come up with better solutions. Tourism has the same potential in the country as agricul-ture, real estate development, infrastructure and textile", the

Meghalaya: NPP chief Conrad Sangma meets governor, stakes claim to form government

Meghalava chief minister and NPP national presi-dent Conrad Sangma, on Friday, met governor Phagu Chauhan and staked claim to form new government in the state.

Conrad Sangma claimed that his party – the NPP – has an "absolute majority with 32 MLAs" in the 60member Meghalaya legisla-tive assembly.

We have an absolute majority. The BJP has already extended its support. Some others have also given their support," said NPP chief Conrad Sangma.

Conrad Sangma also "submitted the letter of resignation as chief minister of Meghalaya" to governor Phagu Chauhan in the meet-

ing.
Two BJP leaders – AL Hek and Sanbor Shullai who secured victory from their respective constituencies also accompanied Conrad Sangma in the meeting with the Meghalaya governor.

The National People's

Party (NPP) emerged as the single-largest party in the state, bagging 26 seats out of the 59 constituencies that went to polls recently.

The United Democratic Party (UDP), which was NPP's ally in the Sangma government, emerged as the second-largest party, winning 11 constituencies.

Meanwhile, the BJP had also advised its state unit in Meghalaya to support the NPP in forming the next government in the state.

The newly formed Voice of the People Party (VPP) won four seats, while the Hill State People's Demo-cratic Party (HSPDP) and the People's Democratic Front won two seats each. Two Independent candidates also emerged victori-

India records 283 new Covid-19 cases, active tally at 2,525

India logged 283 new coronavirus infections. while the active cases rose to 2,525, according to the Union Health Ministry data updated on Friday.

According to news agency, the death toll stands at 5,30,772.

The Covid case tally was recorded at 4.46 crore (4,46,87,162) and the national recovery rate has been recorded at 98.80 per cent, the ministry said.

The number of people who have recuperated from the disease surged to 4,41,53,865, while the case fatality rate was recorded at According to the ministry's website, 220.63 crore doses of Covid vaccine have been administered in the country so far under the nationwide vaccination

Meanwhile Maharashtra on Thursday logged 48 new Covid-19 cases, taking the overall tally to 81,37,710, while no fresh death linked to the infection was registered in the state, said the health department.

The death toll remained unchanged at 1,48,421, said the health department in a

As per the bulletin, the Pune administrative circle re-ported the highest 26 new cases followed by 11 in the Mumbai circle, seven in

Nashik, two in Akola, one each in Latur and Kolhapur

An administrative circle consists of multiple districts.

The number of recoveries rose to 79,89,065 after 22 patients recuperated from the respiratory illness in the last 24 hours, leaving the state with 224 active cases, said the bulletin.

Of the 224 active Covid-19 cases, the highest 69 are in Pune district, followed by 58 in Mumbai and 33 in Thane district, among others, it said.

7th Pay Commission: Good news for Central Govt Employees! DA hike announcement expected after March 8

Agency New Delhi, Mar 3:

The Narendra Modi-led government is expected to make an announcement regarding Dearness Allowance (DA), and Dearness Relief (DR) hike soon. Reports said that the Centre is planning to revise DA from the current 38% to 42% and the fitment factor for lakhs of employees after Holi,

which falls on March 8.

If the reports come true,

an employee who receives Rs 15,500 in 4200 Grade Pay would get a total pay of Rs 39, 835, by multiplying (Rs 15,500 x 2.57) as per the 6th Central Pay Commission. For the unversed, the common fitment factor, currently is at

Previously, the 6th CPC had approved a fitment ratio at 1.86 %, while the 7th CPC recommended 2.57%, at which the employees are being paid currently. But now the employees are demanding that the fitment factor should be hiked to 3.68. Once their demand gets a goahead from the centre, their minimum wage would be in-creased to Rs 26,000 from Rs

Economic Times re-ported that the new salary would be effected from January 23. Notably, the dearness allowance (DA) and dearness relief (DR) of government employees are revised twice a year, effective January 1 and July 1.
